






Dear Bear Facts Editors,

As one of the early Bear Facts editors (1964-'66), I want to congratulate you and the entire staff on your 40th anniversary. Quite an accomplishment!

When I came to UCSD in 1963 to accompany my husband, Leonard, we were both eager to share in the development of the campus and make this a great place. So, when such forceful women as Frieda Urey, Judy Munk, and Helen Raitt took me under their wings, I did what they asked. Frieda got me involved with Oceanids, Judy with the International Center, and Helen with Bear Facts.

To be honest, I didn't have a clue what it meant to be an editor of a newsletter, never having taken a course in journalism nor having worked on a college, or even a high school, paper. I had attended some meetings of a literary journal at Indiana University, but my role must have been so minimal that I can no longer rece what my contribution was. I did, however, think that I could write English well enough—being a foreigner seems to have made me a pedantic user of the language. Moreover, I had an experienced co-editor: Peggy Burckhardt, who had actually done professional editing. But more importantly, we had as our teacher, the founding editor of Bear Facts: Carol Schultz.

I recollect sitting on the floor of Carol's living room where she showed us how to put the newsletter together. What my present Macintosh computer euphemistically calls "Cut and Paste" is what Carol, Peggy, and I did that day. Since it was virtually impossible to retype everything without introducing new mistakes, we literally cut the typed text, inserted corrections, and pasted the page together with Scotch tape. The layout was done similarly, as our typewriters could handle neither the masthead nor the larger headings, not to speak of illustrations.

Although I haven't looked at any of these early issues in years, I remember enjoying writing a series of articles about where to shop and eat, requiring research that acquainted me with the area. Bear Facts had an extensive calendar of cultural events, and, if I am not mistaken, it was on this basis that Herb York, then Chancellor, gave us some money that paid for printing extra Oceanids' newsletters to be distributed to the initial group of UCSD undergraduates. Of course, the students soon started their own paper, causing our circulation to drop drastically.

This probably was the only setback in Bear Facts' history. As always, I look forward to receiving my next issue of Bear Facts.

All Americans were encouraged and inspired this year by Olympian, Chris Klug, who won the bronze medal in snowboarding. The amazing part of his accomplishment was the fact that less than two years before, he had a liver transplant. At one point he wondered whether he would even be alive for the Olymp[ics, much less win a medal. But thanks to the decision of a generous donor family Chris is alive and giving hope to many other people. The family who gave that priceless gift is one of a few thousand each year who decide to become organ donors. But many more are still needed.

More than 80,000 men, women and children are now on the national waiting list, many critically ill, their only chance of survival an organ transplant. Unfortunately, sixteen people will die today because no organ was available for them. and the list keeps growing, with a new name added every thirteen minutes.

So, register as an organ and tissue donor. The Living Bank, founded in Houston in 1968, is a non-profit organization dedicated to saving lives through organ and tissue donations.

Lost in the Desert

Conclusion



As every morning, my brother-in-law, Jim, and I arranged at which campground we would meet in the evening. The ladies did not seem particularly interested in what we discussed. Maybe they simply trusted our judgment. (Big mistake!)

Anyway, it was a beautiful morning in Arizona, when I left last-night's campground with my wife, Beate. I eventually stopped at a small space next to the highway. The hills on both sides of the road looked promising, as if they might be fertile ground for cacti. We got out and went separate ways, as was our custom in such circumstances. She went right, I went left towards the near hills. After about 10 Minutes I happened to look back towards the car and saw the little red convertible, which my brother-in-law was driving, stop behind our van. I could not see who got out or back in, but turned my back angryly and disappointed. Already in the morning I had had the impression that my wife would have much rather gone with her sister and family to visit some Native American sights than to search in the desert heat for cacti. And now she had obviously left with them. Why had she not said so already in the morning?

After looking without enthusiasm for a few minutes longer I gave up the cactus hunt and returned to the van. Sure enough, there was a hand-printed note, that they had also taken the camera. I got in the car and slammed the door. It would be no fun to drive all day by myself, and it also was a lot more fun to look for cacti together with my wife and then show eachother what we had found. My day was ruined.

It was close to 7 p.m. when I had almost reached the border with New Mexico. Another hour, more or less, until I would arrive at the campground. Suddenly I saw in the rearview mirror a bright red VW convertible. That had to be Enrights with Beate. I stopped the car and the little car stopped behind. I got out of the car, approached the red car angrily and knocked at the driver's window. Jim let the window down.

- "Where did you hide my wife?" I barked.
- "Who?" Jim looked perplexed.
- "Beate of course."
- "What do you mean? She went with you this morning."

It took a few seconds for me to understand what that meant. I looked at my watch. It was 7 p.m.. For heavens sake, where had we become separated? It must have been that time when we had gotten out on the side of the road and looked for cacti. But when was that? Probably about 11 a.m.. That was about 8 hours ago. Where was she now? We looked at eachother aghast. A cold fear spread through us. But then Jim sprang into action. We found a phone booth, he whipped out his phone card and started calling. And already, 10 or 15 minutes later,, after he had spoken to Highway-, County- and State Police he had found out, that someone had reported an orange bus missing. And from that it took him only a few minutes to get to the Prescott police where he spoke with the sheriff who had found a woman on the side of the road who had no identification on her and spoke with a German accent. Then we could finally talk with her in the homeless shelter. She cried with relief. "Please come and get me immediately."

It took us close to four hours, but finally the five of us were together again. And I can honestly say, that I had never before and have never since been witness to my brother-in-law's breaking every speed limit. In a motel in Prescott we celebrated the good outcome of our adventure with a big bottle of red wine. And my wife and I promised that we would never again lose sight of eachother when we were out cactus hunting.

Jim wrote a recommendation for the police officer to his superiors.

And the moral of the whole story: Do not act on a preconceived idea and trust your wife!!!
