PATROL REPORT NO. 1 - SAIDOR - 1972/1973

Attached please find three copies of the above patrol report. This patrol was conducted by Mr. Kipling Naveyana, Patrol Officer. Late submission of this patrol report is regretted, however, it was only received by me early this month due to the fact that I had instructed Mr. Naveyana to rewrite it on two occasions.

The purpose of this patrol was the collection of taxes for the Rai Coast Council. No patrol instructions were issued as Mr. Naveyana departed on patrol the day after my arrival at this Station. I am afraid that I would not have agreed to his collecting taxes as this is the duty of the Council Clerk.

I have no comments to make on the "INTRODUCTION".

POLITICAL: I agree that the people of the area visited by this patrol are well aware of the council aims and functions. It is good to see the people involving themselves in political discussion. I cannot agree that there are no major new works this year as the council clerk's house is in fact a major new work, and all roads are major work and are act in actual fact carried over from last year.

satisfactorily and with it it is hoped more economic development will come. The people on the coastal fringe are far better off than their inland neighbours at the present time, however, this could guite easily be reversed with the construction of roads into the inland areas. The inland areas, being at a higher altitude are more conducive to the planting of economic crops and cattle.

SOCIAL: The social development does exist however it has never risen above the village level. It is hoped that the council will attend obtain the services of a young woman of the area in 1973 to summer a welfare course at Ahioma. She will then be available to give assistance and advice on the setting up of clubs throughout the Rai Coast area.

MISCELLANEOUS: I take it that Councillor Dampat requests the services of an Army barge for the cartage of live stock to and from Madang.

I do not consider this patrol report to be of a very high standard and I feel that Mr. Naveyana is quite capable of far better work as he is an intelligent young officer.

DIARY

Departed Saidor by a tractor for Lamtub School. Arrived 12.30 p.m. Walked to Wednesday, 9/8/1972 the Lamtub Village and camped for the

night.

Collected tax at Lamtub Village, departed for Mindiri Village at 3.30 p.m. Arrived Mindiri at 6.30 p.m. and camped for the Thursday, 10/8/1972

night.

Tax collected at Mindiri, commencing at 8.30 a.m. and finishing at 6.30 p.m. Friday, 11/8/1972

Camped for the night.

Tax collected at Mindiri from 8.30 a.m. to 6.50 p.m. The people from the inland of the Yaganon Census Division paid their Saturday, 12/8/1972

tax this day.

Departed Mindiri for Forguan at 8.30 a.m. and arrived 1.30 p.m. Camped for the sht. Forguan Village is about half way between Lamtub and Mindiri villages. The road is well kept all along the coast. Sunday, 13/8/1972

Tax collected at Forguan from 8.00 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. Camped for the night. Monday, 14/8/1972

During the night villagers asked me about road from Saidor to Madang and it was explained that at the moment there are no plans for the construction of this road. This year there are no new works in the Council's estimates, all the works are being carried forward from last year.

12.30 p.m. Tax collected at Lamtub. Tuesday, 15/8/1972 Got a car at Lamtub School at 1.30 p.m. and arrived back at Saidor about 3.30 p.m.

The patrol was continued. Departed Monday, 21/8/1972 Saidor by the Council Toyota for Warai at 9.30 a.m. Arrived Warai at 12.40 p.m. and because there were no villagers

available, the patrol team camped for the night.

To collected at Warai. Departed for Billau at 1.30 p.m. Arrived at Billau at 2.30 p.m. and camped for the night. Tuesday, 22/8/1972

Departed Biliau for Maibang at 8.00 a.m. on foot, following the newly constructed road - "Biliau/Maibang Road" - and arrived at Maibang at 12.30 p.m. Tax collected at Maibang and camped for the night. The patrol campel at Maibang for three days waiting for the villagers inland. Wednesday, 23/8/1972



Thursday, 24/8/1972

fax collected at Maibang. Camped for the night.

Friday, 25/8/1972

Tax collected at Maibang, and camped for the night.

Saturday, 26/8/1972

Departed Maibang on foot for Gabumi at 8.00 a.m., following a rough bush track, and arrived at Gabumi at 10.30 a.m. Collected tax and camped for the night.

Sunday, 27/8/1972


Stayed whole day at Gabumi waiting in vain for the surrounding villagers to turn up.

Monday, 28/8/1972

Departed Gabumi at 7.30 a.m. for Pang Pang School via the "Yamai/Sindama Road".

Arrived at 11.30 a.m. Collected tax and got the Council car at 3.30 p.m., arriving back at Saidor at 3.45 p.m.

INTRODUCTION:

The patrol was conducted for the purpose of assisting the Rai Coast Local Government Council in collecting Council Tax for the year 1972/1973. The Councillors accompanying the patrol were BIORO and IPANG.

The first helf of the patrol was conducted in the Yaganon Census Division, from 9th August to 15th August, and the second half in the Mot Census Division from 22nd August to the 28th August.

The people from the Yaganon were not as happy as the people from the Mot because the Yaganons want to have a road built along the coast towards Madang instead of building it inland. They argued that the Malalamai road should be stopped as this road is going in the wrong direction, that is, towards Morobe District. It should go towards Madang.

The Mot people were happy to pay their tax because of the Biliau/Maibang Road which is going to be a great help to them. There was more Back Tax collected from the young men who were away in the last financial year, than any other Census Division, and most of these men actually admitted voluntarily that they had not paid their tax last year and that they were quite willing to pay the double tax.

POLITICAL:

At this stage of political development in the area, it can be safely stated that the majority of the population, the tax payers' population, is well aware of the Council's aims and functions. The political awareness, in the villages directly contacted, was something that I did not expect. After each day's work there were gatherings of about twenty to thirty people asking what the Council intends to do this financial year. It was explained that there are no major new works this year, all the works are being carried forward from the last financial year.

Going back to politics, there were some sophisticated answers given when the questions of general administration and

the council administration were directed to them. I have mentioned earlier that the political awareness in the area patrolled is considerable, because, comparing it with previous patrols at my previous postings, this area can be regarded as one of the most influenced ones in the District. However, there was one point that kept cropping up, and that was the role of Officers of the Division of District Administration and the role of Councillors. I explained this to the best of my knowledge, particularly stating the fact that the latter runs the Local Council affairs and the former concern themselves with the affairs of the whole Sub-District.

ECONOMIC:

The economy of the area is rapidly developing with the help of the Development Bank Loans. The loans are not obtained through the Council but with the help of the Department of Agriculture Stock and Fisheries.

This year, with only copra and coffee as the major produce, the Council's revenue is Twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000). The tax itself is Thirteen Thousand dollars (\$13,000). However, with the help of loans obtained from the Development Bank there will be many cattle projects built which will increase the economy and in turn the Council tax rate will go up. Another thing that the people expect to be of assistance is the three major roads being built by the Council with the Rural Development Funds money. The Saidor/Malamai, Yamai/Sindama and Biliau/Maibang roads will be a great help as the people will be able to bring in their locally grown crops, such as pawpaws and bananas, to the market promptly.

At Forguan Village the people approached me and asked for guidance as to how to go about buying a work boat. I explained to them the Bank Loan System and asked them to bring this matter up with the Assistant District Commissioner for the Saidor Sub-District.

Generally speaking, the coastal strip of the Mot and Yaganon Census Divisions is better off economically than any other area in Saidor Sub-District. This is stated because of the cattle projects built and the keen efforts in new coconut plantings that can be seen. There are more and more people asking for Bank Loans.

SOCIAL

There is very little interest shown in social development. Although there are social games held at Saidor from time to time, the only people who benefit from it are the villagers around the Station. I explained to the people that if there is enough interest shown the Council would try, working through the Department of Social Development and Home Affairs, to provide the facilities for them, e.g. Women's Clubs.

After some discussions on this matter I came to the conclusion that the people take that part of life as something of very little or no importance at all. I realised that, although there were dancing and feastings in the olden days, this form of social life, sports expecially, never existed.

It was explained that social life is just as important as any other form of life because there will be better ways of life copies from others during the gatherings and most important of all, this will lead to the unity of the country.

Finally on this aspect it can be said that the well known Cargo Cult is of very little significance to the people, only a minority group of followers exist.

MISCELLANEOUS:

The last Army Patrol conducted through this area was in 1971. Councillor Dampat, from Mindiri, asked me if the Rai Coast Council can get any help from an Army Barge. I explained to him that this was not known but if he put forward this topic at a Council meeting, there will be some investigation carried out on the matter.

CONCLUSION:

In conclusion it can be stated that life can be seen developing really rapidly. However, it will take some efforts to establish a social organization, viz. Women's Club etc.

The majority of the population tend to ignore the cult movement. There are continual arguments going on, especially during the village meetings, between the non-cultist and cult follower.

SAIDOR PATROL REPORT NO. 2 of 1972/73

I regret the delay in the transmission of this Patrol Report to your office, however, it has taken Mr. Dunger quite some considerable time to prepare it. Enclosed are three (3) copies of the Patrol Report.

The main object of this patrol was to up-date the area study and also the census.

The standard of this Patrol Report is quite good, however, Mr. Dunger will have to take more care with his sentence construction.

It seems a pity that the people have wasted their time over the years in constructing the airstrip at Tapen which is not in actual fact used. The new airstrip site seems to be a far better proposition in all respects. I do not think that cash crops will be transported out by aircraft as this airstrip will more than likely be used only by the Lutheran Mission and not by commercial aircraft. The length of the airstrip precludes the uplift of large amounts of coffee etc., also, the altitude would restrict the uplift weight of aircraft.

The cargo cultism mentioned on page 2 is something that has been with us for a long time and I feel that it will not affect the economic development of the area. The populace of these villages mentioned are not all followers of the cargo cult.

I wish to compliment Mr. Dunger on the thorough way in which he has done the "Social Groupings". This shows dedication to his work.

Under "Literacy" - it is a pity that there is a difficult situation existing at Umboldi School. It is quite likely that this school will be closed in the next year or so due to the attitude of parents not allowing their children to go to school, and also the fact that the parents do not help with the upkeep of the school. I am making enquiries into the ownership of the land at Umboldi and will advise further.

I feel that the radios in the area are doing a lot to assist us in getting the message of self-government across.

Under "The Economy of the Area" - I am quite sure that there are a lot more coconuts than the figures quoted by Mr. Dunger as the coastline from Saidor to the Morobe District border has a continual grove of coconuts along its length. The reason the coffee production has fallen is twofold one, the distance which coffee has to be carried; and two, a fall in price. I agree with Mr. Dunger that the possibilities of expanding the economy are excellent as there are large tracts of land which could be easily used for cattle grazing. The Department of Lands is considering acquiring a large tract of land in the Malalamai area for eventual subdivision into small holder blocks. The people are quite willing to sell what is probably in the vicinity of 1,000 acres.

 - (b) Cargo Cult at Gali, Bonga, Sel, Bandit, Mulumiang, Kalalin and Wiliwilian. Only report on any cutwardly observable trends influence on economic social and political development. Please do not deride any members of the cult for their beliefs.
 - (c) Political Education. Ensure that your talks to the people are clear, precise and short. Only talk on two subjects as I suggested as the people will become confused if you talk on all nine topics. I suggest that your topics for discussion should be "The work of a member of the House of Assembly and political parties". Note the interest of the people, their reactions to your talks, any comments made by them, their understanding of your talks etc.
 - (d) Attitudes of the people towards the Council do they feel that it is doing enough for them; can they give us any ideas for improvement of the Council etc.
 - (e) Are the people experiencing any difficulties in disposing of their cash crops.
 - (f) Has this long dry period affected their gardens and crops.

A. INTRODUCTION:

The main objectives of this patrol were to up-date the area study for the WARUP CENSUS DIVISION and to revise the Census.

This region is situated in the southern sector of the Saidor Sub District, bounded by the Yupna River. The Upper Nankina Census Division forms the western boundary and the Nankina River the northern boundary.

The objectives of this patrol, as outlined in the patrol instructions, were successfully carried out.

(a) The area is typical of the sub-district, with narrow coastal belt which exceeds almost two miles, rising suddenly to heights exceeding 5,500 ft. above sea level. The vegetation varies from kunai patches and coconut plantings on the coast, and primary rain forests in the middle, to the beginning of mass forest in the high ranges extending to the Finisterre mountains. The Warup Census Division is extremely rugged abounding in fast flowing rivers and creeks which swell to such proportion during the wet season that they make communication between villages difficult.

The rainfall per year is approximately 160 inches in the highlands and 120 inches in the coastal region. This rain mostly falls in the months of November to May during the north-west monsoon winds. As from beginning of May to end of August 1972, the southeast monsoon wind brought a very dry period which affected a lot of village gardens and creeks in respect of food and water consumption.

The pattern of the terrain is characterized by long descending parallel surplines from Finisterre leading in a slight north-west of north direction. This is one of the reasons why the patrol encountered hard going when travelling from east to west in the mountains.

(b) Enclosed is a map showing the ensus Division and the vehicular roads in the area. The truck vehicular road from Saidor to Sel has been extended further east to Malalamai Village, and three minor vehicular roads, one ascending from beyond Lagap Plantation to Wilwilian, one before crossing Biding Ford to Fangger and one after crossing Biding Ford to Umboldi. There was another minor vehicular road ascending from Mur following to Kabui River but this has been closed for local people's cattle project. Even though two major

- C. SOCIAL GROUPINGS:
- (a) Within this area there are four distinctive social groups -



rivers in the area are fordable I feel work needs to be undertaken to erect fords across Warup River by Sel Village and Yaut River by Yagomi Village. This will keep communications flowing smoothly in the seven months wet period from November to May. It is also hoped that the vehicular road to Malalamai will soon be extended to Gali which can be finalised on the boundary of Morobe District.

