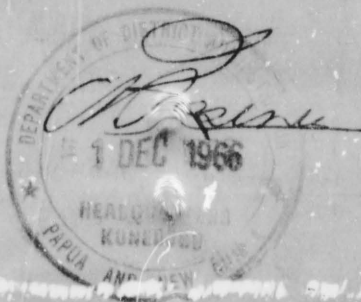



Introduction The sole purpose of this Patrol was to visit as many villages as possible involved in the Territory Census. Because of the short time available and the small amount of funds permitted, only four (4) of the villages on alienated land on the island were visited. At each village the purpose of the Census was explained to the people and the people were requested to provide the information which later would be asked.


Census Education: Four of the ten villages on alienated land were visited by the Patrol. The villages were MWAPAS, UNGONAM, KAVATAN and UNAMATANA. Insufficient time was available for me to visit the other areas to be later visited by the Census Patrol. In addition as the majority of the villages involved in the Census, were situated at the western end of the island, there were insufficient funds for the Patrol to visit them.

At each village the purpose of the Census was explained and a list of notable events to assist in determining the ages of people were collected - this list will be handed to the area Sub-Enumerator at Losuia on the 19th June 1966.

The Patrol was uneventful and fullest cooperation was received from the people in the villages visited.



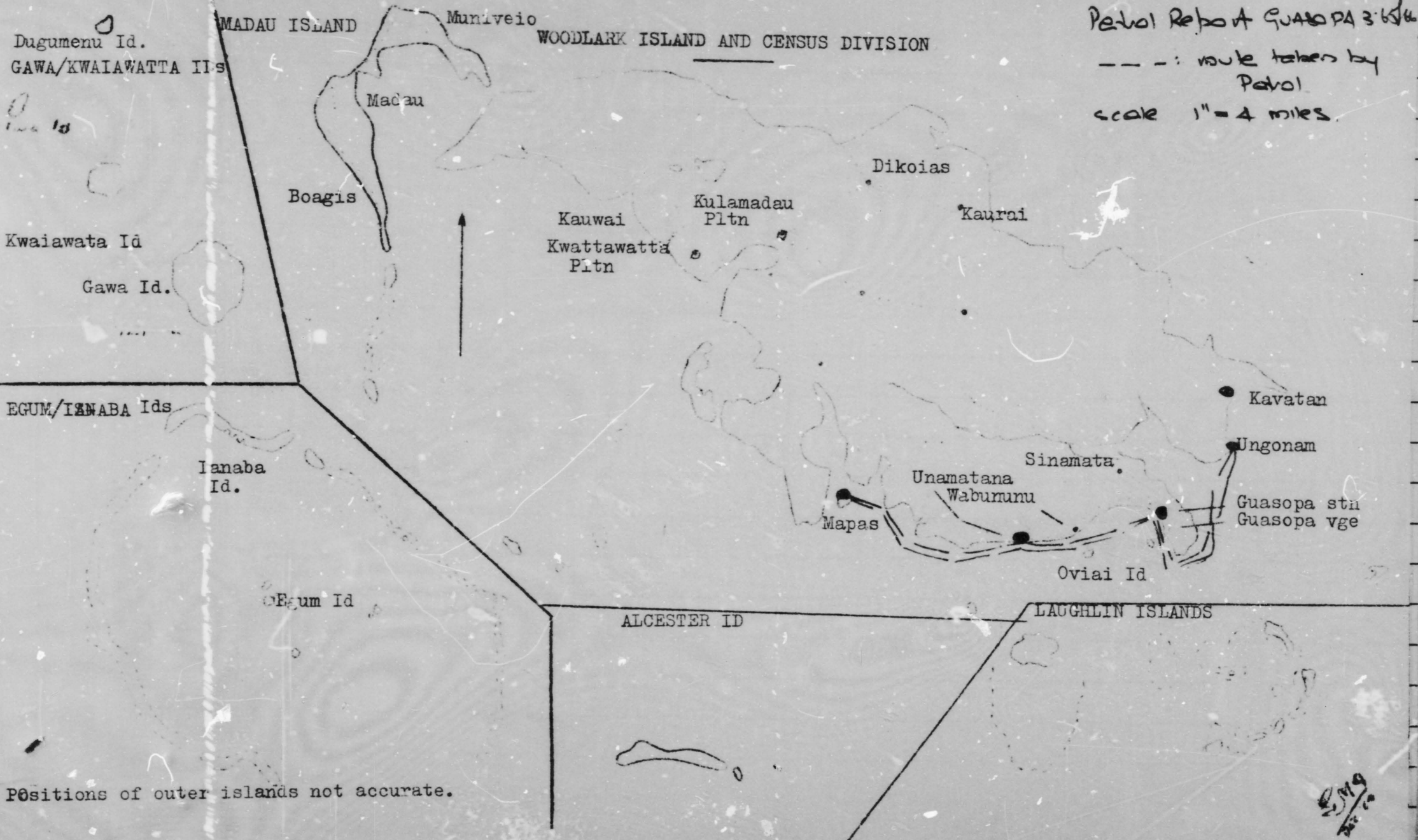

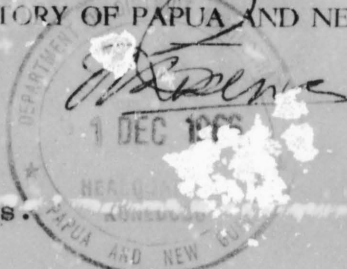

GUASORA PATROL REPORT No. 2 of 1965/66

Please find attached 3 copies

The comments I desire to make
are as follows :--

(1) This patrol served the patrolling officer as an introduction to Woodlark and its outlying islands ; he should now have more of an understanding of the area and its special problems i.e., lack of shipping , isolation of the population , lack of economic resources on some of the outer islands , etc.

(2) Page 3. Para. 6 I will be instructing the O.I.C. that , although legally correct , it is administratively undesirable to force people to repair their houses and clean their villages using court action. The idea came be so easily planted in unsophisticated minds that they only have to keep their houses and selves tidy when ordered to do so . The ideal that should be aimed at is for the people themselves to realize that it is in their own interest to improve their living conditions .

