

Two UCSD history professors honored for exceptional work

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TWO UCSD HISTORY PROFESSORS HONORED FOR EXCEPTIONAL WORK

Two members of the Department of History at the University of California, San Diego, have been recognized for their work.

Pamela Radcliff, an associate professor of history, has received the Sierra Prize from the Western Association of Women Historians (WAWH) for "From Mobilization to Civil War: The Politics of Polarization in the Spanish City of Gijon, 1900-1937" (Cambridge University Press, 1996). The book was judged to be the best monograph by a WAWH member based on original research in any field of history.

Radcliff is a specialist in modern European history with an emphasis on Spain. She received her bachelor's degree from Scripps College in Claremont and her doctorate from Columbia University. She has been on the UCSD faculty since 1990.

Dain Borges, an associate professor of history at UCSD, has been chosen the Latin Americanist Professor of the Year, 1997-98, by the graduate students and undergraduate majors and minors in Latin American studies at UCSD.

Borges has been on the UCSD faculty since 1995. He received his bachelor's degree in Hispanic-American history and literature from Harvard College and his master's in Latin American studies and doctorate in history from Stanford University.

Borges is currently president of the Brazilian Studies Association, BRASA, and editor of the Brazilian history section of the Library of Congress's "Handbook of Latin American Studies."

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
