# What would you like to say to the Revelle College student body?

#### Provost's Corner

I'd like to welcome all new students and welcome back all continuing students to Revelle College and UCSD. The purpose of this article and others like it, which I hope will follow, is to try to explain some of the academic features of the campus and assist students in achieveing their academic goals.

Since I hope to open a two way dialogue, perhaps I should first tell you a little bit about myself. I am a faculty member in the chemistry department, having come to Revelle in 1967. I have been Provost of Revelle for seven years. In this position I see that all academic and student leadership opportunities are widely available.

If you have questions or complaints in these areas, please feel free to make an appointment to see me (534-1571).

For this first article, I thought I would give some advice on how to do well in you classes at UCSD. This should be one of your objectives, though certainly not the only one while here. I am the first to admit that much of education takes place outside of the classroom and that many of our most successful students do not graduate with spectacular GPAs.

You will soom learn that the faculty has high expectations of you. Learn to stay cought up!
Try to put in at least 12 hours a week in your "big" courses and

mot much less in the others. This should mean at least forty hours a week studying, outside of class. Hide out in Central, Bio-med, or S&L libraries if the dorms are too noisy for you.

Use old exams, soft reserves, older students, etc. to test your understanding of the material. Study alone at first, then get together in a group. Have a weekly study schedule and reward yourself for sticking to it. (But, likewise, give up something if you don't.)

Finally, keep a social life.
Whether it's intramurals or
parties, make the most of your
time. There's an old Revelle
saying: "Work hard. Play hard.
When you're working, don't
play, and vice versa."

If you find that you are not performing to your ability, get help fast. Don't be afraid to use your prof's office hours and to check out all the TAs in a class. If you feel "unmotivated", the most common excuse I hear for a poor record, see an advisor in the Provost's Office. Be sure to get your academic advice in our office.

I hope I'll get to know everyone who has read thus far. Now it's time to stop procrastinating and put your plan into action. If we can help, please let us know!

# Editorial: The Gulf Crisis By Dan Bonguard

The Russians are predicting World War III.

General Mikhail A.

Moiseyev, the soviet military
commander, remarked in an
interview with The Washington
Post that "in case of military
actions, Iran will join the Iraqi
side." He further predicted that in
such a case, the Gulf Conflict
would turn into a world war.

General Moiseyev does have a point. The Gulf Conflict could very easily escalate into a war, even a world war. But what it will not do is become a bonafide World War.

Allow me to explain the critical difference between World War and world war. World War I was a true World War, with the powers of Great Britain, France, Russia, and the United States opposing Germany and Austria-Hungary. World War Two was a similar conflict, with Italy and Japan siding with Germany. In both cases, the struggle was between two approximately equal forces. That is what it takes to make a World War - two large and approximately balanced forces opposing each other. In modern times, the often-predicted Third World War would see the United States face the Soviet Union in a brief and mutually fatal nuclear encounter. This is not what will come of the Gulf

The crisis in the Persian Gulf is a potential world war — lower

conflict.

case. The reason for such a designation is that this confrontation does not feature two equal and opposed sides. Instead, the Gulf Conflict pits Iraq (and possibly Iran) against the United States, the Soviet Union, China, Britain, France, Japan, Israel, Germany, Canada, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Syria, Jordan, and even the perpetually neutral Switzerland. And on top of all that, the United Nations has condemned Iraq and authorized blockades of all shipping and air traffic.

There is no way Iraq could survive an armed conflict with combined armies better trained, better equipped, and over ten times the size of its own. Unless Saddam Hussein is truly as crazy as he has been portrayed, he will do his best to avoid war. Despite his calls for the destruction of the United States, Hussein has yet to attack, showing that he has at least a rudimentary level of sanity.

Iraq's only chance of victory lies along the path it currently follows — to out-wait the United States, and hope that the American people grow tired of the constant tension and fear. When the first shots are fired, if they are fired at all, the bullets will be ours, not theirs.

Saddam Hussein does not pose as great a threat to the world as many people imagine. There may be war. There will be no World War III.



#### Review: Zeppelin in Space
