
Reading Response 5

However, Kong's analysis allowed me to see how Asian Americans are de-minoritized: we are everywhere on campus, but our status as minorities is denied. Because of the negative stereotype that Asians are good at everything and have a greater chance to succeed compared to other minority groups, a racial wedge is created in which those students who are a part of the other minority groups feel devalued. They are working hard, but it is difficult to get to the same place without the same support and background. Kong challenges how Asian students are numerically shown as the majority and that the UC is a perfectly equal system where there is no racism, thus silencing the criticism of other minority groups. Her analysis opened up a new perspective, where I now see this complicated argument on racial politics at UCSD, making it to be a vulnerable campus climate that affects our learning environment.
