

The Guarneri String Quartet to perform

October 1, 1980

The Guarneri String Quartet, regarded as one of the finest chamber ensembles in the world, will perform at the University of California, San Diego at 8 p.m. Friday, Oct. 17 in the Mandeville Auditorium.

General admission is \$10 for orchestra seats and \$9 for seats on the main floor. Admission for UC San Diego students is \$4.

Hailed as a group which "has no superior on the world's stages" by The New York Times, the Guarneri has earned a reputation for impeccable virtuosity in its 16 years of playing.

The Guarneri was founded at Vermont's Marlboro Music Festival by four musicians who had already established themselves as accomplished soloists. Violinists Arnold Steinhardt and John Dalley each made their concert debuts at age 14. Michael Tree, violist, performed at age 20 in Carnegie Hall and David Soyer, cellist, debuted as a soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra when he was 17.

The quartet has earned the praise of audiences and critics worldwide. Its repertoire ranges from the classics to the works of twentieth century composers such as Berg, Webern, Sessions and Schoenberg.

The program at UC San Diego will include Beethoven's "Quartet in F Major, Opus 18, No. 1," Bartok's "Quartet No. 6" and the "Quartet in D Minor, Opus 56 (Voces Intimae)" by Sibelius.

The concert is part of the UC San Diego Chamber Music Series.
