Sunday 2nd September.

At EAPENAMANNA. Sueday Observed.

Monday 17th September.

At WAPENAMANDA. Fublic Holiday Observed.

WAPENAMANDL_ININ Farede 7 s.m. Spent worning packing for patrol and departed WAPEN-MUANDEA at 11-45 7.m. and arrived at ARON at 12-30 (.m. At about 2 p.m. I walked to WIMIMAGIN where work started on the new bridge. Bearers hauled into place and I returned to the Rest-house at about 6 p.m.

THE REAL PROPERTY AND A DECK

FRON WAPENAMANDA. At about 8 n.w. I walked to NOTHINAGIN and proceeded to nail the planks into position. At the same time work was started on the other bridges and besrers were houled for those bridges. Returned to the Rest-house at about 1 p.m. for lunch and received message to return to WAPENAMANDA inmediately due to transfer to Supreme Court, Port Moresby, Beturned to WAPENAMANDA at 2 p.m. per Land-Rover and arrived there at 2-30 p.m.

END OF DIARY.

The general purpose of this patrol was to supervise the minten-ance of the WARAG-MT.HAGEN road between WELVA and the WAPENAMANIM - WARAG boundary near AMAPIAN. Maintenance work was also carried out on the MAUANTA road that is from the main road to the RAUGANDA Rest-house and the TCHAN VALLEY road as far as ARUN. A walking track from the main road to the LAMAN-DETMANDA Rest-house was also marked out. Bridge decking was replaced on the TUTAN VALLEY road too.

NATIVE APPLIES

There is little consent to be unde regarding the native situation in this area at the moment as the area has had quite a bit of petrolling in the last few months and the general situation seens unchanged.

The only delays in the work were caused by rain and there was quite a bit of wet weather whilst I was out on this patrol. Other delays mere coused by some matives who wanted to leave their work and go and look at the While ceremony which was passing through the area the time of the patrol. However it was stressed how important this work was and after a for initial difficulties, I had no further trouble gelling the work done.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

As may be observed from the patro; instructions the privary purpove of this patro; was to supervise the maintenance the rest of this a main road that is that section of the main WIMAG_NT. MAGEN road which rans through the Espenamands Administrative Area.

In my brief experience on road work I have found that the methods of sistemance we carried out on this patrol were by far the best. I think that the only way to make sure that a good job will be done is to get the natives to heap the gravel at the side of the road along ide his or her work and when you are satisfied that sufficient gravel has been carried only them should you spread the gravel. This acthed texes one's petience at times but I think that it is the only way to set the job done properly. This same wethod was employed on the AMAFIAE RAUA AND road and consequently I do not think this section of the petrol weeds further comment!

During the two days I spent on the TODAE calley road I was guite satisfied with the work done, the size of the new planks and above all the willingness of the natives to get a difficult job done as matchly so pessible This may have been partly due to the fact that they wanted to carry on with the MOGN ceremony which was in their area at the time of the work. When I retarned to MAPUNAWANDA station the main rand was in good

condition and for the benefit for future patrols of this type I would suggest that the methods employed shows are by far the most suitable to get the job done quickly and effectively.

The native situation 19 quits normal for this area. Althoug a considerable amount of gambling takes place in Raiver Hiv r and a large number of people from that area cannot be blamed for the incidence of gambling area. at Lumic. Gaubling is rife throughout the Mabag Subdistrict and the Magen/Minj area for that matter. As with other Missions the Baptist Missionaries complain of the amount of gambling in the area, but seldon, if ever, will become involved in attempting to stamp it out by laying informations or giving evidence.

The Q.C.C. Sections 216 and 217 would not serve in the case of child marriages. With regard to this I would suggest you show Mr. Bailey all provious correspondence received. Propaganda is the only way.

From a recent aerial survey it was seen that the bridle track down the Lai River is proceeding apace. The completion of this will be of great benefit to the region's inhabitants.

Please advise Mr. Beiley of the form of report writing required in this District, i.e. all matters concerning other Departments to be in Appendices with an extra copy for distribution.

Attached please find the report of a Patrol to the Lower LAI Census Sub-Division, conducted by Mr.G.E.Bailey, Patrol Officer, Gr.I.

