Dear Friend & Dr Sir
My last day you was 25 July & since
that I have received your favour of 2nd June & 10th July & am
very glad to find you and family all well; last August
Court Mr Heath passed a judgment for your debt Thomas
& Stephen Fullers Debt & a Deb't he owes Dr. Thos so that
you are only upon an equality with those Gentlemen
and you wrote me sooner what you expected as supernumerary I
should have claimed but on Account of the Intimacy that
is between you & him I did not chuse to do any thing with the
out other however I think you are very safe —

I shall get a place of Tryals & will make out & send you
I am not insensible of the Benefit you would receive from
a ship of your next bound. Rec'd a Letter having always
been on the look out some I borrowed but I believe nothing will
be worth living. From your Dr Sir I know who profess Built
all probably sell part soon & I have employed an At-

tance of his to advise him to make an offer —
Troy Hill watter Miss Fisher is so rotten that I shall be obliged
to build it up this year with stone & give it a new Roof. the
want of Hatter this loop Clll come to send some Mules from
the other Estates to get the Coops off. You have 1000^{ds} now
to take 14th Nov & buy 200^{ds} sugar on board the ship Anna
Capt Payne who sails as Hethago. I think the last of your
Coops I think the buyed sugars are very good & hope will
turn out well — Moorsland would be of use to Worcester
but my Attorney writes me a clear Title cannot be got
without applying to Sir Henry Moore as it will not pass
legally unless he will when the Title is clear up. I suspect
for a sum of £600.000^{ds} some of Worcester Negro ground is
on it. This Estate looks very well at present and if the
bunes do not lodge next month I suspect a very good crop
next year. All the Month of August being dry has made

the Plantations at Williamsfield short and has affected all
the Cane. Burnt very much & occasioned a very great
scarcity of Negroes provisions and has spared by many People
are at a great expence for Rice & flour to feed their Negroes
Sam. Teding, John Bernard must bear a very great expence
I have been obliged to take all the Children at Town & try all
from short & small & feed them at the House & the working
Negroes at Town are apised with a little Corn the last
three days of the Week as we have had fine seasons
since the beginning of this month I suspect provisions
will be plenty on your Estates in 3 or 4 Weeks & that your
whole expence will not exceed 30 or £40. On the 1st of November
I packed out of a Vessel from the Gold Coast belonging to
Mr. Hodder comisioned to White & Soesterton at Montego Bay
25 poor Young Negro Men for your Estates for which I am
to pay £5^{ds} & duty when the Vessel calls in Bill of lading
I had engaged the first choice of this cargo from Mr. White
for sometime & when I went on board the day before the
Sale. I was determined not to give so high a price but
when I saw the people picked out they pleased me so
well that I could not part with them and after considera-
-tion how much they were wanted on your Estates &
that I had orders lying in Town for 3 Months & could not
get any good Negroes and the probability of Negroes being
scarce this season I say after considering all these circum-
stances I hope you will approve of what I have done
10 of these are put in Williamsfield 1000^{ds} Worcester & 500^{ds}
Troy — I shipt 10 100^{ds} of your sugar to Mr. Hodder of
Liverpool & shall draw on him for £150. It is my pleasure
of the above mentioned Negroes — I have received
The 100^{ds} of sugar for you by Capt. Morgan for which I am obliged
to you. Your daughter was to take one half of the parcels
from


from Mr. Brighton however as it is now we will keep it

Bernard has been ^{so} extremely bad that his coffin was
actually made he is now so far recovered as to be able
to go to Montego Bay a few days ago his recovery is a
