UCSD Shuttle--Seating Room Only

Students who are forced to park in the lots beyond Third College have recently encountered a new problem--there is limited space on the Shuttle Bus. This is forcing many of those students arriving during the peak hours to have to walk what seems like miles to reach their classrooms.

This problem has arisen because of a new regulation being observed by the drivers which prevents students from standing on the bus. With a twenty-five person maximum capacity, it is a natural result that many are forced to "miss the bus."

The problem, as California Highway Patrol Officer Bob Baker, who is the Motor Carrier Safety Unit Specialist, explains, is that the buses are simply not built to carry standing passengers. After a recent safety test, Baker found that the buses would exceed the vehicle gross weight with any additional passengers.

"Some even went above that weight with just the 25 seated passengers," Baker said. "They're very impractical vehicles."


But Alternative Transportation Director Greg Snee defended the Shuttle service, saying that the vehicles were taken from their previous Med-Center routes in order to provide services for UCSD students who were parked a far distance from the campus.

"Each of the buses already have around 400 thousand miles on them,"
Snee said.

As for what is to be done about the situation, Snee replied with a pessimistic "Not much."

Though during the peak hours, the two running buses have increased their frequency from a 15 minute trip to a ten minute trip, no plans to add the third bus on the route have been made.

"There are three buses, but there's always one needing to be repaired. If we were to get students used to a third bus, then take one away to repair it, they'd be

even more upset then they are now," said

The biggest problem that prevents the school from purchasing a fourth bus is, of course, funding. It is highly unlikely that students will see another bus during this fiscal year.

Another step that is being made to aid the problem is obtaining an exemption to allow students to stand on the Shuttle Bus. Although other UC campuses continue to break the law by allowing passengers to stand, UCSD is adamant about doing it legally.

But, as Officer Baker pointed out, an exemption is highly unlikely.

"We wrote a letter to Sacramento trying to get special permission, and they asked for a study and a recommendation--it didn't turn out very well," Baker said. It was through this study that the CHP determined these vehicles to be unsafe for standing passengers, and consequently they were prevented from writing a recommendation with the existing equipment.

If anything were to happen, such as an accident, the University would be held liable.

With the current buses, if an accident were to occur, there's no telling what would happen to the students who were standing, as the bars do not extend the full length of the bus and are not anchored properly to lend to any extra forces.

"The add-ons look as though they were bars that are used to assist the handicapped," said Baker.

Aside from increasing the frequency of the Shuttle trips, Snee said that there is an extended evening route planned for next quarter, which will go all the way to the Revelle Apartments during the hours of 6 p.m. to 12 a.m.

As for now, students should not rely on getting a Shuttle ride during the peak hours. It would be best to arrive a little earlier and by all means, wear comfortable shoes.


Revelle Helps Founder Celebrate 79 Years

At nine a.m. the die was cast, And even though a whole day had passed Since I slept in my bed last, I didn't want to sleep, not quite so fast.


I'd throw myself off, and sleep away The daylight hours of the next three days. At night in bed, awake I would lay, Unable to sleep the normal people's way.

On Monday, March 7, Dr. Roger Revelle celebrated his seventy-ninth birthday. As a Revelle student, I very much anticipated my meeting with the renowned Professor of Oceanography and founder of UCSD and Revelle College.

Dr. Revelle has recently done extensive work on the "Greenhouse Effect" and its effects on the water supply in the arid regions of the world. His work took him to Cameroon to work with their agriculture and aid in food development. Although he agrees progress will be slow, his work is imperative in these times of hardship in Africa.

As for his personal interests, Dr. Revelle is a avid fan of the San Diego Symphony and the La Jolla Playhouse. His favorite show was last summer's "A Walk in the Woods," a comedy about a Soviet and a U.S. Ambassador discussing the relationship between their two countries. While talking about the world we live in, Dr. Revelle seemed pessimistic. He talked of rampant consumerism in our nation, with the government spending in a frenzy while facing a huge national debt. He even went so far as to say that America is a doomed society if we don't assume proper leadership in the world and stop supporting dictatorships such as the Pinochet regime in Chile.

