

American Academy of Arts and Sciences announces new fellows at UCSD

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Eight members of the University of California, San Diego faculty have been elected as new Fellows of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

They are among 159 selected nationally to be formally inducted Oct.5 during ceremonies at the House of the Academy in Cambridge, Mass.

Honored were Gary Cox, professor of Political Science; SigeYuki Kuroda, professor emeritus, Linguistics; Michael S. Levine, professor, Biology; Jean M. Mandler, professor, Cognitive Science; Richard L. Salmon, professor, Physical Oceanography Research Division; Larry R. Squire, professor, Psychiatry; Harry D. Suhl, professor emeritus, Physics, and Robert Terry, professor, Neurosciences.

The Academy, founded in 1780 by John Adams and other leaders of the young republic, was created as a learned society to "cultivate every art and science which may tend to advance the interest, honor, dignity, and happiness of a free, independent and virtuous people."

This year's inductees join approximately 4,000 Fellows nationwide who have been recognized for their contributions to science, scholarship, public affairs and the arts.
