

PATROL REPORT No. 1 1958/) FINSCHHAFEN

Your 30-9-140 of 27th January, 1959 was apparently written before receipt of my 34-3-1/52 of 15th January, wherein I made certain recommendations for land acquisitions in the Siassi Group.

Whilst there may be a reasonable case for the establishment of a Patrol Post in the Siassi Group there are far more pressing needs in this District and I do not intend to make a recommendation at this stage.

Since the war these people have been administered from Finschhafen; they were later transferred to the New Britian District under the Assistant District Officer Talas, and several years ago were again transferred back to the administrative control of the Assistant District Officer, Finschhafen. I believe that the Siassi Group can best be administered from Finschhafen and do not consider that any consideration should be given to again transferring the area back to the New Britian District.

Long Island has not been considered as an area for re-settlement, not because it is in the Madang District but because there is sufficient land available on UMBOI Island and because the UMBOI Islanders are willing to make land available if required.

- 4. Please let me know of any recommendation for further resettlement and submit a case for the actablishment of a patrol post in the islands. Would these people be better administered from New Britain where it may be possible to obtain areas of land for re-settlement? You might take this matter up direct with the District Officer Rabaul.
- 5. I do not know whether it is not a good thing to settle domestic differences at village level so long as decisions are acceptable to those concerned.
- 6. He s Long Island been considered as an area for re-settlement?
- 7. A very well reported patrol in which the reporting officer has made a very capable assessment of the people's needs and difficulties.

The above report is forwarded.

I will be proceeding to SIASSI early in January and the problem of the landless island communities, which has been the subject of numerous earlier reports, will be gone into and some effort made to put an end to many of the troubles existing in that area.

It is agreed that a Patrol Post in the Siassi Group would be of great assistance to the islanders but such a move is definitely not intended in the foreseeable future.

I agree with the Assistant District Officer Finschhafen and see no reason what-so-ever for AROP being included in the MOROBE District.

I am writing to the Assistant District Officer, Finschhafen advising him that shotgun licenses may be issued providing the applicants comply with Department of Native Affairs Circular Memorandum No. 150 of 29th September, 1957.

I will edvise the patrolling officer that he has no authority to prevent the people returning to TOLOKIWA should they so desire.

Relevant extracts on Health, Education and Apriculture have been forwarded to the various Departments for their cormation and action as necessary.

Mr. Green has submitted a good report.

Attached are the necessary copies of the above report for perusal and distribution please.

The collection of tax and the consolidation of F.M.D.S. Shares is a job well completed.

It is apparent that a Patrol Post on STASSI with an energetic officer in charge would improve the position both economically as well as administratively.

Remarks re the siting of the village higher school at BUNSIL are bolstered by the Australian Lutheran Mission based on SIASGI and it amears that although this was the proposed Patrol Post site it is definitely not suitable.

An cirstrip on STASSI will certainly improve communications.

The matter of AROP coming into the Finschhafen Sub-district would not be feasible as communications would be more difficult than at present in the case of an eruption and evacuation measures. the matter of equal taxation is worth considering. However

Mr. Green has carried out a good patrol and with the completion of the HUBE division taxation will be completed before Kmas.

INTRODUCTION:

The objects of this patrol were to collect personal tax in the Siassi Islands Census Division, to amend the census, to compile a register of shareholders from village contributions made to the embyro Finschhafen Marketing and Development Society by the Siassi and Sio people and to carry out routine native administration.

patrol departed no funds for payment of carriers were available in the sub-district, particularly as this was a tax patrol, but the people showed no resentment of this situation, on the contrary, when the position was explained to a meeting of village officials at Gizarum prior to the commencement of the patrol they accepted it with alacrity. This is the best illustration that can be given of the good relations that exist between the Administration and the Siassi people.

(Yabim = meeting) when representatives of each Siassi

community and members of the Australian Lutheran Mission
gathered for their annual conference.