(3) Page 4 et seq. This investigation reveals that the patrolling officer is quite prepared to sit down with the people in an endeavour to gain an understanding of what must have been an involved and tedious dispute . I would agree with Mr. Morris that there appears to be no solution to the dispute involving, as it does, two personalities and extending into the labyrinth of the KULA exchange . Mr. Morris will be requested to maintain a 'watching brief' on the situation .

(4) Page 6 . Agriculture 1 & 2 This aspect has been covered by other officers in other Patrol Reports . In the Laughlin Islands , there is no competition for the present trader because no other boats , except Administration vessels (and then only rarely) , ever call there . The only other person who could purchase their copra resides at Kulamadra , nearly 80 sea-miles away.


The people of Iwa, Gawa and Kwaiawatta are caught up in a vicious circle ---- no boats call there because no copra is produced and no copra is produced because no boats call there . I believe a boat owned by a Losuia trader used to call at these islands occasionally up till 1957 ; however , the small amount of copra produced and increased running costs of the boat caused the abandonment of the effort .

I would believe that the problems outlined in 1 and 2 will only be solved when the proposed Wood-Lark N.L.G.C. gets underway . This Council will have to have a boat and one of the Ware cutters now being produced in the Samarai area would appear to be ideal . These sturdy vessels , completely equipped with sails and a small but rugged and reliable Yanmar Diesel cost approximately 1500 dollars and can carry approximately 2 ton of copra. There would appear to be no reason why this vessel could not institute a fairly regular ^{RUN} between these outer islands and Guasopa or Kulamadan , where regular commercial vessels can pick up the copra .

(5) Page 6 . Agriculture 3 I have discussed this matter with the District Agricultural Officer and he advises that preventative measures cannot properly be undertaken until specimens of the insect are obtained . It should be possible for the D.A.O. and myself to inspect the damage on our forth-coming visit to Guasopa Base Camp.

