Dear Rich:

I spoke with Juan, and then also with students at the LGBTA meeting. I would say that there is interest in doing this. Students were excited about this and Juan thought it was a good thing for the Umbrella Group to do. Juan is also optimist that something could be done even with such short notice (similar receptions, such the farewell night for Patrick Vesaques, have been arranged on such short notice by the CCC in cooperation with others)

I think we should do this, and I think we can do this. So here are my thoughts and other people's input on this matter:

We need to get people involved immediately and start getting the most important details planned within a few days. It would be good if a date, time and location could be determined in a few days. For various reasons, I think we should just start arranging things now.

This would a reception (not a commencement) to recognize LGBT/Queer graduating students, and to honor individual LGBT/Q students for their achievements and contributions to our community. It should take place on June 5 or 6, the weekend before finals, as the weekend of June 12 and 13 are the dates for actual commencements (when students will probably send time with family, be moving out, etc.). An on campus location seems best for arranging and for people to be able to attend hassle-free. It should take place in evening or night, sometime in $7-10\,\mathrm{pm}$ range.

A full dinner would be too much to do and pay for. Perhaps desserts, beverages and hor d'oeuvres? Specific platters can be ordered and purchased from local stores easily, such as of fruit and vegetables, just as desert spreads. (Martinelli's is a cheap and fun alternative to champagne.) This can be elegant but simple.

I've tentatively reserved the CCC Lecture Hall for June 5 in the evening. This room has been used for a number of receptions, and the CCC staff can advise us on planning this event. I'd recommend a number of round tables for people to sit at rather than rows of seats. There can be long tables for the food and refreshments, and other things. We would need table cloths or tarps. A podium, and A/V such as mic, amp and speakers would be best so Pride VIDEO NY NOOD '98 people can hear.

We should give out some sort of gift to the graduating students. (The LGBTA students suggested that we honor not simply graduating seniors, but also graduate students just about to or just having completed their degrees -which I think is fine.) This could take the form of rainbow tassels, some sort of cloth item like a ribbon or "coontah" (I can't spell it) cloths for grads to wear with their robes, or something tangible that people can wear or keep as a memento.

There should also be <u>certificates of recognition</u> for worthy graduating students -- how they'll be selected is something we'll have to consider. * (students) There should also be a printed program) for people look at, and take with them. Flyers) to announce event would be good, but not a large number.

The programme should include some talk, some entertainment of some kind such as music or poetry, presentation of certificates, and end with graduating students gathered in front to receive their gifts and be applauded (and photographed). Maybe we could ask Renee to sing or play something.

The event should be for whoever is interested in attending, with RSVP. That means not just graduating students and Umbrella Group staff and faculty, but

other LGBT students and allies. I'm guessing we'll get about 30-50 people to attend. 13 students wrote down their names as wanting to attend at the LGBTA meeting, and the Principal Members guess there were at maybe 20 LGBT/Queer students graduating that they knew of (whether or not they were active in the LGBTA). Dress should either be casual or dress-up (semi-formal).

So, to break down the costs, what I would guess to be most to least cost:

- 1) Food and beverages
- 2) Gift to graduating students
- 3) A/V equipment rental
- 4) Printing: flyer, program, certificate.
- 5) Miscellaneous: table tarps, decorations, certificate folders, etc.

We'd be looking at several hundred dollars.



- To advise and make recommendations for policies and procedures that would ameliorate conditions that adversely affect LGBTs at UCSD.





CACLGBTI: Programs and Actions

The Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Issues (UCSD CACLGBTI) in fulfilling its charge has coordinated or participated in several projects, such as ad hoc committees and the development of programs.

LGBT Resource Office Steering Committee

Appointed by Chancellor Dynes in April 1999, the Steering Committee is charged with establishing an UCSD LGBT Resource Office, to address issues of Safe Space and other programmatic concerns articulated in the "Proposal for the Establishment of a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Resource Center at UCSD" authored by the Ad Hoc Committee and CACLGBTI. The LGBT Resource Office is scheduled to open for operations in Fall Quarter 1999. The members of the Steering Committee were recommended jointly by the CACLGBTI and the Ad Hoc Committee. The Steering Committee is charged independently of CACLGBTI, but will consults with the CACLGBTI in developing the LGBT Resource Office.

Ad hoc LGBT Resource Center Committee

Initiated by CACLGBTI in 1998, consisting of CACLGBTI members and other students, faculty and staff, to: investigate the needs and implementation of a LGBT Resource Center; to prepare "Proposal for the Establishment of a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Resource Center at UCSD"; to advise the CACLGBTI on these issues; and with the CACLGBTI, articulate the interests of students, faculty and staff to the Administration for the establishment of an LGBT Resource Center.

The Ad Hoc Committee assisted the CACLGBTI in recommending appointees for the Steering Committee of the UCSD LGBT Resource Office. The Steering Committee will take in consideration the concerns of the Ad Hoc Committee prior to the establishment of the UCSD LGBT Resource Office.

LGBTA Out and Proud Week

Open Zone Program

CACLGBTI has assisted UCSD Residential Life and the undergraduate colleges in the development of a "Open Zone" program similar to the "Homophobia Free Zone" implemented at Porter College, UC Santa Cruz. Currently Roger Revelle, John Muir, Earl Warren and Eleanor Roosevelt colleges have implemented the Open Zone Program directly; Thurgood Marshall College has a counterpart "Be An Ally" program incorporating the programme of the Open Zone Program.

Current Program description:

The Open Zone Program is intended to provide sensitivity training and increase awareness related to lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender issues. This workshop takes a look at myths and facts, impact of homophobia and ways to be an ally to this community. There will also be an opportunity to participate in a structured activity that will simulate potential life experiences of lesbian, gay bisexual, and transgender persons.
