I Will just say to my patrons or their especial benefit, some of whom have been frequently decoyed by the near imitation of tables, chairs, &c., (as well as my system of tickets) by a house in close proximity to the Fountain Head, (and been as often taken in) that with a little more attention they can avoid the like occurrence for the future, by noticing the numbers on the Candy windows, 47, 49, and 78 and 80 on the doors.

The FOUNTAIN HEAD was first established on Jackson street, and was destroyed by fire in September, 1850—re-opened in Clay street, the same month—then again consumed by the same devastating element on the memorable 4th of May, 1851, and was again opened where it now stands, in July 1851, and was the first public refreshment saloon ever started upon the coast of the Pacific, without intoxicating liquors—not even a glass of beer has ever been sold upon the premises—neither shall be. My friends advised me to introduce the sale of liquor into my business, as they thought it would add much to my profits; my reply was, "I have hands to labor and produce what will sustain life, but not to deal out that which will destroy it." The Fountain Head, as usual, is open from six o'clock in the morning till 12 o'clock at night; so that gentlemen who are unable to obtain seats at regular meal hours, may get refreshments, when the crowd is not so great. "In shape and gesture proudly eminent, stood like a tower . . . but his face deep scars of thunder had intrenched, and care sat on his faded cheek; but under brows of dauntless courage and considerate pride, waiting revenge."

We rose, and with an unflinching voice said, "well Judge, how do you do." He made no reply, but commenced taking off his coat.

We removed ours, also our cravat.

The sixth, and last round, is described by the pressman and compositors as having been fearfully scientific. We held "Boston" down over the Press by our nose, (which we had inserted between his teeth for that purpose,) and while our hair was employed in holding one of his hands, we held the other in our left, and with the "sheep's foot" brandished above our head, shouted to him, "say Waldo," Never! he gasped—

Oh! my Big—ler, he would have muttered, But that he dried up, here the word was uttered. At this moment, we discovered that we had been laboring under a "misunderstanding," and through the amicable intervention of the pressman, who thrust a roller between our faces, (which gave the whole affair a very different complexion;) the matter was finally settled on the most friendly terms—"and without prejudice to the honor of either party."

We write this while sitting without any clothing, except our left stocking, and the rim of our hat encircling our neck like a ruff of the Elizabethan era;—that article of dress having been knocked over our head at an early stage of the proceedings, and the crown subsequently torn off, while the Judge is sopping his eye with cold water, in the next room, a small boy standing beside the sufferer with a basin, and glancing with interest over the advertisements in the second page of the San Diego Herald, a fair copy of which was struck off upon the back of his shirt, at the time we held him over the Press. Thus ends our description of this long anticipated personal collision, of which the public can believe precisely as much as they please; if they disbelieve the whole of it, we shall not be at all offended, but can simply quote as much to the point, what might have been the commencement of our epitaph, had we fallen in the conflict.

"HERE LIES PHOENIX,"

"Boston" looks melancholy!—He knows that this is Phoenix's Last, and that's exactly "where the shoe pinches." This squib is adapted to the comprehension of the meanest shoemaker.

The news brought by the "Hunt," from San Francisco, was of no importance. We received full files of the S. F. papers, but have been unable to glean anything from their columns, worthy of obtaining immortality in our

ILLUSTRATED NEWSPAPERS.

A year or two since a weekly paper was started in London, called the "Illustrated News." It was filled with tolerably executed wood cuts, representing scenes of popular interest, and though perhaps better calculated for the nursery than the reading room, it took very well in England where few can read, but all can understand pictures, and soon attained an immense circulation. As when the imitable London Punch attained its world-wide celebrity, supported by such writers as Thackeray, Jerrold and Hood, would be funny men on this side of the Atlantic attempted absurd imitations,—the Yankee Doodle,—the John Donkey, &c., which as a matter of course proved miserable failures; so did the success of this Illustrated affair inspire our money-loving publishers with hopes of dollars, and soon appeared from Boston, New York and other places, Pictorial and Illustrated Newspapers teeming with execrable and silly effusions and filled with the most fearful wood engravings, "got up regardless of expense" or anything else, the contemplation of which was enough to make an artist tear his hair and rend his garments. A Yankee named Gleason, of Boston, published the first we believe, calling it "Gleason's Pictorial (it should have been Gleason's Pickpocket) and Drawing Room Companion." In this he presented to his unhappy subscribers views of his house in the country, and his garden, and for aught we know, of "his ox and his ass, and the stranger within his gates." A detestable invention for transferring Dague's types to plates for engraving, having come into notice about this time, was eagerly seized upon by Gleason for farther embellishing his catch-penny publication, duplicates and uncalled for pictures were easily obtained, and many a man has gazed in horror-stricken astonishment on the likeness of a respected friend, as a "Portrait of Monroe Edwards," or that of his deceased grandmother in the character of "One of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence." They love pictures in Yankeeedom; every tin pedler has one on his wagon, and an itinerant lecturer can always obtain an audience by sticking up a likeness of some unhappy female with her ribs laid open in an impossible manner for public inspection, or a hairless gentleman with the surface of his head laid-out in eligible lots, duly marked and numbered; the factory girls of Lowell, the Professors of Harvard all bought the new Pictorial, (Professor Webster was reading one, when Dr. Parkman called on him on the morning of the murder.) Gleason's speculation was crowned with success, and he bought himself a new cooking stove and erected an out-building on his estate, with both of which he favored the public in a new wood cut immediately.