The last census patrol to the area was conducted by the writer in Jan/Feb 1958. There has been no medical patrol cince Mr. Carlaw's visit in January 1957.

NATIVE AFFAIRS:

The future of the landless island communities is still the major problem of the division. This matter was raised by the writer in Finschhafen patrol report no.9 of 1957/58 and an investigation of the situation was made by the then Acting Assistant District Officer at Finschhafen (T. W. White) and summarised in the Finschhafen patrol report no.10 of 1957/58. In that report he made recommendations for possible solutions to the perplexity but to date the only recommendation carried into effect has been the removal of ten families from overcrowded Aramot Island to rearby, Administration owned Mutu Mulau Island. This move, to alleviate the almost slum conditions on Aramot, was effected only after the people concerned had tried every excuse in the Aramot book, and that covers a breathtaking rangem of excuses indeed. Now that they are settled however, they appear quits content on Mutu Mulau and it seems distinctly possible that other Aramot families may be encouraged to join them. No suggestion of this was made by thi patrol as it will probably be more opportune to raise the matter later. The achievement to date should be consolidated first and with this in mind it was mentioned to the residents on Mutu Mulau that if they became a settled community the Administration would possibly consider transferring ownership of the island to them some time in the future.

However that is but one minor facet of a most intricate problem solved. We are still faced with a rapidly increasing island population which is landless and whose trading system, the means of survival in the past, is gradually disintegrating. There is constant bickering between the islanders and the nearby Kaimangas on Umboi Island generally to do with the islanders stealing butoften, too, the standers counter charge that the mainlanders are charging exorbitant prices for food. Once again the patrol was approached to lay down fixed prices for food stuffs, despite the fact that this was done only in April of this year and prior to that by almost every patrol through the area. It seems impossible for the

people to reach agreement amongst themselves any more.

Representatives of most of the island communities asked the writer if anything was being done to purchase the land for them to plant gardens and economic crops and this can be interpreted as an encouraging sign of increasing awareness amongst the islanders themselves of the significance of their problem. It is believed that the District Officer intends investigating the matter in the near future so no action was taken by this patrol other than to ascertain that the Kaimanga villages concerned are still willing to dispose of arable land for the use of the islanders.

Although the writer is aware of the considerations involved he feels that the case for the establishment of a permenent patrol post should be stated. Purely from the population viewpoint other areas must be given priority over Siassi, but is population an important factor in this inctance? let us a naider the following points-

- (a) the problem outlined above. If solved, that is if
 large areas of land are purchased from certain Umboi
 villages by the Administration for development by the
 landless island people then fairly constant expervision
 will be necessary if the scheme is to be given any
 chance, of success and certainly more than that
 afforded by an annual, or at best bi-annual patrol.
 The seriousn as of this situation makes it necessary
 that firm action be taken within the next few years
 so the establishment of a patrol post should not be
 shelved until the too distant future.
- (b) The isolation of the division is made even more extreme by the fact that the Vitiaz strait, which separates the Sisssi Island group from the New Guinea mainland, is a particularly rough stretch of water.
- (c) The Siassi people, especially the Kowai -speaking group, are fiery tempered. Vicious assaults, particularly on their woman-folk, are common, as is

riotous behaviour. At present many such assaults are not brought to court simply because there is no way of getting there. This sometimes results in abuses of authority by village officials who, trying in good faith to restore order, take the law into their own hands. Puvely by accident this patrol found out a man who had beaten his wife so severely that he had broken a bone in her arm. The village officials were not going to mention it because it had occurred some months previously and anyway they had "settled." it in the village. A patrol post on the spot would go a long way towards eliminating these too provalent cases of assault and help to bring about a much better relationship between the sexes generally. This is an important need in Administration on Siassi because the women are treated very badly indeed. E ry move made by the local missionaries towards female education in any form meets with stiff opposition from the village leaders, including the luluais and tultuls.

development especially as regards cocca. These people are most anxious to improve themselves and cocca is the popular crop. So far they have had no Administration assistance whatsoever, in fact they have been told they must not plant cocca. This has not deterred some of them from planting, it has only deterred them from planting it where it will be noticed by patrols. There is a great agricultural potential here, in cocca, copra and Robusta coffee, there is also enthusiasm, but there is no guiding hand.

