#### SigAlert!

When you slow for a traffic delay and hear on your radio that it's a "SigAlert," do you wonder what that is?

It was named for Loyd C. Sigmon, who died at the age of 95 in June 2004. An obituary in the San Diego Union-Tribune (7 June 2004, from the Associated Press) told the story. Sigmon was an executive of radio station KMPC in Los Angeles in 1955, when he created a system of emergency warnings that could be sent by police to local radio stations. His device, which cost \$600, could be activated by a special tone and then a dispatcher could broadcast a message; a light and buzzer alerted the radio stations. Los Angeles Police Chief William Parker gave this system the name SigAlert, in honor of Sigmon. Its first use was in Los Angeles in Sept. 1955, for a train derailment at Union Station. It then came into use everywhere. "He was," noted the newspaper, "honored by governments, broadcasting organizations and the National Safety Council. He had personalized license plates that said SIGALRT." He did not, however, get rich from his creation. He didn't sell it to anybody. In fact, "I lost some," he said, "because I used to bet on a horse named SigAlert that never won."

The California Highway Patrol now handles traffic duties on freeways, and it calls for SigAlerts via computer these days. A SigAlert is limited by CHP to "an unplanned event that causes the closing of one lane of traffic for 30 minutes or more."

Sigmon was born (1909) and raised on a cattle ranch in Stigler, Oklahoma. He received his amateur radio license at the age of 14, and went on from there to radio stations.

The Oceanids Avi-Set birding group meets each month during the academic year to visit diverse sites around the county. There are always some trip highlights, some planned, some accidental.

This April we arranged to have a tour by Phil Lambert, Manager of the Silverwood Wildlife Sanctuary, the Audubon site in Lakeside. The sanctuary has had limited visiting since the 2003 wildfires destroyed the entire property and its three homes. For the second spring there was a lush growth of wildflowers. Have you ever had to look up at the tops of San Diego wildflowers? Aside from the botanical pleasure for us, the flowers had lured back some species of birds, including the colorful Lazuli Bunting and Costa's Hummingbird.

On another spring outing we returned to the east side of Lake Hodges which this year, wonder of wonders, actually had water within walking distance of the trailhead. We were treated to sightings of a flock of White Pelicans and watched the Western and Clark's Grebes doing their dramatic courting dances.

On another trip to Old Mission Dam we had excellent viewing of the largest warbler, the Yellow-breasted Chat, singing from the treetops. That was an added bonus to our viewing. We always find some spring warblers there, but have missed the Chat other years.





#### Desert, bayous and Saramago's parable.

We've just returned from a trip to the most recently designated National Monument: Grand Staircase-Escalante in South Central Utah. Along one of its main roads, Route 12, you enter an extraordinary land-scape made up of colored cliffs, canyons and buttes. Huge formations of slickrocks standing up like giant sentinels in this pristine high desert make you feel at once minute and yet strangely protected and privileged. This vast ensemble inhabited by resounding silence and pure skies proved to be for me a true antidote to the haunting horrors of the Louisiana's tragedy, where too much water in its flood, rot, decay, molds, and chaos were the inherent nightmare.

As I remembered how blame for this catastrophe had been attributed to many, as it should, and had gone all the way back to the initial culprit, the French indeed and in particular to Jean Baptiste Lemoyne, sieur de Bienville who had founded New Orleans in this most unlikely location with water all around coming from the River, the Lake, the Gulf, the skies, I rationalized that after all the French Quarter, le Vieux Carre, had been built on higher ground and had for the most part been spared, but this was not enough to erase the lingering memories of this tragedy. It persisted in the tranquil and apparently secure vistas of Escalante and Boulder when we still encountered the vanished civilization of the Anasazi Indians, whose world had also mysteriously crumbled due to complex reasons of both climatic and societal imbalances.

And then to my mind came back the book, *Blindness*, from the great Portuguese writer Jose Saramago, whom we had read in November 2004 in our Oceanids Book Group. It now appeared to me as prophetic writing in its portrayal of the collapse of an unnamed city whose inhabitants fell ill one after another to a mysterious epidemic of blindness. The ensuing chaos, the unspeakable horrors, the innumerable tragedies unsparingly described by Saramago were of the same nature as those I saw and read about New Orleans. What Saramago wrote, "We're going back to being primitives hordes... with the difference that we are not a few thousand men and women in an immense, unspoiled nature but thousands of millions in an uprooted world", had been exemplified in Louisiana before my very eyes. Even Saramago's style, shocking at first, because of its long, unpunctuated sentences, ample, rambling and yet so precise, where dialogue is undifferentiated from other forms of speech, suddenly made sense; in this unpredictable world, often incomprehensible and uncomprehended, what could be added or subtracted by a comma or a semicolon, what more meaning could they possibly give to a human situation gone astray? And when I further thought of the other novel with a similar theme, The Plague, by Albert Camus, s also a Nobel Prize Winner like Saramago, and evoked its classical style and spare sentences, I could plainly see what a gap there was between Camus's 1945 and Saramago's 1995, indeed half a century in which our hold on reality had seemingly further disintegrated.

And yet Escalante as a place still stood preserved, and books such as *Blindness* were still being written; both are accessible to us, they still exhort us as in the epigraph of Saramago's book, "If you can see, look If you can look, observe", and so they both allow us "to keep on hoping, hoping..."

In conclusion I recommend both the book and the trip. At opposite poles they have in common an uplifting grandeur and an untarnished beauty.
