

35 teen-age students to be given opportunity for six weeks research at UCSD in oceanography or anthropology

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Thirty-five outstanding teen-age students will be given the opportunity to spend six weeks in research this summer at the University of California, Ted Forbes, Dean of Student Affairs, announced today.

The "junior trainee" program will go into its fifth year by means of a recently-received grant from the National Science Foundation, Dean Forbes said.

The six-week course opens on June 24 and ends August 23.

Students will have the option of working in research in oceanography or in anthropology at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

Students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grade are eligible. Those interested in applying should request application forms from Dr. Ted Forbes, Dean of Student Affairs, University of California, San Diego, P. O. Box 109, La Jolla., California.

The grant from the National Science Foundation is part of a nation-wide program to give secondary school students an opportunity to work with university scientists during the summer.

Applications for the San Diego program come from students throughout the nation.
