

Initiated several years ago, the Friends of the UCSD Theatre has become a thriving and vitally important support group for the UCSD Drama Department. Currently numbering over one hundred members, the Friends are actively engaged in a series of special events that are ancillary to the UCSD Theatre Season. For example, after the recent production of Behan's "The Hostage" (dealing with the IRA conflict in Dublin), there was a Pub Party with cast and crew at Quinn's Pub in La Jolla. After the forthcoming production of Genet's highly theatrical "The Balcony" there will be a special forum on the collaborative process with Director Michael Addison and Designer James Sims. And, to close the year, there will be a full afternoon presentation in the UCSD Drama Department studios where "Mini Master Classes" will be held by Eric Christmas, Arthus Wagner, Mary Corrigan, Floyd Gaffney, and Yen Lu Wong - all designed to give the Friends a very special insight into the workings of the UCSD Drama Department's graduate professional theatre training program. All these events and more are designed to enlarge the theatre experience and provide more contact with the professeional theatre artists who make up the UCSD Drama Department faculty and staff.

There is, of course, a reciprocation: the Friends of the UCSD Theatre membership fee includes a subscription to the UCSD Theatre Season and a donation (ranging from \$5 for students to \$76 for Patrons). These donated funds have come to be of singular importance to the UCSD Drama Program, supporting an exciting "Externship" program for drama students, that has enabled the top students in the program (both graduate and undergraduate) to engage in work with professional theatres around the country. For example, students have served as "Externs" at the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco, the Teatro de la Esperanza of Santa Barbara (now on a California Arts Council Tour), the Globe Theatre, and the Oregon Shakespearean Festival. In addition, a young playwright has been able to serve as playwright-in-residence at Brown University while one of his plays was produced, and a number of actors have been able to attend national auditions held by the Theatre Communications Group, sponsored by the League of Repertory Theatres. fhus, with living stipends and travel grants from Friends of the UCSD Theatre, the UCSD Drama program has been able to help students enter the demanding world of the professional theatre.

Membership in the Friends of the UCSD Theatre is always open, with fees adjusted accordingly - and the Theatre Season still includes Genet's "The Balcony" and a new spectacular version of "Alice in Wonderland" directed by Guest Artist William Glover. Ed Note: There is some confusion regarding the difference between the new (soon-to-be-built) UCSD Theatre and the Mandeville Center. Why do we need both on campus? The new theatre (to be located on Revelle Campus above the Sandwich Hut) is to be primarily a repertory theatre, for the use of the UCSD Drama Department, whereas Mandeville is intended to fill the needs of the Music Department and for special events of the campus and the community.



UCSD Recreation Card Holders

Adult activity clubs include ballroom dancing, ballet folklorico, belly dance, evening conditioning, jazz dance, and aerobics. Membership dues run \$8-\$10 per quarter. There is also horseback riding, which runs \$50 for 9 one-hour session. All clubs have instructors.

Classes for children are gymnastics (beginning to advanced), swimming, soccer, and horseback riding. Children's classes cost \$10-15, except riding, which costs \$40 for 8 one-hour sessions. (Each child will have his/her own horse for the whole hour!)

Also available for use by card-holders and their families are the swimming pool, a sauna (adults only), gymnasia, weight room, and courts of three kinds - tennis, handball, and squash. Courts may be reserved at 452-4036.

Sign-ups for next quarter begin on March 20 in the Recreation Office. The cost for the Recreation Card is \$14 for one quarter, and is cheaper if purchased for the year in June.

Profiles: UCSD Women



In an office at the School of Medicine can be found a diligent woman with loosely fluffed brown hair, handsome facial features, looking more slender now than in recent years. Look through her door and you will find her working, working, and working. You must probe a little beyond Pat Erb's quiet diligence and her fundamental modesty to note her warm good humor; deeper still you will find a woman of unusual spirit and courage.

