5. Intercollegiate Athletics Upgrade & Football Referendum

The University of California, San Diego's Intercollegiate Athletic Philosophy states that because of the vast diversity of UCSD's athletic program it is unrealistic to suppose that adequate finances will ever be available to support all of the programs in their entirety. Because of this philosophy, many of the Inter-collegiate athletes are forced to pay for their equipment and travel costs, sometimes amounting to hundreds of dollars.

In addition, the administration of UCSD has determined that in order to establish an Intercollegiate Football Team at UCSD, a referendum must be passed by the students specifically stating an increase in student fees in order to finance the football program. As a result of this increase, all students will be admitted to home football games without admission charge.

If passed, the funds generated by the referendum below will be used to upgrade UCSD's intercollegiate sports programs and to establish a Division III Football Program.

This is to confirm that the ICRHA referendum held May 31, and June 1 has met all conditions as established prior to the election. A proposed charter for this management body will be written by appointed representatives from each of the cooperatives and enterprises and Associated Students. This management body shall be called the Student Cooperative Center Board and its members will consist of one representative from each of the enterprises that occupy space in the Center, including but not limited to the Grove Caffe, A.S. Lecture Notes, KSDT, and Soft Reserves, a representative from each of the cooperatives, from each of the colleges, and one from the Graduate Students Association and the Associated Students. The Student Cooperative Center Board will begin administering the student center fee beginning the Fall quarter of 1989;
- 5. That the Student Cooperative Center have as its priorities the efficient management of the facility, the preservation of the Triton Pub facility, the development of new coops, the expansion of existing coops, the hiring of staff trained in cooperative economics and the creation of an interdisciplinary academic program in cooperative economics;
- 6. That the administration of the Student Center be transferred from the UCSD Undergraduate Affairs Administration to the University of California Center for Cooperatives.

3) REFERENDA QUESTION ON NUCLEAR WEAPONS LABS

The University of California manages the Lawrence Livermore and Los Alamos National Laboratories, the only two labs authorized to design, develop, and test all U.S. nuclear weapons.

The UC Regents are required to make a preliminary decision in September of 1990 whether to continue the University's management responsibilities. The current Department of Energy contract with the University expires in 1992.

The University's primary duty in managing the labs is to appoint directors to each of the labs. The UC does not participate in the programming or budgeting processes of the labs; this is done by the Department of Energy and the Department of Defense.

The University receives a management fee of twelve million dollars of which approximately half is available for University use. From this, the University allocates \$1 million annually to support collaborative research between the labs and UC faculty and students. This money makes up less than 1% of the UC's total research budget.

Over fifty percent of the labs' budget goes to the research and development of nuclear weapons and seventy seven percent of the labs' total budget goes to military research in support of national policy as communicated to the labs by the Department of Energy. The remaining money is allocated to non-military research programs.

There have been four faculty reports regarding the management of the Labs. The first three recommended continued UC management of the Labs only if substantial modifications in the nature of University management occurred. The most recent Academic Senate report, the Jendreson Report of 1989, recommended that the University should discontinue its management of the Labs.

4) CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENTS, OF A.S. CONSTITUTION REFERENDA QUESTION

ARTICLE VIII: AMENDMENTS

Section C: Constitutional Convention

Upon the receipt by the President of a petition signed by twenty-five (25%) of the members of the ASUCSD or upon passage by two-thirds (2/3rds) of a council resolution calling for a Constitutional Convention to be held, then a Convention shall begin within twenty (20) academic days.

- 1) A convention shall be open to all members of the ASUCSD
- 2) At the close of the constitutional convention there shall be no more than one (1) constitution presented for consideration on the ballot of an election to be held within twenty-four (24) academic days of the close of the convention. If the spring general election is scheduled within sixty days of the close of the convention, the constitution shall be placed on the ballot of the general election.
- 3) Bylaws:
 - a) The Constitutional Convention shall be governed by the ASUCSD Constitutional Convention Bulaws.
 - b) A two-thirds (2/3rds) affirmative vote of the A.S. Council members shall be necessary for ratification of the Constitutional Convention Bylaws and for amendments to the Constitutional Convention Bylaws.
- 4) A new Constitution shall be approved upon concurrence of 2/3rds of the members of the ASUCSD voting.

