

The Juilliard String Quartet to perform

January 13, 1983

The Juilliard String Quartet will perform at 8 p.m. Saturday, January 29, in the Mandeville Center Auditorium at the University of California, San Diego.

The ensemble will perform Mozart's Quartet in G Major, K. 387; Sessions' Second String Quartet and Beethoven's Quartet in C Major, Op. 59, No. 3.

The Juiliard String Quartet is generally recognized as one of the finest quartets in the world. Its repertoire comprises 580 full length works, ranging from the classics such as compositions by Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven and Schubert to those by the moderns including Bartok, Webern, Schoenberg, Ginaster. The quartet has from its beginnings championed the works of American composers, including Copland, Sessions, Babbitt and Carter among others.

The Juilliard String Quartet was founded in 1946 with the active cooperation of the Juilliard School president William Schuman. It is now the quartet-in-residence at the Juilliard School, where its members have trained many of the members of today's most prominent quartets. The LaSalle, the Tokyo and the Concord Quartets were all founded with the help of the Juilliard Quartet.

All the members of the quartet are American born and trained. Robert Mann is first violinist; Earl Carlyss is second violinist: Samuel Rhodes is violist and Joel Krosnick is cellist.

The January 29 concert is the second in the Chamber Music Series sponsored by the University Events Office at UCSD. Tickets are \$12 for the general public and \$5.50 for UCSD students. Tickets are available at the UCSD Central Box Office.