It is regretted that the Report has taken so long to reach you . However , infrequent mail schedules in from the Base Camp and the pressure of Census duties has precluded earlier comments and onforwarding

Claim for Camping Allowance is attached . A claim for Travelling Allowance is also stated to have been forwarded , but no trace of it can be found here. Enquiries will be made of the O.I.C.

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

Introduction The main object of the Patrol was to give me an introduction to the area which is administered from Guasopa Base Camp. Secondary objects included the provision of assistance to the P.H.D. Water Survey Team in it's work in the Woodlark Census Division, and the investigation into a long standing dispute in DIKOIAS Village which was reportedly leading to the stage where various elements in the village were moving elsewhere and the village was in danger of ceasing to be an effective group. The objects of the Patrol were accomplished although not all the area planned to be visited was actually patrolled due firstly to an alteration of trawler programmes and secondly, my becoming ill in the last week of the Patrol.

The Patrol was well received in all villages visited. Fullest cooperation was received regarding the provision of carriers and canoes where requested.

The portions of the Census Division visited included the following island groups and villages :- Laughlin Ids. (BUDEBUDE), Alcester Id. (NESIKWAB), GAWA, IWA, KWALAWATTA Islands and DIKOIAS, KAURAI and MAPAS Villages.

Villages Insufficient time was permitted me during the portion of the Patrol conducted from the "Managuna" with the P.H.D. Water Survey Team, to more than just fleetingly visit the villages. However once the Patrol left the "Managuna", the Patrol proceeded at a more reasonable pace and conditions in the villages were investigated. The following comments refer (see also section relating to Dikoias Village further in this Report): -

1. BUDELUN Village (Laughlin Id.) - the village was found to be in an extremely clean condition and apparently reflects the influence which Village Constable PIPORA has over his Village Group.
2. NESIKWAB Village (Alcester Id.) - this village precariously set on a shelf above the only reasonable landing on the island, was found to be in a reasonable condition. The absence of a number of men on Kula trade to a degree would account for this but considering the difficulties which the villagers have to face the condition of the village is as well as could be anticipated.
3. GAWA Island (several hamlets) - the P.H.D. Water Survey team permitted me 1½ hours on this island - the majority of which was spent in climbing to and from the top of the plateau where the hamlets are situated. As darkness was falling, little was seen of the area.
4. IWA Island - the P.H.D. Water Survey Team completed it's work on this island in 25 minutes and then were anxious to depart.

for GAWA Island. Accordingly there was insufficient time allowed for me to climb up to the plateau upon which the village is situated.

5. KWAIWATTA Island - Again as with GAWA and IWA, insufficient time was permitted me to climb up to the village area.
6. DIKOIAS Village - considerable time was spent in this village investigating a long standing dispute. During this time repairs were requested and carried out to a number of houses in the village. Due to the absence of the Village Constable MICKIDULANA from the village, the area was found to be in an extremely delapidated and dirty condition. Several villagers during the duration of my stay in the village refused to carry out the work allotted them by the Village Constable who had by then returned to the village. Complaints were laid and eight (8) prosecutions were commenced under Reg. 101.4 of Native Regulations. Thereafter no further trouble occurred and the condition of the village greatly improved.
7. KAURAI Village - It was obvious that by the time the Patrol visited this village, that word had come through from DIKOIAS as to the requests made there. Thus when the Patrol visited KAURAI almost all of the houses showed signs of very recent repair and feverish activity was still in progress when the Patrol arrived. The village however has obviously been kept in a good state of repair and no additional requests were made of the villagers to improve conditions farther.
8. MAPAS Village - this village was found to be in a reasonable condition with the few houses of this settlement all well constructed and maintained. The absence of some of the villagers on Kula trade was compensated for by the 25 men from GAWA, NESIKWABU and BUDEBUDE who were at Mapas for Kula.

Village Water Supplies: The P.H.D. Water Survey Team visited the following Villages or Island Groups:- GAWA, IWA, KWAIWATTA, EGUM, IANABA, ALCESTER, LAUGHLIN and GUASOPA Base Camp. A copy of the Teams field recommendations together with photographs of proposed well or bore sites is held this Office.

