

Alpha Phi Omega assigns \$2,000 for student scholarships

Alpha Phi Omega, a men's service fraternity at the University of California, San Diego, recently assigned \$2,000 for student scholarships.

"The money is a result of \$500 we raised from our 'Beauty and the Beast' Contest," said George Kurata, president of the group. "The \$500 was matched by Regents' funds to the total of \$2,000."

The General Scholarship fund received \$500 for one or more continuing students, and the Special Opportunities Scholarship fund received \$1,500 for the culturally deprived.

Alpha Phi Omega, which consists of approximately 30 students at UCSD, has served in several community projects; such as painting and landscaping the Nazareth House in Mission Valley, assisting at the Boy Scout reservation at Mataguay, cleaning pools, gardening, repairing retaining walls and general assistance around the UCSD student coffee hut.

The group also has a visiting service for the students who are in the student infirmary.

Winners of the "Beauty and the Beast" Contest at the local campus were Charles Milne, a junior from University City, and Nancy Lyons of Del Mar.