Metive Situation:

Mr. Bailey's reference to the practise of encouraging Village Officials to settle minor disputes being introduced only last year is

disputes being introduced only last year is incorrect. It has been a common practice for many years, where the sheer volume of petty litigation could not be entirely attended to by the Officer on patrol; the volume of litigation requiring direct Court action demands this. The general situation appears to remain as tisfactory. Gambling is wide sp read and spreading, and as Village Officials appear incompetent, either through personal involvement or lack of enthusiasm, to bring cause to court, it is impossible to do much about stamping it out. The most serious effect of gambling is that it leads to theft to enable the thief to obtain a new stake.

I think invoca tion of Sec.216 and 217 of the Q.C.C. to discourage child marriage against the will of the child concerned is of itself fuitle; however, if in fact it does tend to discourage its incidence, no harm has been done. Continued propagands against it is of more efficacy. Most native girls are slready married before they reach the statutory ages laid down in the Code.

Acirulture:

The D.A.S .F. Officer, Wapenamanda, is shortly patrolling the Lover Lai, and can no doubt satisfy requests to this patrol for assist-

ance in coffee matters.

Mr.Bailey has carried out a useful pa trol and reported satisfa ctorily thereon. The aims of the patrol were achoived. Delay in forwarding the report is regretted, and is compounded of Mr.Bailey's spending condiderable time after the patrol was completed, trying to re-concile his census statistices with the p revious years, and the fast thereport was mislaid upon receipt at this office.

He time was last during the patrel cuin to inclement weather conditions, the patrel being blessed throug out it's duration by fine, sumy weather. This was also the first Highlands patrel enhanced up by syself and the local native appeared as co-operative as his ceastal counterpart He re. Then to consus revision. It may be can that this section of the Enga people are more inclined to the first fir with patrels than their Lavengai and Tabar oppearts numbers in the Hew Ireland Mictrict were I was previously. The Sommen Roll for the 1964 Legislative Council Ricctions for this division was compiled during the patrel thms leaving only the Middle Lai and Tebak valley areas of Wapmannak Fatrel Pest to be completed and as these two latterly mantioned a rather more speedy listing may be looked forward to.

NATIVE SITUATION.

The Native situation overall remains satisfactory. Natives of this area appear to be well versed concerning the pro-cess of the law and in all but six instances the numerous dispates brought before the Patrol were settled mutually by the parties concerned without the need for court action. The practice of encouraging village officials to settle minor disputes was contin-ued. This was introduced by the previous patrolling Officer in Marked of last rest 23.0

Land disputes, which are the cause of considerable litigation in the Wapenamanda area are comparitively few in the Lower Lai owing to the greater amount of suitable land available to the populass. Two disputes were brought before the patrol in this sphere, one was settled by me to mutual satisfaction and the other by as independent luluai whe was not concerned in the matter. In common with the rest of the Engs area the males of the Lower Lai lead polacylous lives. Concern was expressed to me by a number of the resple over the fact that there are increasing numbers of wence leaving their husbands in cases were the sam has more than one wife. The patrol noticed that were a woman embraces the Christian Faith she leaves her husband if he has mere than one wife. It may sound unduly cynical to say that some women become Christians to enable them to leave their husbands but I believe this to be true in some instances. Of course some of the men adopt Christianity but were a man has more than one wife this is the exception.

One case of tribal incest was brought to the Patrols attention at KITAN (PINYAPIAS census point). Here a man of about 35 of age had "married" his step-daughter and had a shild by her

----- much to the diagust of the local people. I was informed that the reason for his action was that his two wives were now rather old and he preferred a young woman. He action had been taken against this man by his own people because he is mentally unbalanced and given to fits of vielence. The man concerned was escerted back to Wapenamanda were he will be placed before Medical authorities for observation.

LAW AND JUSTICE.

Only six sittings of the Court for Jative Affairs were held during the Patrol. Offences ranged from failing to appear before the Court, one case of failing to appear for Consum, and unit and stealing. As merited by the individual case gool sent or fines were moved out. Consern over gambling amongst the LIMIS people was expressed by the Reptist Rimister resident there but the patrol

Consern over gashing alonget the LIMIS people was Copressed by the Reptist Minister resident there but the patrol was mable to mearth my instances probably because of price warning of our couting. It was noted however that the matirus from this area were gashed for gashing. The chaister concerned elade that gashing had reached such heights that if he were to disate pupils from his school for playing lucky he would less TOF of his pupils. It is believed that this gashing cross has reached LUMI by way of BAITHER RIVER. Whether it exists in the properties alained is open to conjecture pending proof. The instances of forcing young girls of about 13 and the parties concerned were informed that any further such gaings on could result in charges being laid under Sastiens 216 and 217 of the Q.C.C.

