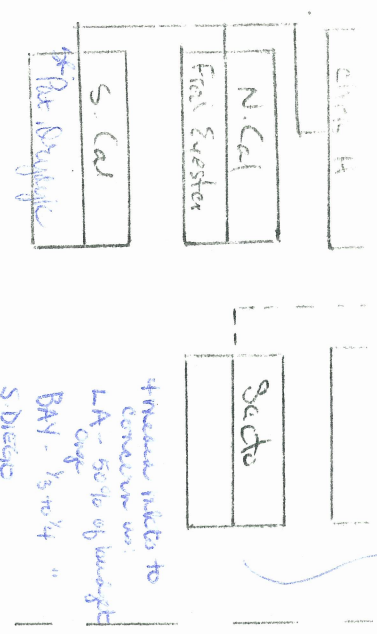

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS  
ON MAIL REGISTRATION  
IN CALIFORNIA

1. Q. WHO CAN REGISTER BY MAIL?
  - A. Any person who is qualified by age, citizenship and residence to register to vote in California through a deputy registrar may also register by mail.
2. Q. CAN A VOTER USE AN ACTUAL POST CARD OR IS A FORM INVOLVED?
  - A. A form is involved but it is not a postcard since it exceeds the dimensions of a postcard. Section 324 of the California Elections Code requires that the Secretary of State print, or cause to be printed, Voter Registration Cards. Title 2, Division 7, Article 2 of the California Administrative Code and Section 310 of the Elections Code designates the specifications of the form.
3. Q. IS THE FORM DIFFERENT FOR EACH COUNTY?
  - A. The forms allow for informational language to meet the specific needs of each county, but are sufficiently uniform among the separate counties to allow for the processing and use by one county of an affidavit completed in another county.
4. Q. MUST YOU LIVE IN THE COUNTY TO REGISTER IN THE COUNTY?
  - A. Your registration must be maintained in the county of your residence. You may, however, register while temporarily in another county by using the forms of the host county which will be forwarded to your own county. You may even request a Voter Registration Card be mailed to you by your County Clerk, wherever you may be -- in another state or country.
5. Q. MUST YOU BE AN OFFICIAL REGISTRAR TO HAND OUT POST CARD REGISTRATION FORMS?
  - A. NO.

6. Q. HOW DO ORGANIZATIONS OBTAIN FORMS "IN QUANTITY"?

A. Forms should be obtained from local elections officials under most circumstances. The Secretary of State has required that counties issue no more than fifty cards to anyone EXCEPT on the receipt of a detailed written plan for their distribution. This limitation is necessary to avoid the sudden depletion of the supply to people who will not use the cards to register voters, or who will distribute them carelessly.

7. Q. MAY AN INDIVIDUAL OR AN ORGANIZATION "DUPLICATE" THE OFFICIAL FORM FOR DISTRIBUTION?

A. NO. A bill to permit duplication of forms was introduced in the Assembly this year, but it was not passed by that house.

8. Q. IF NOT, AND AN EXACT COPY WERE MADE, HOW COULD IT BE DETERMINED THAT THE FORM IS A FORGERY?

A. The question assumes an "undetectable" EXACT copy. There are no silk threads in the mail registration forms.

9. Q. HOW MUCH DO THE FORMS COST?

A. The printer's latest estimate is approximately \$13 per thousand.

10. Q. HOW MUCH IS BUDGETED FOR DISTRIBUTION THIS YEAR, AND WHY ARE THE NUMBERS OF FORMS LIMITED?

A. \$296,000 for printing and \$850,000 for postage. This will pay for approximately 22,700,000 cards. I believe this number to be reasonable.

11. Q. CAN A VOTER RE-REGISTER IF THE PERSON HAS MOVED FOR EXAMPLE, BY USING POST CARDS?

A. The voter must Re-Register if he or she moves and may do so by mail or in person, whichever is most convenient. Pending legislation (not to be effective in 1976) would permit the voter to change his or her registration address by a post card notice to the county clerk.

12. Q. MAY OFFICIAL REGISTRARS DISTRIBUTE POST CARDS?

A. Any person may distribute mail registration forms, including official registrars.

13. Q. CAN POST CARDS BE FILLED OUT AT HOME OR MUST THEY BE FILLED OUT BY AN OFFICIAL REGISTRAR?

A. Voter Registration Cards are designed for SELF REGISTRATION. Official Registrars are not required.



14. Q. ARE REGISTRARS PAID FOR HELPING FILL OUT POST CARDS?

A. Not by any governmental entity. They could be paid from private sources. Deputy registrars may be paid, as in the past, for executing the non-mail forms

15. Q. CAN UNOFFICIAL DISTRIBUTORS OF POST CARDS BE PAID BY ORGANIZATIONS FOR REGISTERING BY POST CARD?

A. YES.

16. Q. WHAT PROCESS WILL BE USED BY COUNTY REGISTRARS AND SECRETARY OF STATE IN DISTRIBUTING FORMS?

A. Cards will be issued to all comers, except that individuals and organizations requesting forms will be required to submit detailed written distribution plans if they wish to receive more than 50 cards.