Apparently BUNSIL has been considered a likely cite if and when a patrol post can be established on Siassi but it would now seem unsuitable. (See EDUCATION)

Another matter raised in the last report was the wish of the AROP (Long) Island people to be included in the Finschhafen SubDistrict. It appears this was not considered important as nothing more has been heard of the matter but at the annual mission conference held at BARANG village, which was attended by the writer, a Luluai from

Arop renewed the request and it was promised that his wish would be made known. Even if there seems little reason for a transfer there does seem to be a case for better liaison between Saidor and Finschhafen Sub-district headquar Frs regarding tax rates. This year Arop had to pay £1 whereas the Finschhafen group paid only 10/-. It is not known if this has caused any ill-feeling on Long Island but it certainly has puzzled many people.

Shotgun Licences.

Many Siassi villages are harassed by wild pigs which abound throughout Umboi Island and requests for shotgums were received from several communities. These were investigated and it is recommended that the following natives be permitted to purchase shotgums. They are all responsible men.

Not only are gardens badly damaged by wild pigs but new coconut plantations have been practically wiped out. This has caused a good deal of frustration amongst the people as these coconuts were planted on the advice of patrolling officers.

Taxation.

A total of £611-5-0 was collected; 1157 tax receipts were issued and 413 exemptions were granted.

As anticipated no difficulty was encountered in collecting the tex. It has been mentioned in the Introduction to this report however that it was most unfortunate that no funds were available for the payment of carriers as this would have added considerably to goodwill on the first tax patrol to the area. The compilation of tax registers and collection of tax is a dreary and time-consuming task and it is to be hoped that this does not become a regular D.N.A. function,

but that special tax collectors, who do not mind the stigma of being such, can be appointed. Otherwise the future looks very dull indeed.

It is recommended that the 1959 tax rate remain at 10/- because there has been no noticeable improvement in the economy of the division, over the past 12 months.

Trochus fishing, one of the main sources of income for these people, has petered out owing to the fallen market for that commodity, but this should be offset by an increased copra production with better return to the producer when the Finschhafen Marketing and Development Society commences operations.

Villagos.

The general standard of villages on Sizesi remains higher than in most other parts of the sub-district. The villages of MARARAMU, GASAM, GOM and MARLI which were found in unsatisfactory condition by the last patrol have all been improved considerably so that now every village in the area is in reasonable condition. In some places minor improvements are to be effected to housing and sanitation and in those cases the village book has been noted accordingly.

The village of MANTAGEN was established in 1954 by descendants of the survivors of the tidal wave which swamped villages in that region when Ritter Island erupted late in the 19th. century. The people desirous of returning to their land came from Tolokiwa Island villages and Barim. They were allowed to migrate to Mantagen only after a careful investigation had been carried out by the then Assistant District Officer at Finschhafen (B. Bunting). The community has always been a small one and, on present trends, has only a 50-50 chance of survival. Because of its isolation other villages are unwilling to allow their women to marry into Mantagen and there are no women of marriageable age in the village itself. Several of the families who migrated in from Tolokiwa Island approached this patrol with the request that they be allowed to return to Tolokiwa. This request was refused because:-

- (a) It was obviously inspired by disagreement between the lulual Tawadit, who is a Barim and who has made his people put their shoulders to the wheel since they moved to Mantagen. The lethargic Tolokiwas have not taken to this hard work too kindly and yearn for their former indolent existence.
- (b) These people have a definite future at Mantagen where the soil is excellent and fish abundant. There are also excellent trochus reefs nearby if that industry ever recovers. On the other hand Tolokiwa Island is comparitively poor and unhealthy with little scope for sound economic development.