- (c) There is an all weather airstrip at Saidor and a small airstrip at Tapen which has been opened only for Lutheran Mission 'planes. In actual fact, Lutheran Mission 'planes are not using the airstrip for it is too short for aircraft landing. People of Tapen, Bwana, Maom, Windiluk and Gabutamon have already worked on a new airstrip site approximately two miles west of Tapen Lutheran Mission Station. The airstrip lies from the north to the south with a length of 2,200 ft. and width of 150 ft. People have worked 150 ft. from castern end of the airstrip towards southern end. With the help of the Lutheran Mission, providing tools for the construction of the airstrip, the people are showing a lot of interest in the construction work. After completion of this airstrip I am certain it will be of great benefit to the people economically and socially. I emphasize the airstrip will ease the economy of these people and develope their social attitudes. Disregarding the airstrip, I can not see any possibility of transporting the productivity of cash crops from isolated regions to coastal anchorages for shipment. There is a wharf at Saidor and good anchorages at Bonga, Malalamai and Gali.
- (d) Prior to World War I the coastal region was contacted and administered by the Germans. Until recent times the villages in the upper reaches of Warup Census Division were contacted by Lutheran and Catholic Missionaries. Some of the villages have since been ignored of their social, political and economic attitudes. The Lutheran Mission particularly is very active and influential in the area with the sub headquarters at Tapen. Even though Catholic and Lutheran Missions have representatives in most of the villages, it is typical that the people are accepting Christianity on a dualistic basis with their own pagan beliefs. I feel that the Mission influence in the region is more apparent than real.

The existence of cargo cultism does penetrate the area and is accepted by certain villages. There are eight villages - Bonga, Gali, Seure, Kakimar, Bandit, Wilwilian, Kalalin and Fangger - involved in the cargo cult movement. I will elaborate on cultism later in my Situation Report.

It is obvious that the inhabitants of the Upper Warup are more industrious than their counterparts along the coastal belt and of course it habituates the whole of Rai Coast.

B. POPULATION DISTRIBUTION TRENDS:

- (a) A copy of the latest Population Register is attached to this report as Appendix I.
- (b) The attached map as Appendix II shows to scale the main tracks in the region.

There is a vehicular road along the coast from Saidor to Malalawai; the Upper warup inhabitants come through the small radial tracks to the coast bringing garden crops or cash crops to Saidor by vehicles for cash purchases. The traditional system of barter trade is for the time being adequate in the region through the small radial tracks.

- (c) The labour flow in and out of the area is sufficient. No comment.
- C. SOCIAL GROUPINGS:
- (a) Within this area there are four distinctive social groups -



- (1) The Isat social group comprising the villages of Yagomi, Sel, Mur, Bazu, Malalamai, Bonga, Seure, Watang, Kepoiak and Kapungkapang.
- (2) The Ohatike social groups comprising Bandit, Umboldi, Mulumiang, Nampa, Suang, Kakimar, Fangger and Saui.
- (3) The Yung social group is made up of the villages of Bulgebi, Guiarak, Daman, and Kapundangin.
- (4) The Domun social group comprises the villages of Tapen, Bwanz, Windiluk, Maom and Gabutamon.

The Ohatike social group also comprises a small inter-related section called Asaro which Ohatike people can understand although their respective languages vary in dialect.

- (b) The functional social is the lineage which is constantly patrilineal throughout the area.
- (c) Refer Section (a). The Lutheran Mission teaches Kote in its schools at Tapen area while the Catholics prefer Pidgin or Neo-Melanesian. English is taught compulsorily by both Missions but I feel that it is too late and too little. Unless the Administration takes a strong hand in the matter, the whole issue of the teaching of one Franco-Lingua can only become more of a hopeless melange than it actually is.
- (d) As I see throughout the area the various social groupings maintain a relatively harmonious relationship with each other. During political talks the query arose from the older generation in several villages concerning departure of the Administration. In fact one of the greatest fears of the people, and one that was brought to my attention, seems to be the fear that the harmony could easily evaporate after the Administration departs and internecine warfare could follow after independence.

The trading contacts and inter-marriages between Domun in the mountains and Isat in the coast are fairly constant. The rest are relatively similar. Much litigation arises in the area due to the fact that child adoption is so prevalent.

(e) The relationship between Warup social groupings and outsiders occurs through Domun and Yung people who have extensive blood ties with some of the group from the Upper Nankina reaches.

D. LEADERSHIP:

(a) Wengam Dubot of Tapen, and Wamburan Waglo of Yagomi, are only two respected leaders who appear to be more influential among their people. The leadership is acquired, not inherited.

(b) Personal details -

Wengam is pro Administration and is a Counciller for Ward 2. In May, 1972, elections, he was elected unopposed. He is married and has several (natural and adopted) children. His father appears to have been influential among the Domun social groupings. He is Lutheran Mission educated and speaks Domun, Kote and Pidgin fluently.

Wamburan Waglo is a subsistant farmer, married with one child. The people along the coastal belt from Seure to Gali have respected him highly. He had contested Cr. J. Moreng in this year's elections but was unsuccessful. Wamburan is very px pragmatic in his political views.

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E. LAND TENURE AND USE:

(a) Land ownership obviously is profilineal with the division and sub-division resulting from inher nce creating a positive competition for the development by entrepreneurs for farming or planting ventures.

The community owned land follows the pattern of other areas in the Territory. It was observed that in the villages of Bandit and Umboldi there is a definite manpower shortage and villagers are making land available under certain circumstances to newcomers if they are prepared to settle in their villages.

(b) The Administration land lease is held only by European interests.

Bokoma (1½ acres) near Seure was held by the S.D.A. Mission since the early fifties and was being reverted to land owners. Near Tapen there are five acres of land, held by the Lutheran Mission since 1953 with minety-nine years lease.

Nom had extended to (231 acres) near Baru, owned by Saidor Plantations, was purchased in April 1960.

Darwun (142 acres) between Mur and Lagap, owned by Saidor Plantations and purchased in March 1960.

Lagap (515 acres) owned by Saidor Plantations and purchased in May 1960.

About 220 acres owned by S.D.A. Mission between Bonga and Gali have been reverted to the land owners at Bonga. The people of the area are apparently not interested in Land Tenure Conversion, generally they have no knowledge of tenure conversion.

(c) Some communal effort is made at times with planting and harvesting of cash crops with the supervision of D.A.S.F. Officers but this more than often does not gather sufficient cash in order to pay Council taxes.

F. LITERACY:

(a) There are three schools in the area. Two are Administration schools and one is a Lutheran Mission school. All schools teach English. The Lutheran Mission school teaches to Standard V. The Mission plans to employ an additional teacher next year for Standard VI.

There are three native teachers at Umboldi, and one European with four native teachers at Saidor. The Tapen Lutheran Mission School and Saidor Administration school appear to be functioning well with no complaints from either parents or teachers.

Umboldi Administration Primary School seems to be encountering hardship between teachers and parents. The complaints from Headteacher, Umboldi, seem to be apparent and reasonable. Parents were inquired for children for the Preparatory Class for the year 1973 and the result was nil. Parents expect some sort of payment for their reluctant maintenance of school. The Umboldi land owners also inquired re payment for the piece of land which the school operates on. I was informed by the school Headteacher of the attitudes of parents towards the education of their children. Three female children, eligible for attendance at High School next year were being discouraged and prevented from acquiring further education.

- (b) Only a small proportion of adults are literate in vernacular, Pidgin or English.
- (c) Seeking employment and better living conditions, the patrol could not find any person with equivalent to Intermediate or above, being a resident of Warup Census Division. Due to the scarcity of employment in the area those who have in the past received higher education now reside elsewhere and will continue to do so in the future.
- (d) Most of the students moving out of the area to acquire higher education are from the coastal region and only a small portion are from upper Warup reaches. As I have mentioned earlier in (F(d)), the inland parents need to be incited to standard where they can appreciate the value of education.
- (e) There are fifteen to sixteen radios in the area. Apart from local broadcasting stations, no interest whatever is shown in the National Broadcasts. The musical programmes are most appreciated at the village level. Newspapers in Pidgin are read more often and greatly enjoyed as cigarette papers. Informal programmes and current affairs are understood by younger generation when in Pidgin.

G. STANDARD OF LIVING:

(a) The houses built in coastal belt and lower ridges are on stilts about three to four feet off the ground. Walls are of bamboo with thatched grass roofs. Most houses have bamboo floors, and kitchens are normally built outside the living rooms.

Due to the extremely low temperature at night time, the villagers of the Upper Warup construct squat houses with bamboo floors and grass roofs. In every house the fire place is constructed in the centre of the living room which serves as a kitchen and at night gives warmth to the house dwellers. The majority of houses lack windows or ventilation of any sort. The houses could improve if the kitchens are built outside. Latrines are constructed in every village the patrol visited and are built outside the normal boundaries of the village itself.

The cophisticated coastal inhabitants have fully adopted the European style of clothing and artifacts in large quantity. Clothing in the hills is acceptable by the inhabitants at the ages of 10 to 36. The younger ones (females) wear "purpur" the grass skirts and the males were "mallo" the bark loin cloth, and the same situation applies to older people in their forties. The European artifacts are used abundently in the villages. The most commonly used are of the practical nature, such as cooking pots, axes, kerosene, lamps (hurricane and Coleman), bush knives etc.

The patrol could not see any plough or hoe, or anything of that nature in the villages. Most villages in the area have two to three shotguns and they are used for protection of crops and for obtaining fresh meat by shooting pigs and birds. All of the shotguns were inspected and found in good condition.

- (b) The basic diet is invariably the same throughout the area. Sometimes along the coastal belt, coconuts and fish substitute taro, yams, Kong Kong taro and sweet potatoes. In the hills the common diet is substituted sometimes by introduced items such as cucumbers, cabbages, tomatoes and potatoes. Canned food is rarely bought on cash basis from the several unattractive local village trade stores.
- (c) There are no community centres or other type of organisation in the area. People show no apparent interest in sport, but soccer, for which they show remarkable skill and ability, is played regularly at Saidor.

H. MISSIONS:

(a) The Missions operating in the area are Lutheran Mission with Headquarters at Tapen, and Catholic Mission with Headquarters at Saidor. Both Missions influence to some extent and operate very well in the area. There are no conflicts with church concerns among believers of both missions.

Besides the Lutheran and Catholic Missions there is a small group of Seventh Day Adventist Mission members at Seure Village. There again, no segregation among believers, but in my opinion the only source of possible conflict in the near future could be the existence of well organised cargo cultism.

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(b) A small Aid Post and airstrip, see Section A(c), are provided by the Lutheran Mission. The people of Malalamai also get some help from the Lutheran Mission towards buying a boat which is now making regular movement along the coast.

Both Catholic and Lutheran Missions have provided schools at the village level in several villages. In fact the Missions provide no firm employment apart from the casual labourers employed by Lutheran Mission at Tapen.

(c) As I have mentioned earlier regarding people accepting Christianity on dualistic basis with their own little pagan beliefs, some of them are reacting apathetically towards the new faith.

I. NON-INDIGENES:

- (a) The only plantation in the Warup region is operated by Mr. K. Cazzonelli on behalf of Saidor Plantations as co-owner.
- (b) The number of labourers employed on Saidor Plantations has increased up to fifty-five for the last two years but this figure fluctuates according to seasonal needs.
- (c) One outlet for primary produce is at Malalamai and is operated by the Lutheran Mission and the boat owners. There are two local co-operative copra buyers, one at Malalamai and the other at Gali. The Malalamai boat lifts copra to Madang for sale. The boat is operating fairly well, servicing local people and the Administration field officers.

Other outlets at Saidor consist of -

- (1) The D.A.S.F. buying produce and onforwarding it to Madang.
- (ii) Saidor Plantation does the same.

People of Malalamai and Bonga Villages have made a request for a larger co-operative to function along the coastal region and buy products from both coastal and inland.

J. COMMUNICATIONS:

- (a) Refer Section A(b). The Sel Bluff road which is built through south on to Seure is fairly dangerous for a heavy load. The road is appraximately 500 yards south from the crossing point. I feel that it is far shorter to blast the northern wall of the Bluff and also this will reduce the work expense in erection of ford across the actual crossing point.

K. TECHNICAL AND CLERICAL SKILLS:

There are 36 residents in the region with technical skills, comprising teachers, doctors, carpenters, plumbers, power house operator and drivers. About sixty-four people with diverse employment ranging from clerks to electricians are residing outside the area surveyed.

L. THE STAGE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT:

On the main the people are politically aware of the rapid political changes. The Rai Coast Local Government Council was created in 1964 and the people have been represented since then.



This of course was a major change in the politics. The further realistic change and experience gained was in the process of the House of Assembly Elections in which they participated and Mr. J.B. Poe was elected for Rai Coast Open Electorate.

The sophisticated coastal electorate and its highland counterpart have in them an encouraging creative approach towards the political emergence. As they realise and understand the meaning of representation they freely use their knowledge, approaching not only in council debate, but bringing up their political awarenews to their own representative in the House.

However, the practical concept of politics is not the main issue. The people are most uncertain in their minds about so called "vague rumours" of independence which are quite agitated by them. In the course of this patrol I understand that the fear of independence arose from misinterpretations of "self-government" and "Independence".

