It is noted that departmental matters have been handled at District level.

Eventual emancipation of the females should result in a more equitable distribution in the future.

The settlement of the dispute over the sage palms was no doubt greatly facilitated by the presence and advice of the Officer. This is the ideal method of handling such arguments.

Departmental policy in relation to village migration dictates that people may live where they like on their own land providing there is no infringement of the rights of other natives.

It is good to read that the Lake Murray men are snergetic and keen enough to wish to make money even if they have so little potential. Many other people in wealthier environments show little interest in exploiting their resources.

It would certainly seem preforable to have expert advice on the siting of the BORDA Airstrip before further expenditure is incurred.

TERRITORY OF PAPU, AND NEW GUINEA' No. 30-6-5 District Office, DARU, WESTERN DISTRICT. 15th September, 1959. Department of Native Affairs, KONEDOBU. LAKE MURRAY PATROL NO. 2-59/60 R. C. BROWNE, P.O. Attached hereto is a copy of the above report together with claim for camping allowance, village population registers and map of the area patrolled. 1. The Assistant District Officer, Klunga, has commented adequately on the matters arising out of the patrol and extracts relating to Health, Education and Agriculture have been passed to departmental representatives concerned. 2. It is hoped that the plans of the new mission bedy will come to fruition for they will undeubtedly give a noon needed filip to Administration of the sub-district, particularly as regards improvement of communications and servicing of present and projected posts. Assistant District Officer and I consider it for him to deside the best base for its operations and use it to the best advantage. The facts as outlined by him support its being based at Kiunga for the present. However this re-location should not be taken as an indication that there is a lessoning man for the present at Leke Lungay and is a lessening need for water transport at Lake Murray and the recovery of the vessel Miwa at Kikori on a replacement for it will not be overlooked. 4. Under the heading "Economic Development and Agriculture", while some direction is necessary it is certain that "pelicing" of village plots will not encourage voluntary acceptance of new crops. Their advantage might be better demonstrated by establishing a station project with periodic field days for farmers to study cultivation methods and sample produce. Clair his house K. R. LAKE MURRAY PATROL No 2- 59/60.

1. Three copies of the above report together with Camping Allowance Claim and Village Population Registers are enclosed herewith please.

2. The Report was returned to Lake Murray for enclosure of map for the Directors convenience hence the delay.

3. Patrol No 1 was conducted by myself from KIUNGA last October and covered the MIDDLE FLY and LAKE MURRAY DIVISIONS.

4. Mr.Browne will be advised that the term"PATROL No" and not"PATROL REPORT NO" now applies.

5. INTRODUCTION:

If the KIUNGA launch, M.V.MIWA, now at KIKORI does not arrive the M.V.MAWA would be required here to keep food up to workers on the DC3 airstrip site. From remarks passed by Messrs. FERNS and KING of the Department of Civil Aviation it would appear that Mr.GLENN, the Director of Public Works, is in favour of the main Sub-District airstrip being located at KIUNGA and that he hopes to allocate us £1,000 this year to complete clearing. A launch is an absolute necessity for this collection of food as there are few people within a days radius of KIUNGA itself.

The Catholic Montford Fathers inform me that they are expecting two additional Fathers and Sisters at KIUNGA next year and that KIUNGA is to be their main base. They are also getting a plane within a year or so. The Unevangelised Fields Mission already have a light aircraft strip at RUMGINAE North of KIUNGA and will ferry goods brought to KIUNGA by boat as soon as the KIUNGA strip is operating. Both of these Mission bodies intend opening up the more remote areas per addium of light aircraft as soon as stores can be flown out from here— the limit of river navigation.

Considering these facts and proposed Administration Patrol Posts in the Strickland and South of Telefomin (both of which Posts could be better serviced from here by light aircraft in view of mountain approaches from other adjacent Districts) I feel that the M.V.MAWA must be based here if no other launch is forthcoming. Ie., in other words, the M.V.MIWA is, at the moment, the focal point to extending into a population at least eight times that already services by the laurch in LAKE MURRAY and the MIDDLE FLY.

7. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & AGRICULTURE:

The District Commissioner has already made arrangements with Mr. Browne concerning the establishment of two economic coffee plots near the Patrol Post. I cannot envisage extensive agricultural development as the area is mainly examp.

These people are of course sago gatherers and hunters and as sago stands are often far from "villages" the people, of necessity, spend more time away from "villages" than in them. Gardensshould of course be encouraged (if and mere practicable) but certainly not "POLICED" and Mr BROWNE will be instructed accordingly. I would consider that the encouraging of re-planting sago stands which have been worked out close to "villages" would tend to stabilise the population more.

