As we begin a new academic year I would like, on behalf of all OCEANIDS, to give a warm welcome to all who are Newcomers to UCSD. Especially the women. Our organization is for all women associated with this campus - the wives of university employees, women employed by the university departments, women graduate students, and the wives of graduate students. If you are not as yet a member of OCEANIDS, we hope you will become one. Mrs. Marshall Orloff, the Membership Chairman, will accept your application and dues at any time. 
This campus has grown very rapidly in recent years, and is expected to do so for many more years. This year we are suggesting two ways, closely related, in which OCEANIDS can serve our University Community. None of us, after the events of this past year, can be unaware of the problems of communities in general, the universities in particular. In addition to the problems we share with other universities we have a special one of our own - the expansion rate of this campus. This effects not only our university community but the San Diego Community of which this campus is a part.

We hope our members will give some of their time to a study of UCSD's relationship in all dimensions with the rest of the San Diego area. We ask you to find out how we as individuals or as a group can help resolve some of the problems of "town and gown" with responsible action when necessary. There is much need just now to help the community develop a better understanding of the university, and a need for cooperation on the part of the university toward a better understanding of the whole community. Secondly, we should become more informed about the Building Program now in progress on this campus and in the areas immediately adjacent to it, actively concerning ourselves with what is happening now and being planned for the future. The well-being of the whole community is dependant on this.

Once more - Welcome to UCSD. I hope to meet you at University House on October 18. The Interest Groups will have representatives there to explain and discuss their programs. If none of the existing groups provides for your interest, Mrs. Harold Urey, our Interest Group Co-ordinator, will be glad to discuss this with you. The officers of OCEANIDS, hostesses from the university departments, and other members of OCEANIDS will be present and looking forward to meeting you.

BOARD MEETINGS

The OCEANID Board meets the first Thursday of each month at 10:00 A.M. The next meeting will be held on November 6.

This group, formerly known as the International Affairs Group, agreed last Fall to focus its attention on the most crucial issues of the day, whether domestic or international; hence its present name. Accordingly last year was devoted to an examination of the various aspects of the "Student revolts of the Sixties" and this provocative theme made for very well attended meetings. Highlights of the year were a session on the students' attitudes and motivations led by Mrs. Herbert Marcuse, a description of the movements in various parts of the world by Mrs. Linus Pauling; animated discussions with 'New Left' white students from our own campus and with black student leaders from the San Diego area; finally a very appealing presentation by the newly appointed black Principal of Lincoln High School.

We are hoping to maintain such standards this year and have chosen as our theme of study "Urban problems in the U.S. and abroad". For our first meeting on October 15, Dr. Gertrude Szilard will speak on "Health Problems in the Poverty Areas of San Diego."

Later on we will attempt to go a little more thoroughly into some of the most critical and talked about aspects of the crisis of the cities, such as

- private property or collective ownership; a look at the new trend towards communal living
- free enterprise versus city planning
- air pollution control versus industrial lobbies and private versus collective transportation
- inner city versus suburbs
- freedom of expression and diversity versus law and order; youth and police
- future of public school systems in metropolitan areas
- alternatives to welfare, etc.

These are only suggestions. We expect newcomers who will join our group to make this study an exciting one by contributing ideas and maybe expertise (or that of their husbands); and we especially hope to hear from visitors from abroad about problems and solutions in their own countries.

The third Wednesday of each month, at 8:00 p.m., has tentatively been chosen as the time of our meetings. We hope to see many of you there.

OCEANIDS NEW VICE-PRESIDENT

At their final meeting on May 27, 1969 the 1969-69 Board of OCEANIDS regretfully accepted the resignation of Vice-President-elect, Mrs. Alan Batchelder. There being no provision in the By-laws for either an election or appointment in such a contingency, the President, Mrs. Richard Weinberger, with the consent of the Board recalled the 1968-69 Nominating Committee. They unanimously nominated Mrs. Victor H. Rumsey to fill the position. The President then ruled that the 1969-70 Executive Board vote in lieu of the membership. Mrs. Rumsey was unanimously elected.

NEW APPOINTMENTS MADE BY CHANCELLOR

A series of recent administrative appointments at the University of California, San Diego have been announced by Dr. William McGill, UCSD Chancellor. The appointments concerns persons already on the UCSD staff plus several who will be new to the campus. Most are a result of the administrative reorganization in which several new vice chancellors were named by McGill.

Dr. William A. Nierenberg has been appointed Vice Chancellor - Marine Sciences and Director of Scripps Institution of Oceanography. George S. Murphy, Jr. has been appointed Vice Chancellor and Dean - Student Affairs. A change in the title of Dr. Clifford Grobstein was also approved by the Regents. He has been appointed Vice Chancellor - Health Sciences and Dean of the School of Medicine.

Chancellor McGill said the appointment of Vice Chancellor Nierenberg and the change in Vice Chancellor Grobstein's title underscore the importance of marine and health sciences in San Diego's future. Under the direction of these two distinguished administrators, the broad fields of oceanography and medicine at UCSD are producing an enormous growth of technical and scientific knowledge.