People of the Lover Lai are nainly engaged in substa gardening followin the usual bush fallow system. European vege are grown in addition to native foodstuffs and provide a sopplementary item in diet as wellas a small each income by co ag to the Raytist Mission at LUMIS and the Lutheren Mission at WAPENAMANDA. and a e by celli-

Coffee gardens were sighted in the PADS, PINYLPIAS and MANIS areas which are coming along satisfacthrily. Coffee from tness gardens is either disposed of by sale to the Daytist or Matheran Missions. The Mission airstrip at LUMIS has proved a been to the natives in this section of the Lower Lei as it has out out the need to carry produce to MAIVER RIVER.

Natives from the KAMAMAMDA area approached the patrel seeking coffee seed to enable them to start coffee gardens and this has been referred to the Wapenamanda D.A.S.P. Officer.

LIVESTOCK.

Adequate numbers of pigs and chickens are owned by the . people but play a part more of ceremony than of diet supplementing.

Bridges over the streams are limited to suplings or are non-existent. Three suspension bridges erors the Lai River at various puints and when used by the patrol were well maintained and in good condition.

MEDICAL AND HNALFEL.

The health of this section of the Lai appears on the whole good. It will be noted from the consus figures that there were a mainer of deaths amongst children above last years. This was due mainly to the consuming of tainted yig ment at a correspond in the middle of last year.

Elthough an Aid Post Orderly did not eccompany the patrol the corvices of such personal! from the three Aid Posts the area vers utilized, Ailments were limited to minor skin complaints and one once of lograncy.

In addition to the three Aid-Posts continued the Incheron Mission Morgital at Mashionnes is within any walking distance of the Sover Ini and the Lumis Deptist Mission has a qualified murning Sloter stationed at the Mission she halfs infant welfare elimics.

MISSIONS AND EDUCATION.

There are three Missions active in the Lower Loi, manely the Lutherun at PANARI, Daptist at LONIS and Seventh May Advertist at REFUMIE. Of these only the latter is not staffed by a European Missionary.

All targe Missions have schools at the abovementioned places in addition to a runber of small village schools which teach the fundamentals before proceeding on to Mission Contro Schools.

All three Missions and their adherents get on well tagether and from the outside at least there would appear to be no infer-familen jealousy.

It was noted that the Baptist Mission at LUMIS is now purchasing formented coffee beans from local natives at a price (1/6 lb.) to the mutual natisfaction of both parties.

The mative situation is as good as can be expected in this densely populated area. This surrepticious marker is the first of its kind in the Subdistrict during the last four years, to sy knowledge, and probably since the year 1946 in fast. I agree with you that Mr. Bailey and Constable Eage are to be congretulated on their detective work in the case, and you must ensure that a very good case is presented to the Supreme Court ending in a constation, to show the people that there is no fiture in this type of occurrence. I would appreciate a procis of the evidence.

From experience at Houst Hagen there are three main points which must be checked on before the purchase of trucks by the villagers -

- (1) That a full list of all contributors is kept; there is no duress in collection and the group concerned should be as small and homogeneous as pessible;
- (2) That they have surveyed the business possibilities and have a number of sound prospects;
- (3) That they have a fully qualified driver available right from the start.

Although the consus was not completely revised by this patrol it is assumed that before writing the Common Roll Mr. Bailey took note of all changes in the clans. For your further advice.

The District Education Officer has included Welya on his recently formulated 5-year plan. However, no time of compensations is yet known.

The patrol has made a great improvement to their section of the main Wabag-Ragen Road.

Please ensure that Mr. Bailey is shown the form of Reports laid down in this District. As you say a good report of a considerable amount of constructive work.

THE OF PATROL BLART.

INTRODUCTION.

