You should proceed with the investigation of the killings which occurred during the fighting. Although most of the participants have been punished under the Native Administration Regulations, all efforts should be made to arrest the actual murderers and bring them before the Lower Court.

Unfortunately there is little you can do about the Mission situation. It is a difficult situation when traditional disputes over land and other subjects take on a Mission loyalty effect.

The prompt action by your Police and Officers probably saved a serious situation developing.

Subject :

As stated in the report this fight was quite different from fights over land disputes in this area. Formally the fight is joined, then reported to a station where upon a detachment of police are transported to the area to arrest the rioters. Then this is dono there is no further trouble. Howover in this instance although the greater part of the Nenai and Muprbaru adult males were arrested on Monday the fight broke out againon Wednesday mainly being carried on by the allies of the original antagonists.

The great **goty** is that with the exception of one or two allies actually arrested on Weinesday by the police fighting, all escaped the consequences of their act. As usuad there as henour this we amongst the fighters and no one would inform against any who fought on the opposing side.

It does appear that besides the age old animosity which excists between the two groups there is now the new one of religion. The Nemai are basically eatholic whilst the Mupabaru are Seven Day Adventists and Lutherans. The Lutheran Station is just to the west of the SDA station making three mission stations in a fadius of two hundred yards. The burning of the SDA house and the killing of a R.C.Cetechist will I'm afraid be remembered for a long time.

There appears little chance of obtaining a conviction for murder against any of these listed. The shooting of each of the three was supposedly seen by one witness only which is unsufficient with the alledged killer denying the allegation and the witnesses statement subject to doubt because of biase. The complication in the case of Petrous is not now in this area as one frequently finds one of the so called "rubbishmen" taking the blame for the act of a headman. A year we ago a kradman of the Tschak Valley was changed with a tribal fight killing but by having another person admit the offence whilst he denied it and because of the paucity of reliable witnesses the Supreme Court found him not Guilty.

A resthouse is to be built at Lamandeiananda Cenemorial Ground to ensure that such undercurrents of strife are not missed in the future.

PATROL DIARY

Wednesday 20th September, 1961

VAPENANINDA - PAUS Proceeded by vehicle to PAUS Rest House late in the afternoon with atrol personnel.

Het Mr.Bell. A.D.G., at the Rest House.

Night at PAUS

Thursday 21st September, 1961

PAUS - LAMANDELAMANDA Ceremonal Ground

Walled across to the opposite side of the LAI River to the NENAI and EXPARARU Area. Burnt houses and trambiand gardens indicated that fighting had been heavy. Broke off from main patrol with six police and inspected MUPABARU hamlets. Apprehended five sen before proceeding to camp site.

Mr.Bell had gone to the NENAI, and after interviewing prisoners I visited the MURABARU/NENAI boundary gardens and bamlets where fighting had most intense. Seventeen burnt out houses were seen and numerous gardens trampled down. Casuarina and banana trees had, but down. Returned to LAMAFDENAMENA via the NENAI Area.

End of Diary.

Indroduction.

On Monday, 18th September, 1961, two Members of the IDAGON-MUMPACARU Characteristic that fighting had broken out between IDAGON-MUMPACARU and IDAGON-NERAI groups on the afternoon of Sunday, 17th September.

The informents stated that several men had been wounded and that the fight had arisen following a dispute over land.

Presuming that the fighting was nostly atypical of land disputes in the general area; i.e., a brief armed encounter followed by an early trace, six members of the Wepenamarda R.F.4 N.G.C. detachment were immediately send to the area to apprehend those involvedighting.

On their return the police reported that the fight had been of greater proportions then that normally encountered, that fighting was in progress when they arrived at the scene of the fight, and that the nine known wounded had been located and were brought to the station. They further reported that a member of the MUPABABU sub groups had died from wounds. The dead nam was taken to Wabag for post mortem.

On Monday afternoon I had visited the area by land rover, having met the police on the road returning to the station with those involved in the fighting, I did not visit the area.

On Tuesday I sent for the village officials of the groups involved in the fighting. The Constable sent on this task returned to report that the village Officials did not wish to leave the area whilst so many group members were absent from the area. He reported that all was quiet in the area, and that there were no indications that trouble was brewing.

Early on Weinesday morning six police were again sent to the area with instructions to apprehend those natives who had been involved in the earlier fighting and who still remained in the area.

At approximately 10 a.m. I received word that fighting had again broken out and later that two people had been killed. I immediately prepared to depart on patrol to the area and sent advice to the 1.B.O Wabag that fighting on a large scale had broken out. On the return of the landrover from Wabag, I departed with further police to join Wr.Bell A.D.O. who had proceeded immediately to the fight area following my advice.

At this stage approx. 100 men had been apprehended for involvement in the fight which had taken place.

Investigations revealed that one of the men (a number of the MUFABLED) reported dead on Wednesday had been wounded on the Sunday and had gone to friends in a neigh bouring group for assistance. They had taken him to the Intheran Mission at TAIROS on Tuesday where their request for transport to the Mission hospital was refused on the grounds that the mission would provide no aid other than aid post facilities to those involved in the fighting.

Fearing an encounter with the enemy NEMAI (who live between TAIROS and the hospite)) the members of the HUPAEARU Group who were carrying the wounded men took to him back to their home, intending to circle the area on the following morning and thus safely reach the hospital. During the night the man died.

During the Wednesday fighting a Roman Catholic Mission catechist of Wabag was killed whilst reportedly fighting with the NEFAI. He was hit by prows within 5 yds of a Seventh day Adventist Mission establishment which, like the R.C.Catechists establishment, was sitvated on the disputed land.

By the time the patrol reached the area, the members of the disputing groups had departed the area, and contact with the remaining members of the groups involved was extremely defficult. For people who were prepared to give accurate or reliable information concerting the fighting could be found, and the pervading attitude on the port of the majority was to tell nothing and implicate as few people as possible whether smongst their allies or their ememies. The result was a paucity of information on the fighting and completely unreliable reports of the circumstances surrounding the shooting of three men who died.

The were no indications or reports of pending trouble over land prior to the advice on Monday that fighting had broken out on the previous day.

General;

LAMANDELAMANDA, the land over which ownership is disputed has been the subject of arbitration for some years. The most recent arbitration by a Mative Affairs officer was the recording of an agreement on a garden boundary by Mr.D.J.Hook in May, 1961.

However, prior to this there have reportedly been two disputes on other sections at LANANDEHAMANDA which have been settled by Wapenamanda officers. No records can be located and it is possible that the arbitration was informal.

Prior to the outbreak of fighting the land dispute was not brought to this office

About two weeks before the outbreak of fighting occurred, men of NEMAI entered the HUPABARU area and attempted to steal a pig belonging to NEI of WUFABARU. They were caught in the act by YEI who attempted to hold one of the men, IAKAB. YEI was struck down by KURI of NE-NAI with an axe blow which caused a serious wound on the head. The incident was not reported at the station because the MUPABARU were afraid to use the main read which passes through the NENAI area, and because I was at the time absent from the station attending a local government course in LAE.

The events immediately proceeding the fighting are rather contradictory. There is little doubt that both groups were responsible for uprecting gardens belonging to the other groups around the disputed area. I have, howevey, been unable to determine which of the groups was the initiator of the provocative acts, and which group responded with similar reprisels. It is known that the MUPAHARU, including IBABUN and PIESO of that group and IANDASIKI of PALINAU group uprooted sugar cane placted by the NEMAI, and that the NENAI uprooted a yas garden belonging to KARAU of MUPAHARU. The latter incident resulted in an exchange arrows, and the general fighting began.

Reports on the fighting are generally contradictory, but certain bacrvations are worthwhile.