Complaints and Enquiries: Two complaints were recorded during the Patrol, both coming from Dikoias Village and both involved long standing disputes relating to custody of children. One dispute was settled by mediation to the satisfaction of all parties whilst the other is being proceeded with further as it involves a child who was sent to Baniara as an exchange for a Baniara child sent to Woodlark under the procedure known as TAKULUT.

Local Court: Eight Court cases were held during the Patrol, all of them at DIKOIAS Village and all involved breaches of Reg.101.4 of the Native Regulations. All defendants were found guilty. Seven were fined \$1.00, the fine being paid before the Patrol left the village. One of the defendants was convicted and discharged due to illness. I would like to mention that subsequent to my holding these court cases, a number of DIKOIAS Villagers in conversation, spoke of their approval of the cases being held.

Dispute at Dikoias Village: Additional time was spent at DIKOIAS to investigate a dispute which has been in existence for some time. The actual extent of the dispute varied from informant to informant, from the rather lurid description of it resulting in "...the demoralization of Dikoias", and thus a serious threat to the continuing existence of the WAMWAN Social Groups, through to "...just a normal intra-village dispute". Enquiries revealed that the disputing factions in the village comprised the Village Constable MICKIDULANA and his brothers opposed by TAGALANA, one of the wealthiest men in the village (in both the traditional and cash sense) and his families.

Briefly, the dispute commenced in the 1959 Kula Season when MICKIDULANA became seriously ill. Several of his Kula partners around the Island and at GAWA reportedly decided not to continue their activities with MICKIDULANA as it was obvious that MICKIDULANA was shortly to die. Accordingly they commenced to trade with TAGALANA, who is younger and more agile than MICKIDULANA. The outcome was that MICKIDULANA did not die and he could ^{not} regain his former partners from TAGALANA, the latter increasing his wealth and position at the expense of MICKIDULANA. The matter then lay dormant for several months until the 1960 garden season when a number of thefts of food from gardens occurred. The majority of the food stolen was from MICKIDULANA's group and immediately the blame was put on TAGALANA and his group. The ill feeling increased and over the succeeding five years resulted in MICKIDULANA moving, with his brothers to KULUMADAU. With the absence of the Village Constable the village ceased to be administered efficiently and this coinciding with an increasing dependence upon a cash income from wages earned, and trade with KULUMADAU, presented some symptoms which have been interpreted by one Mission Worker on the island, as indicating an advanced stage of "demoralization".

Enquiries revealed that although the average garden size for the village was well below the Island average so far calculated (0.2 as compared to the average 0.4/5 acres per adult person), this fact was more than compensated by the cash income from KULUMADAU. An average of 8 to 10 DIKOIAS men work at KULUMADAU in various capacities whilst the majority of those remaining in the village visit KULUMADAU at least once a week to sell produce and carvings. During the sample period of the Patrol visiting DIKOIAS it was found that the men who were working at KULUMADAU received an average of \$4.50 per week whilst those selling carvings and produce averaged \$1.50 per week. During the time the Patrol was in the village, there was no shortage whatsoever of food. This is taking into account the fact that 6 new houses were commenced and one influential villager died in that period.

In conclusion there appears to be no solution to the dispute but it is suggested that the dispute by no means is serious. There appeared no evidence that the actual village was in danger of disintegrating nor that the traditional organization had ceased to operate. The matter will be followed up on subsequent Patrols.


Agriculture: The following matters were raised to the Patrol :-

1. Laughlin Islands: The villagers of BUDEBUDE reiterated their complaints made to previous patrols regarding the low prices paid them by Mr. T. Voight for their copra. The prices allegedly paid them for one bag of copra (rammed), ranged from \$1.50 - \$2.00 with occasionally one bag returning \$2.50.
2. Iwa, Gawa and Kwaiawatta Islands : numerous requests were made by villagers from these islands for some one to visit them regularly to lift their copra.
3. Oiviai Island: A request for assistance was received from this village group for insecticide to halt a small insect which is methodically stripping the leaves off Yam plants, leaving the bare stalks of the plant remaining. To date this destruction is not widespread.