 (c) The settlement at Mantagen was established only on the insistence of the people themselves so they should now

be prepared to accept the responsibility for its development.

Nevertheless a careful check must be kept on this small community. A.P.O. SOM of GASAM, who is responsible for it, has been instructed to make frequent visits.

Village Officials.

Reference has been made already to the occasional abuses of authority by Siassi village officials which are caused by their isolation from sub-district headquarters. In an endeavour to eliminate such abuses the writer, on his previous patrol, encouraged the officels to have regular meetings amongst themselves where they could discuss their problems and any official placed with a difficult situation could seek the advice of the gathering rather than act in haste on his own judgement. From this suggestion regular monthly meetings have been instituted, one in the Kowai area and one in the Kaimenga. Villages take it in turns to be host to the meetings and rough minutes are kept. Although little of real value is achieved, these meetings have helped to create a sense of responsibility amongst the officials and do provide a deterrent to the hot-heads who think twice now before they beat their wives, knowing that their

behaviour will be brought before an assembly of officials.

Local missionaries say that some problems have been brought to them when the meetings have been unable to reach a conclusion. This practice of seeking advice from the missionaries was encouraged as it further reduces the liklihood of any illegal actions by the officials.

Several officials need new hats but none have been available for some time. If stocks come to hand before next patrol some should be taken them for issue.

ROADS, BRIDGES AND AIRSTRIPS.

The only vehicular road on Umboi Island is the one from GIMARUM to AWELKON which is used regularly by the Australian Lutheran Mission to supply their station at this latter place. The road is usable throughout the year except after heavy rains but with constant maintenance it could perhaps be made an all-weather road, although there is a lack of any good surfacing material nearby. Some work on this road was carried out by prisoners gacked during the course of this patrol. Other tracks remain in good condition.

There are no bridges on Siassi.

An airstrip is being built near Lablab Mission station on land belonging to people of Birik village. The site has been inspected and approved by the Dept. of Civil Aviation, but is heavily timbered and will probably be under construction for at least two years. Although spensored by the mission the clearing is being carried out voluntarily by the local village people.

At the present time the owners do not wish to dispose of the land on which the airstrip is being built, but the mission, who hope to arrange a regular service when it is completed, intend paying for all food trees cut down so a check on these is being kept by the local missionary and the landowners.

CONCLUSION.

With the exception of one or two important problems which have been outlined in this report and considering the administrative limitations the general situation on Siassi is satisfactory. However it should be borne in mind that these people, with the aid of an excellent mission organisation, are progressing at a quicker rate than other parts of the sub-district, particularly in the field of education. The Administration should make every endeavour to keep pace with them and provide the facilities and services essential to smooth and contented progress.

APPENDIX " A "

HEALTH:

The combined services provided by the Australian Lutheran Mission and the Administration aid-posts gives a good coverage to the division. The mission is doing very valuable work in infant welfare, especially amongst the Kaimanga people and the number of native babies born at the Lablab hospital is allowed by high. Only one case of maternal mortality was record and that was a village birth. There is little need to elaborate further on the tork being done by the missionaries as it is already well-known to the Public Health Department.

Brief Report on Siassi Islands Aid-Posts.

l. TUL (Tolokiwa Is.)

A.P.O. TAU

A.P.O. Danial. He has now been posted to the Kotte area and replaced at Tul by a local orderly, TAU, who has only recently finished training school. Tau is enthusiastic about his work, appears competent and seems to be accepted by the people.

Buildings satisfactory.

2. GASAM

A.P.O. SOM

A good aid-post run by a competent and conscientious orderly.

Buildings good.

3. AIYAU.

A.P.O. ANGORI.

Angori continues to render sterling service to P.H.D. and is without doubt the most reliable A.F.O. on Siassi.

Buildings excellent.

