UCSD MAINTAINS HIGH RANKING IN FEDERAL FUNDING

The latest figures from the National Science Foundation show that the University of California, San Diego remains fifth in the nation among research universities in federal research & development money it receives.

For the fiscal year 1986-87, federal R & D obligations to UCSD were \$151.8 million, trailing Johns Hopkins, Stanford, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of Washington. UCSD was first among the nine UC campuses, just ahead of UCLA at \$147.8 million.

Federal R & D obligations are awards made by federal agencies for research and development as reported by the federal agencies.

In federal R & D expenditures, the amount actually spent on research and development, as reported by the universities, UCSD moved up a notch from eighth to seventh place nationally with \$142.7 million. Again, UCSD was first among the UC campuses and trailed Johns Hopkins, MIT, Stanford, University of Wisconsin-Madison, University of Washington, and Cornell.

UCSD is also ranked first among public universities in the percentage of undergraduates who go on to medical school, and is also first among public universities in percentage of graduates who go on to earn Ph.D.'s.