The current ASUCSD Constitution reads:

ARTICLE III: OFFICERS OF THE ASUCSD

Section G: Ex-Officio Members

7. ASUCSD Judicial Board Chair

- a) Shall be appointed by the President and subject to 2/3 council approval.
- b) Shall head the ASUCSD Judicial Board, coordinating bi-monthly meetings.
- c) The Judicial Board shall give bi-weekly evaluations of the conduct of the ASUCSD officers, in line with the stipulations set down in evaluating procedures by the ASUCSD.
- d) The chair shall make mandatory reports every other academic week to the council on the results of these evaluations, and on any other relevant business dealt with by the ASUCSD.
- e) Shall work in concert with the Student Advocate in bringing relevant concerns of the ASUCSD to the attention of council.

ARTICLE IV: JUDICIARY

Section A: Authority

- 1. The Judicial Board of the ASUCSD shall be vested with the Judicial authority of the ASUCSD.
- 2. The Judicial Board authority shall extend to all Judicial cases arising under this constitution, its by-laws, official actions of ASUCSD officers and employees, and any other matters delegated to the committee by the ASUCSD Council.

Section B: Membership

- 1. The Judicial Board shall consist of one (1) representative appointed by each college and confirmed by the ASUCSD Council.
- 2. The president of the ASUCSD shall appoint the chairperson, subject to 2/3 approval by council.
- 3. In the event that the number of representatives appointed by each college, and the chairperson shall in total equal an even number, the ASUCSD President shall appoint another member to maintain an odd number of members on the board.
- 4. Members of the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall serve a term of one (1) year upon nomination from the time of appointment.
- 5. In the event of a vacancy on the Judicial Board, the representative college council of that vacant position shall appoint a new member within twelve (12) academic days. Failure will result in the President of the ASUCSD appointing member.
- 6. In the event that a vacancy in the office of the chairperson shall occur, the ASUCSD President shall appoint a replacement within twelve days (12) of knowledge of the vacancy.
- 7. Membership on the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall preclude the serving in any other official or employment capacity within the ASUCSD.

Section C: Rules of Procedure

- 1. The ASUCSD Judicial Board will meet bi-monthly at regularly scheduled well publicized times, unless the board is called to order by any one of the ASUCSD officers authorized in this constitution with the authority to do so.
- 2. The procedural guide lines of the Judicial Board will be followed in conformity with the Judiciary authority and procedures charter.

Section D: Function and Powers

- 1. The ASUCSD Judicial Board shall function as the mediating body of any and all conflicts arising from the actions or policies of the ASUCSD Council or Associated Students.
- 2. The Judicial Board shall exercise the primary Judicial power of the Association granting such judicial relief as permitted by this constitution and the by-laws of the ASUCSD.
- 3. The Council shall investigate, in conjunction with the Student Advocate, charges of violations of this constitution and all of the regulations of the association.
- 4. The Judicial Board shall have the power to issue advising opinions upon all questions of proposed or enacted legislation of the association which is raised by petition of any member of the association.
- 5. The Judicial Board shall serve as the interpreter of the A.S. Constitution and its by-laws, and rule on the constitutionality of council actions.
- 6. The Judicial Board shall also serve as the evaluative board of any salary/monetary allocations paid in part or in full to members of the ASUCSD council or its subordinate bodies.
- 7. The Judicial Board will work as an appeals panel in rendering decisions involving the ASUCSD Elections Board.

Section E: Finality

1. All decisions of the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall be final unless reviewed by the board itself.

Section F: Removal from Office

- 1. Any member of the Judicial Board may be removed from office for failure to perform his/her duty.
- 2. Charges may be brought by any five (5) ASUCSD elective officers.
- 3. In open session before the ASUCSD Council, the accused board member shall be given all due process rights and an equal opportunity to defend him/herself at an impartial hearing conducted in accordance with minimal due process requirements set forth in UC policies and UCSD campus regulations. Removal from office shall require a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the entire council.
- 4. Members of the Judicial Board shall automatically be removed from office for failure to attend any three (3) regular meetings in one quarter.