The concept of national unity is very indistinct but on the tribalism basis it is firmly advancing between tribes and comparative clans. To emphasise on the national unity, the sophisticated coastal electorate are more advanced than their highland counterpart who are pushing their way through to standardize themselves. I feel this can only be done by a constant and patient process of trade and communication exchanges which of course take time.

The advancement towards politics, apart from the concept of the law and order, has changed for a little better in the last two years in class homogeneity of the people. There is a class polarization of people beginning to penetrate the area and positive political issue is gradually advancing throughout the region.

M. THE ECONOMY OF THE AREA:

(a) Along the coastal belt the inhabitants grow coconuts only. Their highland counterparts grow coffee and coconuts. The total economic trees in the area are - coconuts 30,873; coffee Arabica 40,531; and coffee Robusta 1,858. These are accurate figures showing trees of bearing age. The figures below represent the immature economic trees - coconuts 47,239; coffee Arabica 38,256; and coffee Robusta 450. The figures undermentioned represent the total production for the year - coconuts 104 tons; coffee Arabica 30 tons; and coffee Robusta 1.1 tons. The figures were obtained from D.A.S.F. Officer's records.

Following uncertainty in the international market, the planting of coffee has decreased considerably.

- (b) The above compiled figures give a more realistic picture of the economical progress in the area. In fact only one third of the total production finds its way out into the market and in some isolated places the proportion may be even smaller. The outlet for coffee from the eastern half is Tapen in the Warup Census Division. The Lutheran Mission has at times bought production carried down by the central villages such as Gabutamon or watang at Malalamai. The north-western group find their way to Saidor where D.A.S.F. officer-in-charge buys their production. Saidor Plantations and Co-ops. buy copra production. The current market prices are paid for both staples.
- (c) The average planting density for coffee Arabica is 500 to ser acre which produce a total of 36 tons per year, and Bobusta coffee is planted at an average density of 618 trees per acre with an annual production of 1.1 tons, and four (4) being the estimated number of growers.

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The average planting density of coconut trees per acre is 70 with total annual production of 104 tons and 372 being the estimated number of grovers.

Three growers for cocoa interplanted with average planting density of 350 trees per acre. Total production for the year is 0.7 tons.

It is estimated that the average planting density of these staple crops will rapidly be promoted.

- (d) The earning ability of the people is supplemented by the sale of introduced crops to Tapen Lutheran Mission or in Saidor. The sale of European type vegetables is definitely expanding but at present transportation is extremely difficult.
- (e) The Administration employees, council employees, Mission employees and Saidor Plantation workers are all employed at current basic rate of pay.
- (f) No co-operatives functioning in the Warup Census Division.
- (g) As this patrol investigated there are no individual interpreneurs but there several trade stores in villages which are comprised of class family unit establishment. The following villages have trade stores (one in each village) Yagome, Malalamai, Gali, Tapen, Gabutamon, Bagen, Umboldi and Fangger. All trade stores operate on cash sale basis and quite often most of these run out of stock. The main cause of this is lack of commercial knowledge and transportation difficulties.
- (h) There is only one Commonwealth Savings Bank agency at Saidor. The amount of money held by people in Bank Accounts is amazingly high. The people are reluctant to release their current balances and the patrol could not give balances in detail.
- (i) About five people from Bwana and three from Gabutamon did not pay their Council taxes and they were given two weeks to lodge their payment. Most of the people expressed their disappointment that the production outlet is too remote. No comments about the coastal inhabitants.
- (j) Per capita income for the area-is not possible to make an accurate reckoning.
- (k) Refer Sections A(b), A(c), B(b) and M(d).

N. POSSIBILITIES OF EXPANDING ECONOMY:

- (a) There is an abundance of land in the region, uncultivated. with opportunities for exportable stable crops and cattle grazing.
- (b) Until access to shipping points is created I doubt any increase in market gardening. It is costly to build roads due to the rugged nature of the terrain and I reckon this cost could not at present be compensated by the output of produce. As people today understand political and economical issues they urge the building of roads through the area, which would serve both garden produce and the production of coffee. The other alternative is airfreight. As years went by the people are beginning to realise their unsuccessful demands to Administration or a Council for assistance of some sort.

The people of Tapen and the surrounding villages have worked willingly on a new airstrip site at Tapen. The other group at Subura has started a vehicular road to the coast which will adjoin Saidor/Malalamai road.



- (c) The construction of developmental roads by which markets may be reached is one way to increase wage earnings. Development Bank Loan to local people for cattle grazing. In the absence of enterpreneur-employers I feel this would relieve unemployment and bring forth a flow of cash. The introduction of a relatively large amount of public monies should be immediately followed by the creation of secondary and tertiary industries. Unfortunately this region is far from such development.
- (d) Very little interest is shown in fishing. There is one cattle project at Mur, owned by Waleleng Ambo of Bagen and Tot Apura of Subura, both men from middle reaches of the Upper Warup, who obtained a loan from the Development Bank and started the cattle project. In the shole sub-district the highland people are the people with a lot of initiative and industries. There is only one person in the coastal belt of Warup Census Division Joseph Moreng of Malalamai, who is at the moment thinking of starting another cattle project in the area. The people are aware of running primary industries on a small scale only because they lack the commercial know-how.

There are large quantities of quality timber, particularly on Malalamai/Tapen slopes, but the above remarks show that the reactions of the people will never be effective towards such development. The people are of course realising the changes of cash economy involved in the area and what one would appreciate is work put in the planting of young economic trees.

O. ATTITUDE TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT:

The Warup inhabitants understand the principle of Local Government and feel favourably inclined owards it.

P. ATTITUDE TOWARDS CENTRAL GOVERNMENT:

The people know very little about central government. In every village this patrol visited I explained the composition and the work of the House of Assembly, its members, and the work of the Chief Minister and Party Politics. In fact it will take the average inhabitant a long while to understand the principles of responsible and representative Government.

Q. ACCOMMODATION SERVICES AND FACILITIES:

Reasonable rest houses virtually exist in all villages. There are no hotels, workshops or service stations in the area.

PATROL REPORT NO. 3 - SAIDOR - 1972/1973

Attached please find three copies of the above Patrol Report, written by Mr. R. Booth, Patrol Officer. Also enclosed please find Situation Reports 1 to 5 and Claims for Camping Allowance.

My comments are as follows:-

The patrol report is brief, as it should be, and all relevant information is contained in the Situation Reports. My comments on the Situation Reports are appended as separate correspondence.

ECCNOMIC: The Mot Census Division contains very valuable areas of arable land which have not been exploited to the full by the local people. The work on the Maibang Road is proceeding satisfactorily, the council having a permanent labour line of thirty working on this road. It is hoped that shortly a private firm of road contractors will be carrying out more work on this road as the council has sufficient funds to hire plant.

LAW AND ORDER: The law and order situation in this census division is good. The people all have a little difficulty in remembering the day on which their shotguns become liable for reregistration. I feel that a regulation should be introduced to have all shotguns registered on the one day in the year as is the case with trade store licences.

HEALTH: I feel that it was an excellent idea having a health extension officer travel with the patrol to administer triple-antigen to the children of the area. This patrol has virtually brought triple-antigen vaccinations up to date in the area.

LAND DISPUTES: The land dispute mentioned is in the process of being investigated at the moment. It is not a serious dispute and I feel should be quite easily settled.

MISCELLANEOUS: As you know, Mr. Booth was transferred to Bundi midway through this patrol and therefore the report covers only seventeen villages. This will be rectified with the departure on patrol on the 1st November, 1972 of Mr. Easpar Yaman, Patrol Officer, who will complete the patrol.

AREA STUDY: The area study has been up-dated and very little has happened since the last study was done. Cargo culting in the area would appear to be on the wane and Dui is taking over more and more of Yali's powers due to the latter's advanced age and increased senility. A lot of what Yali allegedly says does not come from him at all but from Dui. Dui appreciated that Yali is still looked up to by the people of parts of the Rai Coast and other areas inside and outside this district.

Under (D)LEADERSHIP (b) - 1 wish to point out that Mr. Peter Tarur is not Council President. Peter is a very progressive man and his cows have just started to calve. He has approximately 21 head of stock at the time of writing. I refer to my 35/6/4 of the 25th instant in respect of the land on which Peter has his cattle project.

Under (F) LITERACY: I am deeply concerned that schools are being closed in this area. It is appreciated that if children do not attend a school it should be closed, however, there would appear to be something basically wrong with the people's thinking if schools are closed. It could be quite possible that during 1973 two more schools will be closed in the Saidor area due to poor attendance.

Under (J) COMMUNICATIONS (a) Roads - There has been a very good improvement in the attitude of the people towards road work, particularly between Biliau and Lamtub. In the paut six weeks this road has been up-graded quite considerably by the people.

Under (1) STAGE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT: It is encouraging to note that the political awareness of the people is increasing all the time. These people certainly have a very good grasp of the principles of democratic government and also of self-government.

(M) POSSIBILITIES OF EMPANDING THE ECONOMY: A lot needs to be done in this field and I feel that the Department of Agriculture could help the people a lot. Diversification in crop plantings would appear to be the answer to the economic slump in the prices of coffee and copra.

(P) ATTITUDES TOWARDS CENTRAL GOVERNMENT: We are all aware that Councillor Dui makes trouble only to further his own ends. I am sure that his followers are not very enamoured with the way he conducts himself on occasions. Even his close family have spoken to me about his beliefs in the cargo cult and they said that they did not go along with his ideas.

As previously discussed, please be prepared to depart on patril on or about 15th September, 1972 for the Mot Census Division. You will be accompanied by one member of the Royal Papua and New Guinea Constabulary. The objects of your patrol will be as follows:-

- 1. Up-dating of the area study for this Census Division.
- 2. Up-dating of the census.
- 3. General administration.
- 4. Please check all shotgum registrations and trade store licences in the area patrolled.
- 5. Please check on the section of road from Biliau Lutheran Mission to the border of the Yaganon Census Division. Should the people require any assistance or advice, please do not hesitate in giving it to them.
- 6. Please arbitrate in any minor disputes if the people request you to do this. Please list all land disputes and applications under Section 7 of the Lands Titles Commission Ordinance.
- 7. Please prepare situation reports on the following subjects -
 - (a) Cargo Cult throughout the coastal area of this Census Division. Only report on any outwardly observable trends and the influence on economic, social and political development. Please ensure that you do not deride members of the Cargo Cult but accept them as you would non-believers in this movement. I would like you to visit Yali at Sor and talk with him about the progress of the road into his village. He is very keen to see this road completed and I would advice you to help him in any way possible with surveys etc.
 - (b) Political Education: Ensure that your talks are clear, precise and short. Do not try to cover the "Nine Topics" in one speech. I would prefer you to pick out two topics and give the people a talk on each of these. My experience has shown that the best time to get the message across is in the late afternoon when you will have the older people, particularly the males, gather around you

for a question-and-answer time. Please check the interest of the people in Political Education, their reactions to your talks, any comments made by them, and whether you think that they comprehend what you are saying.

- (c) The attitudes of the people towards the Council do they feel that the Council is assisting them enough; can they give you any ideas which may help them in their social and economic advancement? You will probably find that requests for Aid Posts, funds for road maintenance, schools etc. will be the most common requests. Do not dismiss these but tell the people that you will present their wishes to the Council.
 - (d) Are the people experiencing any difficulties in disposing of their cash crops. Are they interested in marketing their coffee and copra. Do they feel that they would like to see more experimentation done with trial crops of varying cash crops.
 - (e) Is there any resentment by the people on the coastal fringe towards their inland neighbours who have acquired land from them under the Lands Titles Commission Ordinance.
 - (f) Please inspect all Aid Posts and inquire of the Aid Post orderlies whether or not they have sufficient supplies of drugs and dressings.
 - (g) Please visit Biliau Lutheran Mission school and the Administration Primary 'T' School at Pang Pang and give the children in Standards 4, 5 and 6 a short talk on the work of the Council. I would prefer that you made these talks more of a question-and-answer type discussion.

You will be accompanied by a Health Officer who will be giving the children of the area their Triple Antigen injections. Please give him every assistance that he may need.

I refer you to the Secretary's 67-1-10 of the 24th February, 1972, his confidential memorandum of the 13th June, 1972, and his 14-1-0 of the 22nd August, 1972. I also refer you to the District Commissioner's 67-1-1 of the 2nd August, 1972.

Please have your patrol report submitted to me within four (4) days of your return.

I wish you a happy and successful patrol and look forward to your return in early October.

ECONOMIC:

Several rural development roads are in the process of being constructed to exploit the considerable agricultural potential of the MOT Census Division.

The road from BILIAU Lutheran Mission to the border of the YAGANON Census Division was checked as per patrol instructions and arrangements made for additional work and repairs.

The BILIAU/MAIBANG road is levelled and gravelled for about 1 mile beyond DAMOIN. Work has been carried out by the residents of MAIBANG who are somewhat bitter about having received no help from DAMOIN. There appears to be ample limestone available locally for surfacing the road.

Councillor TOMINAKI of AIYAWA was instructed to commence clearing the proposed deviation approximately & mile west of PANG PANG on the YAMAI/SINDAMA road but work had already started on this section. For information on the GALEK/SOR road see Situation Report No. 1.

LAW AND ORDER:

A check of all shotgum and store licenses was carried out in the area patrolled and these, except in one or two cases, were found to be in order. The number of shotgums and stores in the area patrolled are set out below.

HEALTH:

The patrol was accompanied by a health extension officer who administered triple-antigen to the children in each village visited. Generally health was satisfactory throughout the area patrolled.

At MAIBANG the toilet situation was found wanting, there being two toilets to 170 people. These were in state of disrepair. The were told to construct more toilets and these would be checked by the next patrolling officer.