This patrel was carried out through the Middle Lai Census Division of the Wapenamanda Patrel Post Administrative area in the Wabag Sub-District and was purely routine in nature. Tag/Census revision wasicarried out and the Common Roll for the 1964 Legislative Council elections Exercise ant compiled for the area. Thus only the Tsak walley romains.

Good weather was enjoyed throughout and no time was lost owing to inclement weather conditions. Vehicular roads serve the area patrollid and the problem of long travelling times was not encountered.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The native situation overall remains satisfactory. These people have been under Administration influence for some little time now and show no hesitation in bringing forth disputes and Court cases for hearing. In fact I would say that they show an over-readiness to bring forth disputes requiring litigation of the sect simple and elementary nature. It would appear that the sundry parties "starring" in the almost limitless disputes, petty or otherwise, have merely changed , their roles of active antagonists to professional litigatts.

Land, as in the rest of the WABAG Sub-District, is the major cause of disputes which on occassions can lead to violence. Breas if a settlement has been affected by a previous Officer the party that "lost" usually attempts to bring the matter up for re-hearing in the hope that the original decision will be reversed.

At WANBULIN, near PINA CATHOLIC MISSION, it was reported that boundary markers placed by a previous Officer had been remaved and resited to must one mide. The two clans involved are the FUMBACHE'S from the WARAG Administrative area and the WANGALHA'S from the WAPENAM-ANDA side. The SUMBAGES people had moved three markers and carried them a distance of only twenty yards. Thenty yards is enough however when, as in this case, they were shrewedly placed in the middle of a garded owned by the MANGALHA'S. It is thought that these marks were moved in honour of the patrols arrival in the area in an attempt to have the whole dispute re-heard. The markers were re-placed in their original positions.

Land disputes are almost countless and a source of never ending talf and phremetic scenes. If the time was available a good two months work could be put in hearing hand matters alone. The Officer given the task would probably commit felo-de-se even if he had the persinstity picacity of an oracle when all the different component parts of these land troubles were laid out before him.

Sundry troubles over bride price and pigs were settled but debts incurred as a result of MOGA coresonies were not heard in accordance with District policy. Christians marrying unbelievers are a fruitful source of Court cases as it seems to be the done thing in such a marriage for either party to desire a divorce following the tiff an grounds of religious incompatibility.

Overall the situation, although a long way from cake and peaceful co-existance is satisfactory for the stage of development the Middle Lai inhabitants have at present reached. TERNITORY OF PAPUA & NEW GUINEA.

LAW AND JUSTICE.

Sittings of the Court for Native Affairs were held during the patrol were the sircumstances merited Court action. Many minor disputes were settled out of Court.

I have found the situation regarding Court cases the same as have previous Officers. In quite a number of matters brought up the litigants regard the Court as a platform whereby all their traditional dislikes and greviances can be brought up.

Since Recember 1962 there have been three murders in the Middle Lai. Two waman and one man comprise the victims. Of these two of the culprits have been arrested and charged and are now awaiting trial in the Supreme Court. The third murder, which occurred in the vicinity of PAUS whilest the patral wasWEMTA located on the 1st of March at the time of writing remains upsolved. In this instance the body of a young married woman was found on a mountainside, strangled. The other two murders were straight out husband/wife disagreements.

On 5th Febuary there was a fight between the IDAGON people and the HIAGAI'S. The latterly mentioned clan is included in the lower Lai Census Division but their land adjoins the Middle Lai boundary mark. Here, as usual, land was the crux of the matter. Two people were willed and four wounded in the resultant fracas besides ins five houses being burnt down. Court sotion taken after this resulted in 61 metiwes being sectenced to from varying periods of from six to ten months Islak

For the past six weeks there have been no further flareups over land and it is optimistically hoped that any future contestants will think twice before leaping into battle.

BCONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND AGRICULTURE.

Three clans in the Middle Lai are now giving serious consideration to thoughts concerning the purchase of vehicles. Mans in question are TSIGIN-LIUNAL, YAGUNAN and YAPONDA. Some little time was spent with these people explaining the pitfalls which can trap the unwary vehicle owner. For a start they were told to open a community C.S.B. account and to record the assocunts contributed by the various individuals if any of these people do buy a vehicle it will indeed be a manneth task to sort out who contributed what when the time comes to hand out a rebate, if any.