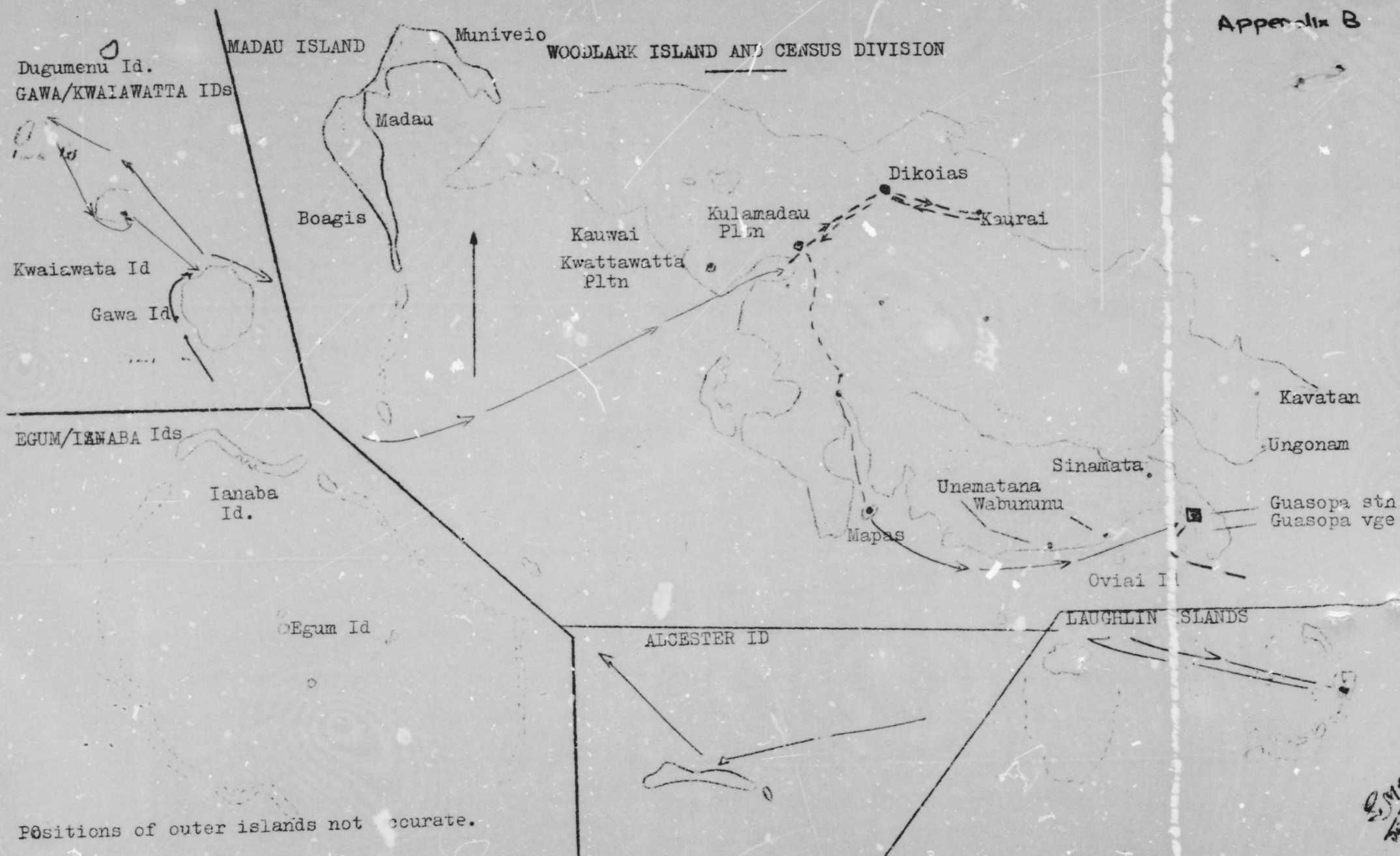
9101 Constable 5th Year GABADI : This Constable was found to be efficient and completely reliable. His demeanour and general attitude towards his work and the people was excellent.