The fighting commenced at about midday on the Sunday and continued until drrk. Fighting was particularly intense and vicious, and it would appear that the ranks of the fighters swelled considerably as the aftermost progressed and increasing numbers of group members reached the fight area. On the Sunday two men were fatally shot. TAKAI of MUPABARU died on the Sunday and ANUSI of MUPABARU died on Suesday night.

Fighting recommenced at dawn on the Monday and continued until police reached the area at about 9-10 a.m. There is reason to believe that a few mombers of groups allied to the original fighters joined the fight on Monday. Approximately fifty fighters were apprehended on the Monday and removed to the station. Village officials of neither group had made any attempt to edvice administration of the fight.

On the Twesday the area was quiet. A constable sent to the area returned to the station with a report that their were no signs of intenled continuation of the fight.

Early on Wednesday morning six police were sent to the area to apprehend those fighters who had evaled them on the Monday. They reached the area to find that fighting had again broken out. Wednesdays fight was noteable for the number of houses which were burnt, and for another circumstance which had not been anticipated.

It is reported that the fighting on the Wednesday began when considershle forces consisting of allies of the MUPABARU and NENAI initiated reprisels against the enemy. The house burning seems to have been almost wholly carried out by members of the PALINAU Group- allies of the MUPA-BARU. There is also reason to believe that members of the TSIGIN, KANDA-UALIN - ANJO and TSIAGAUAN, HUNGIPIN-TSO, and LANDARAGIN groups fought with the remants of the MUPABARU, and that WOIMINAGUN and YOGOENDA group members fought with the NENAI. Unfortunately no real evidence is available as beyond the general 'knowledge' in the area that allies initiated the Wednesday fighting, the participants themselves are close-mouthed and refuse to acknowledge the fact.

Fighting on Wednesday resulted in death of PEIROS, a Roman Catholic catechist of the Wabag area who was stationed at LAMANDELANANDA - the disputed land. Informants state that PEIROS fought with the NENAI on both Monday, and Wednesday when he died from arrow wounds.

CONCLUSION.

At the time of writing 136 men have been convicted in the C.N.A. of rictome behaviour and sentenced to 6 months imprisonment I.H.L. A Investigations into the deaths of TAMAI, AMUSI and PETROS have not resulted in occurete evidence becoming available.

The shooting of TAKAI is claimed to have been witnessed by POLIO of MUPABARU. He states that he saw PIUK of NENAI shot the fatal arrow. Ap other witnesses have come forward. POLIO also claims to have seen FILI of NENAI shot ANUSI of MUPABARU. Both these eye-witness accounts are suspect as no other witnesses area available, and I am assured by other natives that in close fighting every individual is too busy looking after himself to notice surrounding incidents.

The death of PETROS and the surrounding circumstances are even more confused.

Informants state that when, MUPABANU Group gave the Seventh Day Adventist Mission land for a station on the disputed ground, the NEMAI reciprocated by placing a Roman Calholic Mission station on the land. The catechist PETROS - a Wabag native - apparently become involved in the strong feelings over the disputed area, as he is reputed to have fought with the NEMAI on both Monday and Wednesday. PETROS was shot beside the S.D.A. Station, between the station and on outlying S.D.A house which was burnt down by the NEMAI.

KARAP of SEMAI claims to have seen MANGAU of MUPABARU shoot FETROS. However we also have one TOP-a MUPABARU-who has volunteered the information that it was he who shot FETROS. The men MANGAU has not as yet been approhended.

At present the possibility of successfully prosecuting those involved in the killing of the three won is not good. It is perhaps indicative of the attitude of these people that of over thirty men wounded, only one stmitted to knowing who shot him.

Following the patrol two constables have been stationed in the area, one on SENAI land and one on MUPABARU land. Their chief task is to encure that the area does not suffer from further depradation by nearby groups whilst the group measure are serving their sentences.

After the death of PETROS, death compensation payments were made to his group and this aspect of the situation is satisfactory. For a period intercourse between Wapenamanda and Wabag natives had come to a halt because of the local fear of reprisals.

The area is now quiet and no further incidents are anticipated.



Attached please find two copies of the abovementioned report with covering remarks by the Officer in Charge, Wapenamanda.

The low numbers of natives who collected at resthouses to visit the patrol is a normal occurence in the ures for non sensus patrols, even if the Mogn had not been passing through the area. However larger numbers are seen in the houses and gardens with are covered move thoroughly because, without the time consuming ernsus to be revised, the patrol has the time in which to visit more settlements in each area.

It is now over a year since preparations for the moga were commanced in the Lumis area of the Lower Lai. The slowness of these people in scaling the Moga southward up the Lai meant that those in the immediate Wapensmanda area decided not to wait for this offshoot to join the main stem from Wabag, but send their moga on immediately. The Lower Lai moga will therefore not comme much disruption around Wapensmanda.

Advice as to whether or not the road through the Lower Lai to Baiyer River, for which a request of £10,000 was made in 1960, in to be commenced in the near future would be appreciated. This road was that originally projected as linking Mount Hagen and Wabeg but the place was discontinued when the more denegt route over the range was discovered Applications have already been made for two mission leases in the Lower Lai and no doubt additional leases will be requested in the near future, so that it is most likely that missions will be agitating for a readpys-tem shortly. The lower section of the road from Lumis to Baiyer River Las already been surveyed and it is hoped that a surveyer on a competent Road Mester would mark out the upper section so that the inhobit Road Master could mark out the upper section so that the inhabitants of # the area, who are definitely interested in a road, could commence the work immediately.

The lack of response to the request for Highland Labourers was desappointing but as our quota has been filled for this year we can afford to mwait the return of those at present at work before recommencing recruiting. The area will be patrolled again early in the New Year.

Lower Lai Consus Division

Please accept my apologies for the delay in forwarding examents on the abovementioned patrol. As you are aware, I have been absent on patrol in the TCHAK Area for the past five weeks.

The Native situation can, as usual, be described as quiet. Mr. Mundell's encounter with a lack of interest in the patrol at LUMIS is typical of the lack of co-operation to be expected during the 'dOGA' season. The 'HOGA' transations have now entered the Lower Lai area proper, and are travelling slowly towards Wapenamanda. You will be relieved to hear that these exchanges are trivelling towards TAMBVL and not pass through WABAG.

The lack of disputes is typical of this area, which is noteable for its law-abiding citizenry.

Although explicit instructions were given that the patrol remain for at least two days at each Rest House, Mr. Mundell apparently found that there was insufficient work to keep him occupied. MANAMANDA was not visited, presumably because it had been reported that the Rest house had been publed down.

The report on village officials seems to indicate that the average official is obtwardly capable, however the remarks concerning walking tracks and rest houses do not indicate that these men are performing their tasks satisfactorily. Nor an I satisfied with the comments under health and hygienc which refer to the high incidence of untended sores, etc. prevalent amongst the young. It is intended to bring these officials to the station in the near future in order to furnish them with more exact specifications of their responsibilities.

Arrangements will also be made for the completion of Rest house construction.

Unfortunately your request that Mr. Mundell carry out land investigations near FINTAPAIS, and purchase land at LUMIS, did not reach this office until 11th October. Although the message was sent to the patrol immediately, they had reached ELYAGANDA. Mr. Mundell had damaged his log in a fall whilst crossing the Lai Gorge, and did not feel capable of rewracing his tracks to carry out your request.