Although he readily talks about today's problems, he does not consider himself a very political person. When asked about his own concerns about the world when he was a college student, he says he did not have any. "When I graduated, it was just before the Crash of 1929. Until then, we all had a pretty rosy view of the world. Today's students seem to have a better awareness of

the world's problems, which is very important."

When asked to tell of his proudest accomplishment, Dr. Revelle quickly replied, "UCSD." He says that he has enjoyed watching the University grow into national prominence, and he boasts about the students themselves. "Our new students have significantly higher GPA's and SAT scores than in the past." In view of these proud statements, I asked him to describe some the similarities and differences between UCSD and Harvard, where he had taught for a number of years. "Although Harvard is a much better school, I feel that the best UCSD students are just as good as the best Harvard students," he replied. When I commented that UCSD has come a long way in a much shorter time than Harvard, Dr. Revelle agreed, then added with a smile, "There is no greater institution than age."

Asked about his collegiate extracurricular activities, Dr. Revelle responded, "I was always too slow for sports, but I was editor of a funny paper, a weekly publication. When I tried to make it a daily paper, it absorbed most of my time, and I nearly flunked out of school." But never fear, a professor returned from a sabbatical and helped him get his act together.

When I asked Dr. Revelle if he had any words of guidance for Revelle students, he sat pensively for a moment and then said, "I would say to enjoy your college years. College is intense living and if you can make it, you'll be well-prepared. Remember that college IS life, not just a prelude to something in the future."

Very well said, Dr. Revelle, and Happy Birthday from all of the Revelle student body.



In this corner, Dryer's Grand, and in this corner, Steve's Original Mix-In. Two great tastes, each with its own merits. But I have to be a critic, so the match-up was set.

Steve's N.Y. Super Fudge Chunk vs. Dryer's Chocolate Fudge Brownie. The variety of mix-ins made Steve's a more exciting experience. The Dryer's ice cream seemed a bit smoother overall, but the richness of all the chocolates in Steve's helped to put it over the top.

Head-to-head Strawberry competition: Again, Dryer's smoothness came through, but Steve's seemed to have more flavor, helped by larger, more abundant pieces of strawberries mixed throughout.

Perhaps the closest competition was between Steve's Chunky Chocolate Chocolate Mousse and Dryer's Chocolate Fudge Mousse. Paid Intern Positions Available

Applications are now available for 1988-89 Revelle Dean's Interns. The four positions being offered include: Commuter Advisory Board Intern; Revellations Intern; Noon Programming Board Intern; and Faculty-Student Programming Intern.

Applicants must be at least of sophomore standing during 1988-89, have a minimum GPA of 2.0 and be able to work during the two weeks prior to the beginning of Fall quarter, as well as a few brief planning sessions during Spring quarter.

The Commuter Advisory Board Intern is responsible for working with the committee, the Adopt-A-Commuter Program, special projects and services for commuters and facilitation of their involvement in all college events.

The Revellations Intern is responsible for publication of the college newsletter, including budgeting, news collection, mailing procedures and development of reporting staff.

Noon Programming and Special Events includes a general set up of Revelle Casino Night, noon concerts, TGIF's and a variety of Plaza and Commuter Lounge activities and programs. The Intern will also serve as Chair of the Noon Programming Board.

The Faculty-Student Programming Board Intern involves coordination of Casino Night dealers, the Revelle College Firesides and Brown Bag lunch series, the Faculty Talent Bank, and working with the Provost to implement faculty/student general set up of events.

Prospective applicants should pick up a referral slip from the Employment Office, and complete the application. Interviews are required, as well as 2 recommendations from faculty, staff, or former employer, and 4 recommendations from peers.

The applications are due in the Dean's Office by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, April 15. At this time, applicants should sign up for their first group interview.

Incomplete Grades

The grade "I" may be asssigned to a student's work when the work is of passing quality, but is incomplete for a good cause (illness, for example). The Incomplete is intended for use when circumstances prohibit taking the final exam or completing course work due in the last week of classes. You must receive instructor approval (may be instructor initiated in the case of an emergency) on the "Request to Receive Grade Incomplete" form prior to the final examination. The "I" grade shall be disregarded in determining a student's GPA. An "I" may be replaced upon completion of the work required by a date agreed upon by the instructor, but not later than the last day of finals week of the following quarter. If not replaced by this time, the "I" grade will lapse into a permanent "F" grade.