As Pat reflected on parts of her life for Bear Facts ("Oh you could find someone much better to do this on!" she said), it became clear that her most recent twenty years were interwoven with the legendary events of UCSD and with the people who will one day be the legendary figures of our

Pat began life in Kentucky and Louisiana, and was in Michigan for high school. She rejected college to become an actress and played summer theater on Cape Cod. At the age of eighteen she played Shakespearean supporting roles and loved it. This period might be regarded as the symbolic prologue to our part of her life. Marriage, World War II and two daughters followed: Pat worked at Kellogg Air Base in Battle Creek, Michigan. The family moved to La Jolla in 1956 when Pat's husband took a job at Copley Press. When the marriage dissolved, Pat went to work at Scripps Institution of Oceanography in June 1958. Therewith, I suspect, began the great love affair of Pat's life, her job.

"Oceanography was so GLAMOROUS! Scripps was a small, close-knit family;" she used those same nostalgic tones one hears from all of the early Scripps folk. "There was so much publicity and excitement." Pat worked under James Snodgrass in the Research Support Shops, a reservoir of multiple solutions to the practical problems scientists encountered in their research projects. The early Scripps people never speak long without getting to Roger Revelle. It was he who achieved that memorable camaraderie. "And we would not have a University if it were not for Roger Revelle," Pat reminisced. It was Revelle's relentless battle that finally succeeded in taking Scripps through the giant leap to become UCSD.

Pat transferred to the upper campus in Academic Personnel in 1965, to Urey Hall which housed nearly all the administrative offices from the chancellor on down. "We began by getting the very most distinguished faculty first and it has been FASCINATING! She has truly loved it and feels personally intertwined with each step in the school's development. Pat became involved with medical appointments even before she came to the School of Medicine in 1971. Every new faculty appointment and every promotion has come under her administrative analysis and review. "I feel as though it is my medical school," she asserted with warmth and devotion.

The administrative battles have been enormous, of course. "The order for rating professors is supposedly: teaching, research, university and public service, and professional competence - but the fact is, re-search comes first." In the medical school there are people who are purely clinical or clinical teachers, and the effort to reconcile this fact with a system that developed around academic researchers has been beset with problems. "We really should have a different set of rules," Pat remarked.

"The worst days were around 1970, when the students were protesting," she con-It was rather unnerving when they marched around the building chanting and shouting 'pigs!' Our office windows were broken with rocks; I was in Building 109 by then." The open hostility generated a fearful unrest and it was not easy to get through a day's work. "Chancellor McGill handled those situations beautifully. He always made himself available. He managed to calm everyone down in a most charming way."

Pat then voiced the most popular refrain of administrators today. "We have been literally inundated by bureaucratic routine. With the kind of implementation now required in an effort to avoid litigation, the paperwork has doubled and tripled. The good intentions which may have originally motivated legislation is often lost in endless red tape. But we have to learn to live with it." One feels that Pat Erb can live with it. She copes with the turmoils and the paperwork with the cooly resigned ex-


pertise of a true professional.
Pat joined Oceanids in 1958, and it was 1962 when Marge Bradner and Marge Phleger talked her into chairing the play-reading group. They produced an original play in the Revelle's living room. The drama (which has become a mini-legend of our heritage) directed a number of satirical punches at the regents - played by Harold Urey and Russell Raitt. Pat played a mermaid.
"I have been just a little cog but I have watched everything develop and it has been FASCINATING!" She said it again and again. "It has been fascinating!"

Kathleen Douthitt has known Pat since 1958 and described her as a loyal, warm, and understanding friend; a fine mother and a devoted grandmother; a marvelous detailist in her job; a domestic person who loves to cook and do needlepoint. Kathleen added, "Pat is a traditionalist; she used to give the annual luncheon which preceded the Oceanids tea."

In the past year, a serious health problem with surgery and involved treatments have presented Pat with a challenge that would have battered the spirit of an ordinary person. This remarkable woman has countered with a rare strength and courage. It is her job which has been her most powerful weapon; her love of her job has itself become a conquering spirit. Pat Erb and her work are woven deeply into the fabric of UCSD and the School of Medicine.