The possibility of extending the vehicular road network to the Hower Lai area, and to PAWARI in particular, should present few difficulties. Once a crossing of the LAI Gorge is affected the terrain becomes more precipitous. From PINYAPAIS to LUMIS, and then on to BAIYER RIVER, I suggest that the services of a surveyor would be of great help. Also, I rather suspect that the lack of response to Highland Labour Scheme recruiting in this area is greatly influenced by our recent interest in a road construction programme for the area. If it is not intended that roads be extended to serve this, a definite reply would be appreciated, as elders would then be less inclined to keep the young men at home. The practical educational value of the Highland Labour Scheme cannot, I feel, be under emphasized in areas such as this.

Your intructions are as follows:

1. Whilst Mr.E.Wilshire, E.M.A., is in your company, give him every assistance in obtaining the attendance of the people of the area for medical inspection. Should there occur any instances of blatent disregard or refusal to obey orders to appear for medical inspection, the persons involved may be charged under Reg. 88 (3) of the N.A.R.

2. Spend at least two days at each Rest House and endeavour to inspect as much of the general area and housing as possible.

3. Endeavour to obtain as many recruits as possible under the Highland Labour Scheme. The area is virtually untouched in this respect.

 You may arbitrate and help to settle any minor disputes which are brought to you, but ensure that you do not become involved in land disputes
 stage.

5. Inspect all major walking paths in the area and suggest improvements where necessary.

6. Report on the condition of Rost Houses in the area.

7. Report on Villags Officials and give them such help or advice an you may consider necessary.

8. Deal with such other matters as may arise in the course of the patrol Do not hesitate to contact me immediately should you encounter any difficulties.

Monday, 2nd October.

Departed MAMBISANDA at 10-30 am for YALIS Rest House. Walked over fair track to arrive YALIS at 12-45 pm. Walking time 2 hours. People gathered to meet patrol. Ample food purchased. Afternoon spent talking with officials and people. Heavy rain at 4-00 pm continued for most of the night. Night at YALIS.

Tuesday, 3rd Occober

Assisted Mr Wilshire, M.C.A. in preparation for obtaining blood samples. Arbitrated in several disgutes with the ald of Village Officeals. WAPENAMANDA PATROL NO.2 of 1961-1962.

MATIVE AFFAIRS.

The last patrol to this area was in April of this year and was one of Tax Gensus revision.

During this patrol disputes and other minor troubles were conspicuous in their absence. Those disputes brought forward for arbitration were mainly concerned with the ownership of pigs and claims for compensation for gardens damaged by pigs. One case of unlawfully striking was referred to Wapenamanda for C.N.A. action.

The patrol was fairly well received throughout but at some places attendances were rather low due partly to bad weather and partly to thre proximity of the Hoga Geremony. At LEMIS the patrol was delayed until 11 am because no carriers turned up. Altthough ample notice was given of our requirements not a dozen men presented themselves the part morning to carry. After some investigation it was found that most of the men were attending a Moga ceremony in the Hagen Sub-Flattici about 4 hours walk away.However by 11 o'clock sufficient carriers had ar ived and the patrol moved on. Also at PAUS near the Wapenamends station very few people turned up to meet the patrol as the majority were preparing for the Moga which is at present headed in their direction. These two instances were the only effects of the Moga encountered.

On arrival at AWAS Rest House it was found that no preparation had been made for our visit. The rest house was small and autremely dirty. On his patrol to this area in April of this year the O=I=C Wapenamanda instructed village officials to replace this house and although five months had elapsed no attempt has been made to do this. A great deal of the time spent at AWAS was spent in getting materials for the new rest house gathered on the site. The plan was marked out and as the patrol left the old house was in the process of being pulled fowm and all useable material salvaged.

Highland Labour recruits were requested at each camp and approximately 20 young men were forwarded to Wapenamanda for onmovement to the coast. This was thought to be a rather poor response from an arecvirtually untouched by the scheme in the past.

At the present time there 100 men absent from the Lower Lai under the Highland Labour Scheme. This number cannot hope to be increased in the near future as the attitude is that all those at present working on the coas must return home before others can leave. This is to ensure that the stock of young men does not become over rapidly depleted.

There are two women from this area gainfully (cont)

employed at present. Both are employed as domestic help at the Reptist Mission, LUNIS.

Comments on housing, condition of rest houses and village officials are covered under sepparate appendices.

In conclusion I would say that the native situation in the Lower Lai remains quite satisfactory.

ROADS AND BRIDDES.

There are no vehicular ryady in the Lover Lai and since nothing further has been heard of the proposed Tayenemanda-Baiyer River road is is presumed that this project has been shelved.

Walking tracks are generally very poor sometimes turning into more pads feet deep in mud. Bridging is vastly inadequate with sometimes only one sapling being thrown accross the stream at the most convenient place. Larger streams such as the Lai River have the common type suspension bridge which makes crousing a good deel faster ans safer.

Where accessary instructions were given to willage officials to invrove the walking tracks in their inmediate area. In some cases where new tracks were needed the location and grade of these were discussed with the men concerned and agreed upon before the patrol morred on.

It is my opinion that waiting time between placed could be out down by almost one half should decent tracks exist.

CARMIERS

it all places with the exeption of LUMIS, carriers were plentiful and usually on time. On all the longer walks carriers were changed at the group boundaries so that one group of carriers marely carried for over an hour and a half.

BEALTER AND HYGENE.

Mr E Wilshire, Malaria Control Field Supervisor accompanied the petrol for the first eleven days, however he returned direct to Wapenamanda when the remainder of the patrol moved over to PAUS.

While Mr Wilshirs -os withm the patrol he obtained blood samples from 600 people of all age groups in an endeavour to discover the incidence of malaria. At all times the people wire most co-operative and showed no four of having blood taken.

Most of the housing and sanitation in this area was inspected and was found to be surprisingly clean. However, there were several places where it could be seen that a hurried claning of housing had taken place when word of the inspection go's around. Only in two places were latrines inadequate and these were rectified on the spot in my presence.

Numerous cases of scables and small sores were observed on small children and parents were urged to take their children to the pearest Aid Post immediately there sores were detected. Where possible medical inspections were held in conjunction with the taking of blood slides and treatments given on the spot where needed.

Aid Posts at YALIS, PINYAPAIS, LUMIS and PAUARI give an adequate coverage for the area down to PAUARI but the establishment of a further post say at KARANANDA would give adequate coverage for the people on that side of the valley.



Wapenamanda Patrol Report No. 3/1961-62 - Lower Lai Census Division - Mr. I.T. Spencer, Patrol Officer.

Your memorandum 67-3 dated 30th March, 1962 accompanying the above refers.

It is not considered that Mr. Spencer took overlong on this patrol as he states in the Introduction. The usual Census Patrol to the Lower Lai takes approximately a month. Time spent on this patrol was 26 days, not 25 as stated in the report, and 24 on the cover. Please alter your cover accordingly.

Although walking tracks in the Wabag area have not been regraded they have at least been cleared, widened and improved generally. This too should be done in the Lower Lai by patrolling officers and not left to the Village Officials.

Other Officers through this area have in the past reported quite favourably on the state of the peoples' houses and surroundings. Perhaps Mr. Spencer is comparing them by coastal standards and this, whilst it is the people's custom to closet pigs in the houses at night, is too high.

The Lower Lai has had an anti-yaws medical patrol through it some years ago and a general medical patrol only a year ago, so there should not be a large percentage of people suffering from yaws. This has been brought to the District Medical Officer's notice.

As you say most Village Officials throughout the Sub-District, even those who are traditional leaders, have difficulty in carrying out their daties in a satisfactory manner. Every avenue must be explored in an endeavour to improve them.

The census figures cannot be accepted and are returned for correction and re-writing. In the first place the census must foll w the layout of the previous ones. Secondly each clan is to be rechecked and the new total must be exact with the previous total plus births and migrations in, minus deaths and migrations out. For example the first clan unjibaguin should now be 501 not 498, if the other figures are correct.

