## Striker Is Shot Dead. Bringing First Fatality In Lettuce Walkout

EL CENTRO, Calif., Feb. 10 (UPI) - A striker was shot dead today in the Imperial County lettuce fields, the first fatality in the United Farm Workers' three-week old strike against 10 lettuce growers in the Imperial Valley.

After the killing, the 28-member grower's association called for an immediate end to the strike and asked Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. to mobilize the California National Guard.