8. HEALTH:

The 1,245 people in the Division are serviced by two N.M.O'S at the Fatrol Post and a European Trained Sister at PANGOA U.F.M. The Mission people contact the District Medical Officer daily and the Officer-in-Charge, LAKE MURRAY, contacts him thrice-weekly. Ie., the people have a relatively good medical service.

S. AIRSTRIP:

Mr.R.FERNS. Superiantendent of Airports, and Mr.B.KING, Airport Engineer, have now visited the airstrip. A LAND OTTER STRIP should be sufficient for the needs of the area.

10. EDUCATION:

From the census figures it would appear that twice the present of girls could attend achools and this will be encouraged.

11. VILLAGE POPULATION REGISTER:

Mr. Browne will be requested to enter totals for all columns in future.

HARDY G AFFAIRS

On the whole the native affairs position sopears to be satisfectory but there is one joint which has been causing brouble for years and looks like causing trouble among the natives for some years to come. This trouble stems from the lack of source marriageable girls for the roung son of the villages Despite the fact that the population figures shows an overall majority of 63 in the female population, the fact that the older and more influential son in the villages marry three or four sives being ways few to be distributed among the younger man. This leads to strife between the young men, adultery and now blore are removed that there is a crime far more serious being committed around the lake. The practice of marrying three or four vives has been discouraged over the years but has produced very little result.

The dispute over the sage poles was more or less settled by the claimants themselves after a long discussion. This officer only discussion this entere only discussion this effect on both sides and put in a few suggestions here and there. Doth parties were quite happy with the final arrangement and no complaints have been received since that date.

the position with regard to the nigration of the Para people to other sames without permission is far from satirizatory and it appears at the present time that they will have to be asked to return to their own area but this will be

In previous years crocedile sking were the main source of income and every other possibility was neglected. This year there has been no procedile shooter into the take and consequently no one to buy the skins, however it is thought that most of the crocediles have been such out at present and time will be needed for them to breed and multiply.

These people are not agriculturally minded, their staple diets, sage and banamas, grows with very little care and ettention. Morever core, people and bean seeds were it med in large quantities during the petrol and it is hold to police these garders with the help of their V. Sawa if possible. This policing will lave to be intensified when and if the crocedile season comes into being again. There is no doubt that these people are very anxiety to take money as they spon to junt at any chance to hale a permitted for example, two villes have legnested and have been granted permitted to come as its or operations. Other villages have also asked permission to starb piteses but had to be refused tecause funds would not be available to eurohase the timber. It appears that some industry in this line would suit the temperaments of the large Europe people. . As wentiered under ECONOTIC DEVELOPMENT, corn, peanut and been seeds were insued in large quantities in each village.
Reports on the progress from the various villages show very little
errors on the part of the villagers. Some report that the plants a errort on the part of the villagers. Some report that the plants are dying while others say that snakes are esting the seeds. It appears that the only solution is to have the construction of properly fenced gardens strictly supervised in each village.

A small conta industry may have a future in this area and the papels were encouraged to plant economics. and the people were encouraged to plant commuts. More seed coconuts are requested for issue to the native people. HEALTH. D.M.C. Sable accompanied Sie patrol and had very little work to do. Most of the people who med medical treatment to to Fangoe Mission station or Lake Furray station. At the tire of the patrol there were 26 babtes at Fangoa Mission hospital suffering from Gastro-enteritis, this Tigure rose to 40 some days later but At time of writing the entdemin had passed. There were four deaths, one at Pangoa Mission and three at a willage near the forest week station. the Government station.
At Disc village (refer Tunesday, 18th) the ex-V.C.
is suffering from suspected modular leprosy. To restigned from the nosition of V.C. because he is now losing his voice and can only sheek at odd times. He was treated at Daru some years and for leprosy but it appears that he was not completely cured. It rould be in the interests of the village people if he could be resolved to a largenside Colony as he is likely to infect other people especially his fargly. Gorstruction is soing ahead slowly on the Diroc airstrip. At present light aircraft use part of the strip which is 1,800' 100'. This kneed has now been lengthened to 2,100' x 1708 bet the extra space is not in use as yet. Fowever it will be write some time terore anything heavier than a light aircraft vill operate on the strip as the surface is too soft. This surface will either have to be rollar or excavated, the latter being the heat plan as there is good red soil one to two feet below the present surface. It would be fore any more work is put into it.

One of the worst aspects of the division is the amount of degs kept in each village. These dogs are kept in what appears to be a semi-starved state for nenting. A number of diseased does were shot during the course of the patrol.

It is intended to conduct another patrol into this area before the end of the year with special emphasis on the construction of properly fenced gardens in each village where possible. lost of the villages are being kept in reasonable
