## PATROL DIARY.

1958. 

Sept. 2 Left SOHANO 7.30 am. per M.V. 'Hazel'. Dropped APO at RAUA and continued to TEOP, arriving 2 pm. Disembarked, patrol arrangements made, and messengers dispatched.
seismic 3 Discussions with President TASIVINA. Later inspected copra activitis near village. After lunch visited Tearouki Mission re recruitment Council Clerk. TASIVINA reported some misunderstanding of their powers by some Councillors. Matter to be clarified at next Council tue ting on Thursday.
4. moved to SUANGU, again saw pr. Repping at Tear,uki. En route saw a proposed site for Council centre. Council meeting opened at 11.15 am . Assisted TASIVIM in conduct of meeting, and offerred advice and instruction to Council as necessary. Adjourned at 1.15 pm and resumed 2 pm until 3.15 pm . Moved to WAWUNGINUA Rest House.
5. Att 7.40 am walked to PATEAVIAVI and discussed shift of village which is in progress. Reason is to move back on to their own land from the WANUNGINUA land they are at present occupying. New site considered satisfactory, and their reason sensible. Cacao planting at new site progre sing.
DEterred payments and absentees' tax collected from villages in the vicinity. Discussed land tenure custom and its effects on cash-cropping.
6. MOved to TSIKORT via TOROKOKUPIA, TIASKO and HAKAU Phi. District Court converied at HAKAUOn complaint of manager against a labourer. Arrived TSIKORT 1.30 pm , having inspected lower reached of IRUNG River for crossing first.
After lunch, inspected new Council site with local people, who arranged for the clearing of same to begin on Monday.
7. Sunday. Visited Fe, Rondeaux at C.M. Tinputz, and recruited a trainee for Council Clerk. Arranged his movement to VUNADIDIR by first vessel.
8. Remit ned at TSIKORT during morning while clearing commenced, and directed enlargement of Rest House. ctittent pes seen in middle of Council site, which land is known as "MUGEGA" - see memo file $34 / 5$ of 22.9.58.

Complaint also received of non-payment for "BUEN" Plentat ion - see memo 34/1/9 of 23rd September, 1958. At 1.30 pm moved to NAMKKRIO via POKAPA village and Rougen trade store, encountering\& Mrs. Forster of Reva PEn at latter. Arrived NAMKKRIO 5 pm .
9 Inspected land cleared for cacao near village, which awaits burning off and will then ne sd visit of A.F.W. to line block. Visited Mission area'school five minutes from village. Nice clean place, teachers seem competent for the grades which are up to Standard 11. Gardens are maintained at school for pupils from more distant places.
Visited TESIKO and heard minor complaints. Returned to NAMKERIO, where camped. Some disputes enquired into (debts), and two belated claims for W.D.C. (Death) reported.

## PATPOL DIARY (2)

Sept. 10 Walked down to coast at Revs Pin. Visited Mrs. Forster there, coll ec ted some tax. Proceeded through WITGHESOO and TMNDU to CHUNPAm3, inspecting road and leaving instructions with officials. Moved on to si ARA After lunch, calling at BANIU Pin. on route. Arr. SIARA and camped 6 pm .
11. Walked back to UMUM roadhead and commenced survey of load ty for through road to EANIU. Country found to be very hilly and would be extremely difficult as id costly to construct $M / T$ rose in this section. Concludedthat present rather long detour through ToN hamlet into rear of baniu pin is only practical route; this now needs to be reconstructed, bridges to be renovated.

12th. Meeting of 3IARA locality villages (ABUT to UMUM) to assess present feeling re native leal government. attendance only fair, and rather tardy. See memorandum ............. of Esth september, 1958.
returned to sordino per hired jeep to Bors Pin, thence launch, arr. 8 pm .

Brienty, as I have told you verbally, I believe that the Buka Island people have lost conifdenee in the Administration, We will achieve nothing until we win back that conllidonoe ${ }^{\text {Wo mo mi prove that Administration advice cas produce }}$ tangible and concrete besertte and the best way to do this 1 1a to rehabilitate the Co-Operative soeloties and onsure that they provide edoquate tramsport, procassing/sarketing facilities, and a maximum cash retura for produce, Whon we succeed in this Losal Goverment should follow. In the meantime weit.

The foregoing does not mean that we should not now fora Council on BURA Islamd if we can find workable and जllliag undt. Proceed therefore with your survey of the soLUS aroa a posesible extenaion of the UBOIS unit. The Comperative Offleer has been told to emsure that the SOLUS area is sorviced by the Association tractor which is hoped to arrive shortly, When recemmending any eugeested Courcil arva I would ilke you to pay partieular attention to trampport and communications, both existing and possiblezif the Council is to provide service the people must be able to get to them without amy undue diffieuldy.

I agree that one officer should be well
able to supervise two Councils.
I would like to cee all artieles before they are publiahod in any mewepaper, Incident $11 y$, ara you still sure that sonding the observers to. the TOLAI area was wise meve ?.

