# Budget Cuts Put UC In Danger

Governor George Deukmejian recently enacted an amendment to his 1983-84 budget that will drastically cut the University of California's allocation. This article, the first of two parts will explore the impact on the university statewide. The second part, to be run on Monday, will detail specific problems that loom on the horizon for UCSD.

Citing fears that UC may "slip into the second rank," the Regents have charged president David Saxon with the task of personally delivering a resolution to Governor Deukmejian asking that he restore cuts imposed on the university's 1983-84 budget.

The action was in direct response to an amendment Deukmejian made to the state budget which calls for cuts to the University of California totalling \$50 million, including \$17 million that had been earmarked for faculty and staff pay increases. As of June 1, faculty salaries will be 18.5 percent below those of comparable universities if the cuts are not restored.

University officials are currently lobbying the state legislature to reinstate the Governor's cuts. If these efforts prove unsuccessful, however, there is a good chance that student fees will be raised even beyond the \$150 increase already approved by the Regents, according to Bill Baker, special assistant to the president for the university budget.

"We're sure not eager to raise fees." said Baker. "but we're not interested in running a mediocre institution either."

The cuts were imposed by Deukmejian on various state programs to forestall triggering a one-cent increase in the state sales tax that will take effect if revenues fall below a predetermined level. The university had requested \$1.25 billion from the state, but Deukmejian's original budget, presented in January. lagging faculty salaries. As those salaries become less and less competitive, professors are leaving UC to take positions at other schools or, in some cases, in private industry.

In the long term, this problem is particularly serious because of the difficulty in attracting good talent. "It'll take a long, long time to rebuild the faculty," says Baker, "and we've lost a lot already."

Saxon noted that, "University salaries must become competitive, and soon, so the university can continue to attract and retain the most able individuals. Failure to do this will surely damage the quality of university programs in the future."

— As budgets have fallen short of need in the past, one of the first areas cut was facilities maintenence. As it stands now, the university estimates it will need \$1 billion over the next decade to repair buildings, physicial plant, and instructional faicilities.

The regents had requested \$82.3 million for new construction in 1983-84, but Deukmejian's allocaiton of \$2.6 million represents a "miniscule amount when compared to the enormity of our need," said Saxon after a special meeting of the Board of Regents on May 5.

- Since the passage of Proposition 13 in 1978, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) has increased 59 percent, while UC's budget has increased an average of only 68 percent. During the same period, student enrollment was up 24 percent.

 The University had requested \$20 million to cover price increases in such areas as library books and utilities. Deukmejian has eliminated that fund altogether.

I would like to apologize for the dire tone of my remarks." writes UCSD Chancellor Richard Atkinson in his Summary Remarks of the Regents meeting, "but my comments reflect the critical juncture at which UCSD, and the entire University system. finds itself." # Beyond Graduation

What ever happened to the class of '82?

A report compiled by UCSD's Career Planning and Placement (CPP) sheds some light on the convoluted, and sometimes surprising performance of last June's graduates.


Post-graduate studies have absorbed 34 percent of the class, with the balance moving directly into the workforce. Of these, 72 percent are working full time, earning an average annual salary of \$14,800.

These figures are the result of a career survey sent to the 924 1982 graduates six months after receiving their bachelor's degrees. 56 percent responded to the CPP inquiry, not enough for a precise breakdown, but, according to CPP Director Neil Murray, accurate enough to reflect general trends and, more importantly, to assist current students in learning what awaits them at the end of the diploma procession.

Murray, who took over CPP's directorship last August, hopes that this will be the first of an ongoing series of surveys that will provide raw data on the job market for UCSD graduates. By breaking the study down by major, the results show employability, salary range and likelihood of post graduate study for students of various disciplines.

Academically, those who went directly to work had a mean GPA of 2.79, compared to the 3.26 earned by the total group and 3.44 for those who went on into graduate school. Science majors comprised 45 percent of those in search of a higher degree, while they made up only 29 percent of the total group.


Economics and engineering majors showed a higher percentage of fulltime employment than the other areas in the group, with 76 and 88 percent respectively. Some of the most fascinating results of the survey are outlined in a looseleaf binder in CPP's HL office, which breaks the group down (both by area of study and area of employment) and gives individual information on each graduate's specific major, area of employment, employer, and salary range. While some of the cases outlined are pretty bleak. Murray notes that many



allocated \$1.18 billion. The amendment, presented in mid-April, reduces that to \$1.15 billion, down one percent from last year.

"Taken all together." Saxon wrote, "the budget cuts constitute a fiscal crisis for the university. The budget cuts of recent years have exhausted our capacity for trimming and cutting; we have shaved to the bone already."