Should the ASUCSD amend the ASUCSD Constitution, Article III & IV to read:

ARTICLE III: OFFICERS OF THE ASUCSD

Section G: Ex-Officio Members

7. ASUCSD Judicial Board Chair

- a) Shall be appointed by the President and subject to 2/3 council approval.
- b) Shall head the ASUCSD Judicial Board, coordinating the Board's meetings.
- c) Shall inform the ASUCSD Council on any relevent judicial matters.

ARTICLE IV: JUDICIARY

Section A: Authority

- 1. The Judicial Board of the ASUCSD shall be vested with the Judicial authority of the ASUCSD. The Judicial Board is a hearing body and not an investigative body.
- 2. The Judicial Board authority shall extend to all Judicial cases arising under this constitution, its by-laws, official actions of the ASUCSD Council and/or its officers.
- The Judicial Board will work as an appeals panel in rendering decisions involving the ASUCSD Elections Board.
- 4. All decisions of the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall be final unless reviewed by the board itself.

Section B: Membership

- 1. The president of the ASUCSD shall appoint the chairperson, subject to 2/3 approval by council.
- 2. The Judicial Board shall consist of one (1) representative appointed by each college and confirmed by the ASUCSD Council.
- 3. Members of the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall serve a term of one (1) year from the time of their confirmation of appointment.
- 4. In the event of a vacancy on the Judicial Board, the representative college council of that vacant position shall appoint a new member within ten (10) academic days. Failure will result in the President of the ASUCSD appointing a member from that college subject to a two thirds (2/3) ASUCSD Council approval.
- 5. In the event that a vacancy in the office of the chairperson shall occur, the ASUCSD President shall appoint a replacement within ten (10) academic days of knowledge of the vacancy.
- 6. Membership on the ASUCSD Judicial Board shall preclude the serving in any other capacity on the ASUCSD Council or its subordinate bodies.

Section C: Rules of Procedure

- 1. The procedural guide lines of the Judicial Board will be followed in conformity with the Judicial Board charter.
- 2. Amendments to the Judicial Board Charter must be submitted by the Judicial Board Chairperson to the ASUCSD Council requiring 2/3rds council approval.

Section D: Removal from Office

- 1. Any member of the Judicial Board may be removed from office for failure to perform his/her duty.
- 2. Charges may be brought by any five (5) ASUCSD elected officers.
- 3. In open session before the ASUCSD Council, the accused board member shall be given all due process rights and an equal opportunity to defend him/herself at an impartial hearing conducted in accordance with minimal due process requirements set forth in UC policies and UCSD campus regulations. Removal from office shall require a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the entire council.

VOTER INFORMATION STUDENT RECREATION FACILITIES REFERENDUM

- * This is an all-student referendum to construct, maintain, and operate new student recreation facilities consisting of a swimming pool with jacuzzi, racquetball courts, night lighting on the Muir field, and a jacuzzi at the Natatorium.
- * The construction cost is \$1,006,000 which will come from a Regents' loan for that amount which has an interest rate of 9.5% and is repaid over a 25 year period at \$106,595 per year. The loan is secured by a mandatory \$5/quarter/student fee which also provides maintenance and operating funds. Based on 10,000 students, there is a minimum of \$43,405 per year for maintenance and operation. Additional income comes from non-student user fees and rent when school is not in session(e.g., Summer).
- * All costs were researched by the UCSD Architects and Engineers Office and the Capital and Space Management Office.
- * No fees will be collected until the Facilities are ready for student use, in Fall 1981.
- * There are no additional use fees for registered students.
- * Non-students must pay a use fee.
- * The student fee will be included in student fee scholarships and grants via Student Financial Services.
- * The student fee may be changed only by a direct all-student vote.
- * At the end of the 25 year debt retirement period, there will be a direct all-student vote to approve the fee level for continued maintenance and operation.
- * The question will appear on the ballot as follows:
 - Shall the Students of the University of California at San Diego assess themselves a fee of \$5.00 per quarter per student for the sole purpose of constructing, maintaining, and operating Student Recreation Facilities consisting of a swimming pool, jacuzzi, five racquetball/handball courts, and a shower/locker room located just north of the Warren West Field, a jacuzzi at the Natatorium, and night lighting on the Muir Field, said Facilities to be governed by the Student Recreation Facilities Charter?
- * The size of the new pool is 25 yds X 25 m. Each jacuzzi is 15' in diameter. The racquetball courts are standard size 20' X 40'. The locker room has 100 dressing and 500 storage lockers. Solar heating and natural ventilation are used in the designs.
- * The Facilities are run by a student committee, consisting of 6 voting representatives, one each appointed by the ASUCSD, the GSC, and each College Council, and 3 non-voting consultants. The Facilities annual budget report is public and must be submitted to the ASUCSD, the GSC, each College Council, and the consultants.

