Human Services in Urban Communities" will be discussed Tuesday, May 14, in the final program of the Third College Urban and Rural Studies Lecture Series at the University of California, San Diego.

Dr. Leonard J. Duhl, professor of Urban Social Policy and Public Health at UC Berkeley, will speak at 3 p.m. in Room 2301 of the Applied Physics & Mathematics Building on the Muir campus.

The lecture is the fourth in the series titled "The Urban Condition in the '70s: Its Problems and Policies."

Duhl, 47, also serves as a clinical professor of psychiatry at the UC San Francisco Medical Center.

Previously, he was special assistant to the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development from 1966 to 1968 and chief of the office of planning of the National Institute of Mental Health from 1964 to 1966.

Duhl is chairman of the board of technical and policy advisors of the U.S. Health Corporation ia San Francisco and a member of the science and technology advisory council of the California Assembly.

He is author of "The Urban Condition: People and Policy in the Metropolis," "Mental Health and Urban Social Policy" and "The City and the University."

Duhl received a bachelor of arts degree in 1945 from Columbia University and his M.D. degree in 1948 from Albany Medical College.
