#### MENYAMYA PATROL No. 6 of 1963/64

I attach for your information a patrol report submitted by Mr. J.E. Moyes, Cadet Patrol Officer who accompanied Mr. C.D. Waite on a patrol of the Wapi Division.

Mr. Moyes has only been in the Territory for a brief period and this is his first patrol. He has submitted a reasonable report which has been adequately covered in Mr. Waite's memorandum of the 21st July.

The report has been shown to the District Commissioner and relevant extracts have been forwarded to the Regional Medical Officer, District Agricultural Officer and District Inspector.

#### MENTANYA PATEGL B2. E/63-64

Please find enclosed three copies of a Patrol Report submitted by Cadet Patrol Officer, MR. J. E. Moyes, covering the abovementioned patrol.

The lateness is due to me not realising that a report was also required from Mr. Meyes in addition to my own Memorandum of Patrol - your 67-2-5, of 2nd July, refers to this matter.

#### Comments:-

Introduction. The reference to inactivity on a communal basis refers to indifference towards inter-group projects rather than a breaking down of established reciprocity - see General Situation below.

Diary. A factual secount.

General Situation. The lassitude of the people can be pin-pointed to there being very little worthwhile at which they can direct their emergies. Ourrent readwork should help. And if they can be given some direction towards a cash economy their attitudes should brighten up further. It is hoped that the survey of the Sub-District being undertaken by the Avpartment of Agriculture will turn up with something.

Health. As to the goitres; the story goes that someone from

Law and Justice. Mr. Moyes' observation is valid.

Agriculture. Agricultural Officer, Mr. D. J. Ross, may be able to do something about the problems mentioned when he visits the Wapi.

Education. The position should improve with the spening of the Mission school at KABONG; not that this will be enough.

Village Officials. An investigation was made of the politics of TANOI No. ?. There did not appear to be any material to justify a change in village officials.

Housing. A good example of how a change invariably effects the whole structure of a traditional way of life.

Missions. The Australian Latheran Mission is doing an excellent job with its secular work.

Roads and Bridges. Work on the proposed Menyange-KABONG reed has accelerated as a result of the patrol.

Conclusion. The 6/- given is a Sub-District figure. It would be closer to 3.

Mr. Moyes has shown that he is able to raport objectvely and be reasonably reastructive in comment. His typing should improve with practice.

INTRODUCTION.

The area patrolled has been regularly contacted by Native Affairs patrols in the last few years. The aim of this patrol was to recruit a work-force to assist in the construction of a road from Menyamya to the Lutheran Mission station at KABONG. This work-force was to be drawn from villages close to the proposed route. At the same time it was hoped that participation in a project such as this would promote interest in and lead to futher activities of a communal nature, an aspect of these peoples' village life which seems to be sadly lacking. Generally response was good and the people willing to work. Future encouragement along these lines would help considerably in the advancement of this still relatively underdeveloped area.

#### PATROL DIARY.

June 1964. Monday 1st.

Departed Menyamya 1315hrs, Arrived TAMOI No1 1600hrs. Village unprepared for our arrival despite knowlege of our coming. Hest house poor so used Miss ion building. Short walk to hill above village to observe surrounding country and villages to be visited.

Tuesday 2nd.

At TAMOI No1.

Village assembled in the morning. Talk by P.O.

Waite on community projects, primarily the construction of the road and benefits from this.

Attempt to induce villagers to think for themselves and formulate their own ideas and plans.

Followed by talk by luluai of KUMAI on conditions as he had observed them at SIASSI. Rain interrupted afternoon activities. Final talk with villagers and arrangements made to work on the road and mark futher extensions on the Wednesday.

Wednesday 3rd.

Peparted TAMOI No1 0900hrs.
Arrived TAMOI No2 1000hrs.
Rest house quite good. Village adressed by P.O.
Waite and luluai of KUMAI. Villagers then held
their own meeting, deciding which days of the
week they pepferred to work on the road. Radio
and P.O. Waites movie camera provoked much interest and amusment.

Thursday 4th

Departed TAMOI No 2 1230hrs.
Arrived SIKWONG 1430hrs.
Departuredelayed by late arrival of carriers.
Rest house at SIKWONG good. Village adressed same afternoonand 80 or so men recruited. Cne man who had worked at Wau had tried to interest the other people in planting coffee but with little success. A couple of plots that we looked at were prorly set out or looked after accentuating the need for proper guidance from an Agricultural officer.

Friday 5th

At SIKWONG.
P.C. Waite and myself accompanied about 70 villagers to the road head. A number of people TAMOI No. 4 and No. 2 working there under so Jion of members of the Lutheran Mission. Inspected work them set out with one of the mission workers Mr. Nitzke to survey a possible route to KABONG. Surveyed as far as AIOGA then returned to SIKWONG.

Saturday 6th

Went to road head again. Good number of workers . Supervised and inspected work then returned to SIKWONG.

Sunday 7th.

At SIKWONG. Sunday observed.

Monday 8th.

Departed SIKWONG 0900hrs.
Arrived AIOGA 1200hrs.
Met resident Lutheran Missionary Mr.J.Strelan at KWAIGUMA (across a gully from AIOGA) Rest house at AIOGA very roomy but in danger of falling down. Some hasty propping had obviously been done shortly before our arrival. Village adressed by P.O.Waite who also distributed some vegetable seed creating some interest. Some lettuce brought to the rest house. Generally poor having no heart despite information that they had been planted in a reasonable place. Probably picked a bit prematurely.