Inspired by his success, old Feejee-Mermaid-Tom-Thumb-Woolly-Horse-Joyce-IIeth-Barnum, forthwith got out another Illustrated Weekly, with pictures far more extensive, letter-press still sillier, and engraving more miserable if possible than Yankee Gleason's. And then we were bored and buffeted by having incredible likenesses of Santa Anna, Queen Victoria and poor old Webster thrust beneath our nose, to that degree that we wished the respected originals had never existed, or that the art of wood engraving had perished with that of painting on glass.

It was, therefore, with the most intense delight that we saw a notice the other day of the failure and stoppage of Barnum's Illustrated News, we rejoiced, thereat, greatly, and we hope that it will never be revived, and that Gleason will also fail as soon as he conveniently can, and that his trashy Pictorial will perish with it.

It must not be supposed from the tenor of these remarks that we are opposed to the publication of a properly conducted and creditably executed Illustrated paper. "On the contrary, quite the reverse." We are passionately fond of art ourselves, and we believe that nothing can have a stronger tendency to refinement in society, than presenting to the public, chaste and elaborate engravings, copies of works of high artistic merit, accompanied by graphic and well written essays. It was

for the purpose of introducing a paper containing these features to our appreciative community, that we have made these introductory remarks, and for the purpose of challenging comparison, and defying competition that we have criticised so severely the imbecile and ephemeral productions mentioned above. At a vast expenditure of money, time and labor, and after the most incredible and unheard of exertion, on our part, individually, we are at length able to present to the public an Illustrated publication of unprecedented merit, containing engravings of exceeding costliness and rare beauty of design, got up on an expensive scale which never has been attempted before in this or any other country.

We furnish our readers this week with the first number, merely premising that the immense expense attending its issue, will require a corresponding liberality of patronage on the part of the Public, to cause it to be continued.

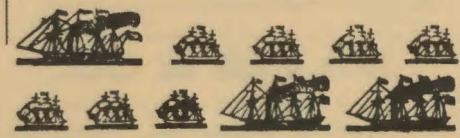

Arrivals and News of the Week.

Tests have been pitched for them, and with an unlimited supply of beans, and the flesh of bulls, (a burnt offering that they do not despise,) they are as happy as circumstances will admit, and doing as well as could be expected." This is about the extent of our news for this week,—maybe something else will turn up before the next, in which case the great "Ames" will undoubtedly publish it. 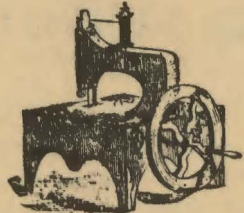

of the Establishment of two Land Dis-
tricts in the State of California.

WHEREAS, by the provisions of the Act
of Congress, approved March 3d, 1853,
entitled "An Act to provide for the survey of the
public lands in California, the granting of pre-
emption rights therein, and for other purposes," the
President of the United States is authorized, at
such time or times as in his judgment the public
interest may so imperatively require, and in the
absence of any further or special legislation of
Congress on the subject, to divide the State of Ca-
lifornia into two or three separate and distinct
Land Districts, as circumstances shall determine
to be necessary, embracing respectively the Upper
and Lower or the Upper, Middle and Lower
portions of the State; and whereas, on full con-
sideration, it appears that the public interest im-
peratively requires that at least two Land Districts
shall be established in that State: Now, therefore,
I, FRANKLIN PIERCE, President of the United
States of America, do hereby declare and make
known that, in pursuance of the provisions of the
abovementioned Act, the State of California shall
be divided into two Land Districts by the east and
west line of the thirty sixth degree of North lat; and
that the Land Office for the Upper District shall be
established at present at BENICIA, and that for the
Lower District at LOS ANGELES.

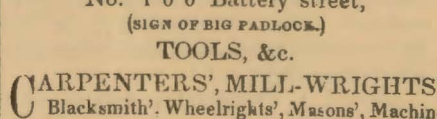
