

Report of Woitape Patrol No.5/59-60 to AUGA C.D.

1. Attached please find two copies of the above report in patrol covers.
2. In a month when over 19 inches of rain fell in this area, it is pleasing that so little delay was caused to this patrol by rain — I understand that this was due mainly to the fact that the people had complied with Mr. Wadsworth's request last year to construct patrol shelters at each census point.
3. The patrol seems to have followed the usual pattern of patrolling in this Administrative Area though large-scale census evasions as described in para. 2 are unusual — usually the people return from the dance for a few days of cleaning up, census revision etc and then back to the dance. This dance, incidentally, was finally completed on 14th April. I have heard a rumour that the reason why not even one minor case of assault was brought to the patrol in one village was that the particular V.C. thought that the causing of extra work for the patrol officer would jeopardise his chances of getting a Special Arms Permit and so instructed his co-villagers not to make any complaints to Mr. Duffy — if such could be proved the V.C. would be on a charge under the Native Regulations.
4. While the Dept. of Forests is considering the possibility of developing the timber stands in the AUGA-IVANE divide, it is obvious that the main chance of economic progress in this census division is in agriculture. Whilst I have seen parts of the Sub-District other than those seen by Mr. Duffy, I would agree that this census division has the greatest agricultural potential of this Administrative Area. There are two main handicaps — lack of communications i.e. roads and lack of an Extension Officer. The way to overcome these two handicaps is obvious but whether they will be overcome in the near future is doubtful.
5. Mr. Duffy has carried out this patrol thoroughly and this report together with other related correspondence has covered all outstanding matters except that no report on the FANE land investigation has been received.

Departed FANE for GAIVA where census revised and tax collected GAIVA. Slept GAIVA Rest House.

Sunday 20 March.

Departed GAIVA for BELAVISTA where remained overnight.

Monday 21 March.

Census revision and tax collection BELAVISTA at BELAVISTA. Remained overnight BELAVISTA Rest House.

Tuesday 22 March.

Court for Native Matters convened at BELAVISTA. One defendant convicted to one month I.H.L. under Reg. 84(1), and one to one month under Reg. 84 (2). Thence to MAFULU where census revised GEPARA and tax collected. Aid Post inspected. Slept MAFULU Rest House.

Wednesday 23 March.

Census revised and tax collected MAFULU. Carriers thence direct to IGUAI and writer to IGUAI via GEPARA. Slept IGUAI Rest House.

Thursday 24 March.

Census revised and tax collected KAILAPE and ARIONE at IGUAI. Minor disputes arbitrated. Slept IGUAI R.H.

Friday 25 March.

Census revised and tax collected IGUAI. Thence to GURORO where slept Rest House.

Saturday 26 March.

Census revised and tax collected GARIMA 1 and 2 at GURORO. Slept GURORO Rest House.

Sunday 27 March.

Census revised and tax collected GURORO. Thence to KONE where met by Fr. FOURNIER. Remained overnight KONE Mission house.

Monday 28 March.

Census revision LAVAVAI, LEDANA, KONE and BAIDANA tax collected at KONE. Slept KONE Rest House.

Tuesday 29 March.

Departed KONE for ARIOME in Ivane valley where remained overnight.

Wednesday 30 March.

Census revision, tax collection AROMAITSI, KOPUKORO and ARIOME Villages at ARIOME. Slept ARIOME.

Thursday 31 March.

Census revision and tax collection MOINGGILI at ARIOME. Thence to KOSIPI where slept C.Mission.

END OF DIARY.

INTRODUCTION.

1. The AUGA Census Division covered by the patrol has been extended for better Administration to now include five villages formerly in the IVANE Census Division. The Census Division now includes all villages in the AUGA/KAILAPE falls and in the upper reaches of the IVANE River. The AUGA/KAILAPE falls last received a Department of Native Affairs patrol in May of 1959 while the IVANE River Villages were last patrolled in November 59. Prior to that patrolling had been infrequent and irregular.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

2. The patrol was favourably received throughout and little or no trouble was experienced in obtaining foodstuffs and carriers. Throughout the entire Census Division efforts had been made to repair roads and rest houses. The people were happy to receive the patrol and brought a number of minor disputes to the attention of the patrol. Most of these were settled amicably without court action and in only two cases was the Court for Native Matters convened. Both of these concerned adultery complaints and the defendants were sentenced to one and three months I.H.L. respectively under Reg. 84 N.R.O's.