This latest round of cuts have exacerbated problems the university has had in numerous areas. Among them: — University officials particularly concerned about



graduates landed impressive jobs, and students looking through the data can see that, despite the depressed job market, the cynical view of Ph.D.s digging ditches is the exception and not the rule.

"This was a 'wait and see' year." Murray notes. "Although we at UCSD haven't suffered the drop in recruitment that some other schools have."

Because economic recovery has been sluggish. Murray doesn't view 1983 as a "great year," but he feels the job market should stay stable and has noticed a slight increase in job please turn to page 6





continued from page 1 applications coming into his office from employers.

Most of those who had found jobs (32 percent) either knew their employer or were referred by someone who did, and 15 percent had had previous experience with them. The next most common roads to employment were self-initiated contact and Career Planning and Placement.

The most lucrative type of occupation was that of the "technical professionals," who earned an average of \$21,850. This group also comprised the largest portion of employed graduates, 29 percent. As far as UCSD having

As far as UCSD having prepared them for their jobs, students gave a mixed review. Interacting with others was named as being "very important to work" more than any other single area, but only 55 percent said that UCSD's preparation in this area was excellent or good. On the flip side, 70 percent (the secondhighest number) said that coping with pressure was important, and 87 percent rated UCSD excellent/good in this area.

The report's summary

notes that "career-related practical experience prior to graduation had a positive correlation to success in the job market," and CPP urges students, especially juniors and seniors, to gain experience in their career area, either through internships or employment.







### Women Rowers Take So. Cal Title Balance Was the Key; Men Ready For Finale Sunday

#### By JOY REARDON Staff Writer

The Triton women rowers grabbed the All-Points Title in their season finale at last weekend's First Annual Southern California Women's Crew Championships in Oxnard. Although they topped the point totals of six other universities, the UCSD women never managed to trophy in a single event but used their depth to take two second places and a third in the four-event fledgling regatta. Final results showed UCSD with 291½ points, edging UCLA (260), Loyola Marymount, and Long Beach State (200 each).

"I'm quite pleased," stated women's Coach Jack Vallerga. "We didn't win any of the individual Grand Finals, but we showed our depth by taking all-around honors. It was a case of losing the small battles but winning the war.

The reggata was organized into a Henley style or "round robin" competition. The Varsity Eight "A" crew beat the University of San Diego and Long Beach State in the heats to advance to the Grand Final against UCLA. The Varsity "B" crew (JV in other races) lost to UCLA but took Lovola in Saturday's heats, placing into the Petit Final with Long Beach State in the same event. The Triton "A" women went down to powerful UCLA, losing by a boatlength to take second, while the "B" winning the Petit Final and

The Lightweight Eight

State but suffering defeat against Lovola, Racing against Loyola a second time in the final, the Triton lights again finished down a boatlength to capture second-best honors. The Henley-style regatta gave the season championships an air of rivalry, pitting crew against crew in an exciting but exhausting series of 1,000meter (approximately four minute) matches. This arrangment obviously favors endurance-trained athletes.

"We'll probably race eights and quads (a sculling event: four rowers with two oars apiece)," Vallerga said, "I'm losing about six or seven MBRA people in their place.



# Racing Seminar Given at UCSD


The gates clang, the crowd roars, and you shade your eyes from the hot afternoon sun as you get up to follow the action more closely. As they round the bend, every head strains forward, the wind barely drying the sweat-drenched backs, and each individual's movement is obscured in a flurry of sand. You clench your fists and watch intently; the crowd roars and the buzzer sounds: your horse has just come in first.

Money. Action. Strategy.

Horseracing involves all of these - as well as a lot of luck. But before your eyes begin to glaze over unduced by lazy beers, and the idea of making a fast buck), read the next few paragraphs - and then proceed with gusto. A day at the races is fast-paced, entertaining, and risky - in short, everything that defines the word exciting. Sanford Shulman, thoroughbred owner and trainer, discussed some of the factors involved in a seminar held last Saturday. There are many guides to

racing and betting, perhaps the most useful is a "racing form." available for about a dollar at the track. The racing form provides the better with a reasonably thorough history of the horse's past performance and some solid ground on which to base an educated guess. Everyone has his or her own betting technique, but Shulman suggests "handicapping" on the horse's total number of races run and total earnings in those races in order to get a good overall picture of the please turn to page 8

animal. The finer points of this genteel spectator sport include emphasis on the horse's speed and the track variant (condition of the track on any given day). The higher the sum of these two numbers (speed and track variant), the more reliable the horse is and the better the risk. Horses with muscle problems generally do better on a "fast' track (i.e. hard, packed surface) and horses with knee and ankle problems generally do better on a slow track (the soft sand or mud helps cushion the impact). Jockeys too are an important factor to consider when betting, as well as the distance of the race and the class of the horse. However, the total number of races and earnings as well as the speed and track figures should be reasonably accurate guides to any given horse's behavior.

