

Geoffrey Barraclough gives inaugural lecture

Dr. Geoffrey Barraclough, Professor of History at the University of California, San Diego is scheduled to give the first talk in the 1967 series of Professors' Inaugural Lectures at UCSD at 4:15 p.m., Thursday (January 26) in the Humanities-Library Auditorium. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Professor Barraclough, formerly of Cambridge University in England, succeeded Arnold Toynbee as Director of the Royal Institute of International Affairs. At UCSD he is teaching Medieval History and World History. He received the Master of Arts degree from Oxford and is a fellow of Merton College, Oxford. He has a long list of published works, his most recent being the book, "Introduction to Contemporary History."

His talk Thursday is titled "America, Europe and Russia in Nineteenth Century Historical Thought." The UCSD Professors' Inaugural Lecture Series is designed to introduce the work of new faculty members to other members of the academic staff and to the public. Other recently appointed professors, from all departments, are scheduled to give inaugural lectures on Thursdays throughout the year.