1. Buk A This report deals with a short Visit to the North tivewementioned locality between 17 th and 20 th of this month.
2. My last visit to the BUKA Pivision vas in Decsmber, 1957 whon the attitude of the people to locel government, except on the West Coast and Islands, and questionably the North Coast,g ves so begative that it was considered hopeless to eomeentrite further worls in the area. stnce then attention has buen on the TEDP area.
3. However, the West Coast \& Islands ('UBORD') group remain arredous to have 3 Council, consequentily I went to the liorth BJKA pecpie aguin th =3scas thair present attitude and see if they would be favirizable to joining with the 'UBORO' group in order to forms sian effective-gize council.
4. In the three fillages of LONIIS, LEMANKOA and LEMANANN, a plemscite showed an overwhelming majority against Councils. ondy in haMANMAU was there any appreciable support - from the Methodist group. Results were as follows:

5. There was little discussion, as the poople would not agk questions or explain their refusal. On my part, I again outilined what a Council was for and what it did. Also I emphasizeds as I have done previously, that the notions expressed to $C_{0} P_{0} O_{0}$ Mr. nobson (Patrol No. 2-58/59 pp.6-8 - Council control of personal property etc.) wore utteriy wrong, and that personal froedom ander the council would be ensured by the supervision of the $D_{0} O_{\text {. }}$ and his officerso I think the people are apt to assume that the corancil will become a law unto itself and a despotic power.
6. However, I am inclined to belleve that there is considerable preverication and obstinacy on their part, fn similar though not so viruient vein to that of the dissident groups in the TOLAI area. For instance, I have frequently omphagized that the tax rate is fixed by themselves, that taxation of women is voluntary, and that there is matation on property. Yet they persistientiy choose to disregard these assurances. Also they do not seem to vant to understand the council systom, because it has been explained, even if not entirely satisfactorizy, several times. further, fourteen of their representatives vere given actour of observation of the TOLAI Councils in JanuaryFobreary, 1956, to assist this understanding.
7. I smot at all sure that the rest.stance ie unanisuous, even in the most "anti-" village, or even oveminelmingly popalaro It is considered more inkely what pesistance has and is being fostared by active oppositionists, which may now have the apport, by and large, or the old guard as Mr. Foldi recently deseribed their roLAI counterpaits.
8. It is thought likely that most people are shying off Coundils because of the strong wedge of oppocition, and they do not want a confliet in the sommint ty. They are not willing to risk this for a, to them, istangible benefit.
9. I respectrully suggest that tours of BUKA I land/will be iargely a waste of time untill there is a sign of a change of mindi resd stence is obviousiy set in most of tha area. However, I think that at every convonient cpportanitty any and all Administration offlcers (of all Departments) slould be prepared to pagh the council systom as an essential peth of devolopment tovards responsibility by the cormunity.
10. Articies ulil be prepared for publication in local newspapers,
e.g. the 'Cathoilic liews', giving revs and information. At the recent 'Folicy Worishep' on Nativa local Govermment In mabaul, it was reconusendod that edrentional noterial in respect of the council systent ghunld be made avellables eapecially through the sehoolso It 13 e pity that propaganda material has noi yol bean fumished by Honderarters, al though this has twice been promised.
11. Finally, as regarcs the 'VBOPO' groups micht I suggest that the ouestion of whetiier a council should be formed here could be decided in the 11 ght of staff availehility for
sharvisions At presont the uniter has only one Council to supervise, and if there continges to be an officer available for local govermment, it is falt he could well utilise his spare timo setting up and ayporvicing this smili council. There is the adied ground that it pould be a foothold in 3 UKA, and could be hopod to swing tho stituation in tine, although its great size rould militate againgt a striking domonstration of council results, unless cuazd darable adninistration assistenco was given. If you concur, I propose to visit the solus aree for the salie
purpose as the visit to N. Buka, 1.e. to seek to enlarge the pro-Council group; also the islatds of SAIMOF and sAPOSA, south of the UBORO group, the first of wich has asired for a revisit.

## PATROL DIARY (2).

Nov. 17 Worked with builder on Council House until 9 an, when "SAFOSA" called. Nent to BAIIU on her, arr. 10.45 am . Saw Manager Baniu Ptn, then visited inc. McKinaly of CHUNPATS and arranged inspection of agric. lease extension applied for. Visited RAUA Ptn. per foot after lunch and conducted Coronial Inquiry. Returned to CHUNPATS 6.15 pm - raining.
18. During morning inspected lease extension to "MONEMBUMBUS" and discussed ownership and question of availalility for sale. Re-surveyed T.A.L. after lunch, then moved to BAIIU Ptn, where Courts fo Naউive Affairs conducted. Remained Ptn for night. During day people of CHUNPATS and TENDL assembled at CHINPATS, and a poll was conducted on introduction of N.I.G. to their villages; large majority in favour, see Meno. 14/7/2(3) of $21 \cdot 11 \cdot 58$.
19. Brom Bailu to UMUM per plantation vehicle, then walked to west side of UMUM gorges. Discussion with Luluai re reopening up vehicular road to BAIIU Ptn. He stated that the local population is too scanty to repair the dozen bridges in this section, and asked for steel girders to be supplied. Advised little possibility of this, but perhaps heavy dalvage truck chassis near Bonis could be used? Luluai instructed to do as much maintenance on road surface as possible, includiug opening up road to sunlicht, and told that matter of bridges vill be taken up later - see memo. 24/1/8 of 22.11 .58

Returned to SOHANO per hired jeep, arr. BONIS 11 am. Boat to SOHANO 1 pm .