4. KAMPALAP

A.P.O. NABOM

Not a very satisfactory aid-post. NABOM apparently spends a good deal of his time at his own village (Aupwel) where he has pigs, and during these excursions leaves his aid-post in the care of untrained "assistants". Medicines were found in short supply, despite the fact that it is only 4 hours walk to Lablab mission hospital, and poorly labelled. It seems NABOM was posted to Aramot Island and A.P.O. MAPRLI from that village was sent to Kampalap, by P.H.D. some time ago. They have since changed villages again without authority.

Buildings fair only.

5. ARAMOT ISLAND.

A.P.O. NAPALI-

See remarks above. The Aid-post building is small and cramped and in very poor condition. The orderly is rather inactive and rarely visits the other villages under his control. He needs more frequent P.H.D. supervision.

6. TUAM ISLAND.

A.P.O. AIBIKI.

This man was found so slovenly in his work by E.M.A. Carlaw in 1956 that he was taken to Finschhafen for re-training appeared to improve for a while but marital trouble has interfered with his work to such an extent that he has spent little time in the villag for the past 9 months. He was brought to Finschhafen by this patrol for P.H.D. investigation into his behaviour.

Buildings satisfactory.

7. OPAI.

D

A.P.O. GENOS

This orderly was not present when the patrol was at the village. The sister-in-charge of the Awelkon mission hospital does not seem impressed with him and says he refused to allow his child to be given a triple antigen injection in a general campaign to wipe out whooping cough carried out by the mission hospitals earlier this year.

Baildings good.

8. MALAI ISLAND.

A.P.O. MOTAI

A new clinic has been constructed and medicines and equipmen are being kept in reasonable condition.

APPENDIX "B"

EDUCATION:

STO

The Australian Lutheran Mission, the only resident mission on Siassi, has three main schools situated at GELEM, AWELKON and LABLAB as well as elementary schools in most villages in the division. The work being done by this mission in the field of education continues to be excellent.

The Roman Catholic mission works in parts of the area from its station at Kelenge on New Britain. They have recently placed two new teachers on Aramot and Mandak Islands. These two wen are from Manus so should settle in well -+ Siassi, coming from a similar environment. They a soth fine types and should do a great deal to raise the standard of education in those villages as it is believed they are both "B" class teachers. The writer

the priest from Kelenge who was on tour in the area at the time of pathol and he stated that the mission was considering a mining a priest of Siassi if land could be leased. In all probability the place of residence would be at Aupwel, and if this does come about the educational and health facilities available to the Siassi people will be forther improved.

The position regarding the Administration village higher school at BUNSIL leaves much to be desired and after giving the matter a good deal of consideration the writer feels that this school should be abandoned and the teachers placed at other locations on the island where they would have more success and probably be happier.

There is a good anchorage at Bunsil but that is about all. Water supply is poor and distant and the soil is infested with insects. Those parts of the school gardens which are not destroyed by these insects are attacked by wild pigs so that there is a continued shortage of food with the result that truancy is extraordinarily high, even for a native school. This is aggravated by the fact that

SIB

BUNSIL is a rather isolated spot and when the school was established there pupils were taken from all the villages on in the division and not from only those villages in close proximity. Therefore when pupils have to go home to get food for most of them it is a good two days walk. Because of its isolation the village people are unwilling to go there and help prepare gardens for the students, consequently the nearby villagers have to bear the burden and frequently complain about this. The fact that there are only one or two boys from each village mitigates any real interest being taken by the villages, in most cases they are not concerned whether the children are fed or not. The net result of all this, of course, is that the pupils cannot make the progress they would under more favourable circumstances and an extra strain is placed on the teachers who have to try and organize food supply. Both teachers complained that they can spend little time on lesson preparation as they spend most of the daylight hours after school working in the gardens and can do little at night because they are not issued with kerosene.

be the establishment of two smaller schools with one teacher in each. One could be placed in the Kowai area at, say, Gasam and one in the Kaimanga region, perhaps at Kampalap or Yangla. These schools would then select pupils from only the neighbouring villages. If the Education Department feels the two teachers should be kept together then only one school would be established, still confining its pupil selection. An improvement important advantage in having the schools situated in or near a native village is that the teacher would be a good example to the people and be of assistance in everyday village life. At Bunsil they can not do this, nor does there seem to be any incentive for them to keep up their own standards.