If you look in her office you will no doubt find her working quietly, modestly and effectively. If you peer a little deeper, I guarantee that you will sense the excitement she feels at being part of the story of a great young school, of being one of the invaluable supporting actresses in a brilliantly stellar cast of characters.

Italian Dinner

Guests of Friends of the International Center on Sunday, April 9 will take a culinary adventure to Italy for the academic season's fourth ethnic dinner. The setting will be the International Center, and the time will be 6 PM.

Co-chairmen Rosita Cavallaro and Teresa Lein are planning to serve a vermouth aperitif to begin the evening along with Arancini (bite-sized rice balls seasoned with cheese and Italian sausage).

The Antipasto tray will consist of Spume di Tommo (pate of tuna, butter, and anchovies), Caponata (eggplant combined with olives, capers, onion, celery, tomato, pine nuts, basil, vinegar, and sugar), Olive Farcite (stuffed olives following a regional recipe), Carciofini (marinated artichoke hearts), and Uovo Ripiene (stuffed eggs).

A classical recipe, Pasticcio di Lasagne Verdi al Forno, has been selected as the entree. This is a baked spinach pasta with a Volognese style meat and Bechamel sauce - not to be confused with the popular lasagne served with various cheeses and tomato sauce. Following will be Insalata Mista, a tossed green salad.

Accompaniments served with the dinner will include wine and Grissini, home baked breadsticks Torinese style. Dessert will be Semifreddo allo Zabaglione con Pizzella (a delicate custard flavored with marsala wine and served with a sweet anise flavored wafer), and coffee.



Facing Up To A National Diaster

In the wake of the "Blizzard of 78" that recently hit Boston, there were several problems that came into focus and caused a good deal of discussion in our household. I hope this editorial will do the same in your household - and not only stimulate discussion, but also action.

As we sit comfortably in our homes and listen to the disastrous news from ${\tt Boston}$ - or from Los Angeles - we all echo a chorus of "what a shame;" and if we have friends or relatives in the area, we perhaps express some anxiety until assured that they are okay. We listened attentatively to my husband's family as they described many of the events in and around the area of Boston where they live. We felt it was good for them to walk to the store even though it was 2 miles away. It was not a particularly big sacrifice to go without fresh milk for 5 days. What finally got to us was the banking situation. Most banks opened up for a short period on Friday, the fifth day of the paralyzing storm. People were allowed to withdraw only \$100 each from their accounts. That certainly seemed adequate; but then we stopped to think about the fact that here was a national disaster - in 1978 - and people could not buy the simplest of necessities without cash, and even that was limited. In this day and age of credit cards and oversized checkbooks, that's rather frightening. Maybe grandma was right when she urged us to keep some cash in the cookie jar.

Beyond the concern of the cash, how a 3 day supply many of us have even of water and food in case of an emergency? During our recent rains, we were without electricity for $8\frac{1}{2}$ hours; and though inconvenient, I located enough camping gear to get us through breakfast. But what if that had been an earthquake - how ready

would we be?

Wine Tour






All Oceanid members, spouses, and friends are invited to join the Wine Tasting Interest Group on their excursion to the Bodegas de Santo Tomas in Ensenada, Baja California on Friday, March 31.

This winery, the oldest in Mexico, was founded by local missionaries in 1889 who planted the mission grapes throughout the Santo Tomas and Guadalupe Valleys of Baja California. Its vats have a storage capacity of 7 million litres, and thus it is considered one of the largest wineries in North America. Santo Tomas produces many white, rose, and red table wines, as well as excellent varietals such as Chenin Blanc Champagne and brandies are and Barbera. also bottled at the winery.


We will have a private tour through the winery to view all of the wine making operations, followed by a catered seafood luncheon accompanied by Santo Tomas wines.