Lative Affairs:

It ispleasing to note that the native situation remains satisfactory.

Roads & Bridges:

In an area such as this it is difficult to maintain tracks and bridges at a reasonable

standard. As nost patrol tracks follow age-old native tracks, and these came about through the Natives' tendency to disregard hills and follow the most direct route, such tracks are continually subject to rawages by the weather and steady improvement is virtually impossible. Eventual graded relocation would seem to hold the only answer.

Agriculture:

The presence of an Agriculture Officer at Wapenananda will greatly assist these

people in their desire for each crops, especially coffee. Difficulties of distance and freight costsprevent fresh vegetable production provising the bulk of native cash income within the fersesable future.

Village Officials:

As elsewhere in the Sub-District, this Division suffers from a serious lack in

first rate Village Officials. I do not think the blans can be laid entirely at the doors of the officials concerned. It is anticipating a let to expect an unpaid official who sees a patrol twice a year, and whose training has have perhaps consisted of a "run through" of the Native Administration Regulations, to maintain a high standard of control. It is true that there are many who can, and do, carry out a very good jeb. However, the presence of less efficient efficials does lower the general standard throughout an area. Elsewhere, I have experimened with a "course" for Village Officials, whereby they were brought to the Station for a week. During this time they were given talks on relevant matters, the Native Regulations were explained to them, and they paraded for the evening flag-lowering coremony by the pelice. Shis did arouts an "seprit de corps" and helped them realize that they were members of a larger organization that the Broup or Glam. The most of mative feederaffs for the course use mogligible in compurison with the babefit obtained. Such courses, followed by "refrecher"courses, would, I week, mine the general standard of Village Officials motioeshly.

This patrol was conducted through the lower isi Commu-Division of the Reparements Patrol Post area, and book twenty live days to complete. ¹⁶nd the patrol been intent only on Commu and worth routine administration, perhaps ten days sould have been out aff the time spent in the area. Hovever much time was spent by the writer attempting to become conversant with the yeaple and their customs and in giving the people a chance to gain confidence in the writer.

The patrol use ariginally intended to give the writer the opportunity of gotting to know the area and it's people in proparation for a land Dange investigation to be held at some future date. However, as there were some substanding jobs to be done in the area it use doulded to eaching the two for the purpose of the patrol. Therefore this patrol has taken slightly langer them other routine serves revision patrols through this area.

Remarks this is the writer's first time in the area, and even in the Highlando, a good comparison ennet be drawn to enable the writer to see improvements in the mative situation or in read and bridge maintenance, if any. Provious patrol instructions were checked, and the result of these instructions, looked for in the area.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

There are no vehicular roads into or cerving the petrolled area, but walking tracks serve all the Census points and rest houses. Not much can be said in favour of the walking tracks in the Lover Jai Census division, where it is most obvious that little or no maintenance has been carried one since the last patrol in the area. The three ar four suspension bridges across the Lai were in a matisfactory condition, but the bridges across the Lai were in a matisfactory condition, but the bridges across the maller streams Jere either seplings or non existent.

The writer spent a considerable time explaning that good reads throughout the area were not only for the banefit of Government personal, but for all in the area. If the existing reads were put in a better modifies, hours could be out off the walking time between 2005 and Tapanamania, and this in term would diminish the fooling of reactness, and even allow gardeners to well their produce at the statice, and thereby gain a small each income. These ideas were put to the people and they were unged to carry out irredicte maintenance on their sections of read. However, the exiter is sure that talking alone can never induce the people to to maintain their reads to even a molerate standard, and feels the mode for this work to be supervised, antil results can be seen and falt by the people

AGRICINLEVIRE

The people of this area are solely occupied with sub--sistence gardening, and use the bunk fallow system with a rotation p period of four to five years. Although the population in this area is quite large there is an abundance of good arable land, emabling the people to carry out even longer rotation periods. The matives are still dependent on sweet potatoes, fure and Bonance as a staple food, though introduced crops such as Potators, beens, cabbago, temates and lattuce are appearing in their dist. Such small market garden crops also provide a small cash income. This however, could be expanded with good communication, Thereż is a good market for vegetables at the Futrol Post, and mission bodies in the area

The matives in this area appear well versed in the 'dee' and 'den'te' of the Administration and consequently are law obiding. In all cases the people are only too willing to bring their troubles to the notice of the Hative Affairs officer whilst in the area, and accept his decision with trust. It is corprising her for complaints were reasived by the writer, considering the large population of the area, and it's recommend.

At all Canous points, except KAHAMANDA, the Patrol was well received, and made volcene, and no shortage of willing convious excountered. The locals brought planty of food for purchase by the patrok. The acception, KAMAMANDA, claimed that they cal me idea that the patrol intended to visit their area, although the paurol had sent word with the runners of the time of arrival.

Of the complaints received, most were requests to give decisions, in the repayment of bride price, advice in individual disagreemerie, and a diminterested verdict to amplisivil complaints. There were several disputes regarding land brought to the attention of the Patrol, and in all cases these were settles by the partice concerned, whilst the Patrol acted in the capacity of an advicer.

In cases where civil complaints were of a trivial nature, and where the writer was of the epistem that the v/llage officials had a better knowledge of the history of the v/lo than he, the docimions were left to the official concerned. This was intended to give the officials some confidence, and to show the people that the officials do have some authority. Throughout the lower Lai, the people show no respect for their efficials. Whether this is the result of officials abusing their authority, or poor shelce, it is hard to determine, but from the writer's short officials respect.

purchase fresh foods on a large scale for shipment to the cost const or other less fortunate areas.

Near PINYAPAIS and LUPUS coffee gardens were sighted, and are flow/ishing. Ouite large numbers of trees are at a bearing age age, and the locals are selling oun dried beaus to the Hissions near Baiyer River. As yet this cast crop has not reached large propertiens, but people with large truets of gardening land at their dispesal are elanouring for Coffee seedlings.

The Agriculture Officer in the area edvices that he plans to visit the Lower Lai area in the near future, to assist the people in marking out garden plots and iscuing Coffee seedlings. He also intends to train a local, possibly from LOMIS, the centre of the Coffee area at present, and return him to the area as a guide, for- and source of information, for anyone wishing to grow Coffee. It is moved that this increasing interest in coffee See not enuse further land problems or disputes.

The lack of energetic officials in this area is probably the ownee of road problem. In all cases the officials complained bitterly that they received as respect of obedience from their various lines, and because of this no work was over done on the roads. This could be true, but it seems more likely that the officials cannot be bothered rounding up the people and supervising them on read work or any other job that might benefit the villagers. Housing throughout the area was sufficient but of a peer and unhygicale condition. It appears that it is the local custum to share one house with one's pig, but surely and- an of energetic official can impress his people of the meed to clear - pigs low-ings from their house and environe without an Administrat--ion officiar's supervision

VILLAGE OFFICIALS CONT.

The efficials throughout the area were adviced to earry out improvements on the filthy conditions of the houses and environe and urged to take legal action against anyone disobeying their orders on this matter. They appeared pleased and surprised to learn this and it is hoped that a wast improvement will be seen during the future patrolo.

REST HOUSEL

The rost houses are all in a very good condition, and their environs are in most places clean and tidy.

The rest houses at MMES and AWAS have been rebuilt of species domign and moderate worknamship. The lulumb in both places was praised for his building. Possibly the worst rost house in the area was at FULS, and nere the folumi was asked to make some improvements.

CIER STA

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Response to the consus revision was good. Absentees were few but in each case the Imluai was able to give an account of the missing persons whereabouts. Little trouble was caused by the MOGA which was at LUMIS at the time, and this coremany accounted for an absentees.