It is in the track's interest to entice the public to bet as often as possible as the track receives a cut on each bet placed. In order to encourage betting. the tracks have set up various ways to lay down the bucks. The most popular are the "exacta" (pick top two horses in correct order), the "win' (pick winning horse only), the "place" (pick a horse to come in firstor seond), the "show' pick a/horse to come in first. second?or third place), and the

'daily double" (pick the top horse in two races). For the more accomplished better. there is the "pick six" bet (pick first place horse in six races) with a yield of \$1,000,000 on a \$2 bet.

Yes, the races are definitel the place to go to pick up a tan and a little extra summer money. But if you don't win \$1,000,000. I guarantee you'll have a great time.



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

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# **Chuck Norris: A 'Lone Wolf'** moves in on Hollywood

#### By CLYDENE NEE

Martial arts films have traditionally been well choreographed blood and guts fighting films with little in the way of plots. For the past seven years Chuck Norris, in his films like Force of One. Octagon, and most recently, Lone Wolf, has been adding new dimensions to the martial arts films of today by making them more actionand less violent-oriented films.

Norris recently visited San Diego on a promotional tour for his new film Lone Wolf. Norris. at age 43, is a testiment to his training techniques and life style. As a former world champion in Karate, he maintains his physique through a rigorous 3-hour-a-day exercise routine.

His interest in martial arts stemmed from his exposure to judo while serving in the military in Korea. He went on to study the Korean fighting arts of Tang Soo Do and Tae Kwan Do. I knew that the martial arts

On leaving the military in 1962, he studied these arts and eventually opened a school of his own. Soon after establishing the school, Norris decided to set his goals on entering karate competitions.

My whole goal was to win the Los Angeles Open," said Norris, "hoping I could win the tournament which would give me a write-up in a magazine.

Much of Norris's philosophy on life revolves around the concept of setting realistic goals that he could achieve. He attributes much of this way of thinking to his childhood.

My mother had to play both roles, father and mother." Norris revealed. "I could have used that as an excuse to say Well Chuck, you just didn't get the right cards. You don't have a father to give you direction, you are very, very poor ." he said. "I could have used the best excuse in the world to grow up and be a failure. Luckily I took a different route and got down a positive

to 1974, when he retired from competition undefeated. At age 34 he decided to embark on a new career, acting.

'I was 34 years old." he remembered. "I had a very successful business, a whole chain of karate schools, and life was really good. But I had no goals and I was getting bored.

He decided after careful deliberation to embark on a new career, acting. "I talked to Steve McQueen, who was a student of mine about it, and he encouraged me to pursue an acting career.

Norris sold his karate schools and spent full time going to acting school. After a while, when he didn't receive any offers, he and a couple of his students got together and wrote a screenplay titled Good Guys Wear Black. This took three years to sell to a producer in Hollywood. Norris convinced a young producer that if out of the 4 million people who studied karate in the country, only half of them would go see the film. then they would make about 6 million dollars. He needed, he said afterwards, the quality of the musicians of the San Diego Symphony, but they, on the other hand, cannot function as beautifully as they sometimes do without the control of a conducter such as Herbig.



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

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

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Valley Girl is the first in a succession of summer films which begin to come off studio shelves as soon as the sun comes out.

Starring Nicolas Cage, as a Hollywood new-waver, and Deborah Foreman, as a statuscrazed valley girl, the movie opens with five minutes of incomprehensible "valley talk" in which five vals drool over 'awesome, tripendicular dudes." The beginning is not a good indicator of the whole film - surprisingly the film redeems itself with a funny and appealing rendition of bad boy meets all-American girl, 80's style.

There were moments when writers Andrew Lane and Wayne Crawford went overboard with the valley-ness of the film. For example: "Like I am totally not in love with you Tommy," valley response. "Not too cool Julie. like I won't be bummed out ....' The dialogue, thankfully, does not remain this way, instead the speech turns into a satire of valley expressions.

The greatest flaw in the film is the age of the stars. Neither Cage nor Foreman look like juniors in high school. The film itself was fun. The music by the Clash, the Jam and "Melt with You" by Modern English all add to the lightheartedness of the film. Valley Girl is not a thought provoking film, but if you are in the mood for a light, funny film it would certainly fit the bill.