LAND DISPUTES:

Only one land dispute was noted during the course of the patrol. BAGAM/YAS of WARAI alleges that he has a coconut plantation south of WARAI. BILIAU claims the land is theirs. Earlier this year the A.D.C. Saidor forbade either the WARAIs or BILIAUs from having anything to do with the land until the matter is straightened out. I suggest action be taken to have this matter finalised as about an acre and a half of coconuts are in danger of being ruined because no one is allowed to go near them or maintain them.

MISCELLANEOUS:

During the course of this patrol I received word of my impending transfer to BUNDI. Because of this the patrol bad to be cut short. As a result of this a census was carried out in only 17 of the villages in this census division.

My patrol instructions were followed in as much as I was able during the time, however, I was not able to complete paragraph 7 (f) and (g) of the instructions and other matters reported upon relate only to the areas visited during the course of the patrol and not the complete census division.

AREA STUDY

(A) INTRODUCTION:

The area covered by this patrol was part of the MOT Census Division. Party only, because, having received word of impending transfer to BUNDI, the patrol had to be cut short.

(a) The area is bounded to the north by the BISMARK SEA and to the south by the FINISTERRE RANGES. The YANGDAR RIVER marks the western boundary and the NANKINA RIVER the eastern boundary.

The coast is a narrow belt varying between half a mile and four miles in width. Kunai ridges extend upwards into rain forests, then moss forest and open grassland. The area has many deep gorges and fast flowing rivers and streams. The rainfall is 150-160" per year most of which is received between the months of November and May, during the northwest monsoon.

(b) The map accompanying this report shows the location of the area in relation to Saidor Sub District Headquarters. A road runs north from SAIDOR to the YANGDAR RIVER. A suspension bridge across the MOT RIVER has recently been completed at considerable expense. Roads are under construction from YAMAI to SINDAMA, from BILIAU to MAIBANG and from GALEK to SOR.

The only airstrip in this censu division is the Lutheran Mission strip at BILIAU. There are good anchorages at WAB, GUMBI, YAMAI, BILIAU AND SINGUR.

(c) Coastal and sub coastal areas of the MOT census division were first contacted by the German Administration prior to 1914. The Lutheran Mission is still the dominant mission in the area, followed by the Catholic Mission.

Cargo Cultism is still active in isolated pockets of this census division but not generally throughout the area. It is confined mainly to the wards of YALI and DUI. It does not appear to be the strong force that it was once on the Rai Coast.

The Lutheran Mission school/at SINDAMA has been closed due to poor attendance. An Administration school has been established at PANG PANG teaching standards 1 to 6 and consisting of 128 pupils. Unfortunately no break up of pupils is supplied as I intended returning by vehicle at a later date to do this.

The same applies to the Lutheran Mission school at BILIAU and AUWAU. Due to my posting I was unable to carry this through.

(J) COMMUNICATIONS:

(a) ROADS - All roads are shown on the map attached to this report. The main road going from SAIDOR to LAMTUB follows the coastline and is being gradually improved. Several rivers have to be crossed, a task which is frequently impossible in the wet season due to flash floods. The concrete causeway crossing the MOT River has been replaced by an elaborate suspension bridge which it is hoped will make it possible to cross in adverse weather conditions. The bridge is due to be opened on the 17th Cotober, 1972.

The YAMAI/SINDAMA road is now pushed about & mile beyond PANG PANG school and work is steadily progressing.

The BILIAU/MAIBANG road now reaches about & mile beyond the village of DAMOIN.

A road is also being constructed from GALEK to SOR.

- (b) SEA There are no wharves in this census division and anchorages are indicated on the attached map.
- (c) ATR The only airstrip in the MOT Census Division is at the Lutheran Mission at BILIAU.
- (d) RIVE 3 There are no navigable rivers in the area.

(K) TECHNICAL AND CLERICAL SKILLS:

No change

(L) STAGE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT:

(a) Although the level of political awareness varies throughout the area, on the whole it appears to be increasing in this census division. The coastal people understandably have a greater grasp of political thinking than their counterparts in the more remote mountain areas, but the dividing gap does not appear to be a large one.

Councillors appear to be doing a relatively good job of imparting the outcome of meetings etc. to their wards.

(M) ECONOMY OF THE AREA:

No change apart from scattered small rice plantings and Councillor TARUR's cattle project near the MOT River bridge which has not as yet yielded a roturn. (See situation report No. 4 attached to this report)

(N) POSSIBILITIES OF EXPANDING THE ECONOMY:

Principal economic crops of the area are corra and arabica coffee and of late several small rice plantings. On the coast there is still sufficient land for further plantings but inland the terrain is suitable in the main only for arabica. Market Gardening was encouraged in certain areas but transport difficulties may be a bar to its success.

Interest in cattle projects is rife and there is suitable land on the coast. Development Bank loans are being contemplated in several cases and the future in this sphere looks bright.

(0) ATTITUDE TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT:



(P) ATTITUDE TOWARDS CENTRAL GOVERNMENT:

It is evident that people in the area with the concept of Papua New Guinea as a unit can see the necessity of a centralized Government. There is however, certain amount of ill feeling against the Administration, as mentioned earlier, in isolated pockets of this census division. Most vocal spokesman for this group is Councillor DUI of WARAI village and all or most of these molcontents are to be found in his followers. YALI himself appears to have drifted from the scene and is no longer vocal. It is difficult to ascertain just how many followers DUI has but I am confident that they represent a fairly small portion of the MOT Census Division.

Wednesday, 9/8/1972

Departed Saidor by a tractor for Lamtub School. Arrived 12.30 c.m. Walked to the Lamtub Village and camped for the night.

Thursday, 10/8/1972

Collected tax at Lamtub Village, departed for Mindiri Village at 3.30 p.m. Arrived Mindiri at 6.30 p.m. and camped for the night.

Friday, 11/8/1972

Tax collected at Nindiri, commencing at 8.30 a.m. and finishing at 6.30 p.m. Camped for the night.

Saturday, 12/8/1972

Tax collected at Mindiri from 8.30 a.m. to 6.50 p.m. The people from the inland of the Yaganon Census Division paid their tax this day.

Sunday, 13/8/1972

Departed Mindiri for Forguan at 8.30 a.m. and arrived 1.30 p.m. Camped for the night. Forguan Village is about half way between Lamtub and Mindiri villages. The road is well kept all along the coast.

During the night villagers asked me about the road from Saidor to Madang and it was explained that at the moment there are no plans for the construction of this road. This year there are no new works in the Council's estimates, all the works are being carried forward from last year.

Tuesday, 15/8/1972

Departed Forguan for Lamtub, arriving at 12.30 p.m. Tax collected at Lamtub. Got a car at Lamtub School at 1.30 p.m. and arrived back at Saidor about 3.30 p.m.

Monday, 21/8/1972

The patrol was continued. Departed Saidor by the Council Toyota for Warai at 9.30 a.m. Arrived arai at 12.40 p.m. and because there were no villagers available, the patrol team canned for the night.

Tuesday, 22/8/1972

Tax collected at arai. Departed for Biliau at 1.30 p.m. Arrived at Biliau at 2.30 p.m. and camped for the night.

Wednesday, 25/8/1972

Departed Biliau for Maibang at 8.00 a.m. on foot, following the newly constructed road - "Biliau/Maibang Hoad" - and arrived at Maibang at 12.30 p.m. Tax collected at Maibang and camped for the night. The patrol camped at Maibang for three days waiting for the villagers inland.

I have mentioned earlier that the political awareness in the area patrolled is considerable, because, comparing it with previous patrols at my previous postings, this area can be regarded as one of the most influenced enes in the District. However, there was one point that kept cropping up, and that was the role of Officers of the Division of District Administration and the role of Councillors. I explained this to the best of my knowledge, particularly stating the fact that the latter runs the Local Council affairs and the former concern themselves with the affairs of the whole Eub-District.

ECONOMIC:

The economy of the area is rapidly developing with the help of the Development Bank Loans. The loans are not obtained through the Council but with the help of the Department of Agriculture Stock and Fisheries.

This year, with only copra and coffee as the major produce, the Council's revenue is Twenty-one thousand dollars (21,000). The tax itself is Thirteen Thousand dollars (13,000). However, with the help of loans obtained from the Development Sank there will be many cattle projects built which will increase the economy and in turn the Council tax rate will go up. Another thing that the people expect to be of assistance is the three major reads being built by the Council with the burn's built be three major reads being built by the Council with the burn's bring in their locally grown crops, such as pawpage and bankane, to the market promptly.

At Forguen Village the people approached se and school for guidance as to how to go about buying a work boat. I explained to them the Bank Loan System and asked them to bring this matter up with the Assistant District Commissioner for the Saidor Sub-District.

Generally speaking, the coastal strip of the Met and Yaganom Commus Divisions is better off scommically then my other area in Saidor Sub-District. This is stated because of the cattle projects built and the keen efforts in new learner plantings that can be seen. There are more and more parties asking for Bank Loans.

After some discussions on this matter I done to the conclusion that the people take that part of life as sen ting of very little or no importance at all. I realised that, although there were dancing and feastings in the older days, this form of social life, sports expecially never distol.

It was explained that social life is bost as important as any other form of life because there will be better ways of life comies from others during the gatherings and most important of all, this will lead to the unity of the country.

Finally on this aspect it can be said that the well known Cargo Cult is of very little significance to the people, only a minority group of followers exist.

(a) The upper Nankina Census Division lies in a region entirely covered by the Finisterre Mountains renges and the Highland type forest with a considerable expanse of open grassland in the Tep Tep region. With the Exception of Tariknan Village, which is a little lower, the rest of the Villages are over 2,000 ft. above sea level. As the area is very mountainous, with some 12000 ft. peaks, landslides are prevalent.

The rainfall per annum is 150" to 160" but this did not occur this year according to drought. The north-west monsoon brings rain between the periods of May and November, Generally visibility is poor in the afternoons as clouds tend to form from mid-day onwards. At night Tep Tep is the only place where it gets very cold.

- (b) The Upper Nankina region is situated south-west of Saidor Sub-District Office and is bounded on the west by Morobe District border, and on the southern end the Yupna River marks the boundary. The Census Division boundaries of Warup and Mot mark the eastern and northern ends respectively.
- (c) The Administration has contacted the area over some years with considerable influence penetrating the region. One would be proud to see the inhabitants greet and welcome Administration patrols, especially to their villages. The people provide necessary assistance to Administration patrols and one of the things I most appreciated was some cunning people in the area asked a let of political questions at formal and informal gatherings. There is no cargo cult or other movements in the area. The strength of belief in sorcery is gradually reduced by strong Lutheran Mission influence in the area. Every village has a small HAUS LOTU; with buildings of permanent materials.

On the whole their attitudes towards central government are good through the area. The people understand even less about its workings than they do about Local Government, but for all this their attitude is excellent and there is no trace of any anti-government sentiment.

It is a pity that interest in economic development on a large scale cannot be stimulated here on the Rai Coast, thus keeping virtually all people at home.

Receipt is acknowledged of the abovementioned report and Area Study of Long Island, compiled by Mr. R.B. Creach, A.D.C.

- 2. The report indicates that the situation on the island is benically satisfactory. Possibly more attention by agricultural patrols would be beneficial, and this suggestion will be offerred to the D.R.D.O. It is noted that a land problem awaits investigation by the next patrol to MARALA villago.
- 3. The favourable reaction of the people to the proposal by the Rai Coast Local Government Council that they should join that Council is noted. I, too, an of the opinion that this move will be beneficial to the people, and an asking the D.L.G.O. to undertake the necessary arrangements.
- 4. The Area Study has been well compiled, and the tecinical extracts add considerably to its value. I note that, whereas Dismond of the Alpha Helix Ex edition has estimated human recolonization of the island, following the categorophic eruption of the 18th century, at about a century and half ago, Mr. Taylor states it was 1928 apparently on definite information. Questioning by the D. C. of Matafuna villagers recently supports Mr. Taylor's statement.

This necessitated a further visit during February to complete the work already undertaken.

INTRODUCTION

(a) Long Island Census Division is composed of Long and Crown Islands, the latter being uninhabited. Long Island has two peaks, either end of the island, rising to 4,278 and 3,227 respectively. Between the two peaks there is a late of volcanic origin which has a small active island in it's centre.

The rainfall of Long Island has not been acurate measured for a whole year, however it would appear that the average rainfall would be in the vicinity of 120 - 140 inches per annum. It is interesting to note that last year there; a period of approximately 6 months when no rain was recorded.

The vegetatation is predominantly of a jungle nature rising from the shore to 4,000.

The climate of the island varies with the seasons, however the temperatures are higher than those recorded on the main-land of the sub-district.

(b) Access to Long Island is either by boat ex Madang or Saidor, or by Government Charter once weekly upon request.

The Government trawler visits Long Island monthly for two days. Matafuna Village is situated approximately 38 nautical miles from Saidor and 64 miles from Madang.

There is one airstrip on Long Island approximately 2 miles from Matafuna Village. There are no read heads or wharves.

There are good anchorages at all villages, however these are dependent on the reasons.

(c) Records of pre Second World War Administration contact are sketchy. However since the war, starting in 1946, the island has been visited frequently by the Departments of the Administration, Public Health and Agriculture. It would be safe to say that in the past few years the island has been visited at least 8 times per year.

The people on the whole are pro Administration, but their conception of it's work and ideals are hazy. Their isolation and lack of contact have made them insular in outlook. The people still lead their lives as did their forefathers, except for a few minor changes. These people don't rally want for anything in the way of food, etc.. They lead an idyllic life bereft of the worries of the world.