Two people were charged and convicted under the Mative Administration Regulations, for being unlawfully abount, after being warned of the consus time.

MEALTH AND HYGIENE

Ъ

This patrol was not accompanied by a Medical Orderly. All post Aid posts were visited and inspected by the patrol, and next were found to have a good many patients suffering from YAWS Sourvy and dynamity. The writer was advised by the respective Aid post Orderly; that they had numerous out patients.

During consus revision quite a number of people were noted to be suffering from running source and these were advised that they should visit the Aid Post.

Hygione through the area was neglected. Hearly all native houses seen whilst noving through the area were in a filtby obs state. The headmon were asked to amend this condition promptly.

There is one large Hospital and two small Aid stations accousible to the people of the lower Lai. Hack of these establishment are run by Missions. There is no shortage of medical aid.

MISSIGNS AND SCHOOLS

There are three Missions operating in the area The Maptist Mission, The Latheran Mission and the Seven Day Adventist Mission. These Missions undertake the greater part of mative eduontion in the Lower Lai. The consus showed that there are 108 males, and 19 females attending Mission schools, and only 7 males at the Government school at Wapenamanda. As well as these pupils there are numerous others attending minor village schools in the Census Division. All education in the area is primary only.

The writer was informed whilst at REYAGA DA that the Beven Day Adventist Mission is planing to build a small hospital at that consus point, enabling the people of the ELYAGANDA ANAS area to obtain medical treatment in their own area, instead of walking to MANBISANDA, the nearest hospital at present. This idea has gained considerable support from the nativus, and the Mission should have no difficulty obtaining labour for the project.

CONCLUSION

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Apart from the immediate most to improve hygians the patrolloi area appears to be progressing satisfactorily under Administration guidence and policy. No very serious broashes in the Native Administration Regulations were dealt with, and records show that the lower Ini has been perceful for many years. It some that the people are able to follow their own natural courses with little friction with their meighbours. The major same of ill feeling is land boundaries and emership claims. It is the writer's opinion that this is the result of inter-slam fighting, prior to the Administration's gaining centrel of this the Mistrirt, where a more presentall clan has answed the gordening ground of smaller class. Now, with law and justice for both the lange are the small, the smaller class are making a bid to regain what they lost to the Auguriar class.

It is hoped that improvements in read maintenance, hygicas and the mative situation in general, will be empried out as a result of this patrol.

I discount to a degree some of these generalisations, such as "all Mabag labour are bed", or "some other groups are all gord". Private enterprise are receiving an unusual service and it is unreasonable that they should be able to stipulate whatever conditions they desire.

The Midle Las people are not exceptions in their valuation of kind. It has priority in every communal society. It can be safely said that the majority of the brawls in the Territory are over land disputes either immediately or busically.

It is not necessary to apologise for the time taken on a strol. All that period spont is contact with the people is well worth while.

The reported dissension originating between the two denominations is not the first time, nor will it be the last that over enthusiastic searching for souls has caused.

In their attempts to promote aconomic development Officers should consider the visbility of production outlets as well as the population pressure in certain areas. If the elected deropean members for the islands of the Legislative Council can be believed ill savised but sincers //forts to grow cash crops in inaccessible country was a contributory factor towards the Buke riots.

Now that Mr. Hogg, Officer in Charge, Wapenamanda, has effected a settlement of the land dispute between the Namai and Mupebaru Clans at Ramandeimanda it is to be hoped that there will be no further trouble. However, in the event that anything does come up, please ensure that this office is notified immediately. The S.D.A. Mission has been quite hysterical about the whole affair. The shortage of outside labour opportunities can be blamed directly on the people now complaining. Most applications for Highland Labour are marked "No Wabagas" (Wapenamenda natives are classed in this) and this is because of past recruits' lasiness and troublesomeness whilst at work on the coastal plantations. In the event that a large number of requests for labour are received then it is possible that a call for recruits may be made in your area, but it is thought that this is the only chance you will have to again join the Highland Labour Scheme. There appears little possibility that the Department of Public Health will position on Aid Post at Yagaindis, which is only about five miles from the Aid Post at Helya. There are more isolated positions where the need is greater. However, the matter has been brought to the notice of the District

Introduction:

ATTA NE -

The main object of this patrolwas the rebuilding of all bridges of the WAPEWAMALDA-WABAG real as far as AMAPIAK. However the whole census division was patrolled, including from WAPEWAMANDA to WELVAND general siministration, such as settling of petty disputes, insportion of living conditions, and conversing with the natives on the aims of the government, rus carried out.

At all places visited interest was shown at the arrival of the patrol and, although wholehearted co-operation was not set with in the building of the bridges, their renewal was carried on speedily. On the whole the natives worked well then their reputation for recalcitrance is taken into account.

The area patrolled is a section through the middle of the WAP-EMANANDA Administrative Area, from boundary to boundary. The MARAG - MAGEN main road cuts through the centre of this area, consequently all rest bouses are accessible by road, except the rest bouse at RAMANDRIMA DA.

The patrol could have perhaps been completed are speadily. It's lengthy duration is accounted for by the number of days throughout the patrol which had to be speat on WAPENAMANDA station, because of the lack of the Hative Aflairs Officers to take care of the station work. e speedily. It's the lack

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Lative Affairs: The native situation is never very calm or asable in this area, the perhaps to the dense population and the recent history of tribal warfare and discord here. The drace population tends to make land very valuable, and consequently one of the greatest causes of Corife in this area is land. The recent tribal fight last Soptember between the RENAL and MUPABASU Clans was over land, and sumerous complainle are always being received, of patrol and at the station, over land.

The detives throughout this area are very "court-minied", and consequently at all places visited unerous netty disputes were brought forward for arbitration. However very few personal matters were brought opthese that were were sout to WFER MUNDA to be heard by the A.B.L. on his weekly visits to the station.

Although there always seers to be an undercurrent of strife among the matives is this area it is always inter-family or inter-tribel strife, to examples of anti-government feeling were met with, and it is highly unlikely that there would be any.Though often anger to guardel and fight among themselves they regard the government, on the whole, with respect; not a respect governed by fear but by a realisation of the stability and reace of mind it is giving to them.

No bad cases of sichless were noticed among the natives through-out the patrol, indeed the only people sant for medical treatment were those suffering from outs and blows

The actual bridge work took up most of the time of the patrol, approximately five weeks, and consequently, towards the end, the enthusiasm of the natives waned. Nowever, even they, no serious trouble was not with and all clans arrived at work regularly , albeit unwillingly. The only trouble occurringwas with isolated cases refusing to work, and they were usually reported by the village officials.

At all places houses and garad garlens were inspected and were found to be clean and well hunt. The ability of these natives to make gardens is well move and has been concented on in many previous reports.

Throughout the patrol natives asked for word. There meens to be a tarrific engerness for work throughout the area, which would give the natives money, and in turn a feeling of security. They work any type of work, as long as they can obtain money from it. As no dightend Labour regraits had been asked for they were not able to obtain work in this field, although many of them are keen to. Local work is not on a large x scale and consequently there is no great brening for labour here. At the moment there seems no suitable work available for them. It seems a pity that such an eager, and potentially large, labour force should remain idle

for want of work.

and the

At all places food was rientiful. However the natives are very loth to sell meat in the form of pigs and chickens, they seem to regard them as an investment and are keen to retain them.

Two days were spent at RAMANDEIMANDA rest house to ensure that the recently released natives engeged in the September '61 fight were settling down allright.Here, as everywhere, they now seem to be settled and although the two clans are very much enemies and afraid of each other further fighting seems unlikely.