Dr. Martin N. Chamberlain, director of University of California Extension in San Diego, has been named assistant chancellor of the University of California, San Diego. Chancellor William J. McGill said Chamberlain will continue to supervise UC Extension programs in San Diego, but will also assume direction of UCSD's public affairs, gifts and endowments, and arts and lectures activities.

Dr. Herbert York, Professor of Physics, Chairman of the Department of Physics, and first Chancellor of the San Diego Campus, has been appointed Acting Dean of Graduate Studies. Dr. Walter Kohn, Professor of Physics, will serve as Acting Chairman of the Department of Physics until a new chairman is named. Dr. Roy Harvey Pearce, Professor of American Literature, will serve as Special Assistant to Chancellor McGill for Academic Planning.

Werner Lendenmann, Director of Programming and Analytical Studies at UCSD for the past two years, has been appointed Director of Planning for the campus. In this capacity, Lendenmann will operate for the Chancellor in all areas of planning for the campus.

Dr. Philip N. James, Assistant Vice Chancellor - Graduate Studies and Research for three years, has been appointed Executive Assistant to the Chancellor at UCSD. In this capacity he will assist Chancellor McGill in research and analysis, correspondence, and supply background information dealing with campus and University problems.

Mrs. Kathleen G. Douthitt has been appointed Coordinator of Academic Personnel for UCSD. She will continue as head of the Academic Personnel Office which she has run since 1961.

Frank R. Cvar, has been appointed Accounting Officer for UCSD. He will serve as part of the staff of the Vice Chancellor - Business and Finance.

NEW APPOINTMENTS (continued)

Lynn C. Naibert, Associate Dean of Student Affairs and Financial Aids Officer for UCSD for two years, has been appointed Executive Dean of Student Affairs under the office of the Vice Chancellor - Student Affairs.

Dr. Morton H. Shaevitz, Associate Director of the Student Affairs Counseling Office and Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Michigan, has been appointed Counseling Center Manager at UCSD. In this capacity he will serve as Director of Counseling and Psychological Services under the office of the Vice Chancellor - Student Affairs.

The appointment of Dr. William R. Frazer, professor of physics at the University of California, San Diego, as Acting Provost of UCSD's Third College has been announced by Chancellor William J. McGill. Dr. Frazer succeeds Dr. Armin Rappaport, who served as Third College Provost for two years. Dr. Frazer joined the UCSD faculty in 1960 and has been active in the planning for the Third College, which is scheduled to begin instruction in the fall of 1970.

ARTS AND LECTURES PROGRAM

Relevancy will be the key word for upcoming Arts and Lectures events at the University of California, San Diego, said James S. Lombard Jr., newly-appointed manager of UCSD's Committee for Arts and Lectures.

"Changes are planned for the types of programs we've offered in the past," he said. "We want to direct the events, especially the lectures, more toward the students as well as the community."

Other changes planned include a more attractive price schedule for UCSD students and other students in the community and a reduction in all season ticket prices. In addition, plans have been made to introduce a new series, the Series Internationale, which will include the former Keyboard Series as well as new events.

JOSEPH E. MAYER RECEIVES AWARD

Dr. Joseph E. Mayer, professor of chemistry at the University of California, San Diego, has been selected to receive the American Chemical Societies James Flack Norris Award for Outstanding Achievement in the Teaching of Chemistry for 1969. The award, will be presented during a Society meeting at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology on November 13. The award includes a \$1,000 honorarium and a scroll.

CARL ECKART HONORED

On July 1, 1969, Professor Carl Eckart began a 3-year appointment as Chairman of the Section of Geophysics, National Academy of Sciences, and member of the National Research Council, Division of Earth Sciences.

THE UNIVERSITY AND THE COMMUNITY

In a constructive effort to open the lines of communication between community and University, a group of students and faculty from the UCSD School of Medicine has established "The Medical Community Concerns Committee" directed toward three major objectives.

The group hopes (1) to provide an effective mechanism by which the University might become aware of the community's expectations of an institution of higher learning, (2) to establish procedures inside the University for constructive responses to the community's expectations, and (3) to develop in the community a deeper understanding of the University's educational processes and the challenges entailed in these processes.

During the summer the Medical Community Concerns Committee (MCCC) has been active in opening channels for constructive contact between the University and the community. Committee members have met in many evening discussion groups with people from the San Diego area and have spoken to Service Clubs and organizations. Students and faculty have appeared on KSDO's "Opinion Please" and on KFMB radio's "Topic", to air their views and to receive comments and suggestions from community members. With the school year approaching, plans are being made to urge undergraduates to attempt to communicate with the community in similar ways.

As members of the new Medical School class arrive and become interested in this project, the size of this committee should increase significantly. Many more speakers will be available to community organizations and for evening discussion groups. If you would like a lively, educational evening, the MCCC urges you to invite your neighbors in to meet its representatives. They want to hear your opinions and suggestions about the University, and they are knowledgeable about campus events and University policy. Although carrying a tremendous load, these young people and faculty members are willing to give of their valuable time to reduce misunderstandings between the community and the University.

