
newcomer desert trip

La Jolla was then a small village and Oceanids provided an ideal opportunity for socializing. As UCSD and SIO grew, so did Oceanids. Notes from April's Sounding Board: Father Joe Carroll

The Lounge at the Faculty Club rang with laughter when Father Joe Carroll spoke on April 3. And with the humor was an amazing description of the organization he has developed at St. Vincent de Paul. He explained that their facility is "one-stop-shopping" with an incredible array of services on the site. Included is a high school, medical and dental care and computer training. The program for adults, excluding a 20% hard-core homeless, is a 60-90 day challenge to change before looking for a job. The goal is to train these people so that they can go out and get managerial jobs as opposed to dishwasher jobs. There is a wide range in the adults: at the beginning many are illiterate but in the end many graduate from high school and are able to go on to college.

Father Carroll used the Socratic method in answering a wide range of questions: St. Vincent de Paul is the only organization in San Diego to have a Faith Based Grant. He feels Faith Based Grants have advantages but is concerned that they be run by professionals who know how to work properly with the people who need help. The program welcomes all faiths and serves all persuasions. Many of the people come to the program after being recommended by agencies and churches in our community. Father Joe thinks needle exchange is a bad idea and that people should never give to panhandlers. He regrets that San Diego isn't allowing more drug rehabilitation centers, has closed mental health centers and is not doing anything about affordable housing. St. Vincent de Paul receives money from many sources and one of these is the monthly auction of donated cars and boats. His first job after seminary had a fund raising part to it and it is obvious he enjoys this and is good at it.

There are many success stories. Almost every day he has people approach him in the community and say, "I am a graduate!" Jean Lindsley

UCLA STUDY ON FRIENDSHIP AMONG WOMEN

A landmark UCLA study suggests friendships between women are special. They shape who we are and who we are yet to be. They soothe our tumultuous inner world, fill the emotional gaps in our marriage, and help us remember who we really are. By the way, they may do even more. Scientists now suspect that hanging out with our friends can actually counteract the kind of stomach-quivering stress most of us experience on a daily basis. A landmark UCLA study suggests that women respond to stress with a cascade of brain chemicals that cause us to make and maintain friendships with other women. It's a stunning find that has turned five decades of stress research---most of it on men upside down. Until this study was published, scientists generally believed that when people experience stress, they trigger a hormonal cascade that revs the body to either stand and fight or flee as fast as possible, explains Laura Cousin Klein, Ph.D., now an Assistant Professor of Biobehavioral Health at Penn State University and one of the study's authors. It's an ancient survival mechanism left over from the time we were chased across the planet by saber-toothed tigers. Now the researchers suspect that women have a larger behavioral repertoire than just fight or flight; In fact, says Dr. Klein, it seems that when the hormone oxytocin is release as part of the stress responses in a woman, it buffers the fight or flight response and encourages her to tend children and gather with other women instead. When she actually engages in this tending or befriending, studies suggest that more oxytocin is released, which further counters stress and produces a calming effect. This calming response does not occur in men, says Dr. Klein, because testosterone---which men produce in high levels when they're under stress---seems to reduce the effects of oxytocin. Estrogen, she adds, seems to enhance it. The discovery that women respond to stress differently than men was made in a classic "aha" moment shared by two women scientists who were talking one day in a lab at UCLA. There was this joke that when the women who worked in the lab were stressed, they came in, cleaned the lab, had coffee, and bonded, says Dr. Klein. When the men were stressed, they holed up somewhere on their own. I commented one day to fellow researcher Shelley Taylor that nearly 90% of the stress research is on males. I showed her the data from my lab, and the two of us knew instantly that we were onto something. The women cleared their schedules and started meeting with one scientist after another from various research specialties. Very quickly, Drs. Klein and Taylor discovered that by not including women in stress research, scientists had made a huge mistake: The fact that women respond to stress differently than men has significant implications for our health. It may take some time for new studies to reveal all the ways that oxytocin encourages us to care for children and hang out with other women, but the "tend and befriend" notion developed by Drs. Klein and Taylor may explain why women consistently outlive men. Study after study has found that social ties reduce our risk of disease by lowering blood pressure, heart rate, and cholesterol. There's no doubt, says Dr. Klein, that friends are helping us live longer. In one study, for example, researchers found that people who had no friends increased their risk of death over a 6-month period. In another study, those who had the most friends over a 9-year period cut their risk of death by more than 60%. Friends are also helping us live better. The famed Nurses' Health Study from Harvard Medical School found that the more friends women had, the less likely they were to develop physical impairments as they aged, and the more likely they were to be leading a joyful life. In fact, the results were so significant, the researchers concluded, that not having close friends or confidants was as detrimental to your health as smoking or carrying extra weight! And that's not all! When the researchers looked at how well the women functioned after the death of their spouse, they found that even in the face of this biggest stressor of all, those women who had a close friend and confidante were more likely to survive the experience without any new physical impairments or permanent loss of vitality. Those without friends were not always so fortunate. Yet if friends counter the stress that seems to swallow up so much of our life these days, if they keep us healthy and even add years to our life, why is it so hard to find time to be with them? That's a question that also troubles researcher Ruthellen Josselson, Ph.D., co-author of Best Friends: The Pleasures and Perils of Girls' and Women's Friendships (Three Rivers Press, 1998). Every time we get overly busy with work and family, the first thing we do is let go of friendships with other women, explains Dr. Josselson. We push them right to the back burner. That's really a mistake because women are such a source of strength to each other. We nurture one another. And we need to have unpressured space in which we can do the special kind of talk that women do when they're with other women. It's a very healing experience.