According to the teacher there has not been one inspection of Bunsil by the Education Department this year. If the Department finds itself unable to carry out these inspections surely it should enlist the aid of a local body capable of so doing, in this case, the mission. It is fair neither to the teachers for to the students to be ignored for a whole year. The writer fixmed the opinion that the teachers feel badly let down over this.

The school at Bunsil has failed because it has tried to cater for too large an area. This is a lesson which should be recalled when planning future village higher schools.

APPENDIX "C"

AGRICULTURE:

SIL

One of the primary tasks of this patrol was to compile a register of shareholders from village contributions made throughout the sub-district to a fund for the purchase of a vessel suitable for marketing native produce.

A scheme has been formulated whereby this capital is to be taken over by a Rural Progress Society controlled by the Department of Agriculture, hence the allocation of shares was listed as a priority job.

Some difficulty in distributing these shares to the satisfaction of the villagers was expected but this was not the case. Before the patrol commenced it was made clear to a gathering of village officials at Gizarum what had to The officials went back to their village and themselves prepared lists of individual contributions to the village fund and in most cases these were found reasonably accurate, requiring only minor adjustments by the patrol. It was not possible to issue £5 shares, which would have been preferable, because the average contribution was much lower than this amount, often, in fact, less than £1. Therefore £1 was taken as a bare share with 10/- multiples thereafter. After the shareholder list had been made up and balanced with the village fund amount, each shareholders name, his father's name and the amount of this share was read out to the assembled village and shareholders were asked to make a note of their share. In all cases villagers expressed satisfaction with the allocation and there is little liklihood of any di agreement arising later. It is possible however that some men who made a contribution and have since left the villages to work may have been overlooked but every effort was made to eliminate this possibility.

Shareholder lists were also compiled for the villages of SIO No.1 and SIO No.2. The method of compilation of the lists at Sio was somewhat different as there has never been any individual contribution of money to the village

accounts. For many years Sio has sold copra as a communal enterprise and built up a capital of almost £4000. After consultation with the people it was decided that every name in the village books should be called and those who were approved by the village would be given roughly equal shares. This resulted in almost every male and female over 14 years of age being granted a share, some to the value of £4 and some £3.10.0.

On Siassi, the merfolk only are shareholders.

Now that the register of shareholders has been compiled at Sio and Siassi receints can be issued to the shareholders if this is desirable. Instruction on this matter is awaited.

A large proportion of the copra to be marketed by the Firschhafen Marketing and De relopment Society when it is formed will come from Siassi, so a rough estimate of likely village production was made by this patrol and is attached hereto. It is pointed out that this is min mainly guesswork and meant to be a guide only, the estimate was conservative and the overall monthly total of approximately 20 tons should be easily achieved. Notes are also made on the existing drying facilities at each village because it is felt that improvement 'quality will be one of the major initial tasks of the Society. The best way of doing this would probably be for the Department of Agriculture to second a native trained in all aspects of copra work to the Society until a satisfactory general standard can be reached and maintained. It would probably be in the interests of the Society to employ such a native itself later on.

There is a great potential for economic progress through cocca, and robusta coffee on Umboi Island and it is a great pity that to date the Department of Agriculture has not been able to exploit this potential. Other crops too would probably grow well, but cocca and robusta coffee are submitted because they are the logical crops at this stage.

As mentioned earlier in this report the people themselves are enthusiastic towards development, all that is required is a co-ordinated effort by the Administration to set the ball rolling.