FIRST INAUGURAL LECTURE

"Is the Sea Floor Man's Domain?" will be the topic of this Fall's first lecture in the Professors' Inaugural Lecture Series to be held at 4:15 p.m. on Thursday, October 9, in the Humanities-Library Auditorium, Revelle College. Dr. Victor C. Anderson, professor of applied electrophysics at UCSD and research physicist at Scripps Institution of Oceanography, will be the speaker.

FUNG, LIBBY, MILES HONORED

Three University of California, San Diego professors, all members of the Department of Aerospace and Mechanical Engineering Sciences, have been named Fellows of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics. They are Dr. Yuan-Cheng B. Fung, Professor of Bioengineering and Applied Mechanics; Dr. Paul A. Libby, Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Associate Dean of Graduate Studies; and Dr. John W. Miles, Professor of Applied Mechanics and Geophysics and Chairman of the Department of AMES. They are among 29 new Fellows named by the Institute to be honored at an honors and awards banquet, Thursday, October 23, in Anaheim.

MUNK AND SNODGRASS AWARDS

Two San Diego collaborators in extensive and continuing scientific studies of deep-ocean tides that have "profound implications not only in the development and use of the sea floor but in areas as far afield as astronomy and space travel," were honored by the Marine Technology Society (MTS) at its annual conference in Miami Beach.

They were Dr. Walter H. Munk and Frank E. Snodgrass, the first recipients of MTS's Award for Ocean Science and Engineering.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE GROUP

People to People was organized by a group of OCEANIDS interested in bringing about cultural, scientific, and material exchanges between the UCSD campus and similar institutions abroad. Its goals and program are the same as the national People-to-People Organization founded by former President Eisenhower in 1956.

Our main project has been an exchange with Escuela Superior de Ciencias Marinas, Universidad Autonoma de Baja California at Ensenada. Other short projects have also been undertaken, when the need arose, such as collections of books for science classes in other countries. This last year we sponsored a "Holes in the Wall" Tour to raise funds; were invited to a Posada at the school in Ensenada; contributed biological laboratory equipment to the school; took care of social arrangements (hosted ladies during day, refreshments for student party with UCSD soccer team, dinner with faculty) for the annual May visit at our campus; and also provided scholarships for 2 ESM students to take the Scuba Diving course given by James Stewart at SIO. After much exploration of possibilities, started an exchange with a fisheries school in the Philippines--books for shells to be sold by the aquarium.

AMERICAN ENGLISH IN ACTION

A few years ago the Dean of International Education at UCSD, observed that many wives of foreign scholars needed assistance with American English. He decided that UCSD should have a volunteer program, coordinated by someone with experience in teaching as well as in international activities. He wanted the project to operate on a one-to-one basis: one tutor with one foreign wife. He talked with many people about English in Action. No one wanted to start the project although everybody thought it was a good idea.

In the fall of 1965 a newcomer to La Jolla volunteered to organize, develop and coordinate such a program. Since the start of English in Action (now called American English in Action) in November 1965, sixty-five volunteers have tutored English as a second language to approximately two-hundred post-doctoral fellows, wives of visiting scholars, students and others from twenty-two countries who resided temporarily in the La Jolla area for research and/or study.

In 1969, forty-seven American English in Action volunteer tutors spent from one to ten hours per week with sixty-eight women from eighteen countries. In addition, many UCSD students and professors had individual lessons with the coordinator and other tutors.

Information about the project is sent to all married people who are on the UCSD roster of foreign scholars. If a man desires this service for himself or his wife he returns the request form for a tutor to this office and the coordinator makes an appointment to talk with him and/or his wife. (Students also are informed about the program through the newsletter which they receive from this office.) A tutor is assigned to the visitor after the coordinator has determined what is necessary to improve the newcomer's knowledge and use of English.

During the summer of 1969 we realized that the School of Medicine is and will be having more and more doctors coming from other countries to study and work at the hospital. Many of these people must live near the hospital and most of the American English in Action tutors reside near UCSD. Therefore we need to find women living in the vicinity of the hospital who have talents which would be useful to this program.

We need, in addition to tutors, women who can provide transportation to this office for foreign wives who are unable to come here by themselves for an appointment with the coordinator, to attend the evening conversation classes for foreign wives and to participate in other activities planned specifically for people who are not yet confident of their ability to communi-

cate in English.

The Linguistics Department at UCSD has given support and suggestions to the tutors and will continue to assist this program. Professional consultants from other universities also come during work-shops to advise on methods and materials which can be used successfully by volunteer tutors who teach American English as a second language.

On hand will be chairmen of various interest groups ready to answer questions and sign up interested persons for as many activities as desired.

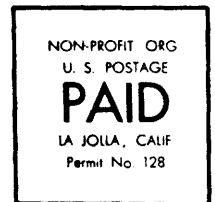
