Annual benefit will support school's mission to transform lives and ensure a Preuss education is available for generations to come

James Noraky knows exactly what ignited his interest in pursuing a career in research: It was his experience at The Preuss School UCSD, a charter middle and high school for low-income students who strive to become the first in their families to graduate from college. During his time at Preuss, Noraky recalls undertaking a variety of science fair projects, a requirement at the school. His projects were often creative and ambitious – once, he experimented with using sound waves as a means of refrigeration. Another time he developed control circuitry that allowed muscles in the forearms to control prosthetic hands.


"These projects were my creative outlet and helped spur my decision to go into research," he said. "The experiences and guidance I received from my teachers and mentors also helped steer my interest in science and engineering." Noraky graduated from Preuss as co-valedictorian in 2009 and received his undergraduate and master's degrees in electrical engineering from MIT. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. at MIT, researching novel techniques to advance video compression technology.

"Preuss was my big break," he said. "I benefited from the rigorous curriculum and opportunities to communicate, collaborate and lead, as well as from caring teachers, mentors and community members. I'm not sure how any high school can get any better."

Noraky will share his story during Preuss's annual benefit, The Preuss Promise: Sustaining What Matters on Friday, April 17. The festivities will begin at 6 p.m. in the Price Center on the UC San Diego campus.

The event starts with a cocktail hour featuring music, science demonstrations and a fine arts exhibit by Preuss students. After the cocktail hour, guests will enjoy an elegant dinner with entertainment provided by the band NRG.

UC San Diego Chancellor Pradeep K. Khosla will speak during the event, which will also highlight The Preuss School's <u>Campaign for Longer Learning Time</u>. Expanded learning time is a fundamental tenet of the
