

Lecture series, "Adventures in Research" continues with Dr. Bennetta Jules-Rosette's lecture on "A Comparison Between African and American Religious Cults"

The spring quarter "Adventures in Research" lecture series at the University of California, San Diego will get underway Wednesday, April 8, with a talk by Dr. Bennetta Jules-Rosette, chairperson of the Department of Sociology.

Dr. Jules-Rosette will discuss "A Comparison Between African and American Religious Cults" in an illustrated noon lecture in Conference Room 111A, Administrative Complex.

Dr. Jules-Rosette earned her doctorate in social relations at Harvard University and has spent considerable time doing field research on religious movements in the African countries of Zaire and Zambia. More recently she has spent time in the San Francisco Bay Area doing research on American religious Cults.

Her talk is part of the continuing "Adventures in Research" lecture series which gives the university community and the general public an opportunity to learn more about current research projects at UC San Diego.

Three more talks are scheduled for the spring quarter. On April 22, Dr. Moira Roth of visual arts will discuss contemporary women's art; on May 13, Dr. Gilbert Hegemier of applied mechanics and engineering sciences will talk about structural safety and earthquakes, and on May 27, anthropologist Dr. Shirley Strum will discuss her research with a baboon troupe in Africa.