Tuesday 9th

Final talk and organisation of about 60 to 70 labourers for road work. DEparted AIOGA 1400hrs arrived KABBNG 1600hrs.Met resident mission medic Mr.K.Cramer.

Wednesday 10th

At KABONG.
Villagers of KABONG and AKWANJE assembled.
Adressed by P.O. Waite and luluai of KUMAI.
Combined work-force of both villages approximately 160 men. The villagers held their own meeting and decided to work on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. In the afternoon while P.O. Waite and a mission worker Mr. Pfeiffer surveyed an approached for the road into KABONG, I, accompanied by nativeconstable GANATO walked to the top of the range observing the village of HIMERKA onthe far side. Descent to HIMERKA very steep, little possibility of a road. Returned to KABONG.

Thursday 11th

At KABONG.
Accompanied by Mr. Pfeiffer set out for the road head. Arrived about 0900hrs. Only some 12 orso TAMOIs working there. A death in the village was the reason offered for the absentees. Met Mr. Ram, the missionary supervising the construction of the road and completed a survey of the road into KABONG.

Friday 12th

At KABONG.

Local natives cleared kunai grass in initial section of the road at KABONG. More detailed survey for about 3 mile approaching KABONG.

Saturday 13th

Departed KABON 0930hrs. Arrived Menyamya 1230hrs.

#### OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS.

#### GENERAL SITUATION.

Recption of the patrol in all villages was friendly. Response to talks given by P.O. Waite was varied but generally enthusiastic. The people of TAMOI Not were at first rather indifferent to the presence of the patroland responded least of all the villages. - pessibly de to poor inter-lineage cohesion.

One of the growing problems is arising out of the lack of activity, agriculturally or otherwise in the Sub-District. Workers returning from plantations are stagnating in their villages. Some of these people have made attempts to grow coffee or other plants but with nothing of this nature already in the Sub-District most attempts are half-pearted or the persons knowlede insufficient to allow him to make a success of his venture. These instances however are isolated, the majority of workers returning to their village and the old way of life.

It was gratifying to hear one of the elders at TAMOI No2 criticising the young people for their inactivity and their being content to live as their parents did. This, coupled with their willwagness to partake in the construction of the road ddes seem to demonstrate that these people are interested in doing something if only we can direct and channel this interest.

#### HEALTH.

All villagers observed appeared in good halth and sufficiently well fed. Hygiene still leaves much to be desired but missionaries and their evangelists seem to be some influence in their villages, these being noticeably cleaner and neater. At SIKWONG quite a number of men had goitres. Evidently they will not consent to surgery.

#### LAW AND JUSTICE.

Only one complaint was brought to the notice of the patrol. This does not necessarily indicate an improvement in law-abidance. The writer felt that the village officials, sensing the main purpose of the patrol, withheld disputes they might have otherwise have brought forward.

#### AGRICULTURE.

Subsistence agriculture appears to be satisfactory (see HEALTH). With cash cropping, very little seems to have been done. Some villagers, who had returned from plantations, had attempted to plant coffee but lack of knowledge and guidance had rendered these projects virtual failures. Agriculture is one field which could provide the income necessary to a development of the area.

European vegetables as well as being an addition to traditional diet of the people are also a small source of incoma.

#### EDUCATION.

The only educational facilities in this area are at KWAIGUMA station of the Lutheran Mission. The Mission school there caters for preparatory grade only. The Mission plans to have a European teacher at KABONG by the end of the year but at the moment pupils from Standard 1 and over are accommodated at the already crowded Mission school at Menyamya. The present school facilities are obviously inadquate for the needs of this Census Division. And if the Sub-District is to be

developed education will be one of its primary needs;

#### VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

The luluais of TAMOI NO 4 and No 2 had little influence in their villages and were of no real assistance. All other Village Officials were helpful and interested even if not outstanding in the execution of their duties.

The proposed course for these people could well promote better relations and understanding between them and the Administration.

#### HOUSING.

The majority of houses were of conical decign with few coastal style buildings. These were mainly mission buildings or in areas under mission influence. No immediate change in design can be seen, for until these paople can afford clothes they will continue to build houses of such a design as to ensure warmth.

#### MISSIONS.

The Australian Lutheran Mission has resident Europeans at KWAIGUMA and KABONG. Stationed at KWAIGUMA is Mr.J.Strelan and at KABONG, medic MR.K.Cramer. The Mission also have evangelists at TAMOI No 2 and SIKWONG. The good work they are doing is reflected in the general village neatness and some coastal design buildings in areas under their influence.

At KABONG for about 12 months is Mission worker Mr.D.Pfieffer who will sup4#vise roadwork from that station to link up with the road from Menyamya.

The Mission is doing invaluable work in the area; work which could not have been conceivably done by the Administration on its own.

#### ROADS AND BRIDGES.

Approximately 2-3 miles of the Menyamya-KABONG road has now been completed and with the work-force recruited on the patrol the road should be completed in 9-10 months. When fompleted tit it will be 8-9 miles in length. Up till now lack of equipment and funds for bridges has been a prohibiting factor in the construction.

The walking tracks between villages were well asfined with some attempt being made to cut and form those on hillwides.

#### CONCLUSION.

The first aim of the patrol was successfully fulfilled with the recruiting of some 300 men to assist in the construction of the Menyamya-KABONG road.

In respect of the second object of the patrol, this area is economically poor in natural resources. The statistics show the annual income of the Sub-District to be 6/- per head per annum. This factor, in the development of the people is naturally a hinderance and much hope is placed in the Agricultural survey, now underway, finding some way of raising this figure.

The lack of income earning activity is suspending the social development of the Sub-District.