The cargo cult is strong in Bok and Koet. Matafuma is divided, half being pro Administration and Lutheran Mission, the other half being pro cargo cult. Melala and Foint Kiau, a hemlet of Malala, are very much pro Administration. The people have grasped the cult as being an organization that can give them benefits which the Administration cannot. The cult appears to be losing impetus and already wholly pro cult villages are being adherents particularly amongst the younger males. The solution to the cultiproblem appears to lie in ignoring it and paying attention to the economic development of the area.

There are no other movements on the island.

POPULATION - DISTRIBUTION AND TRANDS

- (a) Attached is a copy of the latest Population Register. The last census was conducted in 1970 and there has been an increase of 60 in the total population. Investigations failed to reveal how many children had died (neo mortality rate).
- (b) All villages are connected by walking tracks. One can walk around the island in two days easy walk. On the attached map walking times are shown.
- (c) Absenteeism is high for such a small population and there is no way of overcoming this problem. People are not recruited from this area to work on plantations.

SOCIAL GROUPINGS

(a) The island is divided up into four villages - Bok, Koet, Malala and Matafuma. Malala is the only village which has any hamlets, they being Point Kiau and Bok Bok. Both the settlements are small having very close attachments to their parent village.

Malala was the first village settled, it broke up and some people moved to Koet. A section of Koet then moved to Pok and settled. Bok in turn fragmented and a section of the people settled at Matafuma. The people of Malala came from Uma, and Tolokiwa Islands originally. The people of Long Island still retain close contact with the above islands.

The illages are close knit societies except for where the cult has intruded. The village is a component social group.

(b) The extended family appears to be the functional social unit. The family head rules the group. However his decisions seem to be reached in consultation with other family heads. A system of unwritten law appears to be referred to continually by titular heads of families who rely on past decisions.

- (c) The language of long Island is common to all villages and appears to be closely related to if not identical with the Tolokiwa and Umboi languages.
- (d) All villages are closely related with one another and keep in constant social contact. All villages are connected by road. The people of all four villages consider themselves to be Long Islanders, and don't identify themselves with any other group. The Boks and Koets are closely affiliated mainly because of their cultist beliefs. However both these villages plus Mataluma look on Malala as their "founding" village.
- (e) The Long Islanders have very little contact with the outside world. They are related to the Tolokiwa and Umboi Islanders, however they are not sea faring people, and do not possess sea going canoes. They are therefore cut off from the outside world and have become independent as a result thereof.

LEADER SHIP

(a) The leadership pattern is divided between the economic leaders and the cult leaders. However there is no clearly defined leadership pattern. One is either a Luluai or Tul Tul (traditional) or a cult leader. It appears that leadership is not hereditary.

One becomes a leader purely by working hard and accumulating cash and the result of this is respect. Just because a man is a leader it does not mean that his son will be a leader.

(c) The traditional leadership pattern, such as it is, does not appear to be changing. It is apparent however that some of the younger men, who will eventually become leaders, are becoming more outspoken. The younger generation are in favour of advancement in the fields of economic, political and social development. They are keen to see their people go ahead and are most keen to join the Rai Coast Council. They are fed up with the way the older leaders have been complacent in the past. They seem to realise that hard work is the only way that economic independence will be reached in the future.

E. LAND TENURE AND USE

the land tenure system on yong Island is simple in the extrame. Originally the Malala coole settled on the eastern rade of the island and by occupation became pumers of the whole island. However after this village fragmented other groups to be ever the land in close proximity to their settlements.

Apparently the island was subsequently split into four equal parts by the Administration. I cannot find any record of this division of the most of resentment amount of resentment amounts the Malala's as they conclude, and rightly so, that they are the sole owners with island due to their being the first settlers.

Inheritance is patrilineal.

- (b) No invitable hold land to Lease. The people have more than sufficient land and I feel that the question of tenure conversion should be left alone for the time being.
- (c) Cash cropping is conducted on an individual-communal basis.

 The land is communally owned and the system seems to be satisfactoru.

F. LITERACY

- (a) There is one Administration school on the island.

 English is taught in four grades vir. Standard 1, Standard

 11, Standard V and Standard V1. Whilst this survey was
 being carried out it was impossible to ascertain how many
 children would actually attend the school this year and the
 teacher could not help me with figures. Children were still
 drifting into school and their late arrival was explained
 away by cult activities and the fact that parents didn't
 know that the school year had commenced.

(c) It was not possible to ascertain who had higher education, to say, the Intermediate Certificate as none were resident during the patrol's visit. However the following number of persons were in high school.

- (d) No students are absent in Australia or this country receiving what would be termed tertiary education.
- (e) The people are avid readers of any Pidgin English publications that they can lay their hands on. Radio receivers are situated at the following villages.

The people are well informed about local and nationwide happenings and listen to the radio whenever the opportunity arises.

3. STANDARD OF LIVING

(a) Housing is typical coastal being constructed of local materials. An exception to the use of local materials would be in Bok and Koet where a lot of houses have been constructed out of sawn timber drift wood. Virtually all houses have external earth closets. Water is not plentiful as there are no running steams on the island. Water is found by digging in the sand close to the sea shore - the water so obtained is brackish.

Pots, pans, plates, knives and forks are used by all people.

Axes and spades are used and are in plentiful abundance.

Hammers, saws, screwdrivers, chisels etc. are to be found in all villages, but not in plentiful supply.

Clothes are virtually all imported and it is very rare indeed to see a person in traditional dress.

(b) People rely on the normal basic vegetables to sustain life. Taro, sweet potatoe, coconuts, paw paw, banana, marata, pit pit, sage, tabiac etc. are common, as well as numerous berries and wild fruit.

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Introduced crops are water melon, corn, cucumbers, pumpkin, beans, oranges, lemons, grapefruit etc..

The people eat and enjoy introduced crops. All the above crops are included in the peoples diet when they are in season. After the recent drought the people relied on cu-cumbers and watermer has to a large degree. During and after the recent drought the people relied on conned fish and rice to a large degree. At the time of riting the people purchase approximately \$300 worth of food items per week from Mr. Moeder, the only trader on Long Island. They also purchase goods from the 6 locally owned Trade Stores.

The seas abound with fish and turtle and the people therefore have a very high intake of these items. The bush abounds with wild pig, possum, and will fowl (introduced many years ago and are not unlike our bantam fowls). The people have no shortage of fresh meat and their protein intake is therefore high.

(c) There are no Community Centres etc. in existence on Long Island.

H. MISSIONS

(a) The only mission operating in the area is the Lutheran Mirsion. Malela is the strong hold of the Mission with virtually all people being adherents. The influence of the Mission in the other villages is not strong and this is probably due to the influence of the cult. However in each of the other three villages there are strong holds of the Mission if only amongst the members of a single family.

There doesn't appear to be any tension between villages except possibly the fact that Malala ridicules Bok and Koet for their cargo cult allegiance. However I don't consider this to be important or a cause for future disruption in village life.

Malala is the only village with a resident pastor. All other villages did have pastors however they have been withdrawn by the Mission due to the cult. I think that the Mission has taken the wrong stand in that they have openly ridiculed the cult, whereas had they ignored it things may have been a lot different. The Mission allegedly speaks out against the cult

at every opportunity, whereas probably the "Christian" approach would have been better, viz. charity and an understanding of the people's intellect.

- (b) The Lutheran Mission provides a service with a Pidgin School (Bible) at Malela. The Infant Welfare Sister from Imboi Island visits approximately 3 monthly. Only one pastor is employed by the Mission.
- (c) The Lutheran Mission being the only denomination represented on the Island is the most influential. The peoples attitude to the Mission is complacent. The people are not really anti or pro Mission preferring to proceed towards their destiny unimpeded by missions.

NON INDIGENES

- (a) There is only one business enterprise of non indigenous origin operated on Long Island and that is the small plantation of Mr. Franz Moeder a mixed race person.
- (b) Moeder's plantation employs approximately 5 local persons who are engaged in clearing the area. I feel that at peak production it may employ 10 15 persons.
- (c) Moeder operates a vessel, M.V. "SPRAY", which makes weekly tours of the island buying copra and shell. Moeder's service is virtually the only outlet the people have for their economic crops. The copra production on Long Island is increasing each year and the people are starting to show an interest in planting of this crop. It is impossible to estimate what the maximum output of copra could be. Approximately 4 tens of copra is coming off Long Island each week at the present and this could be trebled in the next decade.

J. COMMUNICATIONS

- (a) There are no roads on Long Island. There are tracks connecting all villages and the plantation. Very little work would be needed to turn these tracks into suitable feeder roads. Tractors and four wheel drive vehicles could easily be used if roads were constructed. There is no need for the construction of roads at present. The people should be encouraged to devote all their energy to the planting of economic crops.
- (b) SEA. Anchorages are to be found around the island the best being at Matafuma (all seasons) Bok (N.W.), Koet(N.W.), Malala (N.W.), Point Kiau (S.E.), Bok Bok (S.E.), Biliau (S.E.). A wharf could be built at Matafuma.
- (c) AIR. There is one airfield 2,000' x 150' at Matafuma which takes aircraft of Category "C" standard. There are at least two other airfield sites (Point Kiau and Koet). There is a possibility of extending Matafuma airfield by another 300 feet, however this is not warranted.

L. THE STAGE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT

The people have not advanced any much politically because of their isolation. However they appear to be a cohesive group and their "cry" could probably be interpreted as "Long Island for Long Islanders". The people appreciate that the House of Assembly is now in virtual central of the country.

This people are pro-Administration and are keen in most sectors to join the Council (Rei Coast). Only a minority would appear to have any objection to joining a Council - this objection being part of their cult beliefs.

The people, as far as can be Auged, are pro non-native and all patrols are welcomed. The people often give an outsider a feeling of not being wanted. I feel that this is in actual fact a form of shyness, as I personally, have always been treated cordially by the people.

No persons in the area have been to any Conferences.

The meanle are reasonably aware of the machinery of Government, however they are not well versed in the minor mechanic of running the country. It is hoped that a political education patrol will visit the island later this year to give selected leaders an idea of the machinery of government.

ECONOMY OF THE AREA

(a) It would be impossible to state how many coconut trees there are on the island as no survey has been done for my years. However there is an agricultural patrol visiting long Island at the time of writing and it is hoped that a commis of trees will be done. Approximately of tons of corrains prounded weekly.

Maturity of trees varies considerably and not even an educated guess could estimate what the average maturity of trees would be.

(b) As already mentioned Mr. Franz Moeder claims that he purchases 4 tons per reek. As he is the only buyer we will have to take his figures as being correct. He pays 3c. per 1b. for bagged copra and 2.5c. per 1b. for loose copra. Most copra purchased is in the loose form. We could safely estimate that the value of copra production using Moeder's figures would be:-

\$56 per ton 4 tons per week 208 tons per year # \$11,568 per annum for copra produced.

I feel that these figures maybe inaccurate. Also \$56 per ton

is \$50 below the present price. If the people could be organised into forming a co-operative, purchasing their own boat I am sure the grower would be better off.

- (c) As there are no figures for total tree plantings it is not possible to impute the approximate total production, etc..
- (d) Nil market gardening enterprises.
- (e) Only 5 local people are employed on Long Island at \$11.80 per fortnight. This gives \$59.40 being injected into the local economy fortnightly. In the past two years \$1,000 per annum has been injected into the economy by way of R.D.F. Grants for the airstrip.

A small amount of shell (trochus, green sneil) is produced but no figures are available.

There are no other economic enterprises on the island.

(f) There are no co-operatives functioning in the area.

Apparently in the 1950's a co-operative was started but that collapsed and the people say that they would like to have another co-operative as they have a better idea how these

enterprises run now that they have better educated people in their society.

- (g) There are no visible outstanding entrepreneurs they prefer to "hide" behind the family group stating what
 money they have belongs to everyone. All bank accounts
 appear to be family affairs and enterprises are run along
 these lines with the employment of labour as well.
- (h) The people were willing to assist the patrol with the number of bank accounts held. There are 28 C.S.B. accounts, held by the residents of the island with a total of \$1842.50 in the bank.
- (i) No problems should be found in levying taxes.
- (j) The per capita income is roughly \$84 per adult male. I don't consider this figure to be very accurate as people get cash for the sale of unknown quantities of bettle nut, shells, pigs, possums etc. to their friends in Madang whenever the "Koro" or any other boat calls at the island.

Cash economy is the same throughout the area.

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(k) Marketing facilities are not as good as they could be.

Mr. Moeder has a virtual moncpoly of all trading and the

people often express dissatisfaction at his service, however

there seems to be no answer to this problem as no other

persons appear to be willing to visit the island.

Facilities for marketing revolve around Moeder's weekly or fortnightly trips to Madang plus monthly visits of the "Koro".

N. POSSIBILITIES OF EXPANDING THE ECONOMY

(a) Reference Area Study of 1969/70 (Patrol Report No. 4 of 1969/70). I agree that a Rural Development Assistant could be posted to Long Island on a part time basis - say one morth out of two. However D.A.S.F. are short staffed in this Sub District at the present time.

Land is in plentiful supply on Long Island and the people are being incouraged to plant more coconut trees. The economy could be expanded easily if the people are continually encouraged to increase their plantings. D.A.S.F. are now doing a commendable job in encouraging the people to set up copra drying facilities.

There would be at least 5,000 acres available for coconut plantings. This land would only have primary growth and it and would therefore be easy to clear.