3. Census revision attendance was on the whole pleasing. In only one instance was there any deliberate census evasion this being at MONDO where a number of KARAME and MONDO people (including the KARAME V.C.) absented themselves to attend a dance at ONONGGE. There was no excuse for this action as they had been advised two weeks earlier at MONDO of the impending patrol by Constable BETRUS and again reminded a week later at ONONGGE by Constable VAIDE. The adult male offenders were consequently prosecuted in the C.M.N., 22 being sentenced to one month I.H.L., one to 2 months I.H.L. and three fined ten shillings.

4. The native situation was peaceful and not even one complaint of minor assault was made to the patrol. The AUGA/KAILAPE area has been free from major crime for some years and the people there do not appear to be as volatile as in the TAU'ADE area. An item of great interest to them is the issue of Special Arms Permits and there is no objection to the issue of same to the more responsible officials.

5. The people of the UPPER IVANE valley (MOINGGILI, AROMAITAI, ARIOME and KOPUKORU villages) are not so responsive and showed less interest in the patrol. The influence of the "model village" at TANIPAI near ARIOME (para 7 TAPINI Patrol No.4/59-60) unfortunately has not spread, although there has been a slight expansion at TANIPAI itself. At KOSIPI the interest in and influence of the recently established mission school remains high with consequent benefits to economic village spheres.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & NATIVE AGRICULTURE.

7. In the AUGA valley, there are a number of pockets of flatter land, especially on the middle and higher slopes. In quite a few places mostly on the southern fall these are large enough for european development of coffee without causing any undue land pressure on the population. The people also expressed their willingness to alienate land for European settlers. However, before any developments of this nature could take place, transport difficulties would have to be overcome. Of the Gailala Sub-District seen by the writer, this valley appears to have the greatest potential for coffee. The KAILAPE valley and IVANE valley near ARIOME are overall too steep for any use other than the present subsistence pattern while the KOSIPI area has possibilities for commercial vegetable gardening.

8. The main cash income is from the sale of excess foodstuffs to FANE, WOITAPE and KOSIPI this being supplemented by the sale of coffee to FANE and WOITAPE. The present level of economic development is not at a high level, although in most villages coffee blocks are found.

9. Representations were made to the patrol for assistance in extending coffee plots and in cultivation methods.

10. There was no shortage of foodstuffs throughout the C.D. and if anything they were in excess of needs. Introduced vegetables were in poor supply and condition, due to lack of suitable seed. The people were advised that seeds were usually available at WOITAPE. Domestic pigs were plentiful and in good condition but poultry were rare.

HEALTH AND HYGENE.

11. Medical treatment for these people is available at MAFULU Aid Post, FANE and KOSIPI Mission Stations. The Aid Post was inspected and is covered by memorandum 49-9-1/6.

12. A superficial check of the people was made by the patrol. Apart from a few minor sores and burnes and a few cases of influenza and malaria, their general health was pleasing. One burn case and a few with minor sores were sent to FANE. A few cases of goitre were noted around MAFULU.

MISSIONS AND EDUCATION.

13. Education is almost solely in the hands of the Catholic Mission in Papua, the only Mission in the area, which has established main stations at FANE and KOSIPI. A central boarding school for the whole Gailala Sub-District with (at present) about 120 boarders is being operated at KOSIPI. Extensive effort is being made to improve and expand this school and teachers training should shortly be commenced. At KOSIPI and FANE are the only schools of a high standard, but it is believed that they have not yet been inspected for official recognition. Sub standard schools for elementary learning are also found at IEME, MONDO, BELAVISTA, MAFULU, IGUAI, GARIMA, KONE and TANIPAI. It is planned to expand the KONE school into a central village school with a certificated teacher in charge.

14. Only two pupils attend the Administration school at TAPINI, one of these being the child of a station employee.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.


15. Bridle paths extend through all of the C.D. apart from a section of about 13 miles from near DIGURENDA to the junction with the WOITAPE - KOSIPI road. This section has been pegged and work has already commenced from the DIGURENDA end. When completed this path will be of great benefit to all inhabitants of the AUGA valley, giving them a direct link with woitape P.P..

16. Bridle paths already in the C.D. were in good condition with evidence of recent repairs. There are five bridges in the C.D. and of these the one spanning the IVANE River near ARIOME is the only one which will need repairs shortly.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

17. The standard of Village Officials in the C.D. ranged from good to fair. The V.C. of KARAME was sentenced to two months I.H.L. for census evasion and, if his standard of work does not improve after his release, his dismissal could be considered.

18. No recommendations for appointment or dismissal of Village Constables are made and in covering memorandum 92-2-1/22 the appointment of four new Councillors is recommended.