This referendum requires a 2/3 majority vote to be valid.



- All powers within the ASUGSD shall be vested in the ASUGSD Council. These powers, and the exercise thereof, will be subject to review by the membership of the association as provided in this constitution.

 - e) The development, review, promotion and approval of an annual budget of the association.
 - f) The sponsorship, organization and promotion of programming for the ASUCSD as it deems appropriate.
 - g) Supervise and direct the conduct, affairs, policies and properties under the jurisdiction of the ASUCSD.
 - h) Manage, and invest appropriate finances of the ASUGSD for the maintenance and facilitation of the affairs and property of the ASUGSD.
 - Sponsor, support and aid student organizations concurrent with charter affiliation to the ASUCSD.
 - j) Implement the provisions of this constitution by means of appropriate rules and regulations.
- 1. All legislative and administrative authorities of the ASUCSD shall be vested in the ASUCSD Council and exercised according to appropriate rules and procedures.
 - Development, review, promotion, and approval of an annual budget of the ASUCSD shall be by the ASUCSD Council.
 - b. ASUCSD policy shall be determined by the ASUCSD Council.
- These powers, and exercise thereof, will be subject to review by the membership of the ASUCSD through initiatives.
 Members of the ASUCSD may override a decision by the ASUCSD Council to pass or fail a specific piece of legislation through a procedure by petition and campus vote.
 - a. Proposed override of ASUCSD Council's decision on legislation regarding budgets, appropriations, and/or expenditures of funds shall require a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the members of the ASUCSD to be submitted to a vote by the ASUCSD.
 - b. Proposed override of ASUCSD Council's decision on all other legislation shall require a petition signed by fifteen percent (15%) of the members of the ASUCSD to be submitted to a vote by the ASUCSD.
 - c. The petitions required above shall include the intent to override the ASUCSD Council's decision, the specific legislation that the Council considered, and the fact that a Special Election may need to be called.
 - d. Such petitions must be presented to the President within ten (10) academic days from the time of passage or failure of the legislation.

- e. If such a petition is received with the required number of signatures, the question must be submitted to a vote by the ASUCSD within fifteen (15) academic days from the time of presentation of the petition.
- f. During the interval of the presentation of the petition and the election, all actions shall be suspended and all associated expenditures or funds, if any, shall cease.
- g. A majority of those ASUCSD members voting shall be necessary to override the ASUCSD Council's decision on the specific legislation with a minimum turnout of fifteen percent (15%) of the ASUCSD.
- h. If the ASUCSD Council's decision is overridden by the ASUCSD, the legislation may not be resubmitted to the ASUCSD Council sooner than one (1) year after the override.
- The ASUCSD Council may place a referenda measure on the ballot of an election, general or special, within fifteen (15) academic days upon two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the Council.
 - The referenda measure may be passed by a majority of the ASUCSD members voting.
 - Minimum voting percentage turnout, if any, shall be determined in ASUCSD policies and procedures on elections.