Everywhere the patrol was welcomed by the natives. They all seem to look forward to the government patrols and appreciate the interest which draws the government from it's station into their homes, as it were.

Roads and Bridges:

The road from the HAGEN border as gar as WAPENAMADA station was untouched by this patrol.During the general administration carried out in this area the road was inspected and instructions given as to how to improve it.However extensive road works were uncalled for owing to the good condition of this road.

The main work occurred on the WAPENAMADA - WABAG road as far as the boundary at AMAPIAK.In all, thirtenn large bridges and one culvert were replaced on this section of road.New planks were cut for all the bridges, being longer and thicker than the old ones, so making the bridge surfaces a great improvement on those before. The lack of good bearer logs close at hand proved an obstacle. Some very good hardwoods were pulled from the thick forest areas in the surrounding mountains, however a great deal of time was wested during the pulling of these logs. Sufficient bearer logs were eventually found in the vicinity, and though some were of an awkward shape, they all proved adequate.

A fault in all the old bridges was that all the bearer logs rested only on ground at the mouths of the bridges. The ground being very soft, in some parts shale, tended to break away, especially after heavy rain, and so the bearer logs would sink, making the bridge approaches dangerous. In these new bridges a log was cut and laid across the road, near the mouth of the bridge, and the bearer logs in turn laid on top of this. If some ground did break away this 'pillow'log would stop any one bearer log from sliding down. All bearer logs were cut to a greater length also, so that a large pert of them would lie on the solid ground of the road. Some work on the road in this area was also lone, though not a great deal. Though easily trafficable it is not in very good order. This is due mainly to the lack of good gravel and the fact that the rain runs slong the road taking what gravel there is with it, and cutting up the road at the same time. Any lasting improvement here would entail major road works.

Village Officials:

The number of village officials in this area seems to be adequate. They wield a deal of authority inside their own clans, and generally with other clans. However they are loth to report their clan members for any breaches of the law, evidently afraid of their resultant unpopularity with their clan if they did. They are helpful to carry instructions to their clans and to organize their respective clans for work, but they are not as co-operative as one might wish. They do help by trying to settle petty disputes within their clan, but invariably, at the slightest disagreement, they bring the partier before a Natives Affairs officer. In these petty disputes too they are often loth to give a verdict in case the losing party takes it as a personal affront.

Missions:

There are only two Missions in this area operating under Euro-

The state of the natives in this area is good due to the extensive contact with Burspeans, mission and government, and the ready access to all parts of the area, owing to the all weather road passing through the centre of the valley. These natives are in continual contact with Euro-peans and consequently are more advanced, spiritually, sorally and in learning, then are their counterparts in the ICHAR and LOWER LAI Valleys. Never they still have a long way to go before they could be left to their own devices, without a fear of trouble on the part of the government. They still need constant watching and constant contact with Euro-They still need constant watching and constant contact with government

Conclusion:

Corriers were not used to any great extent on this patrol, a car being available. However when needed there was no difficulty in obtaining then owing to the dense population, the short distances and the good

Cerriers:

At present they are all co-operative, to what degree depends on how much work is involved, and they are all eager to learn and to improve themselves. However not much has been done in this area towards a personal each economy for the natives, or towards building up a type of in industry, or work, to enable those who wish to obtain noney through a stable job. At the moment the greater number of natives have no work, except in their gardens; the time which in the past has been spent is fighting is now time or their hands. If they cannot find something profitable to take up this ' they may revert to their former practices.

They therealves are all very keen as mentioned previously, to work for money, they would appreciate it if work could be given to them. The arrival of an Agricultural Officer in the area will help them to start some cash cropping, such as coffie, but owing to lack of land this could not become an extensive business. Laving this in mind it would be of great benafit to the natives if a permanent and stable industry could be introduced into the area.

Medical and Health:

This area has an extremely good coverage, but only due to the many Mission ald posts. The large, up to date, hospital at MANDISANDA is of immense value to the local matives. At present it is staffed by a Buropean doctor, 5 marsing sisters and numerous medical orderlies. Mabag Government Hospital is easily accessible by road and can also be used by these matives. At MAIROS, PHUSA and MARAMA DA are Mission aid posts, the one at TAIROS being of a good standard with a Suropean surse.

There are few government aid posts in the area; one is at MANNA and one at WELMA. Perhaps the only part which does not receive an adequate coverage is between WARAWA DA and WELMA. There is a fainly large population here and the natives have a long way to go; to WELMA, to WARAWANDA or something times to TSAPONDIS is the TOHAN Valley, for medical treatement. While at YAGAINDIS, between WELMA and WARAWA DA, the local natives oper mached the patrol asking for a government aid post to be erected there. Swidently they have been wanting one for a long time, but there overtures in this matter have been disregarded so far. In my optimion it would be an ad-wantage to site an aid post here, the obvious beeness of the local matives for one would ensure it to be locked after.

The besith of the natives seen was very good. Those whom are a sick obtain medical aid quickly, they themselves realize the advantages of medical sid.

APPE DIX "C".

Education:

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These natives are as well supplied with educational facilities as they are with medical. There is an Administration Privary School at WAP WAMADA, recently removed from it's previous site at WAP WIGHT AND THE School in the middle of the Mid le Lai Area. It has an attendance of over a hundred oupils, many from WAPAG as it is the only school in the Sub-District which goes up to Stendard 3. It has a staff of one Buropean teacher and three native teachers.

The Lutheran Mission run good schools at both VALBOS and NAMEL-SAUDA under the Ministers-in-charge. The standard is as high as that of the government school. There is also a Native Higher Achool at PAUSA where native children from all over the Ministers Sub-District are targht by qualified Baropean teachers. At AMAPIAN there is an ercellent boarding school for all the Mission children in the Sub-District.

The Roman Catholic Mission runs small native schools under the Prieste-in-charge at PEPOBOS and FENA.

In addition to these both Missions have small schools scattered throughput this ares run by native evangelists. Nowever these have a definate bias towards religious teaching and the standard of education in these village schools is not high. The best pupils are apt to the better Mission schools in the area.




Food and Agriculture?

There is no cash cropping in this area which is unfortunate owing to the native's great desire for a moneyed income.However now that an Agricultural Officer is stationed at WAPE ANAVER it is howed that that cash cropping is now done on a small scale may be able to be extended. The covious grop to do this with is coffee, however lack of land must hemper the growth of an extensive coffee industry in the area.

Vogetables grow very well in the area and there is an abundance of them.Some are sold to the Lutheran Mission, for backloading to the conse, and some to the government.Hewaver this is a small scale market and can only be used profitably by those natives when live near the station.A suitable market for this produce would be of immense value to the local matives.

ith the exception of the Rauana/Fina area e native situation appears good. It is quite possible that with the introduction of the Local Courts Ordinance a number of Officers will be given the powers of Lands Coumissioners to enable the settlement of land disputes where direct action by the disputants is likely to take place. This is not the answer to the problem, but is the best that can be done at the moment.

There is a considerable population in the Faunnda Valley to maintain the few miles of road which exists therein. As it passes through the peoples customary land they are obliged to maintain it to a reasonable standard, especially so since they have recently been in receipt of payment, albeit small, for this maintenance.

The Health Department is enable to help in the situation which exists at Kagaindis. In comporison to other areas they do not have to travel far to obtain medical sid.

Forwarded herewith please find the report of a patrol to the Middlo Lai Geneus Division, conducted by Mr.J.B.Brazel, Cadet Patrol Officer, together with covering comment by the officer in Charge, Wapenamanda.

Eative Affairs: Apart from the incident in the RAUANDA/ PINA/PAIRAP area, which is dealth with under separate correspondence, the native situation appears normal.

