### EAST ASIAN EXPERT TO ADDRESS FRIENDS OF UCSD LIBRARY MEETING

Professor Chalmers Johnson of the UCSD Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies will speak on "Trade, Revisionism and the Future of Japanese-American Relations" to open the 1990-91 Salon Series sponsored by The Friends of the University of California, San Diego Library.

The lecture will be held at 5 p.m. Oct. 10 in Room 111A, Chancellor's Complex on the UCSD campus. It is free and open to the public.

Johnson currently is Rohr Professor of Pacific International Relations within the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies at UCSD. He taught for 26 years in the Department of Political Science at the University of California, Berkeley, where he served both as chair of his department and chair of the Center for Chinese Studies. His A.B., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics and political science are from UC Berkeley.

An acknowledged authority on East Asia, political economy, revolution and social movements, Johnson has written some 12 books on these subjects. His best-known book about China is called Peasant Nationalism and Communist Power; his best-known book on Japan, MITI and the Japanese Miracle, has been translated into Japanese, Chinese and Korean. The summer 1990 issue of Daedalus--devoted entirely to Japan--features an article by Johnson entitled, "The People Who Invented the Mechanical Nightingale."