ARTICLE V. ELECTIONS

- 6. Concurrence of a simple majority of those ASUGSD members voting shall be necessary to nullify the council action, with a minimum turnout of fifteen percent (15%) of the ASUGSD Student Body:
- 7: Such a council action, if nullified by a vote of the students, may not be resubmitted to the council sooner than one (1) year after the vote.

CAMPUS LIFE FEE REFERENDUM BALLOT

This Referendum proposes a fee to provide funding for additional student activities, events, and programs and to expand and renovate facilities at UCSD. The fee generated by the 2001 Campus Life Referendum, hereafter referred to as us-Life Fee" would be assessed at \$71.40* per quarter from each "the enro andergraduate and graduate student.

* The Campus-Life Fee will initially be assessed at \$70.70 per student per quarter and will increase by \$0.35 once sixth college begins enrolling students and again when seventh college begins enrolling students.

Referendum Conditions:

- The Campus-Life Fee will be collected starting in fall quarter 2001 with the exception of the line-item allocations for sixth and seventh colleges.
- The line-item allocations for sixth and seventh colleges will be collected starting in the first fall quarter of enrollment for each respective college.
- The Campus-Life Fee will be allocated quarterly to the areas or units in the dollar amounts listed below in Chart #1.
- The Campus-Life Fee will never increase beyond \$71.40.
- As enrollments increase, each area or unit will continue to receive the same per student allocation each quarter in order to offset inflation and account for the increasing number of students.
- Every three years the Registration Fee Committee will review the Campus-Life Fee in order to make recommendations on potential reductions to the Campus-Life Fee with the exception of contractual obligations.
- If state funds, donations, or other moneys become available to support adequately any areas or units receiving allocations from the Campus-Life Fee, the quarterly fee will be reduced by an amount to be recommended by the Registration Fee Committee.

 • All changes in state funding or moneys received by the university impacting
- areas or units funded by the Campus-Life Fee shall be make known and available to the Registration Fee Committee.
- In the future, if an area or unit receiving allocations from the Campus-Life Fee no longer exists, the Campus-Life Fee will be reduced by the amount of the
- The Chancellor's Office and UCSD Administration will provide all funding y to relocate the Campus Police and clear the site for Price Center expan-13/ n non-student fee sources.
- The money allocated to Sports Facilities by the Campus-Life Fee shall be used only for lighting at Warren Field, synthetic turf at Muir Field, and twenty-four hour use of the Main Gym.
- Decisions regarding the expenditure of the allocations resulting from passage of this referendum will be made by existing or formed committees with students comprising at least two-thirds of the voting members.
- The Administration will, with the exception of the aforementioned examples, under no circumstances change the per student per quarter allocation amount.

Student Athletic Support Fee Referendum

SUBJECT: Result of Intercollegiate Athletics Fee Increase Referendum

Dear Vice Chancellor Watson:

On December 18, 2006, Chancellor Fox approved a request from the Associated Students to conduct a fee referendum election to increase the Intercollegiate Athletics fee by \$78.04 per student pet quarter effective Fall Quarter 2007 and adjusted annually with the California Consumer Price Index. The election was conducted on TritonLink from January 29 through February 2, 2007 in accordance with the ASUCSD Election Bylaws and Section 18.00 of UCSD Policies and Procedures Applying to Student Activities.

The UCSD undergraduate students voted in favor of the fee increase, with 55.8% voting in the affirmative, and 44.2% voting in the negative. The percentage of registered undergraduate students participating in the election was 41.9%, thereby satisfying the minimum voter turnout requirement to make the fee referendum valid. This number is based on the number of registered undergraduates on the last day of voting, which is consistent with *The Constitution of the Associated Students of the University of California, San Diego*, which states in relevant part that "the number of students casting ballots must equal or exceed 20% of the registered students affected by the fee at the time the election is held."

Attached is the Certificate of Election signed by the Associated Students Special Election Manager which includes the actual ballot language, certifying the aforementioned to be true. I endorse the result of the election and recommend that you forward it to the Chancellor for her approval and submission to the President for final approval.



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
