

Dr Jane Goodall to give illustrated lecture "Aspects of Chimpanzee Intelligence"

Primate researcher Dr. Jane Goodall will give an illustrated lecture entitled "Aspects of Chimpanzee Intelligence" at 7:30 p.m., Monday, May 9, in the Mandeville Center Auditorium on the campus of the University of California, San Diego.

Goodall's studies of the behavior and ecology of the wild chimpanzees in the Gombe Stream Reserve in Tanzania was launched by the late Dr. Louis B. Leakey in 1960. Currently, she is honorary visiting professor of zoology at the University of Dar es Salaam in Tanzania, and the director of the Gombe Stream Research Centre.

Goodall has written over thirty scientific papers and books. She is probably best known for her book "In the Shadow of Man" and for her series of ABC-TV documentaries, "Jane Goodall and the World of Animal Behavior."

In 1965, Goodall was awarded a Ph.D. in Ethology by Cambridge University. From 1971-1975 she was a visiting professor of psychology and human biology at Stanford. While at Stanford, Goodall helped to establish the first outdoor Primate Research Facility on that campus.

Her lecture at UCSD will be fully illustrated with color film and slides, and will be followed by a question and answer period.