- (b) I don't think that market gardening would be a viable enterprise and the people's energies should be directed to more and better copra production.
- (c) Wage sarners could not be increased at the moment, except where they would be self employed.

(d) There is a distinct possibility that new industries could be introduced viz. fishing, shells etc.. I feel that if we could encourage the people to catch and smoke dry fish they would be able to supplement their income. However I would prefer D.A.S.F. to conduct a feasibility survey of any new industries. The people are only too keen to establish new industries, but they must have officers with the right approach to introduce new crops etc.. Patience is a pre-requisite of any officer who engages in introducing anything new to Long Island.

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ATTITUDE TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT

During the course of this patrol the people asked whether or not it would be fessible for them to join the Rai Coast Jouncil.

Discussions took place on the advantages of being members of a Council. Some of the older people were against joining the Council, however this problem was overcome once it was explained that tax rates would not be excessive and there was such a thing as a tax review committee.

I feel that 90% of the people would like to join the Council and would be to their advantage to do this.

Attached as Appendix VI is a map of Long Island showing the proposed Wards. Ward I would consist of Matafuma Village; Ward II Bok and Koet and Ward III Malala and Crown Island (uninhabited). Ward II may seem to have a larger population than the other two Wards, however this is brought about by the fact that Bok and Koet Villages are close to one snother, whereas Malala and Matafuma are both isolated and as such need to be included in separate Wards. A description of Ward boundaries is attached as Appendix VII. Lengthy discussions have been held with representatives of all villages in the past and explanations given of the adventages of being in a Council. Opposition to the Council has only come from a few Cult followers.

P. ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE CENTRAL GOVERNMENT.

The people seem to have a good appreciation of the work of the Government. They have a rough idea of the workings of the House of Assembly. They accept self government but the independence issue is worrying them. They seem to have the idea that they are not ready for independence. They respect the House of Assembly and see it as the central law making body, giver of cash for economic aid and revelopment, etc.. The Administration is held in respect, however the people complain that not enough is done for them in the way of economic advice.



Q. ACCOMMODATION SERVICES AND FACILITIES

There are only seven Trade Stores on the Island.

Long Island, 22% miles westward of Tolokiwa, is of volcanic origin, and is divided by a deep valley extending in an easterly and westerly direction. Cerlsy peak near the southern end of the island, is 3,727 feet (1136^mC) high, and Resumur, the north-western peak, 4,278 feet (1303^mg). The western and southern coasts are steep-to, except in one position, 7 miles west-south-westward of the northern extremity of the Island, where a reef extends 2 miles off-shore. For 2 miles on either side of the northern extremity there is a fringing reef; a small reef extends half a mile from the northeastern extremity, and along the eastern coast for a distance of about 6 miles, a reef extends one mile offshore.

In 1932, the population of Long Island was 230.

An islet, about 50 feet (15^m2) high, lies about half a mile eastward of the south-eastern extremity of the island, with which it is apparently connected by a reef.

Crown Island, about 7 miles north-westward of the northwestern extremity of Long Island, has a fairly level summit.

From: REPORT OF AN ORNITTOLOGICAL EXPEDITION TO THE STASSI ARCHIPELAGO, NEW HUINEA: RECOLONIZATION OF EXPLODED VOLCANIC ISLANDS. JARED M. DIAMOND EXPEDITION LEADER.

Sometime during the eighteenth century an explosion had similarly destroyed plant and animal life on Long.

Within a short time of our plane's arrival at Matafuna we were confronted with the most unexpected finding of the expediention, the incredibly high population densities of birds or Long. Large flocks of war serves and honey-eaters moved through the treetops; the forest echoed to the hoots and barks of five kinds of fruit pigeons; two fly tehers and a large kingfisher were abundant in the restory; two types of ground doves often burst up ahea. If us; and the administrates were nearly four times as abundant as on "normal" islands with a similar diversity of bird species. This phenomenon rew ined a puzzle until the completion of our work on Chown and Tolokiwa. The bird species of Long were all superior over-water colonists, and nine of ones were "super-tramps": species that are videspreed on small or unstable islands but are absent or larger or older islands.

1,820 feet (554 %) high, and is fringed by a reof, which extends from half a mile to one mile offshore, and through which there are numerous channels. Breakers have been observed off its northeastern side, and several rocks which break in a heavy sea, extend one mile westward from the south-western extremity of the island.

Honkow reef, about 17 miles north-westward of Crown Island, consists of four nutches, on which the sea breaks heavily, extending in a north-westerly and south-easterly direction for a distance of 2 miles and having a least depth of 1½ fathoms (2^m7) over it. A shoal, with a depth of 3 fathoms (5^m5) over it, was reported in 1956 to lie about 3½ miles west-south-westward of Hankow reef.

The forest of Long was composed of rapidly growing softwood tress with a well-lit understory on the flat coastal plain but
bound by vines into a closed canopy on the hill slopes. Although
there are heavy rains in the months October - April, the volcanic
soil does not retain the rain, and there are only a few permanent
fresh-water prings. The time of our visit coincided with a prolonged trought, as a result of which leaves were falling off the
trees and drinking water had to be obtained by digging holes in the
sanuy beach and letting water percolate.

Long is in effect a ring of land 15 miles in oiler diameter, surrounding a steep-walled crater lake 6 miles in diameter. in the cent of which a small island with a hot sulfurous you? represents the tip of a submerged cone. Since the Daba had now yet arrived by July 29, we bought a bag of rice and a case of tinned fish from a Matafuna native and moved to the crater lake to survey its water birds. A precipitous trail led 800 vertical feet from the crater rim dow of a lakeside beach, where ten men from Matafuna began constructing an outrigger cance to take us to the central small island, a reported breeding ground of ducks. The clouds of water birds on Lake Buan of Umboi had led me to conjure up even richer ornithological fantasies for the ruch larger crater lake of Long. In fact, there were only a modest numbers of a duck and a grebe, the same two species .../34

that we had found in the crater lakes of Umboi. The out-rigger canoe was launched after four days, and we made four attempts to paddle towards the centre of the lake. On each attempt, heavy wind and high waves filled the canoe with water until it settled awash, leaving me floating off in a rubber life raft that I had placed as a precaution on the outrigger platform. By then our food was running out, and we returned from our scenically magnificent but ornithologically disappointing lake camp to the coast.

The same morning that we returned to Matafuna, the Daba arrived, eight days overdue. A heavy storm of the sort for which the region is notorious had forced her to seek shelter at Tolokiwa Island along with three other ships. Several attempts to leave Tolokiwa had to be abandoned as soon as the fringing reef was passed, because of heavy seas. On her final attempt the ship was nearly overwhelmed by the seas and sent out a preliminary distress call but did complete the harrowing crossing to Long. For the remainder of the expedition the seas were propitious, at least on those days when we had to venture into open water.

From Matafuna we crossed to Crown Island, the smallest of the major Siassi islands and only 6 miles from Long. This

green jewel of an island has no human population but many snakes, crocodiles, large lizards, giant clams, and nesting sea turtles. We found 30 resident species on Crown, every one of them also occurring on Long. The birds of Crown included all nine "supertramp" species of Long. Bird population densities on Crown were nearly as high as on Long, and were nearly five times higher than on other islands with an equivalent species diversity.

On August 7 we moved to Malala and Point Kiau villages on the north coast of Long for another survey of the crater lake and an ascent of Long's highest peak, Mt. Reumur (4300 ft.). found the previously unclimbed summits of Mt. Reumur covered by a mature, moss-hung, mist-shrouded forest that must have regenerated completely since the explosion. The sole typical montane birds in this forest were the green bamboo finch or "kukusia", plus a fruit pigeon. However, all the supertramp species of Long's lowlands had spread upwards in such numbers that bird population densities were nine time higher than on the mountains of "normal" islands! I also used the time at Malala, the first village founded on Long after the explosion, to gather genealogies and oral traditions from the natives. According to these traditions the original human population as well as the vegetation was destroyed by the explosion. At several places the erosion of sea cliffs has exposed tools, village sites, and coconut trees of this prior population, buried under tens of feet of volcanic soil. An old man I interviewed at

Malala is the great-grandson of the first man who recolonized Long from Tolokiwa as vegetation was beginning to regenerate. This would date the recolonization at about a century-and-a-half ago, and the explosion as probably in the eighteenth century. Records of early explorers and European colonists that I have been studying since returning to the United States are in accord with this dating.

3. BIOLOGICAL COLONIZATION OF BECENTLY BORN ISLANDS IN LAKE
WISDOM, LONG ISLAND, T.P.N.G.
JEAN-MARIE BASSOT AND ELDON BASI.

A trip on the administration vassel, "Koro", gave us the opportunity to visit Long Island (5°S, 147°E) in November, 1969. This island, which lies about 130 kilometers east of Madang, T.P.N.C., is one of a chain of volcanos extending from Menam Island through New Ireland. A large freshwater lake (approximately 100 km.²), Lake Wisdom, fills the steeply walled crater in the centre of the island. There are about 600 people living near the seashore, but the inland portion of the island is uninhabited. Due to the steep crater walls, which in most places reach heights greater than 300 meters, access to the lake is difficult. However, there is a trail connecting Matafuna village with a camp at the eastern end of the lake. A native dugout cance was constructed at the lake just a few days before our arrival and we were able to use it in our investigations of the lake.

Lake Wisdom appears to be quite deep: near the centre of the lake no bottom was encountered using a sounding line to a depth of 90 fathoms (Dr. M. Rapson, personal communication). Our information on the volcanic history of the lake area is limited to what we were able to learn by talking to residents of the area and to a brief

note in the Swamary of Activities - 1068 of the Geological and Volcanoligical Branch of the Department of Lands, Surveys and Mines, T.P.N.G. The latter states that there were previous eruptive periods in 1953 - 1955 and in 1961. On March 16, 1968 another eruption occurred which left two volcanic islands in the lake; the smaller of these was newly created, while the larger, which contained an active crater, was built on the remnants of an island formed during the 1953 - 1955 eruption. The Summary referred to above states that the active crater is one kilometer E NE from the position shown on the wartime map (see figure 1) and this is in agreement with our findings.

Our party appears to have been the first to visit the islands since the 1968 emption. We spent parts of four days investigating the biology of Lake Wisdom, paying special attention to the first steps of biological colonization of the two volcanic islands.

Materials and Methods

The flora and fauna of the lake shore and its shallow waters were observed and collected near the camp. Areas of sandy bottom and rock faces were investigated to a depth of 12 meters using a snorkel or scuba equipment.

Plankton samples were collected at several points between the camp and the volcanic islands with a plankton net 20 cm in diameter (80 meshes/cm) trawled for 5 to 15 minutes near the surface or at a depth of about 10 meters. A stick of TNT was exploded in about 8 meters of water near the camp in an attempt to kill any fish which might be in the area.

Most of our emphasis was given to the exploration of the two volcani islands. An approximate topographic map was drawn and numerous temperature measurements were made (figure 2). Photographs were taken of physical features of the island (figures 3-5) and its fauna and flora. Representative geological specimens were collected. In conjunction with investigations of the microfauna sand and gravel samples were taken for a later analysis of particle size.

The larger island was given a rather cursory inspection and many small forms of life may have been missed. The fauna of the small island was more systematically investigated by hand collecting and by the use of a mouth aspirator. Interstitial fauna was collected at 3, 6, and 9 meters from the shore by digging holes and filtering the water that collected in them through a very fine mesh hand net. Sand and gravel samples were brought back to the laboratory 140 - 140 made 1 2 mag 1 1 mag 1 mag

and the microfauna was extracted by treatment for 48 hours in a Berlese apparatus which was heated from the top with an infrared lamp.

Results

The Lake

Our knowledge of the lake is limited to what was seen in the immediate vicinity of the camp and on our trips to the islands. The lake has a very constant surface temperature of 23°C. Tho thermal activity at the volcanic island has only a very localized heating effect. With the exception of a few birds (ducks, waterfowl, swallows and a charadriiform on the shore) vertebrate life appeared to be absent from the lake. The portion of the bottom which we observed while diving is made up of volcanic sand or gravel with scattered larger blocks of rock. Tiny shells of Planorbislike snail were fairly abundant near the camp. Dense populations of a Turritella-shaped snail were present near the camp and especially near the shores of the smaller volcanic island. These gastropods were often found on a filamentous green alga that was growing abundantly to a depth of at least 4 meters near the island. Another algo was found associated with reddish deposits at the south end of the large island. Near the camp, a third type of alga forming crusts on bottom pebbles was found at depths of 8 to 10 meters. Notonectids

were abundant in all of the lake which we investigated and often appeared to occur in swarms. Dragon fly larvae of several species were common near the shore. One water bestze was seen but not collected and a few mayfly larvae were collected. Plankton hauls yielded small algae, notonectids at all stages of growth, and a sometimes abundant leptostracan.

Physical Characteristics of the Islands

The two volcand islands in Lake Wisdom appear to rise from deep water. As can be seen from figures 2 - 6, they differ markedly in several ways. The larger island, which is approximately 892 meters in circumference and 11 meters high at its highest point, is divided by a depression which completely crosses the island from east to west. The high south end of the island is made up of stratified larva gravel with a few larger rocks interspersed. This material is eroding away and forming steep slopes of semi-consolidated gravel. The northern end of the island contains a circular crater with a shallow lake in its bottom. The hills surrounding the crater appear to be solid lava and they are covered with loose chunks of lava of various sizes. As can be seen from figure 2, access to the island from most directions is rendered difficult by high water temperature or steep cliffs. Temperature data for the water at various points on and around the island cre-

listed in figure 2. Many of the areas of hot water are associated with mineral deposits as is shown in figure 6. The western part of the crater lake is continuously bubbling due to many small vents opening in its bottom. The region marked "A" in figure 6 also has many bubbling hot springs and gives offa constant cloud of sulfurous-smelling steam.

