

National R&D rankings show UCSD as third among top U.S. university

NATIONAL R&D RANKINGS SHOW UCSD AS THIRD AMONG TOP U.S. UNIVERSITIES

The University of California, San Diego ranked third in the nation and first in the UC system in federal Research and Development expenditures for 1995, the most recent year for which figures are available, according to a recently released report by the National Science Foundation.

UCSD's ranks in two of the funding measures increased over the previous year: federal R&D expenditures were third in the nation among top U.S. universities, compared to fifth in 1994, and federal R&D awards moved to sixth place from seventh the previous year. These rankings are first within the University of California system.

Federal R&D expenditures for UCSD in fiscal 1995 were \$284.4 million, behind the University of Washington at \$291.2 million and Johns Hopkins University at \$706 million.

Federal R&D awards are made by federal agencies for research and development during the federal fiscal year October 1, 1994 to September 30, 1995. These data are collected from federal agencies.

Federal R&D expenditures are amounts expended on research and development as reported by the universities for their fiscal year, typically July 1, 1994 to June 30, 1995.