Edith Paipert Namias, April 6,1909-February 10, 2003

Kathleen Winsor Feb. 28 1927- March 4 2003


Edith Namias passed away exactly on the day that six years ago her husband Jerome left this world. Jerome Namias was the founder of the Climate Research Group at SIO. Edith was an accomplished artist who had studied sculpture and painting.

Jerome writes in his autobiography, "Edith had a wonderful feel for symmetry, balance and aesthetics. As I analyzed isentropic charts she would makecomments as to the artistic or often artistically- jarring features I had produced. It soon became clear that parts of my analysis that she did not like were incorrect. It was then that I realized the close association between art and science."

Edith, when not traveling, worked daily in her studio. In La Jolla, their sunny apartment was filled with her art and she exhibited in galleries around town.

Edith is survived by her loving daughter Judith Immenschuh, and two grandchildren. She is buried in Sharon, Massachusetts, next to her beloved Jerome.

For many years she divided her time between Fishkill New York and La Jolla. A Cornell University graduate in Chemistry, she became a science librarian at Queens College in NYC. After becoming widowed, she came to La Jolla in the late 60's as an archivist for Trudi Szilard while Trudi wrote the biography of her husband. For many years she did library research for her sister Joan Laskoff, a film maker of historical films. She was a flutist and played regularly with groups in the area. She was active in many Jewish organizations in San Diego as well as nationally. She was a quiet community activist, supporting many "liberal" causes- walking precincts and parades, phoning, and just being there to give support to things she believed in.

Soon after arriving in San Diego, Kathleen joined Oceanids. She regularly attended the fall and spring luncheons, the Christmas party, was a member of WITS, and the bird watching group. She was active in UCSD Friends of Music, and Friends of the Library. She enjoyed being a member of the Faculty club, and attended lectures and dinners.

Although there was a shyness about Kathleen, she loved meeting people, and getting to know them as a great listener. She tried hang gliding in her 60's. For years she participated in the national crossword contest. She enjoyed folk dancing, the theater and all music. She had a subtle sense of humor when telling tales of her many adventures. She had the gift of combining the physical, intellectual and spiritual in the activities of her life.

She leaves her two sisters, Joan and Peggy, two nieces, a nephew, and close friends who love her and consider her "family".



Zacharias Kunuk, director of Atanarjuat (The Fast Runner), an all-Inuit feature film which has won numerous awards worldwide, will speak on The Art of Inuit Storytelling in the Digital Age at 7:30 p.m. May 7 in the Price Center Theatre at the University of California, San Diego. A screening of Atanarjuat will precede his talk at 7 p.m. May 6, also in the Price Center Theatre. Both events are free and open to the public.

Native to the Inuit culture of Canada, where storytelling is one of the oldest living art forms, the self-taught Kunuk went from trading his soap stone carvings in 1981 for a video camera, VCR and 26-inch television to directing films.