The smaller island consists entirely of unconsolidated material of various sizes and reaches a maximum height of approximately 1.3 meters. Most of the island is made up of send and gravel, but the western end is surrounded by a fringe of boulders and cobbles. There was a shallow, algae-filled pond about halfway down the south side of the island at the time we were there.

No signs of volcanic activity were detected on the small island. Water temperatures were considerably below the large island (figure 2).

Flora of the Islands

There were fow enough plants on the large island that it was possible to take a rather complete census. The only 2 mature plants were two species of grass (one belonging to the family Cyperaceae) growing in seperate isolated cluwns on the rim of the crater. On the beach in the rea marked NB" in figure 6, 39 individuals were

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found and 29 in area "C". These plants were mainly of 2 species, the most abundant (about 90% of the individuals) is probably a Mamhot. No plants were found anywhere else on the beaches of this island. By comparison, plant life on the small island is relatively more abundant in spite of a similar, superficially barren appearance. Plants were growing near the highest part. They were relatively more abundant and appeared healthier in the cobble area at the west end. The plants on this island were not counted, but we estimated that there were 200 - 300 of about 5 species. Manthor sp. (?) was again by far the most abundant followed by a species of grass. Most of the plants were less than 8 cm tall and no mature individuals were found.

Macroscopie Fauna

The fauna of the big island appeared to be quite limited. Swallows were present but there was no evidence that they nest on the island. We saw about 10 ducks and found 2 nests in crevices near the crater lake. Shorebirds (Charadriiforms) were present, and the skeleton of a frigatebird was found on the island.

deep green by algae and contained many notonectids. Domselflies (Odonata) were seen around the lake and dragonflies on some of the high ridges, especially at the south end of the island. The ridges surrounding the crater, which are of course black volcani gravel and larger rocks, appeared to be nearly azoic but we did find 4 lycosid spiders and many cast spider exoskeletons. The beach areas were not investigated for microscopic found due to lack of time.

A more systematic investigation of the small island revealed a surprisingly rich invertebrate fauna. A provisional listing would include the following:

Diptera (2 species)

Coleoptera (at least 2 species, a carabid and a stephalifid)

Hymenoptera (at least 3 species of ants)

Hemiptera (one species, very abundant)

Dermaptera (one species)

Thysomura (one species, probably a Campodea)

Collembola (at least 5 species, including 2 symphipleons)

Araneidae (at least 2 species).

Interstitial Fauna

Interstitial fauna, which was collected only on the small

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Collembola were quite abundant in sand wich in organic debris (mainly rotting algae). One oribatid, 2 species of gastrotrichs, small nematodes (?) and one species of archiannelic were also found. However, the most interesting discovery is what appears to be an harpacticid copenal. These crustaceans were particularly abundant in the samples collected at 6 and 9 meters from the shore, where the sand is poor in organic material. The temperature of the sand at the depth where the samples were taken was approximately 30°C.

Discussion and Conclusion

The plants and enimals collected on Lake Wisdom and on its two recently formed islands must now be studied and accurately identified by various specialists. Many of the specimens should be especially interesting from a biogeographical point of view, since some of the groups encountered (e.g. Apterygota, Harpacticids) are usually quite significant in this respect (see for example works of Remane, Chapuis, Delamare-Deboutteville). Even before exact identification of the specimens, certain general comments can be made about our observations.

The Lake

One striking feature of the laje is the complete absence,

as fir as we could tell, of several grows which are ordinarily common in fresh water. We cound no evidence whatsoever of amphibians, restiles, or fishes. Also, none of our plankton samples yielded capepode.

Thus, it appears that the fauna of Lake Wisdom is not only depauperate, but also are a Mather unusual zoological composition. It would be of obvious interest to obtain some data on the primary productivity of the lake to elucidate the ecological relationships of its inhabitants. The food cycle on bake Wisdom might be exceptionally clear and simple.

The poverty of the fauna might be explained in several ways. One possibility might be a recnt (a few years or decades) origin of the fauna, the previous inhabitant of the lake having been killed by the 1953-1955, 1961, or 1968 eruptions. Unfortunately the documents available to us at present give us no basis for comment on this hypothesis and information that would allow us to discuss the origin of Lake Wisdom on a geological time scale is completely lacking. Another possibility would be the presence of a limiting factor or toxic substance released into the water by volcanic activity. However, this seems unlikely since the aquatic life was no poorer in the immediate vicinity of the volcanic islands than elsewhere in the lake. The isolated geographical situation of Lake Wisdom appears

to provide a more likely explanation for the paucity of its fauna. The closest important masses of fresh water are Lake Dakataua on New Britain (a distance of over 300 kilometers) or, even farther away, the lakes and swemps of the lower Sapik and Ramu Rivers and Lake Kutubu. So far we have been unable to obtain information on the fauna and flora of these water masses which would give us a basis for comparison with Lake Wisdom.

The Islands

From all available information we feel that the fauna and flora of the islands are not more than 20 months old. The presence of certain groups of animals on these isalnds raises some interesting problems.

Some elements of the biota were quite likely transported by air or by birds (spiders, grass seeds, diptera) while others floated in from the edges of the major crater (cortain types of plants, notably Manihot, found growing only on the low shoreline). The difference in number of species and individuals between the two islands can be at least partially explained by consideration of the physical features of the larger island. It appears that the generally steep slopes and high lemberatures at the margins of this island have prevented colonization in most areas. The

two areas (B and C in figure 6) having a combination of moderate temperature and gradual beaches are the only two places in which water borne plants have succeeded in colonizing the island. The low island, on the other hand, is surrounded by water of a moderate temperature, has gradually sloping shores, and is fairly humid due to its low profile and porosity.

The origin of a rich and diversified endopsemmic fauna on the small island is difficult to explain. The narrow ecological tolerances of symphypleones, of archiannelids and of several Harpacticids are well known (c.f. Delamare-Deboutte-ville for references) making it difficult to hypothesize transport by air, by flotation, or along the bottom of the lake.

A search of the sea and lake shores of New Guipea and the Indonesian area for interstitial fauna would be highly desirable.

Summary

Lake Wisdom is characterized by a relatively depauperate fauna. The recently born volcani islands in the lake are in the first steps of biological colonization. The most striking finding on the islands was the presence of an abundant, diversified, and specialized sand microfauna.

Addendum

Until our visit it appears that the islands had not been visited since the last eruption. However, any future investigation of the ecology of the island will have to take into consideration the possible inadvertent transfer of seeds, spores, etc. during our visit. Also, several natives accompanied us to the island and it seems likely that they will return in the future since they found that there was nothing to fear on the island and duck eggs were readily available there.

(1 Although there is no agreement on the matter, some of our informants have stated that both crocodiles and fish live in the lake, so this possibility must not be ignored)

APPENDIX IV

LONG ISLAND (AROP)

Long Island appears to be a broad truncated cone and is the most westerly of the islands examined. It is approximately 19 miles long and 12 miles wide; the long axis trends south-east. The centre is occupied by a crater or caldern lake, eight miles long and more than six miles wide. The general level of the caldera rim is more than 1000 fear above sea level and two of the parasitic cones on the flanks rise to more than 3500 feet: the highest, Mt. Reamur in the north section of the island, is 4278 feet.

There is no record of an eruption from Long Isalnd.

An active cone in the southern section of the lake was reported during the war.

The Crater

Access to the crater was gained by following a native hunting track which begins at the mouth of a streem called the Arabusungna. The mouth of the stream is about two miles south of the village of Malala on the east coast of the island.

A quarter of a mile from the beach, the track ascends a ridge on the left side of the valley. The rim of the caldera is about an hour and half's walk up a gentle forest covered slope of the volcano. Vertical cliffs faces and embayments in the ind nted rim of the caldera hide all except the northern art of the lake from the point where the track reaches the edge of the caldera.

The lake level is approximately six hundred feet below the rim of the calders at this point. A raft was constructed from driftwood on the lake shore and paddled out beyond the arms of surrounding embayments to gains view of the southern end of the lake. The active cone; which was evident in this southern section during the war when the lake was photographed, could not be located. It has either subsided in the lake or has such a small elevation above water level that it is not visible at a distance of 5 or 6 milos. Checks showed that the lake was more than 200 ft. deep at a distance of 400 yards from the shore.

The water of the lake was brackish but potable. Waterfowl were abundant but no fish were seen. According to native reports external drainage of the lake began less than 15 years ago, by a stream centering the sea about four miles south of Malala. As the caldera rim reaches its lowest point (700 ft. approx.) in this vicinity the observation is probably correct.

The crater wall consists of layers of lapilli and fine ash. Approximately 200 f t above take level are numerous boulders of felsmathic pitchstone. The ash and lapilli layers dip steeply in to the drater at lake level. The gravel on the shore contains numerous hardened pisolites.

Evidence of Recent Eruption

On the upper part of the cone slope isolated residuals of the original cone crust, composed of a coherent mixture of volcanic sand and dust, occur. The existence of this material which was presumably deposited during the last eruption, suggests an outburst of comparitively recent origin. Some ruptort may be given to this view by the apparent youthfulness of the forest cover. No large trees were seen on the slopes of the mountain; but this could be due to an inhibitory factor in the soil structure, for the soil on the clopes is so porous that the natives usually grow their toro beside the small streams, and in some localities along the coast the forest is replaced by savannah woodland or a heath which is quite foreign to the climatic environment of the island.

More conclusive eveidence suggesting a comparitively recent eruption was found in a study of the wave-cut cliff sections along the east coast of the island from Pt. Kiau to a point midway between the villages of Malala and Bok. These sections consist

for the most part of a homogenous layer of fresh ash which appears to be the product of a single recent eruption. The ash is predominantly formed of lapilli and consists of a variety of lava types. A small amount of pea-sized numice is present. The most common constituent is a pitchstone and black lava containing large phenocrysts of felsper. The sections vary from 20 to 30 feet in thickness and in one place along the Arabusungna over 100 feet of homogenous ash is exposed.

A basel section is revealed in a cliff face at the end of a blunt perinsula about three hours walk south of Malala and immediately south of a stream called Tabigipoonoo. At the base of the section are three feet of black to dark chocolate-coloured tuff which contains numerous plant fossils and imprints left by standing trees. Above this horizon are three to four feet of recdish-yellow unfossiliforous pisolitic tuff with a well-defined platy fracture. Above this is 9 to 12 inches of curious "metallic" lepilli the particles of which have a dull metallic silver and gold lustre, a reddish pisolitic tuff, and a chocolate tuff which contains marine fossils.

Material derived from the last eruption disconformably our lies the chocolate tuff. A lapilliform layer, 6 to 12 inches in thickness, which consists mostly of sharply angular fragments

of a fresh felspathic pitchstone of a size rarely greater than 1 inch in diameter, forms the base of the recent material. Mixed with these lapilli are fragments of charred wood and in some places completely carbonised tree trunks. The 20 to 30 feet of overlying ash contains odd boulders up to a foot in liameter but consists for the most part of a dark lapilli and send, as has been described above.

The character of these deposits suggests a spasmodic and highly explosive pattern of activity. The basal chocolate tuffs were deposited on a well-vegetated land surface presumably after a long period of dormancy. Violent explosive activity occurred in two separate phases of considerable duration. The later phase was the more powerful, involving an ejection of molten material during its medial period. Subsidence of the coast followed this outburst and a protracted period of dormancy ensued.

magnitude, compltely covering the island with heavy deposits of ash and in all probability removing the central cone by explosive violence or secondary subsidence. The fact that the initial deposit of angular lapilli contained well-disseminated charred wood fragments argues against deposition in water, in spite of the fact


that the underlying beds contain numerous marine fossils. It is probable that severe seismic disturbances preceded the eruption and these were accompanied by uplift of the coastline; a not uncommon prelude to violent outbursts.

Population

Recent investigation by A.D.O. Parish suggests that the eruption was of comparitively recent origin as stories of the escape from Arop are still current among natives of the surrounding islands. It seems evident that some very alarming warning phenomena preceded this eruption as a considerable number of natives appear to have escaped from the island before the catastrophic eruption took place.

Mr. Parish believes that the Siassi isalnd people originally come from Long Island, and has found, on the harsher parts of the neighbouring New Guinea coast, settlements of natives who are also evacuees. One group, he believes, Sattled near Lutheran Anchorage on northern Umboi but were subsequently wiped uout by the 1888 eruption of Ritter Island.

Long Island was still uninhabited in 1921. Seven years later the movement of Tolokeva natives had begun and today there



are more than 300 Tolokewas and their descendants on the island.

The majority of them live at Malala and Bok on the east coast. A small breakaway village has started at Point kinu.

APPENDIX VII

LOCAL GOVERNMENT - PROPOSED ADMITTANCE LONG ISLAND INTO RAI COAST LOCAL GOVERNMENT COUNCIL.

The Rai Coast Local Government Council are any keen to have the people of Long Island join their Council. To this end the Council Finance Executive Committee sent two of it's members to Long Island in November, 1972 to ask the people to join the Council. These two delegates received a very good welcome and the people requested that they be allowed to join the Rai Coast Council. Since then the Council have expressed the opinion that they would like to see all of Long Island and Grown Island incorporated in the Rai Coast Council.