<u>Mode & Bridges</u>: Matives responsible for mintenance of the main vehicular read through the Middle Lai are to be commended for the someistant good condition of the read, especially from the Lai River to the top of the range beyend VELIA. Although the read to RANAMA is not used often, this should be no reason for not keeping it in the best possible repair. The responsiblifies of the people living along the read are not lessened by the fact that it is a brunch read.

<u>Village Officials</u>: Officials in other parts of the Sub-District. The office of Laluai, as at present constituted, appears to be mable to keep up with modern changing conditions, especially where traditional respect for the "alders" is lessening amongst the younger generation.

This was Wr. Brasel's first patrol and although parts of it were "solo" he was yet under eleve supervision of the Officer in Charge. His report is well written, but in the future, I feel he should aim for a longer marrative, as prostice in observation and reporting. He has not, for instance, commented on Census figures, or indicated trends revealed by these. Census figures have been retained to Wapenmands for re-checking, as there appears to be considerable discrepancy between present figures and the previous ones.

This outbreak of inter-clan fighting, was probably no more serious in actuality than other brawls of similar mature in this Sub-District. There were no fatalities, although a number of people were wounded, and within a few hours pe ce was restored.

However, I consider its implications to be mary serious. The most disturbing feature is that it took place in the presence of a patrol, and that the people appeared to have previously preapred for a fight, notwithstanding that they knew the patrol was in the area. On the day of the fight, but prior to it, Mr.Hogg saw me at BIRIP where I was on patrol, and during discussion of the land dispute at PAIRAP, he told me that he had heard remour that the people were going to fight in any ensu-

This incident brings out, I think, two major pointer firstly, the failure of the apparent administration policy of adopting a "head in the sand" attitude towards disputes over native land, in this Sub-District at any rate, and secondly, the contempt with which the law is regarded as a result of this failure. The greatest administrative problem in the Wabag Sub-District is dispute over land ownership, and the lack of adequate legal machinery to handle it has tanded to foster dis-illusionment with the law generally. During my previous texe at Wabag, wideopread dispute over land was evident, but it seldem and have some assurance that they would not settle the matter by fighting. Since then, and especially since the repeal of powers to settle land ownership dispute under the Bative Administration Regulations, the position has deterformed.

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The next obvious development is for an Administration patrol to become more actively in volved in a land fight, with positive risk of injury to both Natives and patrol personnel. I do not think it is being hysterical to predict such an event. Although Mr. Hogg does not ment omit in his memo. an arrow was discharged in the direction of himself and a Police Constabl but wast wide. However, in the half-dark, it was not possible to determine whether it was intentionally shot in their direction, or was fired at random by an excited participant in the fight.

MINDLE LAI CRISHS DIVISION

Fience find attached a report on the abovementioned patrol written by Mr.J.Brazel, C.P.O. For a major part of this patrol I accompanied Mr.Brazel in a supervisory and advisory separity, this being his first patrol.

The mative situation has charged little since the provious patrol, the only incident worthy of econent being the outbreak of fighting between the HANGAILA, ROIP and KALLP Subgroup of the TFIGHT Group and the WARGHIN subgroup of the KANDAUALIN Group. Breats which led up to the outbreak of fighting were as follows:

Shortly prior to this patrol nombors of the WAPCHIN Jub-group complained of treepassing by the TEIGIN Group on land which the WAPC-HIS claimed. The land disputed is known as "PAIMAP". I referred to the land court records and found that a C.H.A. hearing into this dispute had been conducted by P.O. J.HANNAN on 12th June, 1998. I employee a copy of the feeluies and skotch may for your information. You will note that the skotch map clearly shows the boundaries of the disputed area. In the course of the hearing Mr.Hannan placed markers along those boundaries and it appears that the presence of these markers was a primary sause of the dispute.

Although there is no doubt that Hr.Haman clearly indicated that the boundary markers were merely a delineation of the disputed area for the benefit of a future hearing by the Estive Land Countscience, the TSIGIN Group choose to identify these markers as the legal land use boundaries, and claimed the right to garden all land to the Vest of the markers. Consequently they moved thei, accuses and gardens right up against this boundary although it appears that they lived, at the time of the hearing, some distance back from the demarcation line. The VAPOKIN were refused the right to garden the land under dispute under threat of hydical violence, and quite rightly complaimed to this effice.

Incidentally, the WAPOKIE instigated the completint against the TSIGIN and KUMBAGIE which resulted in the C.N.A. hearing in 1958 .

On the 6th June, I visited "PAIRAP" and walked over the disputed land in company with the disputants. It was obvious that feelings were running high, and that as a C.N.A. hearing had already been conducted, little could be done. I had made arrangements for police to move out to RAUANDA on the morning of the 7th, and as you are aware, them visited you at MRIP to discuss the matter. It was decided that the implications of the provious decision be clearly described to the disputants. This is what I did when I returned to RAUANDA. In effect, the TSIGIN and WAPONIN were told that neither group had been given sole land use rights over the disputed oren, and that in point of low teither group could legally stop the other from gardening the land under dispute.

The members of the TSIGH Group very dispesed to argue for the sale rights to parter the disputed land, but I excluded that the metter was sublide or juricationize. 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

WAPENAMANDA to YAGAINDIS. Departed for YAGAINDIS at 3-00 p.m. per Land-Rover arriving at 3-30 p.m. Bridge already started though not in the position originally intended. Too late to alter it so proceeded until dark when the main supports and bearers on the Mt. Hagen side were in position.

TSIGIN-WAP& ANGALIA groups. Risters arrested and charged. After lunch departed for VAIBOS per Land-Rover and called census of DEP-KUNBA and KANDAUALIN groups- risters from these two groups arrested and taken back to RAUANDA where they were charged. Left MAIBOS and travelled to BIRIP per Land-Rover to report to A/A.D.O. (WABAG). Return ed RAUANDA and further rioters who had not attended census were brought in and charged. Parade 6 p.m.

Friday Sth June.

At RAUANDA. W lked to MAIBOS to take statements from three wounded WAPOKIN patives accompanied by P.C. and Interpreter. Arrived VAIBOS 31-50 a.m. Took statements and after inspecting Clinic walked back to RAUANDA arriving at 2 p.m. Afternoon spent assisting P.O.Hogg in investigation and taking statements.

Saturday 9th June.

At RAUANDA. P.O. Hogg departed for WAPENAMANDA per Land-Rover at 9-00 a.m.

Spent morning working on tax/census figr- and later inspected Aid-Post. Afternoon spent inspecting road as far as fINA Catholic Mission Station. Road in very poor condition and recommended to Officials that several bridges be repaired and/or replaced. Inspected Mission and retuned to RAUANDA.

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Sunday 10th June.

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END OF BLARS.

INTRODUCTION:

This patrol was primarily for the purpose of a Tax/census revision in the Middle Lai Census Division. At the same time whilst I devoted myself to the Tax/census revision I also made road and house inspections in the area. The majority of the people were seen on this patrol except for a few aged who were unable to attend the census because of sickness and infinity.

The patrol itself was not a continuous one, the first few days being spent at YAGAINDIS on the main MT.MAGEN-WABAG road replacing a bridge which had been destroyed by a "flash" flood. This was my first experience on patrol and although I was out for only five days it was a useful experience.

For the remainder of the patrol, that is the Tax/census revision part of the patrol, I was accompanied by P.C.Nogg who was always ready to assist and give advice where it was needed. During the entire part of this patrol as well as conducting the Tax/census revision, house, latrine and garden inspections were made whenever possible. The hearing of courts and general minor disputed was left to P.C.Hogg to conduct.

