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Colón gets Moctezuma's Revenge in San Diego/Tijuana

On Saturday, October 12, hundreds of people commemorated 499 years of indigenous resistance in the San Diego/Tijuana region. In San Diego people demonstrated against the Columbus Day Parade, and in Tijuana, people held a cultural celebration.

The demonstration in San Diego was organized by the Raza Rights Coalition to address "the racism and injustice which confront us daily in land that was stolen from us."

"For Chicano Mexicanos, la Raza of the Americas, Africans, And people of conscience, October 12, 1991 marks 499 years of stark and brutal colonization, genocide, enslavement, and exploitation. The European invasion of our land resulted in the decimation of millions of native people: the imposition of foreign flags, culture, borders, language, and religion: and the start of the myth of discovery. On this day - Dia de la Raza - we as the ancestors of these great indigenous nations once again affirm our commitment to resistance and community empowerment."

About fifty people demonstrated along the side of the parade carrying signs, chanting, and trying to dissuade the many Hispanics in the parade from celebrating the genocide of Columbus. About five hecklers stood accross the street from them.

Along with Elks, and Shriners, Boy Scouts and Junior High school marching bands, behind a Columbian Coffee Commercial and a twenty foot diameter brass model of the "New World Order" the U.S. Navy's entry into this celebration of imperialism and conquest, about twenty members of the Super Sonic Samba School marched in the parade. They were dressed as pirates and sang "The First Pirates of the Caribbean" a song that celebrates the spirit of Columbus' 1492 voyage of conquest and venereal disease.

Much of the crowd met the SSSS with cheers and clenched fists of solidarity and resistence. One man at the end of the parade route lauded the drummers for being among the only parade participants who "read their history."

The Super Sonic Samba School also stopped to perform their version of that old Dizney favorite for the people in the V.I.P.* reviewing stand. No comment has yet been obtained from the V.I.P.'s

The UC-wide Women's Conference, to be held at UCSD on October 25-27, is the product of an undergraduate thought group formed this summer to read and discuss the cutting edge of feminist thought on the topic of "Women of Color". The group was made up of a diverse group of women from a variety of ethnic and class backgrounds. The common goal was to come up with a conference which could best integrate the many different experiences of women, without privileging the experience of the typical brand of middle class white feminist thought.

As one may well imagine, this is no easy task to accomplish at UCSD, considering the lack of diversity and depth of resources on campus. But, where there is a will, there is a way! The group collectively wrote a proposal detailing the content and spirit for the conference. We then travelled to Irvine for the statewide U.C. Students Association (UCSA) meeting where we contended with a formidable proposal from Davis. Davis is celebrating their tenth anniversary of their Women's Center. (If we could be so lucky!) UCSA decided to allow UCSD to host the annual UCSA Women's Conference because they wanted to show political support for UCSD women. UCSD is the only campus in the UC system that does not have a university-funded Women's Center.

UCSA does not give the campus a dime to help with the conference, just the "O.K." to use their name. (This is not in the best interest of successful UC wide events). They made it clear that they were not expecting much from the campus (how could UCSD, the campus notorious for its unsupportive climate, put on a conference for other UC's that all had paid Women's Centers and a Women's Studies major!) HAH! We'll see.

At present, in conjunction with the University Bookstore, Adrienne Rich, ma-

jor poet and world renowned feminist theorist, will be reading poetry from her newest collection of poems, An Atlas of the Difficult World. She will be reading at the Grove Caffe at 7:30pm on Friday, October 25, and signing her book afterwards. She has just been nominated for the National Book Award. Afterwards, the University Center Board (UCB) is showing La Femme Nikita at the High Price Center Theater at 11pm.



Adrienne Rich to navigate UCSD's difficult terrain



An Atlas of the Difficult World is the name of the latest collection of poetry by Adrienne Rich. After her October 25 appearance on the UCSD campus, she will know of another difficult place. Originally scheduled to occur in the High Price Center at the University Bookstore, her poetry reading and book signing was mercifully moved to the Grove Caffe in the Student Coop Center thanks to Molly McKay and the other organizers of the UCSA Women's Conference. Adrienne Rich is a renowned poet and a major contributor to feminist literary theory, one of the most widely quoted and influential writers in her field. She became a radical feminist during the 1960's while involved in the political movements of that time. The following is an excerpt from a review of Atlas by Sandra M. Gilbert:

"These are not the roads/you knew me by,' explains Adrienne Rich as she opens the title poem of her new collection. 'But the woman driving, walking, watching / for life and death, is the same.'

"The same: the geographer who here brilliantly maps a luminous and poignant ATLAS OF THE DIFFICULT WORLD writes with the sureness, compassion, and gravity we have come to respect in the course of Rich's forty-year career.

"Yet different: exploring a tangle of roads into the 'outrage of history,' the woman we encounter today speaks with a newly bardic, Whitmanesque authority to all of us who are reading these poems 'listening for something, torn between bitterness and hope / turning back once again to the task [we] cannot refuse."

Gloria Anzaldúa is a Chicana tejana lesbian-feminist poet and fiction writer. She will be the keynote speaker for the UCSA Women's Conference "The Changing Faces of Feminism: Diversity, Commonalities and Dialogue." Her main address will be on Sunday, October 27 at 11am in the High Price Center Theater. She will also be available to speak one on one with participants throughout the weekend. She is co-editor of This Bridge Called My Back: Writings by Radical Women of Color, winner of the Before Columbus Foundation American book Award. Her book Borderlands/La Frontera: The New Mestiza was picked as one of the 38 Best Books of 1987 by Library Journal. In 1990, Gloria edited Making Face, Making Soul/Haciendo Caras: Creative and Critical Perspectives by Women of Color

(which like This *Bridge*, has been a key source of inspiration for this Women's Conference). She has been working on Entraguerras, *entremundos/Civil Wars Among the Worlds*, a book of autobiographical and fictitious narratives, and on a collection of emerging Chicana/Mexicana Feminist theory.

"We have come to realize that we are not alone in our struggles nor separate nor autonomous but that we—white black straight queer female male—are connected and interdependent. We are each accountable for what is happening down to the street, south of the border or across the sea."
