A University of California, San Diego anthropologist will discuss "Taiwan The China We Left Behind" Tuesday, April 9, in the second program of the Public Events Series sponsored by The Friends of the UCSD Library.

Dr. David K. Jordan, UCSD associate professor of anthropology, will speak at 8 p.m. in the International Center on the Matthews Campus. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Jordan has studied the languages and folk religion of Taiwan and has written two books, "Guide to the Romanization of Chinese" and "Gods, Ghosts and Ancestors: The Folk Religion of a Taiwanese Village."

He did field work in Taiwan for two years before completing his Ph.D. in anthropology at the University of Chicago in 1969. Jordan also holds a bachelor of arts degree in linguistics from the University of Chicago and a master of arts degree in anthropology from Stanford University.

A member of the UCSD faculty since 1969, he belongs to the Association for Asian Studies, the Royal Asiatic Society and the China Society.

The talk is the second of several programs planned by The Friends this spring. Mrs. Harold R. Rose, of Del Mar, is chairman of the series which has been planned to encourage greater contact with the university for members of The Friends and the general public.

More then 800 persons are members of the Friends, an educational organization which brings together San Diego area residents with a common interest in books, libraries and the development of the UCSD libraries.