The D.A.S.F. Officer at WAPEKAMANDA has new established phyrethrum nurseries at WELYA, PINA, POMPOBOS, PAUS & Louine. These nurseries have not yst produced germinating seedlings or rather plants owing to their immaturity.

Coffee has been planted in many of the natives gardens particularly in the HUMBER area. This is sold to the LUTHERAN WISSION at prices of up to 1/6 per pound.

Another source of revenue to the people is the sale of fresh vegetables to the same Mission at 6d per pound. on the average 2500 lbs weight of vegetables are sent from WAPENAMANDA to the const C . T . D.

The other sources of cash incomes open are: indentured labour, casual local exployment and the selling of native buildings material and timber to the nearby patrol post and mission stations.

CISSIONS AND EDUCATION.

Two missions have European staff located within the Middle Lai area namely the Gatholic and Lutheran. Catholic Nission have a Father based at FINA and FOMPOBOS. Of these the latterly Nontioned is at present on leave.

The Lutheran Mission have staff based at YARAMANDA. MANDIE NDA, WAFEMANANDA and YAIBOS. Included in this is there articultural section near WAFEWAMANDA.

Whilst the patrol was at WELYA a Lutheran Mission Burcpean teacher approached the natives as to the possibility of his Mission acquiring land there for the establishment of a school. This request was refused by the local natives.

Also at WELVA the patrol was approached by a Gathelie cloric who claimed that there had been a near rict there a few days before between Lutheran and Cathelie adherents over a gives of land that had been "given" to the Cathelie Mission. Upon investigation it mas accertained that the learned Fathers allegations were groundless and the Land in question was being used illegally by the Cathelie Mission as a place of worship and basic schooling.

Overall inter-Mission relations appear to be amicable without being exactly cerdial.

Schools are located at YARAMANDA, FINA, FOMFOROS (mission ran) and the government school at WAPENAMANDA. Nono have any difficulty in recruiting pupils.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

During the patrol the oppurtunity was taken to widen sections of the WAPENAMAWDA-WARAG road. This work has now been almost completed and only the cambering of the road in some sections remains to be completed. The deep ditches which lined the edges of the road in places formerly have been removed as they constituted a road hazard.

Also during the patrol steps were taken to set strengthening of all bridges between WAPENAMANDA-NEBILYA RIVER in motion. This has been done as a tip-truck is expected in the near future at WAPENAMAUDA.

Whilst on patrol I took the oppurtunity of inspecting the LAI RIVER suspension bridge and observed signs of rot. The P.W.D. has been notified of this trend in the structure.

Roads and bridges in the area are on the whole of above average standard.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

Village Officials in the area are of a standard encountered in the WAPENAMANDA area; neither impressive nor overly weak but of a fairly uniform average.

The Lulusi/Tultul system as applied to changing conditions in the Territory is not overly successful mainly because of the breaking dom of the elders respect and the authority they command from the pounder generation when compared with before.

Officials all seemed fairly competent in settling petty disputes without recourse to a Native Affairs Officer.

HOUSING AND SANITATION.

That sighted suitable to existing conditions.

Tithin this category I include rest houses. All have been reconstructed recently and are of a satisfactory nature.

MEDICAL AND REALTH.

Government Aid-Posts are located at WELYA, WAPENAMAL N and LEANDA. Mission Aid-Fosts at VAIBOS, PAUSA and VARAMANDA, There is a Latheren Mission Hospital staffed by a qualified medical officer at MANDISANDA.

Health overall appears satisfactory.

For part of the patrol (YAGUMAN and IDAGON) the Medical Silver from MAMBISANDA Hospital accompanied and a mortality survey was carried out in conjunction with routine patrol dities.

CONCLUSION.

A routine patrol which was not charecterized by any unterard

incidents.

The trouble over the piece of land known as "PAIRAP" which broke out in June 1962 has not flared into fighting again but is far from over. Natives gaeled for this outbreak of lawlesness have been released from imprisonment over the last two months and are still giving forth to suggr mursurings. As one was heard to put it " trabel bilong at i no pinis yet", A not very subtle way of expressing his feelings.

To make this matter of further intrest the Agricultural Officer from WAPENAMANDA has established a phyrethrum nursery on portion of " FAIRAF". It will be interesting to see whether or not this has a main atabilizing effect on the antagonists. Seeing a crop planted for community development may help to lessen antagonisms, or; on the other hand it might be ripped up should the situation lead to blows again.