During the course of this patrol the majority of people expressed the desire to join the Council after it was explained to them the advantages they would receive if they came under a Council. I personally feel that the people would be far better off and I would recommend a tax rate of \$2.00 per adult male (the people agreed that this would be a fair tax rate which they would be able to pay without any hardship).

Attached as Appendix VI is a map of Long Island divided into three wards. The people felt that there should be

three representatives of their island. Ward II may seem to be a little large population wise compared with the other two wards. However this would seem to be the only way of giving fair representation. The Matafuma people don't appear to mix very much with the Bok and Koet people. Also the Malalas seem to stay together.

Ward descriptions should not be difficult to describe.

WADARING ARRA STIDY

These Ranges rise rapidly to great heights with rugged peaks of 9,000 - 10,000 feet.

The area is largely determined by the runged Finnisterre Ranges daving a maze of ridges, cross ridges, and spurs descending from this range Northward to the ses, the spurends near the coast forming a belt of steer lumai covered foothills which are a charateristic feature of the landscripe viewed from the coast. The mountain contours are very irregular, the ridges and spurs lying in helter-skelter arrengement. The area is drained by a great many mountain to rrents flowing through deep ravines and garges and merging into numerous fast flowing rivers northward to the sen. All rivers in this area are unnavisable. From West to East the main rivers include the Gawar, Mego, Noman, Yaganon, Bang and the Yandar Rivers.

No relaiable rainfall figures are available for the area but it is estimated to be in the region of 130 - 150 inches per annum.

The road from Warei village to Lamtub, built in 1970-71, is now virtually non-existent as the current wet season rains, causing creeks and rivers to be clooded and building countless numbers of barrets on the road, have made it impossible for webicles to use. there is very little the people can do to improve the situation until the wet season is over.

Safe anchorage can be found at Kuril, Mindir, Gang (au and Valan Plantation)

The area has been natrolled regularly by the Administration since World War 2. The patrol was well received in every village during the course of its work. The people of this area are pro-Administration and pro-Government. There are one or two villages that are cargo cult followers. On the subject of carco cult Lamtub village appears to be the only strong follower of this movement in the whole of the Census Division. The Administration should have no fears over the doings of this rillage as the movement does not have a particularly shong influence over it. It does, however, appear to be awakening instead. This can be shown by the fact that one or two members of this village are now in the process of taking out a Development Bank Loan for a cattle project.

(B) POPULATION - DISTRIBUTION AND TITUDE

- (a) Attached are the revised comies of the latest Village Population Register undated during the course of the natrol.
- (b) Attached are also the mars of the area showing the routes taken by the natrol and other routes that can also be taken be each village.
- (c) There is a large outward flow of labour and absenteeism from the area. There should be, however, no concern by the Administration over the large absenteeism, as the majority of the absentees are those inland villagers settled on the coastal fringes between buttub and Walsu Plantation. Because of the limited economic corportuatives, these nearly have turned to the coast. Still I feel an eve should be kept on this even though the figure has not reached an alarming level. It can be mentioned here also that most of the economic development can be attributed to these people.

In the near future I feel that land disputes could erice over land murchases between the coastal people and the inland settlers. There appears to be jealousy on the part of the coastal people over the inland settlers economic rowards, who having out years of hard work into their businesses, are now finding that they are no longer welcoaed. Although all this has not come out onto the sarface a close watch has to be maintained, to ensure that the coastal people do not set a better hand of their inland friends.

The outward flow of labour has not reached an alamingly high level, however, once again it has to be watched.

(D) LEADERSHIP

- (a) As in many other parts of Papus New Guinea leadership patterns are changing. There appears in this area, two growns emerging. That of the strong traditional leaders and those of the educated young men and entrepreneurs. The young men are now becaming to have more say in the affairs of their communities fevouring advancement in economic, political and social development. This can clearly be shown by the people favouring more and ore to alect younger and more sophisticated men to become their Council Members and Council Committee Members.
- (b) There are no persons as far as I could find is regarded as the leader or leaders of the whole of the Yaganon Census Division. It is not that there are none but that they are not well known enough in the C/D. to be regarded as outstanding leaders. There are, however, a few who have the notential but are only leaders in their own respective areas or villages.
- (c) As said previously leadership natterns are changing. This, however, does not mean that there are significant changes taking place so as the more sorhisticated vounger generation are replacing the traditional leaders. This is not so. Traditional leaders are still leaders and still excert considerable influence in their areas. It is when complicated subjects relating to the economic, social and political changes taking place now in Papua New Guines, do the younger mentioner to take the upper hand.

People are not turning to men with the education for leadership. They are instead looking for men with the education and most importantly men who know the sustans and live the same way of life as themselves, and also who possess the qualities of traditional leaders. At present it is difficult to find anyone with these qualities. Either he has the qualities of a traditional leader, but then lacks the education or he has the education but is then away most of the time in the towns.

It is interesting to note that about 90% of the children attending Lastub PTS are purely from the inland villages. It can also be noted that there are a lot more male children than there are female children in both schools. The cause of this which is a nation wide problem and one which has to be solved, is that parents do not favour their daughters going to school but fould prefer that they stay in the villages helping the mother.

The high political awareness in the Census Division can be attributed to the rapid political changes that have taken place during the past faw werrs. Self-Government for 1st. December, 1973 has also greatly increased the interest of the people and has made them more aware of the political happenings.

The elected representative for the Cencus Division is Mr. John Roe, also the Minister for Frade and Industry and Foreign Affeirs.

Political Parties has not spread in the area.

The Census Division is included in the Rai Cosst Local.
Government Council. Ten Councillors represent the area in the Council. Although there were disconnointments expressed in the Council, most people complained of Councillors being continuelly absent from their creas, who are instead found working their plots of land on the Cosst. In the interest of the Council and of the sub district I feel that something has to be done to have this Councillors more interested in their work.

(M) THE PROMONY OF THE ARRA

The last census of economic cross was carried out in 1971.

(N) POSSTBILITURE OF TEXPANDING THE PROMOTE

There are arable land on the coastal bolt which would provide prospects of evending the economy. There are some excellent areas of suitable land available for either coconut or cattle project development. Just prior to the natrol commencing, a villager from Lamtub applied for \$3,000 loan to the Development Bank for a cattle project.

Economic opportunities do exist inlend but the long distances to be walked by the people corrying their produce to markets does little to motivate them. One of their hopes would lie on the Guhu sirstrip once completed and possibly open to commercial flights. Their most possible hope would be to have feeder roads built up to this area, which seems an unlikely thing at this present time, because of limited revenue.

(A) APPETUDES TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT

There is on the whole dissitisfaction amongst the people towards the Councils work. The vounger and more sophisticated men do, however, realise and appreciate that with limited revenue the Council cannot possibly spend all its money evenly throughout the Council area. But it must be pointed out that these men are beginning to get frustrated on the Councils neglect of this Census Division. The people nevertheless are not totally rejecting the Local Government system but are beginning to get fed up of naving tax to the Council and receiving little in return.

It is pleasing to see that next financial year (1973/74) the Council have mostly concentrated its projects for the inland areas of the Sub District.

I would like to see the Rai Coast Council produce, with the help of government staff located at aider, a developmental plan for a period of perhaps five years, with the aim of coing something for all parts of its district. In regard to the D.L.G.O.'s suggestion that differential tax rates m ght be advantageous in the area, I would agree provided that the Council allowed in its future Work Program, for any tax-paying areas which may not have received much tangible benefit to date.

If the people genuinely wish to revive their cooperative society, then it would be worthy of support. I think at this stage govt. officers should be wary of pushing it, however. It must be faced that, by and large, cooperatives have been a failure in the country. Individual enterprises, including transport and trading (marketing) ones, seem to me to hold the best prospect of success, and government advice and assistance would probably be best directed towards such entrepreneurs. 



The problem of patrols visiting only certain villages in an area is normal although not desirable and the problems raised can also be found in most Council areas. Several matters arising from the patrol require no action from this office.

A.D. Advison, No permission is required from this office. The matter should be left entirely to the Council to decide.

Mr. Spencer states with some concern the fact that the people of the area patrolled may be unable to pay the increased tax rate. When the original request was received by the Regional Local Government Officer for the proposed rates, a query was immediately directed to the Council regarding their ability to pay and the reply was that the rates should remain as agreed upon by Gruncil. If there is any doubt as to the ability of a person to pay cach he has recourse to the Council Tax Review Committee or the Tax Appeals Tribunal.

Attached herewith please find two copies of the above report compiled by Mr. J. Spencer, P.O.

This was a routine patrol to conduct a by-election in Ward 2 of the Rai Coast Council and to carry out normal Office of Local Government duties.

I have the following comments to make.

1. Council - General.

The Mindiluk people seem to want to remain remote and aloof from the Council. I feel that this is because they have a lot more ties with the Mankina people than with the Warup people. I feel that once a Council project is started at Tapen, then the Mindiluks will realise that there are advantages to be gained by joining in Council activities.

2. People and the Economy.

Try at we may it has so far been impossible to persuade the Coastal people of the Warup C.D. to sell land to their inland neighbours. This is a pity as the inland people have the incentive and ability to work hard.

At present the Administration is negotiating the purchase of 260 hectares in the Yagomi area. However this will probably be taken up by people living in close proximity to the land who have no suitable land for cattle projects. The only solution to the problem would appear to be the compulsory acquisition of large areas of unused land, but this is seen as a rather drastic move.

The coastal people of the Warun have shown very little interest in the development of their grasslands as cattle projects. However Agriculture are now doing an excellent job in conducting field days etc. to show the people the advantages of raising cattle.

The Tax Review Committee will undergo an intensive course on Tax Collection prior to their departure on patrol on the 2nd. July, 1973.

3. Education.

In the past, unfortunately, the standard of teachers at Umboldi have been below par. As a result the education of children has suffered. I am afraid that the problem of the headmaster not visiting villages in close proximity to the school is common throughout the hal Coast area. I have been asked by teachers in the past to ask the people to attend P. & C. meetins. I don't feel that this is part of our work, as outlying schools should now be independent.

The Council has the matter of the establishment of a school at Sel in hand at the moment.

4. Health.

I believe that a solution to the problem at Tapen is in hand, and I hope that a replacement can soon be found.

The whooping cough and influenza epidemics are now under control.

5. Walking tracks.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT: Recommendations to have Long Island to be absorbed into the Rai Coast Council were made earlier this year and it is understood that we are awaiting Cabinet's approval.

M.V.'KORO': The usage of Koro to transport produce to Madang is agreed upon especially to the areas where there are unsatisfactory transport services encountered. But this poses certain problems in regard to handling of the copra for instance, loading and unloading. Koro's crew are certainly not going to do this. A question of taking care and arranging for the copra to C.M.B., whether they are registered producers with C.M.B. etc. Unless some definite arrangements are made between Long Island/Madang this is not recommended at this stage.

Attached please find two copies of the above patrol report.

My comments are as follows.

INTRODUCTION: It is a pity that Mr. Guise did not talk on Area Authority however, I fully understand the problem he was faced with. The people have been given at least three talks on Local Government however, until Long Island joins the Dai Coast Council, I think it will be rather difficult to get the message across. Once the Council is established I think the problem will be alleviated somewhat. These people have already had information on Area Authority disseminated to thom.

PEOPLE AND ECONOMY: The comment of Mr. Moeder is becoming increasingly common. On my visits to the Island the people approached me and told me they are not receiving enough for their copra. It has not been possible to establish what they are being paid per 1b for copra. Moeder says he pays them 3¢ per 1b, but with copra at over \$200. per ton, I feel that 3¢ per 1b is insufficient, even allowing for shipping costs etc.

A recent agricultural patrol to the Island was told by the people that they did not intend planting any more copra, because of the poor pay they were receiving from Moeder.

It is impossible to investigate what the people have actually been paid per 1b for copra, as they have no idea how much copra they give to Moeder.

They have approached all patrols in the last year and requested that consideration be given to using the Moro to transport their copra to Madang. Your comments would be very much appreciated. The comment on turtles is quite true as is the comment on Beetle nut. It must be remembered that the people are keen to obtain money and are fully conversant with fr ight costs, however, it would appear that traders are rather indiscriminant in their dealings with the people. POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND TRENDS: The people seem to be sotting up Hamlets on the Northern side of the Island, so as to screngthen their claims to the land which they own. LEADERSHIP: Official leaders are not powerful on Long Island, but the men who are most respected are individual family leaders. The young men of the Island are keen to see their area go ahead, and I feel this is good, however, we must continue to foster their interests in Economical

LITERACY: It is encouraging to see the number of students at the school has increased. You may remember that in 1972 no children enrolled for Standard 1, however this year 33 have enrolled. I feel the reason behind this fact is the interest shown by the Officers of the Department of the Chief Minister and Development Administration, in the education within this Sub District. We have encouraged the parents to send their young children to school. education within this Sub District. We have encouraged the parents to send their young children to school, particularly in areas where the school has been closing due to lack of pupils. I was given to understand by the District Superintendant of Education that serious thought was being giving to closing at least three schools in this Sub District.

POLITICAL: The people are rather backward in their understanding of important political matters, and I feel this is no fault of our Department, but rather an innate, inbuilt suspicion of anything new. These people are remote, have very little contact with the outside world and have for many many years been Independent. They lead a very simple life untainted by political, economical and social infighting. Talking to some of the leaders in Lang Island recently I was lead to believe that they consider them Independent in most matters, and further that once Independence comes to this country their way of life will not change.

It is a pity that the elected member for the Rai Coast has not visited Long Island, however, we are well aware of the present members ministerial responsibilities, which allow him very little time in his home electorate.