NATIVE AFFAIRS:

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On Wednesday 6th June, P.C. Hogg walked to PAIRAP to investigate a land dispute. At about 2 p.m. the disputants gathered in force outside the Rest-house and there was a general atmosphere of uncasiness and discontent about the land decision. At 4 p.m. or thereabouts a rist broke out between a limited number of Sub-groups WAP & MANGALIA, KOIP & KALIP of the TSIGIN group and Sub-groups WAPOKIN and KUMBAGIN of the KANDAUALIN group.

The fighting commenced at the Rost-house and was quickly broken-up. Fighting started soon after at PAIRAP the site of the land in dispute and it was here that it was most intense- several natives of both the TSIGIN and WAPOKIN groups were wounded with arrows. One native from the WAPOKIN group was ambushed and received an axe wound in the lung. However this wound was not fatal as at first anticipated and he is now recovering in the Latheram Mission Hospital at Mambisanda. The rioters were quickly dispersed and word was sent to WAPENAMANDA and WARAG for police reinforcements. These police camped along the road overnight to prevent any further onthreak of fighting. The following day the alleged rioters were identified, arrested and charged. As in generally accepted there is a great land shortage in this

area and hence there is always plenty of friction between groups over the ownership and use of land. Apart from the disturbance at RAUANDA there was no other trouble experienced but the general atmosphere is quite tense where land ownership and usufractory rights are concerned and trouble can be expected to occur at any time.

It is carious to note that the people re always ready and willing to come to the government for advice and assistance with their land problems but at the same time if they do not gain satisfaction from the government they then think the only way to settle an altercation is by use of force. It is important that they should learn to accept the decisions of the government officers on their problems if they come to the government for assistance, but this will probably take some time.

The people are fairly "court-minded" in this area and it was noted that quite a considerable number of petty disputes were brought to the attention of P.O.Hogg. The Village Officials were reminded of their duties and encouraged to d settle as many disputes as they could. Only when the parties could not derive satisfaction from this writtration and conciliation should the matters be brought to the notice of the government officers. This patrol was a good opportunity to see as many of the people as possible decause of this the people raised as many of their problems as they could and I endeavoured to satisfy of these problems as I could.

ROADS AND BRIDGES:

is mentioned before, the first few days of the patrol were spent renewing a bridge at YAGAINDIS on the main NT.HAGEX-BIRGS road. At all places visited the roads were inspected and the Village Officials advised to make repairs and carry out mintenance where it was needed. The main road between WELVA and YAIROS is in quite good condition and the bridges are also quite serviceable.

The branch road to RAUANDA which also serves PINA Catholic Mission Station is in very poor condition however and the people were advised of this fact. A number of bridges and drains were in immediate need of repair and the Village Officials were advised to exhort the people to carry out these repairs as soon as possible. However considering this road is used fairly seldem especially between PINA and RAUANDA it is not really necessary that it should have the same maintenance as say, the MT.RAD.N.RAG road. Of course it is necessary

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that as far as PINA the road should be in fairly good condition to serve Mission traffic but the remainder is not so important as this portion of the road goes only as far as the Nest-house at RANANDA.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS:

The Village Officials do not seem to be settling the number of disputes of which they are capable. Although these disputes are only of a minor civil nature involving such questions as bride-price and other native custom when a decision of mutual agreement cannot be achieved by both parties, the disputants always come to the government officer for advice and assistance. This is invariably the case and whether it is because the people do not respect the Village Officials' authority or perhaps think they may be biassed in their decisions is difficult to say, but it was recommended that the Officials settle as many complaints as possible - of a minor nature that is, involving matters of native custom. The Village Officials are always willing to organise labour within their groups for such work as bridge-construction and road maintenance.

MISSIONS:

The New Guinee Lutheren Mission (Missouri Synod) is one of two Missions operating in this area and is very well established having stations at AMAPIAN, YAIROS, KUMHASARAM, MAMBESANDA, PAUSA and TARAMANDA. All these stations are manned and supervised by Europeans as well as having mative assistants. At AMAPIAN is the European boarding-school in this area and has a reputation in this district and elsewhere, for a wery high standard of primary education. At YAIBOS there is a saw-mill and Aid-Post. KUMBASANAM is the bulk store which supplies groceries and hardware to the other Mission stations. MANSISANDA is a very well equipped and up-to-date Hospital having accommodation for f both native and European patients. It is staffed by a European doctor, three European Firses and a European pharmacist. At PAUSA there is a native boarding-school and at YARAMANDA there is a day-school.

The Roman Catholic Mission of The Divine Word (MT.HAGEN) has stations at PINA and POMPARUS. At both these stations Mission schools are run for the natives and instruction is given in First-Aid as well as other subjects. There is an Aid-Post at PINA and agricultural instruction is also given to the natives.

REST-HOUSES :

The general condition of the Rest-houses was quite good except at WELYA and YAGAINDIS where it was recommended that new Rest-houses be built. The other Rest-bouses where the patrol stayed are situated at -YARDWANDA, RAUANDA, VAIBOS, PAUS and POMPABUS. There is also a new Rest-house at LAMANDEIMANDE but the patrol did not stay there as it was reportedly not completed at the time the patrol was in this area, so the IDAGON-MUPARARD group came to PAUS for the Tax/census revision.

CONCLUSION:

The general native situation in this area is quite good despite the incident at RAUANDA. The natives are all very keen to improve their general living standards and to secure some type of cash economy. At the moment they do have vegetables which they can grow and sell to the Lutheran Mission at KUMBASAKAM but this is very limited, as is the sale of vegetables to the European settlers generally in this area.

The number of coffee trees being planted in the area is also increasing but here again there is an obstacle because of the limits of the market. The land problem has to be considered here also and some effective remedy will have to be found for this problem, possibly some type of restilement programme or something of the sort, before any really serious casheropping scheme can be instituted.

APPENDIX B

MEDICAL AND MEALTH:

Generally the natives are quite healthy in this area and the only complaints which came to my attention were skin ailments of various types which seem prevalent amongst young children especially, due no doubt to the lack of protein in their diet.

Government Aid-Posts are established at WELYA, WAPENAWANDA and at RAUANDA. The general condition of these is quite good especially at RAUANDA where the Native Medical Orderly has done a very good job in maintaining a very high standard of cleanliness. The Aid-Post and Hospital is well laid out surrounded by a good garden and it is pleasing to note that the Orderly is taking such pride in his work.

Mission Aid-Posts are established at YAIBOS, PAUSA and YARAMANDA and there is also the Latheran Mission Hospital at MANDISANDA which bas accommodation for the sick native population of the area as well as the European settlers.

The people at YAGAINDIS requested that a Government Aid-Post be established there though in my opinion there is no great need for an Aid-Post in this area. The nearest Government Aid-Post is at WELVA which is about three-quarter's of an hour's walk away and the mearest Mission Aid-Post is at YARAMANDA also about three-quarter's of an hour's walk from YAGAINDIS. I do not think it would be any great hardship for out-patients to walk this distance.

Altogether the area is quite well covered as far as Aid-Posts are concerned and the natives have no cause for complaint regarding medical treatment.

APPENDIX C.

FOOD AND AGRICULTURE:

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The general fertility of the soil in this area is very good and showed a definite improvement at the lower altitudes. At all Rest-bouses food was plentiful and the people when requested for food provided ample quantities.

As mentioned previously the people are very anxious to obtain same type of cash economy in the area and so improve their general living stamiard. With the presence of an agricultural Officer now stationed at APENAMANNA it is hoped that he may be able to find a suitable remedy for this problem Already some of the people have started to grow peannts but this is main y to supplement their diet of sweet potate and other foolspit is not I understand part of any system of cash-cropping. It is noped to foster the cultivation of pyrethrum eventually but this is rather a long term view and may take many years to establish.