Distribution plans include, (but are not limited to); the following:

1. The supplying of cards to new customers by utilities.
2. Making cards available at all D.M.V. and Welfare Offices.
3. Direct mail to all new voters whose 18th birthday occurred or will occur during the year ending November 2, 1976. For future years this program will probably be replaced by one in which new voters are contacted in the high schools.
4. The CTA and NEA are firming up plans to register all unregistered school employees, kindergarten through community college.
5. Frontlash has requested a large number of cards for their projects, particularly at colleges.
6. Candidates and political organizations will be issued cards according to their needs and ability to distribute them.
7. There are numerous local outreach efforts. Sacramento County, for example, is planning to use a recording telephone. Mail registration forms will be sent to voters who call in requesting them.

There is no way to guarantee that forms will be distributed fairly or that all will be used. However, registrars have been directed to use their best judgement and to issue cards in small numbers to requesters until they have demonstrated that they will distribute them effectively.

There will be no charge to organizations for forms.

17. Q. HOW WILL A VOTER BE NOTIFIED THAT HE OR SHE IS ACTUALLY REGISTERED?

A. A "voter notification card" will be mailed to each registrant. The registration will be cancelled if this card is returned as undeliverable.

18. Q. WHAT ARE CUTOFF DATES FOR REGISTRATION BY MAIL? IS THIS DATE DIFFERENT FROM REGISTRATION IN THE NORMAL WAY?
- A. A properly executed affidavit must be received by the registrar on or before the 29th day prior to election day. The same cutoff applies to registration through deputy registrars.
19. Q. CAN NATURALIZED CITIZENS REGISTER BY MAIL?
- A. YES, any citizen eligible to vote can register in whatever manner they choose, (by mail, or in person).
20. Q. HOW ABOUT FORMER CONVICTS?
- A. YES, provided that they have completed their parole.
21. Q. MUST VOTER KEEP POST CARD RECEIPT FOR PROOF OF REGISTRATION?
- A. It is usually unnecessary to prove registration in this way. HOWEVER, voters are strongly advised to keep the voter notification card to prevent the loss of their vote in cases where their affidavits may have been misplaced through administrative error.
22. Q. CAN AN ABSENTEE REGISTER BY POST CARD OUT-OF-STATE?
- A. YES, provided that they are bona fide California residents who are eligible to vote, in all respects.
23. Q. WHAT ORGANIZATIONS QUALIFY FOR DISTRIBUTION OF MAIL REGISTRATION FORMS?
- A. All organizations who will use them to register voters.
24. Q. CAN POLITICAL PARTIES OBTAIN QUANTITIES OF THE FORMS?
- A. YES.
25. Q. HOW DOES A POLITICAL PARTY ORGANIZATION OBTAIN QUANTITIES OF CARDS?
- A. From the local Registrar of Voters or County Clerks.
26. Q. CAN INDIVIDUALS GET QUANTITIES? HOW?
- A. YES. Initial issues will be made in limited quantities. Later issues can be increased if the individual builds up a track record of effective distribution. A reasonably detailed written distribution plan will be required.
- Registrars will coordinate with the Secretary of State before honoring requests for 10,000 or more cards.



## VOTER REGISTRATION CARD DO'S AND DON'TS

Limited quantities of Voter Registration Cards are available! It is IMPORTANT that they reach unregistered voters or people who have recently moved and must re-register. If you will follow these DO'S and DON'TS, you will be doing your part:

### DO

- DO** ... ASK people if they are registered; if they are not, give them a card
- DO** ... ASK people if they personally know others who are not registered; and if they do, give them cards for those people
- DO** ... Make sure that people understand the Voter Registration Card - - that it is a "self" registration card to be detached and mailed after it is completed - - that no postage stamp is necessary, etc. - - answer questions and assist people if you can
- DO** ... Explain these DO'S and DON'TS to anyone who helps you with distribution
- DO** ... Make SOMEONE personally responsible for any forms you leave in a public place.
- DO** ... Enlist the aid of organized groups such as Clubs, Churches, PTA's, etc.
- DO** ... Use precinct walking lists and distribute them to people in homes without registered voters
- DO** ... Return unused cards promptly so that others may use them

### DON'T

- DON'T** ... Leave a pile of forms unattended anywhere with a "Help Yourself" or "Take One" sign
- DON'T** ... Hand a card to everyone who passes a certain place, such as a musical or sports event
- DON'T** ... Go door-to-door leaving one at each house. Inquire, instead, whether any unregistered voters live there
- DON'T** ... Use direct mail, except to carefully selected groups, and then only if you make a personal or telephone follow-up
- DON'T** ... Let the cards gather dust in your car, house or the back room of your office; keep them moving
- DON'T** ... Take more cards than you can reasonably use. Think through your distribution plan in advance and plan your strategy