END OF DIARY.

Introduction:

The main purpose of the patrol was to supervise the constructionand replacement of bridges on the Wapenamands - Mt.Hagen road. The section patrolled is on the boundaryof the Wapenamanda and Tambul administrative areas. Timber for bridge building is in plentiful supply. As the country is very mountainous there is difficulty getting this material to the bridges. The area is lacking in essential materials for the maintenance of the road.

Co-operation from the people, on a patrol of this nature, is important, and although the co-operation was not wholehearted, the people finished their allotted tasks speedily and efficiently.

Good weather was enjoyed for the period of the patrol and only two days were lost due to inclement weather.

Native Affairs:

Only a small section of the Middle Lai Census Division was visited by this patrol and in this area the native situation was found to be satisfactory.

Labourers had to be recruited to work on the top section of the road and the bridges situated there, as this section is unpapulated. The labourers were recruited from further down the Minyanba Valley and the patrol met with no trouble in getting sufficient numbers. At Welys, the patrol hid no trueble in obtaining labour.

A numerous number of disputes of a very minor nature were heard and settled by the patrol. These involved mainly compensation for gardens etc. damaged by pigs, dogs and general carelessnession the part of the offending party.

These people are like all the people I have come in contact with while on patrol in so far as they have that money hungary "attitude. EXEXANT The only major dispute encountered one this patrol indirectly involved money. The dispute arose out of disagreement over land boundries between Luluai KEPA's clan and a clan from the Tambol Administrative area. This land had been surveyed for a timber lease with considerable time and money going into the survey. The pegs were removed by some members of KEPA's clan and consequently the surveyers packed up and left. As a result neither clan will have the benefit of the timber lease, thus loosing a considerable amount of money.

There was no trouble in obtaining food for the patrol, which at one time, for a period of three weeks, was supplying food for two hundred labourers.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS:

Of all the Village Officials the patrol worked with, all, with the exception of Luluai Kepa, were friendly and helpfulf. They seemed to have considerable respect shown to them by both members of their own clan and of the other clans. There seemed to adequate officials throughout the area.

Roads and Bridges:

The main duties of the patrol was to construct, strengthen and rebuild bridges on the Wapenamanda - Mt.Hagen road.As the road was closed three days per week for bridge work, the other days were taken up with the supervision of road maintenance at SENALE.

ROADS: Road maintenance was carried out at SEMALE during the first half of the patrol As this section of road has no population, labourers had to be employed from lower down the Minyamba valley. These labourers worked very well. Lack of good gravel and stone was a hapdicap, as it had to be carried from small pockate of sand stone , which were situated a considerable distance.

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Reads cont.

The work on this section of the road mee completed in mid-Nay.Constant maintenance is required here as the road is built across very swampy land, is used regularly by vehicles going to and from Mt.Hagen and the rainfall is high.At the beginning of June a labourer, whose job it is to look after the road, was employed.

.6.

REIDGES LAS the read was closed three days a week, the bridge works had to be carried out speedily and efficiently. This was done by the people, who are and quite happy to work on them. The reason for this could be that the people realized is helping in their development.

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Five bridges at SEMALE were converted to log culverts thus eliminating the need for costlyand regular maintenance. Ten bridges between ANJI and SEMALE were strengthened by the addition of extra bearers. On one of these bridges, all the bearers had to be removed and one end built up. There had not been pillows placed underneath the bearers when the bridge was built originally and with traffic constantly comming down on this one end, had caused the bearers to subside. This was remedied , but three days were taken for this work as rain interrupted work for two lays.

Due to the nature of the country, much time and man power way wasted, getting the logs from the bush and pulling them into position.

Missions:

As there are no Mission stations in the small area patrobled I am not in a position to comment on them .

Rest Houses:

Caly one rest house was visited and that was a WELYA. This rest house was in reasonable condition. It was very large and I think that when a new one is due to be built here, a smaller rest house would be preferable.

Conclusion:

A routine road patrol was carried out without any untoward incidents occurring.

The Preliminary List of probable voters was completed for the Lower Lai Census Division.

The people of this area are not as fortunate as the people closer to the Missions and the Government station, but they are a friendly group and are willing to help the Government in its work.
